Details, thus far, of the rout of the immense Turkish Army by the Buigarains, show that the victorious forces were unmerically far inferior. The Turkish Army is reported to have aggregated 200,000 men, inclusive of the garrison which had retreated from the cantured kirk Kilisseh. ed from the captured Kirk Kilisseh and the main body of the troops which had advanced from Constan-tinople. In fact the Turkish Army virtually comprised the whole of the Turkish Eurpean troops, apart from he garrison of Adrianople, asha, the Turkish Minister of Ware able generals serving in the Army. The fight opened with the discovery by the Turks of a number of Bulgar-ain cavalry scouts. The Turks drew their outpost. These were followed by lines of Bulgarian skirmishers, who were succeeded by the main Bul-garian Army in fighting formation. The battle, which was destined to last several days, resulting in the defeat of the Turks, was soon in progress all along the line. The Bulgarian troops repeatedly delivered fierce at-tacks, sometimes at one point, some-time at another all along the line. time at another, all along the line extending from Lule Burgas to Serai (about 30 miles east). The Turkish troops offered a stubborn resistance, but were unable to withstand the onslaught of the impetuous Bulgarians Finally they turned and fled south in great disorder Tchorlu. The losses to the Ottoman Army are reported as enormous in The capture of a third Turkish mili-tary train near Lule Burgas, before the battle, was an immense advantage to the Bulgarians, as it furnished them with more facilities for transporting their troops and supplies to the scene of action.



In the absence of independint testimony, however, various as nptions as to the accuracy of these elegrams are possible. They may be elated despatches, referring to earlstages in the struggle or mere presentations for the benefit of the Turkish populace. On the other hand they may mean the Bulgarian victory vas not so complete as represented by Sofia. Nine divisions of Turkish reserves are said to have been ordered to Turkish centre and may be holding back Bulgarian advances. Except that the Turks were retreating on Chataldja, fighting a rear guard action, no details of battle were forthcoming from Sofia, but the arrival of five thousand wounded men at Constantinople tells its own story of the san-Sofia. Nine divisions of Turkish renople tells its own story of the san-guinary character of the encounter. Despite optimistic reports from the Turkish side, it is not believed here the Turkish army can retrieve itself. All indications from Sofia are that the allies are determined to dictate the erms of peace from Constantino That construction is placed on an ediorial from the official newspaper, Miri, published at Sofia and other ofcial intimations, that Bulgarians expect to be at Constantinople within a fortnight. Cake is a vicious compound of eggs. flour, sugar which is highly thought of by everybody at the time it is being eaten. Som e people eat cake with the utmost abandon and are. able to mingle gaily in the con-

quite a length of time, while others have to be operated upon at once with a hot water bag.

Cake is usually made about fifteen minutes to six as a substitute for the evening meal. Whenever a housewife finds that she hasn't anything for supper but the vinegar cruet and a change of doilies, she stirs up a spenge cake and invites inspection of its contents. Sometimes this inspection is so satisfactory that most of the cake is left over for the next day and rendered into cottage pudding.

The most romantic form of cake is the bridal variety, which is built up in tri-colored layers and upholstered in frosting, into which is neatly etched the first name of the bride, in red berries, producing a very pleasing memorial effect. Samples of this cake are always sent by mail to distant relatives whose presents were worth disting in the home paper.




