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

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



At the meeting this morning he owners not only agreed to gra minin um wage for miners employ d in Conormal places, but also to dopt the general principle of a mini num wage, from which only old men nd boys should be excepted. The Government will be urged to put special pressure upon recalcitrants, whose extremist views hinder a complete settlement of the dispute being rrived at. It is understood that the owners were also able to inform the Premiear to-day that they were preared to hold another conference with 'he representatives of the miners, in order to see if they cannot agree up on some safeguards which would make he minimum wage workable and elininate the fears of maligners bene-

fitting from its introduction. Some o the Welsh owners are believed to have already agreed to yield to the opinion of the majority and to discuss the question of the minimum wage although still outwardly opposed to granting it. At the conclusion of the meeting this afternoon between the Cabinet and the coal owners, one of the latter authorized the statement that the situation was easier and decidedly more hopeful.
