Hue, French Cochin-China, April 26.

The Dutch ship Aruba, in Monday night, from Triton Island, brings the first definite news of the departure of the fleet on Saturday from Kamranh Bay. Twenty-three ships in all were signted northeast of Triton Island at 10 o'clock Monday morning, holding a northerly course, which would bring the fleet by noon yesterday to the Chinese Island of Hainan, which has several harbors and cable connection with the mainland through the French settlement of Kwanchanwan. The Aruba thement of Kwanchanwan. The Aruba passed six and a half miles south of the Russian ships and from the report of the captain it is clear that Rojestvensky must have divided his fleet or that the remainder of the squadron is far in advance.

Only two battleships and three big only two sattleships and three big cruisers were in the division seen by the Aruba and this suggests that Ad-miral Volkersam may have taken his division of the squadron on another course after the departure from Kam-ranh on Saturday.

Prompt Action of Engineer Burwell in Reversing his Engine Saves the Life of the Little Girl.

cape from death that I ever saw, or ever heard of, in railroad life, was Conductor Sam Pierce's comment on the incident that happened on the Pere Marquette last evening about 5.55 o'clock.

Conductor Pierce's train was bound south from Chatham to Blenheim with Engineer Dave Burwell at the throttle. It was a trying moment for Mr. Burwell, who jumped down from his cab expecting to find the mangled remains of the child under his engine. It was a relieving surprise, however, to find that the little girl lying under the engine, between the rails, right up against the fire box, and apparently uninjur-

ed.

The child was taken from her precarious position, and it was found that she was uninjured with the exception of a bruise on her heel, where it is supposed the flange of the wheel struck her.

The child was taken on to Blenheim, where medical aid was summoned and the little girl to-day is perfectly sound with the exception of the bruise on the heel. No bones were broken.

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

## EARL GREY'S REMINDER

While Expressing Great Confidence in Canada's Future

In First Official Visit to Toronto Say That "Arm and Fleet of Mothe Across the Sea Keeps Open Asia's Door For Our Trade"-Hopes For No Clash of Race and Creed in

Toronto, April 25.—Their Excellen-cles Earl and Lady Grey arrived in Toronto at 7.30 o'clock last night and Toronto at 7.30 o'clock last night and were given a hearty welcome by the citizens. In the vicinity of the Union station several thousand people gathered and a large detachment of police was required to keep the passage clear for the King's representative and his estimable wife.

"With the coming of Their Excellencies a round of social gaiety is commenced, which will close only with the departure of the distinguished visitors on Friday evening.

Earl Grey's Reply.

Replying to the toast to the Governor-General, His Excellency referred to his three previous visits in an unofficial capacity. It had long been his conviction that there was no reason why before the end of a century Canada should not excel the United States in "everything that goes to make a great, a happy, a prosperus and a high-souled nation." The vastness of the country and, touching on the west's importance, spoke of recent Japanese experiments with wheat as against rise as a food. "From this," he said, "you may, I think, take it that we are on the eve of a growing demand for figure and wheat which will grow to enormous dimensions, at first from Japan and later on from the great continent of which Japan is only the perch. So long as the policy of the United Kingdom, of the United States, and of Japan, is directed towards a commen purpose, the bettering of humanity, and is upheld by the power of their combined fleets, the peace of the Paolific is assured, and there will be a free and undisturbed pathway for the commerce of Canada into the ports of Asia.

Meaning to Canada.

"No man can foresee what this may mean for Canada. It is possible that the future may see an even greater trade between Canada and Asia than is now carried on between Canada and Europe. When that comes about I would ask you not to forget that it is the arm of the old mether, which is

is now carried on between Canada and Europe. When that comes about I would ask you not to forget that it is the arm of the old mother, which is keeping open the doer of Asia for Canadian trade, and that it is the fleet of the old mother which is keeping the way to that doer open, and yet Canada does not as yet contribute a single ship or dollar to this Imperial service.

Canada does not as yet contribute a single ship or dollar to this Imperial service.

"Do not think I complain. The people of the United Kingdom do not complain, and do not think when I state this fact that I am finding fault with the attitude of Canada. It is recognized in England that although you do not as yet centribute to the cost of the Imperial fleet you are contributing to the Empire in many and different ways. That you should have reclaimed so large a part of this mighty continent from the wilderness, and by your spirited railway and steamship enterprise been able to make Canada the natural route between England and Japan, and between England and her great Australian Colonies; that you should have given the lead in your preferential tariffs, in your preferential postal arrangements and your cable subsidies, with the object of binding the component parts of the Empire closer together, is to have done much and to have given a lead of which any people may reasonably be proud."

National Self-Respect.

It was sometimes said by the detractors of Canadians that they are now apt to think of what the Empire can de for Canada than of what Canada can do for the Empire. "I believe this to be just as great a libel upen them as to say that the prevailing sentiment in Canada is not "What can I do for Canada." but "What will Canada do for me?" said the earl.

No Real Poverty.

"I stated that I had not yet had an opportunity of making myself acquainted with more than a small portion of your great Dominion, but I have enloyed the signal advantage of making the acquaintance of the greater number of your senators and members of Parliament. Those I have seen have given me a most interesting and satisfactory account of the countries and territories and of the people they represent Judging from the reports I feel that Canada is the incarnation of the Aroadia, which I had formerly believed had only existed in the regions of mythology."

Use the Salvation Army.

Touching immigration he said it would be a good thing for Canada and for the Empire if we could concentrate the disinterested enthusiasm which at present animates the Salvation Army by using it for the purpose of settling on the unoccupied lands worthy and respected families, selected from the poor of the cities in the United Kingdom.

Pleasant Old Time Dietetic Habits Justified by Modern Science. Justified by Modera Science.

There are many eating habits which, though followed mersly because they have been customary from time immemorial, really have a scientific basis. Such is the eating of butter with bread, which by itself, though rich in starch and having a fair proportion of proteid, at all events when made of whole meal four, has not the fat which is dietetically necessary. Similarly with rice puddings the milk is added to make up for the deficiency of proteid in the rice.

The Justification of Milk in Tea.
The scientific justification for adding milk to tea is quite different. When taking meat with tea, the tannic acid contained in the latter combines with albumen to form tannate of albumen, which is practically leather, so that by which is practically learner, so that by drinking tea the coating of the stom-ach is made leathery. But milk also contains albumen, and when milk is added to tea the molecules of tannic acid select their albumen from it, and, as a divorce is unknown to tannate of albumen, the albumen of the stomach is less liable to be affected by tannic acid than it would be if the tea were taken alone

Sharp and Smooth of the Salad. Then there is a chemical reason for adding vinegar to salads. Raw vegetables are easily enough digested by cows and horses, but with difficulty by the human stomach, because they contain that hard, fibrous substance, cellulose. But acids dissolve cellulose to some extent, and vinegar is an acid.
That is why it is a good thing to take vinegar or lemen juice with salad and cabbage, and doubtless that is why it tastes so well, for the palate is an ex-cellent judge of what is good for the stemach. The justification for adding oil is partly that there is practically no fat in the salad itself and partly that it protects the lining of the stom-ach from the action of the acid in vine-gar.—Boston Cooking School Magazine.

A Simple Floor Treatment.

## ARABS DEFEAT TURKS.

Gultan's Syrian Troops Display Great Cowardice—Sacrifice Supplies.

Aden, Arabia, April 26.—The situation in Turkish Arabia has become critical. It transpires that only a thousand of the Turkish troops sent to the relief of Riza Pasha reached Sanaa (capital of Kemen), and these fied thither after sustaining a defeat at the hands of the insurgents. Riza Pasha's Broops, 6,000 strong, encountered the Arabs in great force five miles south of Sanaa March 30, and after a sharp encounter most of the troops, consisting of Syrian reserves, laid down their arms or deserted, the remnant of the Turks managing to reach Sanaa the same evening with only 50 camel loads of supplies.

chief of staff, Izzat Pasha, was The chief of start, 1832t Fugha, was killed, and seven guns were abandoned and taken possession of by the Arabs, who also captured two hundred camejs laden with provisions, and large quali-lities of rifles and ammunition. The investment of Sanaa by the in-

surgents is being tightened. The Sy-rian reinforcements, which recently argran reinforcements, which recently ar-fived in Arabia, are unsatisfactory, and the Ottoman officials are anxiously awaiting the arrival of European bat-talions upon whom the fate of the sapital of Yemen Province depends.



## TIME IS NOT YET RIPE

To Grant Full Self-Government to the Transvaal,

So Says Colonial Secretary Lyttelton On Issuing the New Transvaal Constitution-Constitutional Change Not Extended to Orange River Colony-Cronge Says This Is Breach of Treaty of Peace.

London, April 26.—The draft of the new Transvaal constitution was is-sued yesterday. It provides for a Legistative Assembly consisting of the Lieutenant-Governor, six to nine offi-Legislative Assembly consisting of the Lleutenant-Governor, six to nine offi-cial members and thirty to thirty-five elected members. Every burgher of the late South African Republic is en-titled to vote for members of the first titled to vote for members of the first Volksraad (Assembly), as well as all white males of British birth occupying premises at an annual rental of not less than \$50, or having capital to the value of \$500, unless convicted of treason since May 31, 1902, or of murder, unless they have obtained a free pardon. Financial measures must be recommended to the Assembly by the Governor, and no part of the revenue may be appropriated without his authority.

authority.

In a communication to Lieutenant-Governor Lawley, Colonial Secretary Lyttelton says the time is not yet ripe to grant full self-government. The latter involved party government, and this in the Transvaal will become more practicable when the two races have acted longer together under equal rights of citizenship, and when bitter memories have become softened

by time.
Secretary Lyttelton explains that similar constitutional changes cannot be extended to the Orange River Colony immediately because there do no

ony immediately because there do not so largely demand them.

What Cronje Says.

Norfolk, Va., April 26.—Gen. Cronje, who was a member of President Kruger's cabinet for 12 years and a noted Boer leader, and who now is on a tour of America, was shown a copy of the new constitution just issued from London.

He said: "It is a breach of the treaty of peace made us by England in 1902, which promised a self-govern ment as soon as our country was in

ettled state.

"King Edward has been advised by the capitalists in the drawing up of this constitution. The only thing to be dene is to be patient and work with petitions to the British government." To the remark that petitions would be of no avail, he responded:

be of no avail, he responded:
"Though they may trample us under
foot for ten years, they must listen to
us some day. The Briton now in South
Africa is allied with the Boer and
wants self-government and does not
want the country to be ruled by capitalists and magnates."

It was generally accepted that if salaries were raised, the social position of the teacher would at once be enhanced, and that the permanency of teaching as a profession depended largely upon increased remuneration otherwise educated men will find a reward for their services in mercantile and business pursuits. mission ordered the railways to put into effect a rate of 15 cents per 100 pounds from Toronto to Montreal. The railways asked that they be allowed to charge 18 cents, and applied to stay the order. J. Hardwell, chief traffic ofthe order. J. Hardwell, chief traffic of-ficer of the commission, reported that the request of the railways was not unreasonable. If they were forced to adopt the 15-cent rate, they would be compelled to abandon the 17-cent rate from points east of Toronto. Mr. Hardwell also recommended that the rallways be asked not te charge more than I cent per 100 lbs. for the Toron-to ston-ver.

than I cent per 100 lbs. for the Toronto stop-over.

W. D. Gregory, for the cattlemen, applied for a rehearing. He said that the shipments from Western Ontario were heavy, and when a rate was granted of 22 cents from Port Huron to Montreal, there should not be a charge of 25 cents from Ontario points. From Toronto to Montreal 15 cents was a reasonable rate. The Grand Trunk Railway Co. said the roads paid much more for coal in Ontario than in the more for coal in Ontario than in the States, and required higher rates, but taxation in Michigan was much higher, and more than made up for the increased coat of coal.

John W. Loud, freight traffic manager of the G. T. R., Montreal, replied that there were no shipments at all of cattle from Port Huren. The rate from Chicago and the coat of the coal was all of cattle from Port Huren. more for coal in Ontario than in the

Chicago to Montreal was 28 cents, the same as to New York. Cattle coming into Chicago from the west paid heavy into Unicago from the west paid heavy freight rates, and were subject to heavy terminal charges. For these reasons, the rates to the east were low. In regard to taxation, it was also an important feature, not only in Michigan, but in Ontario. The late government had intended to increase the burdens of the railways, for which the farmers were chiefly reasonable. the farmers were chiefly responsible. It was inconsistent for them to in-

It was inconsistent for them to increase the taxation and at the same time seek to reduce the revenue.

E. Snell, president of the Cattle Breeders' Association, complained that on lambs shipped to Teronto, cars were charged at 36,000, while to Buffalo they were charged only 18,000. It was a glaring injustice, and the people of Torento paid more for their lamb on this account.

Mr. Loud replied that the charges on export sheep and lambs had been

This had been in operation four years it was quite true what Mr. Snell had said, but it was a difference in classification between Canada and the United States. Chairman Killam asked Mr. Snell to send in a written statement of his complaint to the board.

Immediate strangulation is substituted for decapitation. A re-prieve until after the autumn assizes is substituted for immediate strangula-tion, and three reprieves annul the death penalty. Branding is also abol-ished.
