

Federal Officer Is Seriously Injured at Vaudreuil by Man Who Suicides.

Vaudreuil, Que., over the administration of the military service act, Jos. Chevrier committed suicide following an assault by him on James O'Neil Farrell, a federal policeman, whom he injured seriously with a rifle.

The military authorities here gave out the information about the shooting. They stated that Farrell was engaged in making an arrest when he was assaulted by Joseph Chevrier, who resides at St. Lazare, near Vaudreuil.

Farrell was taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital in this city. There he was found to be suffering from concussion of the brain, and had, apparently, been hit over the head by Chevrier with the butt-end of his rifle. An operation was performed, and afterwards it was announced that Farrell was in a very dangerous state. An official investigation into the affair has been ordered.

Quebec, July 12.-The Canadian war nuseum has just arrived from England via Montreal, and is to be displayed for the first time on this conplayed for the first time on this continent in the Exposition Park here.

The size of the museum may be gathered from the fact that it took seven large cars to carry part of it here from Montreal, and it is not all here yet. The museum includes one zeppelin, two aeroplanes, ten heavy cannon, several machine guns, a quantity of small arms, rifles, helmets, uniforms, and other kinds of German war material.

The exhibit will take up 12,000 to 15,000 square feet in the central building of the local exposition.

#### QUEBEC BARRACKS MAY FOLLOW LEAD OF THE CALGARY COMMAND

Quebec, July 12.—A secret meeting of all the principal officers of the Mill-tary District No. 5, was held at noon today at the Quebec drill hall, and although no official announcement was forthcoming, it is known the conflict between the civil and military officials over the habeas corpus proceedings were dealt with. As related yesterday Justice Dorion of the superior court ruled that Col. Rogers and Major Paquette be jailed here for contempt of court if, on July 17, they have not produced Edward Durand, draftee, who obtained a writ of habeas corpus from the superior court. That armed resistance would be offered by the local militia to officers of the civil law attempting to arrest Col. Rogers and Major Paquette is not known yet, but it is believed the local militia will do as much as the Calgary barracks to resist the arrest of the abovementioned officers.

#### VALIDITY OF ORDER-IN-COUNCIL BEFORE SUPREME COURT JULY 18

George Edwin Grey of Nipissing, who is under arrest because he refused to don a military uniform at Niagara camp, and also declined to be inoculated. After hearing the application in chambers, Mr. Justice Anglin consented to the issuance of an order referring the matter to the full supreme court, which will sit on Thursday next, July 18.







THILE THE GERMANS make war upon the occupants of hospitals and homes with crown prince. their air forces, the triumvirate of Allied fivers on the west front proceed with the business of destroying military works. Bombing raids have terrorized certain German cities, and whereever the enemy has munition works and storages the Allied aviators are dropping tons and tons of

These Allied air raids are not organized with the desire to kill children or to demolish churches. The code of the nations fighting Germany has never changed. Handicapped though they may be by their ethics, they proceed without frightfulness, although, as occurred in Cologne the other day when two street cars were smashed like match boxes, the German civilian population is made to realize how easily two could play at savagery. The sportsmanlike game is winning out. The Allies have hosts of young men ready to fly. They have an almost inexhaustible supply of aircraft and the materials with which to build them, and the day comes closer when the possibility of deciding the war in the air will be imminent.

Great bombing machines have been construct. ed in the United States and Britain which are play an important part in the months to come, the infantry in an attack such as the Germans council. launched this spring. The air will soon be full of housands upon thousands of Allied planes.

NO REVENGE ON RUSSIA.

ITH SOME authority, the news is telegraphed from Berlin that Germany will not hold Russia's Soviet Government responsible for the murder of Count von Mirbach, believing that it is doing all in its power to find and punish the murderers. This, following the outbreak of indignation at the murder and the demand for reprisals on Russia by the Germans, looks rather suspicious, and one is moved to look farther than friendship for the Russians to discover the reason for Berlin's present calmness.

Things have been going badly with the Bolsheviki. In Siberia they have had some bad beatings and there is a growing unrest among the various Russian factions against German rule. Had the Germans decided to exact revenge for Mirbach's death, there was a possibility that, in desperation, all the Russians would join together to oppose the common foe. There was afforded to her in those days opportunities for helpfulness that opened to her an average of service for many years since. For fourteen years she has been in regular mission extension work in Peakskill, 40 miles from New York, on the Hudson. The institution is the beautiful summer home of Mrs. Cortland de Puyster, a former society belle, who some years ago renounced her life of unalloyed pleasure to give her time and energy to the spiritual guidance of girls. This Home of Rest, as the organization is called, has for its sole object the spiritual welfare of girls and young women. It aims to fill a real need in the lives of many who have often the desire to seek after the higher and better things of life, and who, in their effort to learn the truth without proper assistance and guidance, sometimes fall by the roadside. Besides the Home of Rest yt Peakskill, there is a haven in New York City called Hephzibah House (meaning "He delighteth in me"). Spiritual recuperation is offered to those who have not been able to find absolute contentment in the life they have been leading. Miss Grigg related several instances of girls whom

lated several instances of girls whom the organization had helped to better, saner, purer and calmer lives. saner, purer and calmer lives.

Emphasizes Spiritual Element.

Miss Grigg's theory is that all Christian associations for young women should be primarily spiritual organizations. If this element is lacking, girls

should be primarily spiritual disparantions. If this element is lacking, girls can obtain from a business college or ordinary school what the Y. W. C. A. offers. But to offset the restlessness that characterizes the young woman of the present day, the association must strive and make the spiritual atmosphere predominant, and the social and physical elements subservient to this. Now is the time to reach the young women with serious problems whose minds are turned in that direction as never before.

Miss Grigg impresses one as a person of absolute serenity of disposition, of real tact, and a sympathetic understanding with her fellow-beings. She proves the theory that perfect contentment is to be found only in a life of service. While in the city she is the guest of her sister, Mrs. H. A. Sablne, Ridout street.

#### **BOLSHEVIKI SOUNDLY** BEATEN BY CZECHS IN WEST SIBERIA

and Commander Takes His Life.

London, July 11.-Gen. Muravieff, commander of the Bolshevik forces operating against the Czecho-Slovaks, has committed suicide, according to an \$10,000,000 DRIVE official Russian wireless dispatch re-ceived here. The dispatch, which denounces Muravieff as a traitor, reads nounces Muravieff as a traitor, reads:

"He issued a false order to his troops and sought to direct an offensive against the Soviet Government of Russia. He ordered his men to advance against off Moscow, and at the same time attacked the town of Simbursk, in the Volga region. The Soviet troops, however, declined to obey his orders and remained faithful to the Soviets' authority. Finding the troops would not follow him in betraying the revolution, traitor Muravieff shot himself.

"On the Czecho-Slovak front all is quiet and the situation is secure. Troops are preparing for a further offensive against Czecho-Slovaks and White Guards."

Guards."

London, July 11.—Virtually all of Western Siberia is in the control of the Czecho-Slovaks, according to a Reuter dispatch from Peking, dated July 10. The dispatch states that the Bolsheviki have been overthrown in the whole region from Tobolsk, east of the Urals, to Semipalatinsk, 750 miles to the southeast, near the Chinese frontier. The Trans-Siberian Railway is under Czecho-Slovak control from Tcheliabinsk in the Ural Mountains, at the junction of the branches of the road which lead to South and North Rusia, to Krasnovarsk, 1,300 miles to the east.

The report confirms earlier dispatches to the effect that the Bolsheviki at Irkutsk have been defeated by the Czecho-Slovaks.

#### "MY PETTY ECONOMIES."

Economic Essex, who told us some weeks ago about her thrift in brooms rites another interesting letter this week, concerning what she chooses to term urther "petty economies."

Why does Economic Essex persist in addressing the editor of this departent as "Dear Sir"? And she isn't the only one, notwithstanding the fact that the name at the top of the page is feminine, not masculine. And, by the way, the name isn't camouflage at all, and we sincerely hope that the editorials contained from week to week in this page do not read like camouflage.

Economic Essex writes as follows this week (and we will be glad to have

Dear Sir,—If I were to tell you all I can remember of the petty economies I have had to practice, (it seems to me all my life), I think it would raise a hearty laugh, and with some of the prudes it might raise the eyebrows in a most disapproving fashion. I really believe there are some people who do not understand the word economy as I do. I am not boasting, but I have been chided by my own sister for being too much that way. Now, don't think me miserly, either, because I just enjoy spending money when I can get something worth while. But I will explain. When I want anything very much, and want more than one thing or several, I just weigh the pros and cons, and when I find I can't get more than one or maybe two of the articles desired, I just ask myself the difference between what I want and what I need. If I find it is just fancy and I don't stand in real need of any of them, I omit them from my list. I do that with my grocer's order. He only comes once in two weeks. I am a woman of many fancies, and it is hard sometimes to forego the things I have been looking forward to, but my mother instilled a horror of debt in my mind, which I think, will never desert me now.

I saw your kind request asking me to write again soon, so I'll do it, while I've the notion. I also noticed the reference to cooking mackerel in your page of June 28. Do you know, I don't think. I have seen one since I landed here nearly fifteen years ago, but in England, mother always just plain boiled them in water seasoned with salt, and she left ways just plain boiled them in water seasoned with salt, and she left the head on. She put the fish in cold water, let it come to a boil, and as soon as the eyes were real white, she took it right out of the water to drain. We never heard of cream sauce in those days. If we had the ingredients to spare, she made melted butter. I always wondered why it was called that, because of the very small bit of butter which went into the white sauce made of plain flour and milk. If any of the mackerel was left cold, plain cold vinegar was put over it until we needed it for another meal. another meal.

Here, we buy what our butcher calls the "whole plate" of beef. Most of it is the whole brisket, and with a couple of good sized rib roasts joining it, weighing anything from fifteen to thirty pounds, according to the size of the beast. That's all the kind of fresh meat we ever buy, because it is cheapest, and we corn the point if it is a heavy one. We have never yet paid over eighteen cents a pound. I put it in the oven over night always. The slow cooking makes even the point tender. I advise everyone to always ask for a fat brisket as the lean is always the most tender on them.

Now, another of my economies is to use a mending preparation for Now, another of my economics is a still using the dishpan I bought when I was married nearly fifteen years ago, and for which I paid forty-

five cents. I've only used up seven of the mending patches so far at two cents each or fifteen for a quarter.

Now really, I must quit for this time. I remain as before, ECONOMIC ESSEX.

#### Will Economic Essex be good enough to tell us how she corns her beef?

CUTTING DOWN UNNECESSARY DELIVERIES Talking about reducing the cost of living through cutting down expenses in connection with delivery charges, a subject on which we have frequently discoursed in this department for a year or so past, the retail merchants of St. John, N. B., have undertaken to reduce unnecessary deliveries and needless return of goods. The public of St. John, it is said, has manifested a great willingness to co-operate.

Not only does elimination of unnecessary trips on the part of delivery wagons and motors cut down the cost of operation of business, but it also releases man power and boy power for more necessary work in war-time. The woman delivery driver hasn't yet arrived in Western Ontario.

Once upon a time it may not have been considered good form to carry home one's own parcels, and the individual who did so was considered to be unmindful of appearance, terribly independent, or even rather foolish. Red Cross knitting bags and war-time conditions have brought most people to a mo ommon-sense state of mind. Carrying home spools and even more formidable bundles is really a species of patriotic service.

Here are some of the suggestions given to customers in the waste-eliminat ng campaign:

1. Carry all the parcels you can.

2. Buy carefully, so that you will not need to return your purchase. 3. When you have goods to return, bring them to the store yourself,

when possible. 4. Shop in the morning-early when possible.

5. Accept your purchases unwrapped, whenever possible, to conserve wrapping paper.

The following are some of the waste-eliminating regulations which have been adopted by the St. John Retail Merchants' Association:

UNWRAPPED PACKAGES. Drygoods merchants will deliver merchandise to customers in the original package, without placing the same in one of the store's own boxes or wrapping it in an outside paper. Merchandise not sold in original packages will be placed in boxes in which other merchandise has been received from manufacturers, when suitable boxes are obtainable, and be delivered without outside wrapping

#### "BABY WEEK" POPULAR,

A series of "Baby Weeks" will be held in Ontario this summer, due to the fact that people are awakening to the great patriotic importance of conserving the lives of the future citizens, in view of the wastage of war. Of course, there are many other reasons for organization to wage warfare against the foes of babyhood, but the patriotic argument is one which strongly counts with the people who are inclined to feel that nothing matters but bringing the great war to

successful conclusion. Since so much attention has been attracted to London by the splendid start made in the Child Welfare campaign, it behooves the city to live up to he reputation in this respect.

With regard to the value of a Child Welfare Exhibit, apart from the service

endered to the community in an educational way, a specific case of life saving through the baby clinic has been related in connection with the Brampton Child Welfare Exhibit held in June.

There was one little one presented at the baby clinic there whose little life was in imminent danger, and who would not have survived a month unless it had received immediate attention. By the way, doesn't that constitute a strong argument for regular "well baby" clinics as well as "sick baby" clinics? By "well baby" clinics as well as "sick baby" clinics? "well baby" clinic is meant one to which children can be brought regularly to be weighed and to see how they are progressing. Frequently the tot has a serious weakness that requires to be overcome before it can thrive, some physical defect that should be corrected before it can possibly grow vigorous. Sometimes underfeeding, overfeeding or otherwise faulty feeding is interfering with the child's well-being quite unsuspected by the mother. At the "Baby Week" in Brampton, which was concentrated into two days, no less than one hundred and fifty children were examined in the clinic. While in London the age limit was three years and under, there it was extended to six years.

Brampton is well satisfied, not only with the great interest manifested in the

clinic end of Baby Week, but also the exhibit features, moving pictures and the evening program.

Brampton exhibit was honored by the presence of the chief medical officer of

Brampton exhibit was honored by the presence of the chief medical officer of health of the province, Lieut.-Col. McCullough, who addressed the evening gathering. And this is the plea he made for Child Welfare, "No one woman's child is safe until every woman's child is safe." Isn't that something for the people to think about who say, "Really, I'm not interested. My children have every possible care and attention, and I wouldn't take them to the clinics anyway."

Medical men who specialize on diseases of children are unanimous in their declaration that the one most supremely important thing in the care of children is proper feeding. The mayor of Brampton was chairman at the evening meeting addressed by Lieut.-Col. McCullough, and after the latter had emphasized the importance of obtaining a clean milk supply for the town containing an adequate importance of obtaining a clean milk supply for the town containing an adequate

percentage of fat, Mayor Bull expressed the willingness of the council to fall in with any proposition which would insure the town milk supply and that would preserve the health of the community.

Well done, Brampton! And three cheers for the mayor! Looks like business, By the way, the children of Brampton had a prominent part in the evening

TO GET SUPPLY OF COAL

Committee Named to Assist Controller in Negotiations With Dealers.

The London Street Railway must re urn to its old schedule. No. 1 Committee so decided last night. Engineer

the London Street Kallway must return to its old schedule. No. 1 Committee so decided last night. Engineer Brazier reported that he had checked the intervals between cars on the various lines since a number of cars were dropped from the service. His finding was that the schedule as provided by bylaw was not-being lived up to as regards the interval between cars and also as to the speed of the cars. The engineer recommended that the change in the schedule be forbidden, and his recommendation was adopted. The interval, he said, was being violated by 1½ to 3½ minutes.

Street Railway matters were much in the limelight.

Ald. Moorhead urged the committee to take action to improve the service, as he contended it was not adequate to the needs of the city.

The Trades and Labor Council wrote, asking that the company be forced to resume the old schedule.

Then came the engineer's report.

Sent to Council.

Ald. Ashplant's motion to charge \$1 for each Springbank car was up as the last item. The alderman fairly talked several members of the committee out of the room. Finally on a vote of himself and Ald. Wilson, it was decided to send the recommendation on to the council Controller Merryfield opposed. Ald. Holmes and Ald. Harley did not vote. Mayor Somerville, Ald. Manness at Ald. Watkinson had tired of the discussion, and one by one vanished.

The fate of the city's coal supply for the coming winter may repose in the hands of Ald. Wilson and Ald. Watkinson. They were appointed, with Ald. Ashplant, as a committee to assist Fuel Controller McCallum in dealing with the city's supply, and negotiations with the dealers and the federal controller. Ald. Ashplant said that he could not attend the meetings, so the work will be up to his two confreres.

During the coming winter the city may be confined to a supply of coal equal to the 1916-17 supply, which was 5,000 tons less than the amount used in the city last winter.

The fuel controller wrote to the city to this effect. It is because of United States regulations limiting Canada. He supplied the figures of the amount of coal received in that time and also last year. Last year the city got 80,365 tons of anthracite and 73,891 tons of bituminous. In 1916-17 the figures were 75,041 of the former and 64,434 of the latter.

If the city can advance any good reasons why this total should be increased for 1918-19 it must send the facts.

It is possible that the committee settled the market question when it put through a motion to increase the rentals \$3 and gives lease on all stalls for three years.




