Miscellaneous Extracts.

DEATH OF MISS BATHURST.—It appears
that Miss Bathurst, who was residing at Rome
under the protection of her uncle and aunt,
Lord and Lady Aylmer, rode out with them,
escorted by the French Ambassador, the Duc
de Laval Montmorenci. The groom by Miss
Bathurst was sent back to the residence of
Lord Aylmer, with some message; and when
the party arrived near the Point de Molle,
the Duke proposed leading them by a path which
he had often ridden, along the bank of the Ti-
ber. The river having become swollen, portions
of the bank had given way, which had render-
ed the path so narrow that, after pursuing it
some short distance, the Duke, who was fore-
most, proposed retracing their steps. In en-
deavouring to turn her horse, Miss Bathurst
unfortunately back-did him too near the edge
of the bank, and the horse and rider were plung-
ed into the river. Not one of the party could
swim; nevertheless, Lord Aylmer attempted
to rush into the water, and had advanced some
paces when his distracted wife held him forcibly
back. What renders this sad catastrophe
still more lamentable is that the groom who
had been sent back to Rome is a good swim-
mer, and might have been able to rescue this
charming young girl from a watery grave.

ROYAL HUMANITY SOCIETY.—The anniversary
of this praiseworthy association was celebrated
on Thursday, at the Freemasons' Tavern
Great Queen Street. His R. H. the Duke of
Cambridge presided. About 150 gentlemen
sat down to dinner. The cloth being removed
the usual loyal and patriotic toasts were duly
honoured. An interesting procession then en-
tered the hall, consisting of above twenty per-
sons, each carrying a Bible,—men, women and
children, who had been rescued from drown-
ing and from the very gates of death through
the medium of the Society's agents. Their
appearance produced a deep impression of the
society's usefulness. The medals of the society
were then presented by the royal chairman to
the individuals to whom they had been award-
ed. Their names were—1. William Darling
and George Darling, his daughter, whose heroic
conduct is well known to the public.—2.
Alexander McIntyre, who saved five fellow-
travellers from drowning when the ferry-boat
in which he was, in April, 1837.—3. The Rev.
James Aylton, Vicar of St. Nicholas, who, after

two or three unsuccessful efforts, succeeded in
saving Alfred Banks, who had fallen into the
river at Hale Weston.—4. F. H. Stevens,
mate of H. M. ship *Rodney*, who, when James
Ray, seaman, fell from the main-top-sail yard-
arm into the sea, on the cry being raised of
"A man overboard," without waiting to take
off his clothes, jumped over the side of the
vessel, and, after great exertion, succeeded in
saving him, after he had fallen into a state of
insensibility.—5. Capt. Crow, of the steam-
packet *Lord Melville*, who, when Mr. W.
Youatt had fallen over the quay at Calais, in
a dark tempestuous night, plunged from the
pier into the water, grasped the drowning man,
and rescued him from a watery grave.—6.
John Stephens, mate of H. M. ship *Inconstant*,
who dived and succeeded, after much danger
and difficulty, in bringing an insensible man
to the surface of the water, and, in the face of
a strong tide, managed to support him till a
boat came to their relief.—7. Thomas Stephen
Copping, Esq., who, when a female had
fallen over a bridge at Cook, threw himself
over the parapet wall, and seized her as she
was about to disappear under the archway.—
The evening was enlivened by the professional
exertions of Messrs. Fitzwilliam, Bellamy,
Hawes, &c. The band of the Coldstream
Guard's was also in attendance. The subscrip-
tions amounted to upwards of £700.

INFAMOUS HOAX.—On Saturday morning,
from two till five o'clock, the family of
Captain Wybrow, in Grove street, Camden town,
were kept in continual annoyance by the ar-
rival of upwards of twenty physicians, who
had been hoaxed by representations that they
were required to attend Captain Wybrow with
all possible speed.

By the will of the Earl of Essex, we un-
derstand that, deducting a pinture of £5000 per
annum, secured to the Countess (late Miss
Stephens), together with the Cashbury park,
and the house in Belgrave square, the whole
of his property devolves upon the heir at-law,
his Lordship's nephew, Arthur Capel, now
Earl of Essex.

LONGEVITY OF THE HOUSE OF PEERS.—
There are thirteen Peers, whose united ages
make upwards of 1000, viz:—Lords Lyne-
doch, 89; Rolle, 88; Fortescue, 86; Aber-
gavenny, 84; Manners, 84; Leicester, 84;
Arden, 83; Sidmouth, 82; Lonsdale, 82;
Limerick, 81; Camden, 80; and Westmore-
land, 80.

It is said to be the intention of the directors
of the London and Birmingham and Grand
Junction Railway Companies to increase the
speed of the mail trains on their lines of
railway, so that the distance between Manches-
ter and Liverpool and London shall be accom-
plished in nine hours.

The total amount of silver coined and de-
livered into the mint, from the 5th April,
1837 to 31st January, 1839, was \$240,000,
and of copper for the same period, \$7,010.

Madame Tagliani is expected to arrive in
England on the 15th of this month. The new
ballot to welcome this celebrated danseuse is
to be called *La Gaetana-Musical World*.

The *Sporting Magazine* has given a por-
trait of two carrier pigeons that were bred in
Hertfordshire, educated at first to fly short
distances, and then trusted to make longer
flights, until they accomplished the astonish-
ing feat of returning from Haverfordwest, in
Wales, a distance of 265 miles in eight hours.

Dr. Lowe, the great Prussian Orientalist,
has written a grammar and dictionary in the
Circassian language. He also composed a
grammar of the Arabian language. He has
lately acquired the Turkish language, being
the twenty-fifth language which he has ob-
tained.

It is stated in a foreign paper, that on last
Good Friday, the Emperor and Empress of
Austria, performed the annual custom of wash-
ing the feet of twelve poor men, and as many
poor women. The aggregate ages of the men
amounted to 1061 years. The eldest was 105,
and the youngest 83. The eldest of the fe-
males was 89, and the youngest 84.

THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, MONDAY, JUNE 17th, 1879.

New York papers received to-day are without later European intelligence.

Halifax papers of the 8th inst. are received. — H. M. ship *Madagascar* sailed from Halifax for Quebec on the 7th inst. H. M. brig *Snake* arrived at Halifax on the 6th, and H. M. ship *Edinburgh* on the 8th,—both from Bermuda.

The Halifax Recorder of the 8th inst. says, "The list of shipping arrived this week is unusually large. Two brigs, six schooners, and one sloop entered the harbour on Sunday. On Monday the display of colours from the signal staff was unusually superb and gratifying. It was not made to commemorate the anniversary of any remarkable historical event, but to denote the appearance of a great number of vessels in the offing. We have no recollection of having previously seen so many vessels coming into our harbour in one day; it was highly delightful to watch their arrival one after another, till sunset. The whole number amounted to twenty,—three of which were in Her Majesty's service (two frigates and one brig) six brigs and eleven schooners. There were twelve arrivals on the following day and six on Wednesday."

By this Morning's Mail.

Montreal, Saturday evening, June 15th.—Yesterday morning, Mr. Ross, a brother of Miss Ross, the young lady who was drowned on board the John Bull steamerboat when on fire, arrived in town from Quebec, and claimed the body of his unfortunate sister, which had been interred previous to his arrival. When the calamitous accident took place, Miss Ross was on her way to Coteau du Lac, to visit her sister, who is married to Dr. Stebbins Evans of that place. She was a daughter of the late Deputy Assistant Commissary General William Ross, and sister of the late Capt. Samuel Ross, of the 76th Regiment.

It is stated in the Courier of yesterday, that our account of the conduct of the Canadians towards the passengers and effects of the John Bull, during her destruction, "proves to be very much exaggerated." We could wish that this were the case. But it is not so. We only reported what was contained in affidavits made at the Police Office, and what can otherwise be well authenticated. It is proof to the contrary of our statement can be adduced, it is not justice to the character of the people involved in the barbarous treatment shown to the passengers on board the John Bull, that it should be made public. To this no one can object; but we are sorry to be compelled to say, that until this be done, our statement must remain good, as being founded upon unquestionable authority.—*Gazette*.

On Thursday forenoon the steamer *Britannia* was discovered to be on fire at the Sorel wharf, the discovery was made by an individual passing in a scow, and there is no reason for supposing it was the work of an incendiary. The flames were speedily extinguished, and but little damage was effected.

Early on Thursday morning a fire broke out in a carpenter's shop in Chambly, which communicated to Mr. McDonald's store and another building, all of which were consumed. The origin of the fire has not been ascertained.

The Hon. Dominique Mondelet has been appointed Judge of the Court of King's Bench, and acting Resident Judge of the District of Three-Rivers. He left Montreal for Three-Rivers, to assume the duties of his office.

The steamers *Great Western* and *Liverpool* were advertised to sail on Thursday last,—the former from New-York and the latter from Liverpool.

The splendid steamer *British Queen* is to leave Portsmouth for New-York on the 1st July. She is doubtless the most magnificent vessel ever built. She is of the burden of 2016 tons, and her engines are of 500 horse power.

A work which has been for some time advertised, entitled "Hochelega D-picta, or the Early History and Present State of the Island and City of Montreal," is to appear on Monday next.

Several thousand acres of Government lands in Upper Canada are in progress of forfeiture or non-performance of duties and payments or other requisites.

The Hon. and Ven. Archdeacon Strachan left Toronto on the 5th inst. for England, and to be consecrated Bishop of Upper Canada. He was to take passage in the *Great Western*.

It is stated that the Commercial Bank of Upper Canada proposed to the Upper Canada and Gore Banks to join it in resuming specie payments on the 1st August, and that these Banks have refused to comply with the proposition.

Upper Canada papers concur in stating that the crops throughout that Province are in a most flourishing state, and promise an abundant harvest.

In addition to Lord Durham's Report and Sir F. Head's Narrative, we perceive that a work on the Canadas by Sir Wilmot Horton—has recently made its appearance, as well as several other works on the same subject by authors less known.

The *Buffalo* convict ship, it is understood, has been engaged in England to convey the rebels and brigands from this country to one of the penal Colonies, and may be daily expected at Quebec.

A few weeks since the Government of Upper Canada had prepared warrants for the release of 25 more of the youngest now in Fort Henry, when information arrived of the speech of Judge Tucker, at Hogsburgh, on the release of some prisoners by the Sheriff of the Eastern District. This indication of public feeling on the American frontier induced the Executive to detain the warrants, and finally, to countermand them.

M. M. S. Buzzard, Captain Fitzgerald, arrived at New York on Tuesday last from Barbadoes with a Spanish slave brig as a prize.

On Tuesday last, at Kingston, U. C. the foundation stone of the Roman Catholic College to be erected, was laid by the Hon. and Right Rev. Bishop McDonell, with the imposing ceremonies of that Church, in the presence of a large concourse of spectators. The Band of the 83rd Regt. attended. The officers of the Garrison, and several civil functionaries appeared in the procession. Dr. Rolph delivered an appropriate address on the occasion.

The ship *Thetis*, Captain Charles Brown, which arrived at St. John's, N.B., on Thursday from Liverpool, has only been sixty days absent from that port, during which, besides making both passages, she discharged a full cargo of timber, &c. and took on board about 700 tons of salt and other merchandise. Such an unprecedented instance of despatch for a ship of 836 tons register, proves the *Thetis* to be a very fast sailer, and her commander an experienced and persevering navigator and man of business.—*St. John's Courier*.

Up to the 31st May, 11,815 passengers arrived at New York from Europe.

COMMERCIAL.

Montreal, June 15.—The amount of business done during the week has been very large. Auction sales have been numerous, and generally speaking, excellent prices have been realized. In dry goods, we understand, several houses have already disposed of the greater part of their spring imports.

In the produce market but little business has been done, except in ashes, which, a reduction in the rates, have sold pretty freely—pot, 26s. 6d.—pearls, 31s. 4d. 31s. 6d. Flour.—Superior kinds continue in good demand—but there have been few transactions in superfine and fine. The latter may still be quoted at 33s. 9d.

Provisions.—Pork we quote at \$17 1/2 @ \$18 for prime, \$19 1/2 @ \$20 for prime mess, and \$24 @ \$24 1/2 for mess.

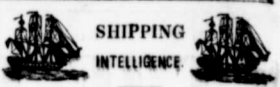
Exchange on England continues at 10 per cent premium. The Montreal Bank draws on New York at 1/4 per cent premium.

Upper Canada.

TORONTO, JUNE 11.—On Saturday, at 8 o'clock, A. M. Perry, who was condemned at the Assizes for the murder of his wife, underwent the sentence of law. A great crowd attended the execution.

We perceive by the last Niagara Reporter, that a meeting numerously attended, was held at the British Hotel there. Thus Butler, Esq. in the chair. The meeting was called by public notice, signed by thirty house-holders of Niagara, and its object was to take into consideration Lord Durham's Report. A series of resolutions were passed, approving generally of the Report, and concluding by a proposal to establish a society, to be open to all ranks, all classes, and all creeds, the object of which shall be the acquisition and diffusion of general knowledge, and to support by all constitutional means, Lord Durham's principles of Government, as set forth in his report; such society to be designated the "DURHAM CONSTITUTIONAL CLUB."

Lower Canada.

Montreal, June 13th.—A Canadian refugee, Clement Beausoleil, formerly a denier in furs, &c. opposite the New Market, was arrested on Sunday night, the 10th inst., in the county of Missisquoi, by two troopers of the Frontier Mounted Police. He was met near Crossett's tavern, on the road to Bedford, and having been asked for his pass, was detained on informing the men he had none. He afterwards attempted to make his escape, but a threat to fire at him, caused him to beg for mercy and surrender at once. A pair of rifle pistols and a bowie knife were found upon him, and are now at the Police Office. On examination before Col. Williams, he stated he was in the province in November last, but made his escape, soon after to Swanton, where he has since resided. He entered Canada again on the 4th inst. to see his relations at Boucherville, travelling there and on his return, principally at night. He was on his way to Swanton when arrested.

Yesterday, J. S. Neysmith was also apprehended in town, though very much disguised, and committed to prison in consequence of having long been concerned in insurrectionary movements in the country.—*Gazette*.

On the 31st ultimo, a young man, named Louis Riff, son of a respectable farmer residing in the Township of Wickham, was accidentally drowned in the River St. Francis, by falling from a floating piece of timber, while engaged with a party of lumbermen, in conveying masts and square timber down the river.—*Id.*

Montreal, June 13th.—The steamer *Britannia* has been purchased by Mr. St. Louis, and has commenced her regular trips between this city and Michiche, stopping at the intermediate landing places.

A small detachment of the 71st Regiment was sent over to St. Johns yesterday.

We understand, that the Government intend erecting at Laprairie, without delay, a large barracks, capable of accommodating about three thousand men. The building will be of brick, and is to be defended by four strong towers of stone. Most of the brick will require to be imported from the States, as the brick-fields here could not supply the requisite quantity in time.
