#### THE TARIFF COMMISSION Mr. Chamberlain's Address at the

First Meeting.

London, Ian. 16.-Mr. Chamberlain presided at the arst meeting of the tariff commission, which as embled here yesterday. Mr. Cham berlain in a speech drew a parallel from what the United States and Germany had accomprished under pro tective tariffs, and denied that any tariff. could be framed here which, as its op ponents alleged, would make the rich richer and the poor poorer. The United States under protection had reached prosperity unequalled in the world. Tr no other country was wealth so evenly distributed, while there was no country in the world where such a large proportion of the population was on the verge of hunger and distress as in Great Britain. Mr. Chamberlain said the object of the commission was not to formulate tariff laws, but to investigate and inquire with open mind.

to formulate tariff laws, but to investigate and inquire with open mind. All that had thus far been decided was, that the policy adopted so many years ago, required reform.

At the conclusion of Mr. Chamberlain's speech the commission discussed a general method of procedure. On Mr. Chamberlain's motion, Mr. Pearson was unanimously elected Vice-Chairman. FRANCE'S THREAT TO POPE.

Rome, Jan. 16 .- The French Govern nent has presented the Vatican with a note in the nature of an ultimatum regarding the appointment of Bishops to five vacant French Sees, substantially saying that either the Pope must approve the selections of the French Government or the will be announced offiment or they will be announced offi-cially without the approbation of the Holy See. In addition, the Papal Nuncio will be asked to leave Paris, and the clergy will be forbidden to collect Peters' pence in the churches, but the concordat will not be denouned. The rumor that the Pope had decided to approve the appointments is incorrect. The Vatican hopes to be able to continue the negotiations.

#### BIG FIRE IN CALGARY.

LOSS NEARLY THREE HUN-DRED THOUSAND DOLLARS.

The Norman Block, Owned by Sena tor Lougheed, and Several Stores Destroyed-Brussels Suffers Heavy Loss-Other Fires.

Calgary, Jan. 16 .- The most disasrous fire that has occurred in Calgary in some years started last night at 12.30 in the furnace room of the Norman Block. The whole block was completely gutted. The fire seems to have originated below Robertson's clothing store and Glanville's retail dry goods store. At first it did not seem to gain rapidly, but by 1.30 flames b gan to pour out at the windows. By 2 o'clock the roof had given way and a burst of flame lit up a large volume of smoke rising from the building. At 2.30 a stream was breather to bear your two stores from the building. Roberts ordered him to take it down and put it up right side up, as if nothing was the matter. About that time a steamer, which witness took to be a collier, passed about three miles away. Captain Roberts saw that he was wrong, and about ten minutes later allowed the sailor to put up the flag in a reversed position. Griffiths gave a clear statement of the happenings in connection with the disaster. He said Captain Roberts was much excited, and told of a conversation when in connection with the disaster. He said Captain Roberts was much excited, and told of a conversation when the boats were being lowered, when Captain Roberts had told witness that he (witness) would be drowned. Witness replied that if he was he would not be the only one. Griffiths had no hope that the boats would live and advised people not to go into them. He said no steps were taken to rescue those in the water after the first boat capsized, though they were alongside the steamer. There were no rockets or blue fires or other signals on board, so far as he knew. The rudder was known not to be in good condition, and the steamer would not steer well. Griffiths thought of cutting the line when the tug Holyoke was towing, as the steamer was foundering, but not being ordered to do so, and as he had been told that the captain could shoot any one not obeying orders in such a time, he did not. He told of clambering over the steamer's side when she turned over at the last minute. Griffiths was the last living man on the boat. WANTS A DIVORCE.

Duke Philip of Orleans Wants Dissolution of His Marriage,

Vienna, Jan. 16.-The Allegemeine Zeitung says that Duke Philip of Orleans is seeking a divorce, and that he has petitioned the Curia for a dispensation to enable him to marry the daughter of a great Austrian noble. The paper asserts that the Duke consulted the leading members of the sulted the leading members of the royalist party last summer and informed them of his intentions, giving as a reason that his present union was childless and that he desired to continue the royal line. The Royalists endeavored to dissuade him from taking such action, and pointed out to him that his divorce and remarriage would scandalize Catholic circles in France, the chief supporters of the Royalist cause. It at first appeared that the Duke acquiesced in the wishes of his followers, but he now renews his request to the Curia, urging the nullification of his marriage on the ground that of his marriage on the ground that he was forced into the union. The lady whom the Duke desired to marry is said to be the Princess Clementine, daughter of Pauline, Princess de Metternich-Sandor. The report has caused a sensation in Court circles, and the course attributed to the Duke is severely condemned.



#### MORE WAR TALK.

TOKIO PAPERS TAKE GLOOMY VIEW OF SITUATION.

China Purchasing Arms from Japan-Will Make an Effort to Preserve Neutrality.

London, Jan. 16.-The correspondent of The Times at Tokio says all the leading journals now regard war as inevitable and insist upon the necessity of sparing no expense in pre parations. They discuss the marked strength of Japan's financial position to-day as compared with what it was in 1894, on the outbreak of the war with China, and exhort the whole nation to sacrifice everything in the country's cause. Meanwhile voluntary subscriptions have begun to reach the treasury in considerable numbers.

numbers.

The Japanese steamship services between America, Australia, Europe and Bombay are to be suspended immediately, freeing twenty-five large steamers, which can be used as trans-

dately, freeing twenty-hee large steamers, which can be used as transports.

The Japanese press approves of China's neutrality in the event of war inasmuch as her military incapacity forbids any other course. Moreover, the neutrality of the tar eastern states and, the colonies in the event of war would embarrass Russia greatly, because she would flus be obliged to draw all her supplies from home.

London, Jan. 16.—The Pekin correspondent of The Times says:—Both Prince Ching and Viceroy Yuanshinkai have given satisfactory assurances to the Japanese Minister that in the event of war China will maintain strict neutrality. There seems to be undoubted evidence that the rapprochement between China and Japan has been assisted by the disclosure at Berlin of Russia's proposal concerning Maachuria, which exhibits Russia in the light of a sovereign power dispensing concessions regarding territors, which China still considers as Chinese.

London, Jan. 16.—Baron Hayashi said to a representative of the Associated Press that he had no indication of the probable attitude of Russia in regard to the latest Japanese note. "It is practically certain," he said, "that any declaration of war will not emanate from Language."

declaration of war will not emanate from Japan."

The Minister is fiel very hopeful of the result of the latest Japanese note, but he specifically denies that Japan's reply suggests the neutralization of a portion of Manchuria, as well as of a portion of Corea, or that mention was made of the right to break off negotiations."

"Our conditions," said the Minister, "Our conditions," said the Minister, "are practically summed up in the concluding portion of the announcement by the State Department of the United States regarding the Chino-American treaty. For these principles to which Secretary Hays says the United States is irrevocably committed we are willing to go to war unless Russia will consent to give us a definite pledge that she, too, adheres to the open door and Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria." Baron Hayashi, commenting on the Associated Press despatch from St. Petersburg quoting the peaceful statement made by the Czar to members of the diplomatic corps yesterday at the New Year's reception, said:—"I have read with pleasure the statement attributed to the Czar. If these are his Majesty's views there will be no war. The question rests with him. Japan has nothing further to say."

The British Government is believed here to have identified itself more fully week by week with the Japanese position, until now Great Britain is almost as deeply committed as Japan. The position in which Great Britain now stands, according to the view taken of the situation here, has impressed and simpressing the Russian statesmen. The decision for war or peace now rests with the Czar's advisers, and symptoms are visible here that the decision will be peace, by largely admitting Japan's demands. The skill Japan has shown throughout the negotiations excites admiration at the German Foreign Office.

#### THE PERILS OF EASY DIVORCE.

Rev. Dr. Talmage Arraigns the United Divorce, and Unsparingly Denounce the Incongruous Conflict of State Laws Upon the Subject-Only Way Out of the Immoral Tasgle,

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 10.—In this sermon the nation's flagrant, besetting sin, easy divorce, and the incongruous conflict of state laws on the subject are unsparingly characterized. The preacher indicates the only way out of this immoral tangla which is wrecking the home and descrating the marriage altar. The text is Mark x, 9, "What therefore God hath joined together let not man put asunder."

put asunder."

As the civil war was the mortal clash between two conflicting ideas, so to-day we find conflicting ideas in mortal combat over the marriage altar. The one is the Christ idea, which declares that marriage is not a confederation that can be broken at will, but an indissoluble union. This idea assets that after marriage the twain in every sense becomes twain in every sense becomes The second idea declares that easy divorce is not a crime, but of-ten, for the social good, a necessity. It says that when a man and a wo-It says that when a man and a wo-man are unequally yoked together it is better that they be separated by law, even if the cause for separation be not so serious as that recognized in the Bible, and, more, that they may, if they wish, contract new mar-riages.

riages.
But, though James Bryce in his
"American Commonwealth" affirms
"American Commonwealth" affirms that the family as a unit is "the one fundamental and permanent problem of human life and society," yet of human life and society," yet everywhere, by reading the signs of the times, we can see that by ersy divorce the sanctity of the home is imperiled. Everywhere the danger signals are being lifted, to prove that marriage is becoming nore and more a mere temporary convenience Carroll D. Wright in his labor statistics declares that in the year 1889 there were 36,072 divorces in the state of Illinois alone and that there there were 36,072 divorces in the state of Illinois alone and that there was one divorce to every fifteen marriages. He went on to show that from 1867 to 1886 there were 328,-716 divorces 716 divorces in the United States and that each year the proportion of divorces to the number of inhabitants in the United States was on the increase, just as the individual wealth of the Americans processing. crease, just as the individual wealth of the Americans per capita increases year by year. So awful is the spread of this divorce evil and so blunted are becoming the once keen edges of public sentiment upon this question that Morgan Dix, who in no sense can be called a sensationalist, uttered last Thanksgiving Day this scathing invective against wholesale licensed libertinism, now being practiced through the wide open doors of the legal courts of our land: The divorce evil is terrible. It is an evil, we must try to uproot. Once upon a time if we ever mentioned the fact that a person had been divorced we spoke of it under our breath, as a subject not proper for conversation. We then regarded divorce as something closely related to disgrace, and that not long ago either."

Against the further spread and for the extermination of this divorce evil the Catholic Church is already up in arms. Against it only a few weeks ago all the Rhode Island ministers barded themselves together to give religious combat. Thus, as the public leaders of many denominations are fighting this undermining and would be destroyer of the home, it is not inappropriate for me to speak a few words in reference to those legal and domestic causes which might hereafter make "easy divorce" an impossibility.

First, nothing can be accomplish-

might hereafter make "easy divorce" an impossibility.

First, nothing can be accomplished in a material way unless there is national legislation or at least concerted action among the different state legislatures upon this subject. There must be all over the land harmonious and united legal action against the divorce evil. It should be made impossible for a man to get a divorce in one state which he could not obtain on the same ground in any one of the 3,000 divorce courts of the United States. All those courts ought to be in agreement as to what causes justify and what do not justify the dissolution of a marriage.

riage.

We recognize the necessity of the criminal courts of the Unites States working in harmony. Why should we not recognize the necessity of concerted action by divorce courts? Some years ago in Chicago a man killed his wife and burned her body in the vat of a sausage factory. Supposing after that crime he could have scepped across the state line and in Indiana defied the legal authorities of Illinois. What would have been the result? Supposing that a notable murderer could have walked a free man in Philadelphia after he had poisoned his child wife in New York City. Why, murder and outlawry would be everywhere in the United States running rampant. The only safety of life depends upon this fact: If you commit a murder in one state and then run away another state governor will recognize your extradition papers and allow you to be forcibly returned to the place where you committed the crime.

We recognize the necessity of concerted action between states on the murder question. We recognize also the necessity of concerted action between different nations and widely separated authorities in cases of their as well as murder. A few years ago all that a cashier had to do after wrecking a bank was to cross the Canadian line and he was safe. But now men guilty of financial crimes We recognize the necessity of the

To suppress forgery and theft there must be concerted action between nations as well as states. Why, in the same way, should there not be concerted action between states in reference to the divorce law? But though concerted and harmonious action by the different state courts should be regarded as a necessity yet we find the actual conditions just the reverse. To illustrate how a man can defy the divorce courts of one state by living in another state, a prominent member of the Presbyterian General Assembly Committee told me that a short time ago a man died in the United States and left three legal widows. He left three legal widows. He left three widows, and he was, not a believer in Brigham Young either! How was that? A few years ago this man went to a western state and there settled and married. After awhile he became tired of his wife and decided he would marry another woman. So this man left the state where he was then living and went into another state, got a divorce and there remarried. Of course the state of his former residence did not recognize the second marriage. former residence did not recognize

former residence did not recognize the second marriage.

Time passed on, and this husband tired of his second wife. He moved to another state, got a divorce and married a third wife. The marital disease with him by this time was becoming chronic. But now neither the first nor the second state, where the first nor the second state where he used to live recognized his third marriage as legal. Time passed, and this husband of many wives died. What was the result? Each at his former marital companions inherited the property of the dead man which then existed in her own state! By law that man in three different states left three different wives each law that man in three different states left three different wives, each a legal wife in her own state, but illegal in the other two states. Such is an instance of the ridiculous and infinite absurdities existing between the conflicting divorce courts of our land.

this submerging flood of national infamy: It is for the gospel ministers to protest against it by practice as well as by preaching. The pulpit cannot speak loudly and with the voice of a true leader unless at the same time it refuses to become a party to the national crime of éasy divorce. What do I mean by this statement? That the minister himself shall not be a blatant and a brutal divorce? Oh, no. No self respecting Christian church would allow her minister to continur preaching in her pulpit after a divorce excapade. Paul writes, "A bishop must be blameless, the husband of one wife." No minister's life can be blameless when he turns his back upon his first wife for an unjust cause. But I do mean this: A minister should not officiate at the second marriage of a divorce unless he himself knows positively that the divorced man was not culpable in the snapping of the marital bonds. By such a ministerial course public sentiment would be aroused against this national evil, and aroused quickly and permanently.

I have taken only lately this stand in reference to the clergyman's responsibility. Like hundreds and thousands of other ministers I have heretofore said to myself: "I am not in any way compelled to look into the personal characters of those whom I unite in marriage. When I used to live in New York state I had to ask the contracting parties a long list of questions and make a report to the county officials in reference to the same. But in the state of Illinois the clerk of the county court does that. He asks the questions. He gives the license. He is responsible for the narriage, and not I." But a short time ago, when talking to a brother minister upon the subject, he said: "You are wrong. You cannot shirk your responsibility in that way." Then I commenced to look at this responsibility in another way. I said to myself: "Yes, I am wrong. That county clerk cannot tell me what I ought to do. The er way. I said to mysen, am wrong. That county clerk cannot am wrong. That I ought to do. The

am wrong. That county clerk cannot tell me what I ought to do. The paper he sends to me is only a license, a Governmental privilege, permitting me to marry the parties if I wish. I am not compelled so to do. For instance: The saloon keeper gets a city license and has the privilege of selling me a glass of whisky. But because it is lawful for me to buy whisky from him that is no reason why I should drink it. Because the county clerk tells me that I can remarry a libertine, who has been simfully divorced, that is no reason why I should tarnish the good name of my church by placing such a black record upon the session books. No, no, my brother minisbooks. No, no, my brother minis-ters, we cannot thus skirk our re-sponsibilities. You and I are re-sponsible before God when we become officiating parties in the mar-riages of divorced persons. A reli-gious marriage means infinitely more than a mere civil contract. If not, why do nearly all people desire to be married by a clergyman instead of by a police justice or a county judge?

We are responsible as ministers. A legal divorce, in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred, is not sufficient ground for a church divorce. We must remember that the minister before the world stands as the representative of the church. Why, legal divorces are often obtained on the filmsiest ex-cuses. Bishop Fallows, in a scathing attack upon this marital evil, quotes some of the most absurd and trivial causes on account of which men and women have been divorced. One woman got a legal divorce because her husband enlisted in the United States navy; another because her husband maked and gave her headaches; another because her husband called he sister a thief; another because husband did not like her front hair and cut part of it off. One husband secured a diverce because his wife refused to sew on his buttons; and ther because he told his wife he had found another woman whom he could love better. Think of any minister being guilty of such a heinous sin as to marry such divercees to other marital partners. It is high time for us ministers to band together and rouse, public sentiment upon this

question.

I once heard of a young lady who used to boast that she was engaged to three different young men at the same time. She had in her possessioners and the control of the same time. used to boast that she was engaged to three different young men at the same time. She had in her possession three different engagement rings. After awile she dismissed all three suitors and married a fourth. Do you wonder that after such perfidies her married life was unhappy? Untrue to her fiance, of course she was untrue to her husband. A divorce scandal a few years later was the result. Her father, a noble Christian man of the west, as a result felt himself disgraced and resigned his pulpit for he was a minister. His life was to some extent wrecked, as well as hers. You say such a course as that is an extreme case? Of course. But all evils should not be despised because they are not monstrous evils. The little, seemingly harmless firtations during summer vacations or at a church picnic or in the street car or concert hall are all divorce seed plantings. You cannot trifle with human affections in youth without being in danger, as an iconoclast, of smashing the marriage shrine when you are middle-aged. Let parents be careful with whom their children associate. Let them beware of what they are allowed to say to others and what others are allowed to say to them. It is all well enough to talk about the vaunted freedom of the American boy and gird; but, for my own part, especially in reference to the promiscuous association of young people and the careless promises they, are allowed to make, I think they have altogether too much freedom.

Go to almost any bookstand that you see and open some of the books at random and read. There we find the authors make their heroines out of bad men and their heroines out of bad women, with here and there a redeeming white spot to offset these black characters. Broken marriage vows, "Childe Harold" indecencies, deceitful wives, deceiving men—these move as an ever changing kaleidoscope before the fascinated eyes of the young readers. There the boy and the girl learn to call crime respectable and a man's dishonor a poy and the girl learn to call crime respectable and a man's dishonor a "free lance of gold." A bad book worms its way into the moral vitals and finally poisons the heart. The way for good people to keep pure and to prepare themselves for a Christian marriag, which will never be broken this side or on the otherside of the graps, is for them talking.

with good people. They must work

I have known such cases and have rejoiced that the law permits have rejoiced that the law permits the innocent party to be relieved of the burden and affords protection from molestation. But I protest against the diversity of the divorce laws of the different states, which tends to confusion and uncertainty in the relation so vital as this to the in the relation so vital as this to the morality and stability of society.

My belief in reference to divorce can be summed up in the words of Sir Walter Scott in the case of Ecand versus Evans, "Though in particular cases the repugnance of the law to dissolve the obligations of continuously substitution way open. hatrimonial cohabitation may operate with great severity upon indi-viduals, yet it must be carefully reremembered that the general happiness of the married life is secured by its indissolubility." My belief is summed up in the thought that the more people realize when they marry that they must marry for life the more future generations will be careful how they marry and the more the sanctity of the home will be presented. sanctity of the home will be pre-served. Therefore, my friends, suffer almost every injustice for your chil-dren's sake, for the community's sake, for God's sake, rather than break the nuptial bonds.

Sight of Treasury Wealth is all That is Permitted-No Sampling is Allowed

"Handling Uncle Sam's cash is in itself no easy task, but hundling the vast number of people who desire to view that portion of it stored in the treasury vaults in Washington is not by any means the least of the troubles of the treasurer." said Elaas H. Roberts, treasurer of the United States a day or so ago,

No one can visit the underground storage vaults without a permit from Mr. Roberts, and the treasurer holds that every citizen holds an interest in the money and if he gets any satisfaction in looking at it or examining the vaults in which it is kept he is entitled to that satisfaction. Consequently none is turned from his office without the necessary permit, unless there is some special reason for withholding it.

The welcoms given visiters, together with the sorded delight Americans take in seeing vast stores of money, makes the treasury one of the best showhouses in Washington. Were an admission charged to the silver vaults the revenues of the government would be appreciably increased.

COME FROM EVERYWHERE. Sightseers come from all over the world. One day when it was particularly gloomy and disagreeable outside, so that there was not much doing in the tourist line. Treasurer Reberts took the trouble to keep track of his callers. Exactly 700 persons entered his office. They represented 35 states, 7 foreign countries and reacher 40 disagreement. 7 foreign countries and nearly 40 dif-ferent nationalities. The foreigners came from Great Britain, France, In-dia, China, Germany, A'rica and Aus-tralia
