CAMBRIDGE BEATS OXFORD

A comparatively Easy Win—The Light Blue Rowing Club in the Basin—Slightly Unpleasant Weather.

London, April 7.—Oxford and Cambridge universities rowed their forty-first eight-oared race this morning. Of the previous contests Oxford had won 22, Cambridge 17, and one, that of 1877, was a dead heat.

A capital send-off was effected, both sides striking the water almost simultaneously. Oxford went away with 34 strokes to the minute and appeared unable to quicken.

The Oxonians averaged 100 lbs. in weight, while the Cantabs turned the scales at 133 lbs. The heaviest crew that ever crossed was Oxford's, in 1871, when it averaged 179 lbs.

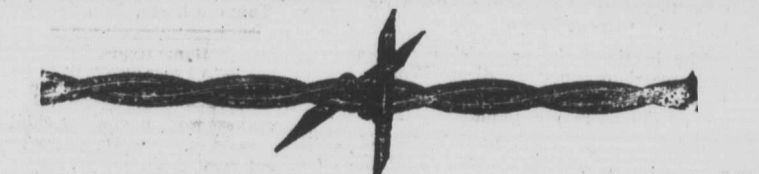

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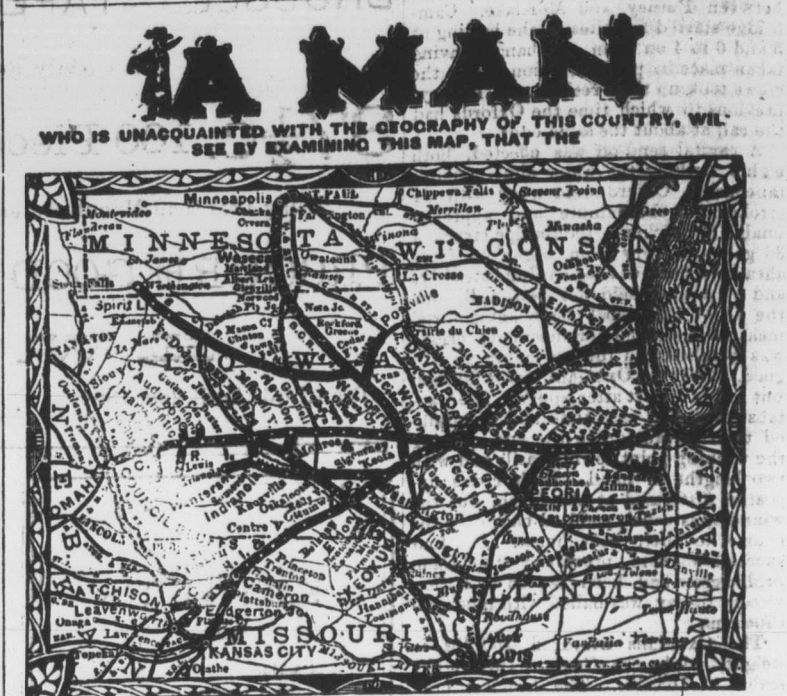
