The disease became so prevalent that the State Board of Health was obliged to interfere. Within a short time 20,000 people were vaccinated and the disease was stamped out. It is interesting to note that it was particularly amongst the well-to-do people of Niagara Falls, those living under excellent sanitary conditions, that the disease prevalled.
