MR. FIELDING PRESENTS BUDGET MILLION AND HALF SURPLUS

The National Transcontinental Expenditure Big But Justified CANADA'S CREDIT IS EXCELLENT

Minister of Finance Points Out Necessity of Curtailment and Cuts Off All Public Works For Present Time.

Ottawa, April 20.—A surplus of one and a half million dollars for a year in every other country, Canada has been confronted with falling revenues and prospects of a deficit, was the gratifying announcement made by Hon. Mr. Fielding in his thirteenth budget speech in the House of Commons.

With her husband and two little sons looking on, Mrs. James Gardiner, of 651 Richmond street, was terribly burned by an explosion of gasoline yesterday, and is at present in St. Joseph's Hospital in a very critical condition.

Gasoline Exploded. In an instant there was a blaze, which set fire to the coat and to Mrs. Gardiner's dress, and a second later the can, with four quarts of gasoline in it, exploded, and the flames shot into the air and set fire to the shelving and a quantity of clothes in the room.

Hair Was on Fire. "It all happened so quickly that we could do nothing," said Russell Gardner, who was standing in the room at the time.

BISMIRA THE OLDEST CITY OF THE WORLD

Dr. Banks Continues His Interesting Lectures at the Auditorium.

In the third of his series of lectures given at the Auditorium last night, Dr. Edgar J. Banks spoke on "Bismira, the Oldest City in the World." This was one of the cities unearthed by the University of Chicago Babylonian expedition, and the work of the party formed a large portion of the lecture.

Some interesting facts about the great expedition were told by Dr. Banks. The laborers, who were about 500 in number, were paid 12 cents a day for their labor. The expedition built huts for them, which they could purchase for 15 cents.

Various finds of great beauty and interest, which were discovered in the excavating of the city, were illustrated on the screen, and carefully described. Among these was a beautiful gold plate, dating from 3,750 B. C., which was presented to the late President Harper of Chicago University.

REMOVE SCREENS FROM THE BARS

Temperance People Yesterday Made a Suggestion to the License Commissioners

MATTER IS CONSIDERED

Hotelmen Praised by the Delegation Present—Inspector Galpin's Salary To Be Increased.

The annual meeting of the license commissioners was held yesterday afternoon and was unique from the fact that it was the first session at which not a single complaint was registered against London hotelmen.

On the contrary Secretary McDermid and Rev. D. S. Hamilton, of the London Temperance League, had nothing but praise for the manner in which the hotels are conducted.

Secretary McDermid

Secretary McDermid congratulated the board upon their efficient work and also Dr. Drake upon his appointment, and spoke in high terms of Mr. William Yeates, of the board.

"Nothing spectacular has occurred during the year," he said. "The only thing I would mention is the transfer of the Mahon license to the Grand Trunk depot. But I have not the slightest complaint to make, as it removes a hotel that it was well to get rid of. In regard to the removal of screens, I heartily endorse Mr. Hamilton's views. We want particularly to keep the boys out and if screens are removed it will help me to get rid of them."

Commissioners Pleased.

"You have no objections to make regarding any hotels," asked Chairman Greer. "Not the slightest," said Mr. McDermid.

"We are glad to hear it," said Mr. Greer. "We are, in regard to removing screens, I don't know whether the law gives us the necessary power." "Yes, I have read it up, and it does," said Mr. McDermid.

"Well, then, we will consider your request at the earliest opportunity." "In regard to what you say about the station license," Mr. Greer continued, "I opposed the transfer being granted, because during the wait for trains there is a decided tendency for a certain class of men to get intoxicated and become a nuisance to passengers, and conductors, and in fact everybody. I think you are justified in the praise you have bestowed on Inspector Galpin. He has worked faithfully, and in London puts in so many hours for so little pay. We have taken up the matter of securing a raise for him with the department. As to our hotels we have as fine a lot as can be found in any city in Canada. This is to some extent owing to the individual care of the hotel-keepers and they deserve every praise."

Inspector Galpin presented the following report, showing his work: Recorded visits for year, 8,788. Fines collected, \$820.

There were 36 cases during the year, three of which were dismissed, one was dismissed as witnesses could not be found, and the other two cases were dismissed on account of not having sufficient evidence.

He was assassinated in 1897. There arose a serious movement against him in May of last year when he was expelled from the island and banished. He made his escape to the mainland and fled there for several days before being restored.

DRANK CARBOLIC ACID

Toronto, April 20.—Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson, wife of Dr. S. G. Thompson, of 229 Jarvis street, died in St. Michael's Hospital this morning from a dose of carbolic acid. Mrs. Thompson, who has been an invalid for the past four years, managed in some way to get hold of a two ounce bottle filled with carbolic acid, and almost emptied the bottle before she was found. She was rushed to the hospital where stomach-pumps and every device known to medical men were applied, but without success. Death resulted soon after. Mrs. Thompson, who was 45 years of age, leaves, besides the doctor, a son, George, aged 19 years.

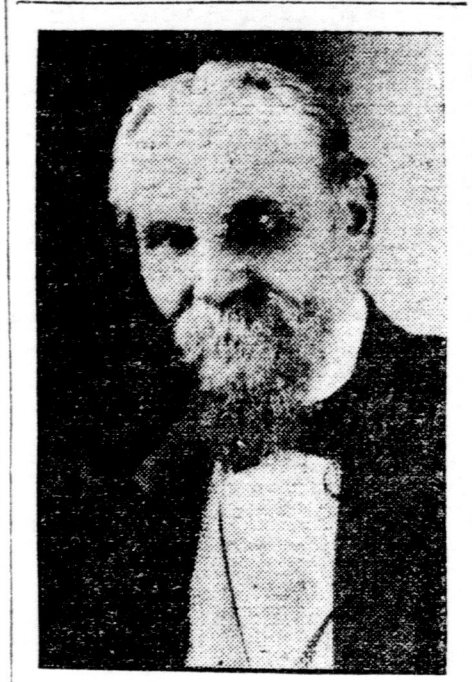
