locomotive engine, as Mr. Hall is probably aware, and it was that engine that I saw taking on board coal, and it was that engine with rotary plow attached that returned to Brigus Junction, as I set forth in my telegram to the Colonial Secretary. Again, Mr. Hall says that the rotary plow after clearing the Placentia line reached Brigus Junction ahead of the Placentia train, which got there at 8:30 p.m. My reply is that the rotary plow did not clear the Placentia line, neither did it make any attempt to do so before returning to Brigus Junction, and that after cooling it immediately returned to Brigus Junction. Mr. Hall's letter to the Colonial Secretary would lead the reader thereof to suppose that the rotary plow had cleared the line to Placentia and then immediately preceded a train from Placentia to Brigus Junction. This is entirely misleading and incorrect. The last train from Placentia was on Saturday, the 10th, the engine of which was derailed between Whitebourne and Brigus Junction, and the rotary plow and engine went to its assistance, with two men and two boys from Whitebourne, and there has been no train FROM PLACENTIA FROM THE 10th INST. TO THIS HOUR, THAT IS TO SAY FOR NEARLY THREE WEEKS. It is entirely evident to me that the Government Engineer, Mr. Hall, is without knowledge of the facts, which are that no train with mails has left Placentia since the 10th inst. en route to St. John's, and that no train with mails has reached Placentia from St. John's since the 9th inst. As I stated in the House of Assembly a few days ago, "His Majesty's mails that have been sent out for Trinity Bay South, Whitebourne, Placentia and other points covered by the Broad Cove and Placentia lines, SINCE THE 9th FEB. HAVE BEEN DUMPED ON THE STATION AT BRIGUS JUNCTION." There they are to-day, as far as I can learn from the Postmaster General. If this is not a disgraceful condition of things then I do not know what other language to apply to it. It is unnecessary for us to amplify this clear and concise answer of Sir Robert Bond to the Government Engineer, Mr. Hall's report, which our contemporary declared "checked" that gentleman's exposure of railway matters.

The Railway Tie-Up.

The Editor of the Evening Chronicle accuses the Editor of the Evening Telegram of inconsistency in reference to the Reid gifts. Now, in the first place, the Editor of the Evening Telegram never wrote a word of approval or disapproval about the gifts until after the debate in the House of Assembly. Further, the Evening Telegram has never expressed any approval of the feature to which Sir Robert Bond took objection, viz. the acceptance of the gift by the Government. What did appear in the Evening Telegram was the correspondence between Sir Edward Tabor and Mr. W. D. Reid, and an appreciation of the munificence of the latter and his brothers; and this was written and published without the knowledge of the Editor, who was absent from the office on the day of publication and did not know anything about it until the day after publication. For what did appear the Editor accepts responsibility, but Mr. McGrath will have some difficulty in making it a dish as nauseous as the Chicago letter is to him.

Our contemporary, the Evening Chronicle, also stated last night that Sir Robert Bond's criticism of the conduct of the train service was "checked" by the official report of the Government Engineer. The Government Engineer made two reports, one in answer to a question put in the House of Assembly by Sir Robert Bond, and a second in reply to a letter addressed to him by the Colonial Secretary on 15th February. We will deal with both reports. Number one, we submit, more than bears out all that Sir Robert Bond contended for. It is admitted that no report upon the railway has been made for three years, while the law (Sec. 7 Railway Contract, 1898) presumes that there will be an inspection and report at least once every year. The Government then have been content with the reports furnished by the Railway Contractors and have not taken the steps provided by Contract to check these reports. The Government Engineer has admitted that the railway is not "fully equipped with rolling stock"; that there has been "a good deal of trouble with regard to freight delays which have caused inconvenience to passengers"; that "the principal cause of delay on the Carbonear and Placentia lines for the past year has been the handling of freight in conjunction with passenger traffic, and to shutting operations at Placentia"; that "there are not sufficient section men employed to attend to matters of detail"; that he does not

know how many men "would be required to keep the lines of railway open in the winter months"; that he trusts absolutely to the mail clerks for reports on operating of the railway lines when the trains are running, and when they are not available he keeps in touch with the Company's operations through the Despatching Officer of the Contractors. Of course the mail clerks cannot report anything about the railway lines when no trains are running, so the Government Engineer, and his master, the Government, are content with such information as the Railway Contractors' official is disposed to give them. If this is what our contemporary regards as "checked" by the Government, we regard it, and we think the discerning public will also regard it, as an apologetic admission of all that has been contended, and a deplorable admission of inattention to duty on the part of the Government Engineer and Government. The Government Engineer is employed by this Colony as a check upon the Contractors, and is not supposed to be an apologist for them, or to obtain information as regards operating of trains and condition of railway lines from their Despatching officer. If reports furnished by the Railway Contractors as to the condition of the lines, and the operating of the railway, must be regarded by the Government as satisfactory, then what is the need of paying five or six thousand dollars per year for a Government Engineer? Better add the amount to the poor man's dole and dispense with the services of that gentleman at once.

The second report of the Government Engineer referred to a telegram received by the Colonial Secretary from Sir Robert Bond, Feb. 14th, in which that gentleman said "No mail received at Whitebourne since Friday (Feb. 9th). No train passed through here since Saturday afternoon (Feb. 10th), although engine could come here on Monday (Feb. 12th) at daylight, take on board coal and return to Brigus Junction. The present disgraceful condition of service surely demands immediate attention by the Government." Our contemporary, the Evening Chronicle, declares that this statement by Sir Robert Bond was "checked" by the official report of the Government Engineer. Let us see how this works out. We have seen Sir Robert Bond to-day send the matter and in reply to our query he said:

"I have read Mr. Hall's report on the telegram that I transmitted to the Colonial Secretary on the 14th inst., and I am amazed at the want of knowledge it displays. In the first place Mr. Hall questions the accuracy of my statement that 'on Monday morning (Feb. 12th) at daylight an engine took on board coal at Whitebourne and returned to Brigus Junction.' My statement is true, Mr. Hall's is evasive. I am sorry to say, for in his reply he says, 'It appears from the train records that the rotary plow which was at Whitebourne left Monday morning (Feb. 12th) at 8:23 a.m.' The rotary plow is moved by a

Mrs. Tucker says we have to pay three dollars a barrel for potatoes to-day, and how on earth can poor people get strong and healthy while this kind of thing is allowed to go on. Turnips are being imported in by the hundred barrels this winter, still we have to plunk down fifty cents a barrel duty in order to protect the farmer, who cannot supply enough to provide us with three square meals. Let our members in the House, now in session, glance over the long list of articles now paying high duties and make an effort to reduce them; let them put forth their energies in endeavoring to find a way whereby our people will get a look at good fresh meat at a reasonable cost; let them do something practical about the housing question, and then we will fling up our hats and sound their praises. But for goodness sake cut out advice to half-fed men and women on fresh air. We are nearly ice blind from tackling pamphlets on consumption. What we need around here is better grub at lower prices. We will be then in better humor to listen to lectures and will be more inclined to take tips on "how to live long" without the favoring of the proverbial grain of salt.

The RAILWAY TIE-UP

Men Hungry, Cattle Perishing, Lumber Camps Without Supplies --- Worse Than Dog-Sled System of 40 Years Ago --- Hall Should Be Given a Taste of It --- Morris is Blamed for the Mess---No More Governments Favourable to the Reids.

Special to Evening Telegram.

COME BY CHANCE, Feb. 27, 1912.

The Government news despatch for the outports, compiled by McGrath, says that the line will be clear to-day. P. T. McGrath knows more about displaying the great virtues of the Reids more than he does about the condition on the line. The road will not be open for four days at the present rate of progress. The rotary is hung up every day from sunset to sunrise. Here it was resting last night. If Steele can keep the Botwood line open regularly, why does not Reid keep his line open? The rotary makes about twenty miles a day. The sickening thing is to see four engines push a plow, and the rotary hung up 12 hours out of every 24, and all going like a picnic. **WILDE MEN AND ANIMALS ARE HUNGRY NORTH** and mails are hung up, and nights are glorious. Bishop's Falls, Grand Falls, Lewisporte, Badger, Gumbo, Clarendville, this settlement, and other settlements in connection with the station are all badly in need of freight, which has been ordered.

HORSES AND CATTLE ARE PERISHING FOR WANT OF HAY AND OATS, AND THE LUMBER CAMPS ARE WITHOUT SUPPLIES. The Botwood railway has not been hung up an hour this winter. The conditions which exist at present are more unsatisfactory than the dog-sled system of forty years ago. Government Engineer Hall ought to have a taste of the second class cars for a week and have to sleep on the floors, then his report about Reids reasonable efforts to clear the line would come home to him as it comes home to us. Hall is paid thousands of dollars annually to look after public requirements, and what he should do is to demand that the Reids do all possible to open the line or resign his job. To Hong Kong with his word, "reasonable." Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, is blamed for the whole mess. The universal shout is: "NO MORE Governments favourable to the Reids, for the Northern Bays." McGrath's letter to the "Citizen Record," republished by you in the Telegram of July 11, 1900, on "Reids' Pawns" and the "Men Behind the Scenes"; J. A. Robinson's opinion on the "Huge Octopus," and the evidence before the Supreme Court published in the Daily News, February 17, 1906. His Excellency would certainly have entertained a different opinion on the matter. The history of Mr. A. B. Morine's dismissal from the Executive Council by our former Governor, Sir Herbert Murray, would also prove interesting reading; and the case for the Colony would be further strengthened if His Excellency could induce the Hon. J. A. Robinson to explain what he meant when he referred in the Daily News to Sir E. P. Morris as Reids' solicitor who should not have a seat in the Executive, adding that "Mr. Morine's connection is open and known; Mr. Morris's hidden but still known. The difference in their positions appears to be in the method of payment alone." I agree with Sir Robert Bond that if Sanitoria are necessary the Government themselves erect them out of the surplus of revenue. The people of Newfoundland do not want any favours from the Reids. All they require is full value for what they pay. Sir Robert Bond is right, as he usually is. God bless the man.

Bond's speech, as published in your paper of Saturday last, has been read with great interest by the citizens of all shades of politics, for all right thinking people can do no other than commend his attitude re the Reid Bros. gift to the Government. Could any sane man conceive of such a condition of things in the 20th century? Such a condition of things is a disgrace. For some weeks there has been no transmission of mails by trains to any external parts of the Colony, and those whose business call them in or out of the city are seriously affected. But have they no duty to the public in the matter of those land conveyances, for the operation of which the people of the Colony are so highly taxed? Is the Government afraid to press the Reid Bros. Britain is contemplating competing with France and Germany in building up an aviation fleet. The forthcoming estimates will contain a liberal provision for the purchase of aeroplanes. Ten have already been ordered, and before the summer the Army will possess from twenty to thirty.

PARIS, Feb. 26.
Both French and German diplomats, and members of the Cabinets of both nations, are considering plans for a meeting between President Fallieres and the German Emperor, according to a report that is current in well-informed quarters. Such a meeting would represent another effort to solidify the peace of Europe.

LONDON, Feb. 26.
To-day saw the actual beginning of the coal strike, which, if allowed to develop, will bring England face to face with one of the gravest crises in its history. Some miners, whose notices expired to-day, decided to quit work; others will remain at work till March 1st. The commanders of several regiments of Territorial and Reserve troops, stationed in parts of the mining districts, have received instructions from headquarters to have the straps removed from the men's rifles and to return them to the stores, so that in the event of disorder the strikers and other rioters will not be able to seize the weapons so readily.

Editor Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Feb. 26.

A committee of the Cabinet, under the presidency of Premier Asquith, met the coal owners this afternoon. The owners were able to give Asquith and his colleagues a report showing that considerable advance toward peace had been made since Friday. So far as Scotland and England are concerned, the owners are prepared to make such concessions as would settle the dispute in a few hours. At the meeting this morning the owners not only agreed to grant a minimum wage for miners employed in abnormal places, but also to adopt the general principle of a minimum wage, from which only old men and boys should be excepted. The Government will be urged to put special pressure upon recalcitrants, whose extremist views hinder a complete settlement of the dispute being arrived at. It is understood that the owners were also able to inform the Premier to-day that they were prepared to hold another conference with the representatives of the miners, in order to see if they cannot agree upon some safeguards which would make the minimum wage workable and eliminate the fears of malcontents benefiting from its introduction. Some of the Welsh owners are believed to have already agreed to yield to the opinion of the majority and to discuss the question of the minimum wage, although still outwardly opposed to granting it. At the conclusion of the meeting this afternoon between the Cabinet and the coal owners, one of the latter authorized the statement that the situation was easier and decidedly more hopeful.


