

Minister of Finance Points Out Necessity of Curtailment and Cuts Off All Public Works For Present Time.

Ottawa, April 20 .- A surplus of one and a half million dollars for a year in which, in common with practically every other country, Canada has been confronted with falling revenues and prospects of a deficit, was the gratifying announcement made by Hon. Mr. Fielding is his thirteenth budget speech in the House of Commons. The story which the Minister of Finance had to tell no doubt suffered in Toronto comparison with previous chapters of Montreal trade, of growing revenues and of business developments, which has been the history of the Dominion for the past twelve years, but in circum stances created by the recent worldwide financial stringency, and in view of the experience of other countries, where a remedy has been sought in an increase of taxation, the result of the past year's operations in Canada Wearther No.

In the third of his series of lectures given at the Auditorium last night, Dr. Edgar J. Banks spoke on "Bismyra, the Oldest City in the World." This was one of the cities unearthed by the University of Chicago Babylonian expedition, and the work of the party CHANGE IN TRANSIT formed a large portion of the lecture. Long before Abraham had moved up out of the land of Ur. Bismyra had been a flourishing city, and before that Railway Board Fixes Tariff for Altertime had been buried. Bismyra is in the very centre of Babylonia on the vast plain between the two great rivers, the Tigris and Euphrates, early days it was a fertile plain, irrigating canals being run through the country in every direction. FOUND A REVOLVER **NEAR KINRADE HOUSE**

But It Looks Like a Hoax or an Advertising Scheme—Found Beneath the Walk.

Hamilton, Ont., April 21. - A 32calibre revolver was found this morning under a slat walk, leading to the residence of Mrs. Abbott, 111 Herkimer street, two doors west of the Kinrade home, by William Robson and George Anderson, two bricklayers, who were going to work. The general impres sion is that the revolver is not the one with which the murder of Ethel Kinrade was committed, but that it was placed there recently as a huge hoax on the police and public. Last night at a local theatre, a thaumaturgist announced that a revolver would be found under the sidewalk on Herkimer street. Robson was one of those present, and as he went to work this work this morning in company with Anderson, was talking about the matter. He had decided to keep his eye open, and as he passed Mrs. Abbott's house he noticed something shining under the slat walk, immediately next to the cement sidewalk. His companion thought it was a piece of tin, but Robson stooped down, and putting his hand under the slats, pulled forth a revolver. He put it back again, and from D. M. Brown's grocery store the police were notified. The revolver is a self-cocker. 32-calisix-chambered, and is of stocky bulldog variety, with a short barrel. The end of the barrel was incrusted with soft dirt, each chamber was choked up, and the mechanism was grimy. There was not a speck of rust on the weapon, and this beyond doubt that the revolver was placed there recently. 
