# FIRST IN AIR AS ON SEA, IS THE **BRITISH AIM**

Pan to Create National Reserve by Fostering Interest in Flying is Revealed as Offfical plan.

London, June 10---Can this instinct for aerial navigation become implanted in a nation through the operation of a carefully calculated official program? The chiefs of the British Air Min istry believe it can, and to this end announce the details of plans by which they hope to make the British an airfaring as well as a eafaring race.
