Hope and Love,-to find and light the first Christmas tree. They searched for one that should be as high as Hope, as wide as Love, and should have the sign of the Cross on every bough. The balsam fir seemed best suited to meet these requirements, and so was chosen, and to this day the balsam fir is the

favorite Christmas tree.
