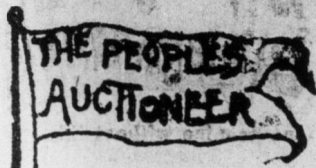

"On his bicycle."

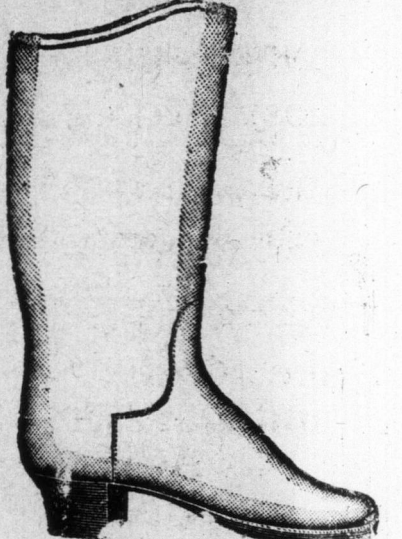

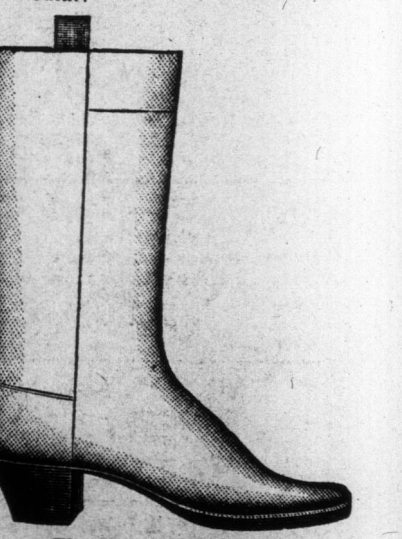

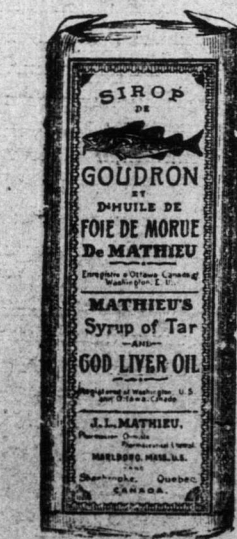

### Household Notes.

Ribbons slightly soiled can be well powdered with French clay or magnesia and held over the heat from the stove for a few minutes. They will shed any grease or soil. Then they should be carefully pressed after brushing out the powder and soil very thoroughly.

When a fish bone lodges in the throat, the easiest and safest way to remove it is to leave it alone, and do not irritate the membrane by coughing and swallowing hard substances. But slowly suck and swallow the juice of a lemon. Fish bone can be dissolved by lemon juice.

When you have been so unfortunate as to scorch the bodice or skirt of a white dress, apply peroxide at once. Place a cloth underneath and one over the scorched spot. You may have to make several applications of peroxide before the stain will be entirely removed.

Sweet potatoes are delicious served in the following way: After they have been boiled until done, mesh them and put in a generous supply of cream and butter, then beat them until very light, put them in a baking dish and bake them in the oven until they are a nice brown.

After taking the bread from the ovens it should be removed from the pans and put bottom side down on a wire bread cooler. If you wish the crust to crisp, do not cover it. If you wish a soft crust, cover it with a clean towel while it is cooling. Put it into a tin box and cover closely.

### Another Protest Against The Government.

The inefficiency and indifference of the Government in enforcing the Bait Act during the season just passed is not the only subject which has called forth a strong protest from the Board of Trade. The Council of the Board of Trade expressed regret to learn that the Government was negotiating with the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. for the general control of the telephone system, including the long distance outport telephones. The Council set forth its protest in these words which are embodied in the last Quarterly Report.

"The Council are pleased to learn that the long agitation for a new telephone system has at last taken effect. In October, 1909, the Council published a report on the present telephone system pointing out its grave defects and suggesting that it should be made a Government service under the control of the Post Office, and that a long distance telephone system for the outports should be connected with it. The Government has taken legislative authority to raise \$150,000 to install a system both for the city and outports. The Council regret to learn that the Government is negotiating with the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. for this service. The Council still adhere to their previously expressed opinion that this service should be controlled and operated by the Postal Telegraph Department inasmuch as it is a valuable adjunct to our Telegraph system. As the Company has already invested nearly \$2,000,000 in our Postal Telegraphs, we consider it is unwise and against public policy to give this valuable franchise to our greatest telegraph competitor. If the Anglo secures this franchise, it means that they can use their long distance telephones as feeders for their present telegraph lines, and inasmuch as the 'Anglo' have the

right forever under their Charter to extend their telegraph system without the permission of the Government, and even in competition with the Postal Telegraphs, it is obviously a mistaken policy for the Government to grant such a valuable franchise to a competitor who enjoys such exclusive rights as the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. The Council feel it a duty to respectfully protest against this franchise being given to any Telegraph Company."

The report of the Council, including these two strong censures of the Government, was passed unanimously by a general meeting of this large non-political trade association, whose members are largely interested in the staple and other industries of the country. It shows cogently how the trade generally regards the action of the Government in respect of the subjects dealt with. One matter is of vital importance to our staple industry and our revenue.

The rigid enforcement of the Bait Act is essential to the Newfoundland control of the North Atlantic Fisheries. The Bait Act is the keystone of our fishery policy, and if that keystone is displaced, our strong hold will fall, and fishery interests will be as at a low ebb as they were twenty odd years ago. If our revenue will fall as smuggling increases. The picnic of a politician or the official visit of a Governor must not be allowed to jeopardize the vital interests of the whole people. The livelihood of our people is far more important than gubernatorial visits.

The protest which we push to-day against the handing over of outport long distance telephones is quite as much justified as the protest about the indifferent enforcement of the Bait Act. The interests at stake are not as large but the policy disclosed is quite as vicious. As the country has a P. T. system, it would be a suicidal policy to get them to spend \$150,000 of the People's money to provide an "adjunct" to feed the Anglo-American system and to starve our own system and dig deeply into the pockets of our people to keep up an adjunct provided at the expense of the public. But it is a suicidal policy and the protest of the Board of Trade is abundantly justified.

**Cable News.**

**SOFIA, Nov. 1.**  
 Details thus far of the rout of the immense Turkish Army by the Bulgarians, show that the victorious forces were numerically far inferior. The Turkish Army is reported to have aggregated 200,000 men, inclusive of the garrison which had retreated from the captured Kirk Kiliss and the main body of the troops which had advanced from Constantinople. In fact the Turkish Army virtually comprised the whole of the Turkish European troops, apart from the garrison of Adrianople, Solonika, Monastir, Janina, Scutari and other strongholds. The great army was under the personal command of Nazim Pasha, the Turkish Minister of War, who was assisted by some of the most able generals serving in the Army. The fight opened with the discovery by the Turks of a number of Bulgarian cavalry scouts. The Turks drew their outpost. These were followed by lines of Bulgarian skirmishers, who were succeeded by the main Bulgarian Army in fighting formation. The battle, which was destined to last several days, resulting in the defeat of the Turks, was soon in progress all along the line. The Bulgarian troops repeatedly delivered fierce attacks, sometimes at one point, sometimes at another, all along the line extending from Lule Burgas to Serai (about 30 miles east). The Turkish troops offered a stubborn resistance, but were unable to withstand the onslaught of the impetuous Bulgarians. Finally they turned and fled southward in great disorder to the Tchorlu. The losses to the Ottoman Army are reported as enormous in dead, wounded and prisoners, as well as of ammunition and other supplies. The capture of a third Turkish military train near Lule Burgas, before the battle, was an immense advantage to the Bulgarians, as it furnished them with more facilities for transporting their troops and supplies to the scene of action.

**PARIS, Nov. 1.**  
 The Matin publishes an interview with Noradunghian Effendi, Turkish Foreign Minister, who is quoted as saying—Turkey cannot lay down her arms until she is victorious. However, if Europe intervened, for the purpose of mediation, we are ready, as in the past, to follow the advice of Europe. We cannot forget that we participated in the labours of the Conference at the Hague, and to-day, as yesterday, we shall not disavow a single one of the dispositions adopted at that conference, and to which we placed our signature. M. Poincare will find that Turkey will not stand in the way if he takes up the courageous task of attempting to re-establish peace. To-morrow, as to-day, we shall show the Great Powers of the West, that peace has no supporter more loyal than Turkey.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 1.**  
 With a view to deciding the heavyweight championship, Kelly, representing McIntosh, the Australian promoter, has signed a contract with McKilrick, manager of Joe Jeanette. The contract calls for the appearance of Jeanette in five contests in Australia, the first to be with Langford and the second with McVey, both of whom are now in Australia. McIntosh agrees to give Jeanette \$25,000 with 25 per cent. gate money, and five round trip tickets for himself, manager and partners. They sail from San Francisco at the latter part of November. McIntosh will also give a gold belt, emblematic of the World's heavyweight championship.

**LONDON, Nov. 1.**  
 Page Croft, Unionist, asked Premier Asquith in the Commons whether the Government has decided upon the manner in which the Overseas Dominions would be represented at London in matter of Imperial defence, and whether Premier Borden would be able to include that information in his forthcoming naval pronouncement. Mr. Asquith replied that no decision had yet been arrived at, but the subject was one of confidential communication between the two governments.

**SOFIA, Nov. 1.**  
 The Turkish cruiser Hamadith discharged nine shells at Cape Mitya lighthouse between the Bulgarian ports of Burgas (Bulgarian's principal Black Sea port, about 100 miles north of Lule Burgas, which is an island town) and Varna. The lighthouse was damaged. The Bulgarian government intends to protest against the bombardment of a building devoted solely to peaceful purposes.

**LONDON, Nov. 1.**  
 Describing the defeat of the Turks at Kallar, in Macedonia (midway between Monastir and the Grecian boundary, and about 60 miles west of Saloniki), a despatch to the Morning Chronicle says that they left 2,000 dead, while 500 were taken prisoners. Seven guns fell into the hands of the Greeks. The main body of the Greek Army is now marching in force to the attack of Saloniki.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 1.**  
 Governor Wilson, speaking before an audience which filled every corner of Madison Square Garden, received the greatest ovation in his campaign for the Presidency. After addressing an enthusiastic audience at the Bronx, he stood for an hour and three minutes at the railing of the speaker's platform, waiting for the demonstration to end.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 1.**  
 Today will witness the closing of the Hotel Metropole, from which Herman Rosenthal was summoned to be shot last July. The closing is directly due to the murder. Too much notoriety had driven away patronage.

**ATHENS, Nov. 1.**  
 The Turkish battleship Fetihbulud was sunk last night in the Gulf of Saloniki by a Greek torpedo boat.

# LATEST War News

## The Torpedoing of a Battleship.

Special to Evening Telegram.

**ATHENS, To-day.**

Lieut. Vothis, commander of the torpedo boat, which sank the Turkish battleship Fethulbulend at Saloniki, sent the following report of the incident to his Government. The forts at Karabum were flashing searchlights unceasingly between the Estuary of Karavofarno and the mouth of the Vadar Rivers, but I passed safely in making full speed for Saloniki and arrived at 11.20 in the evening. I discovered a Turkish cruiser at the left extremity of the pier. At the right extremity were other vessels, including a Russian warship. I manoeuvred cautiously and escaped detection and launched a torpedo boat at a distance of 150 metres from the starboard side of my vessel. After turning slightly to the left I launched another from the port side, then steamed away at full speed a safe distance and again turning discharged a third torpedo at breakwater. When such an explosion was heard that we thought a cannon had been fired on land. After the first explosion we noticed lights moving about the cruiser and heard a whistle being blown by officers. The place was lit up by explosion which occurred at a spot a little forward of right funnel. Dense volumes of smoke poured from the funnel, and the vessel lurched forward by the bows. I then started at full speed passing in front of Karabum which certainly had been apprised of the event from Saloniki and the fortress behaved all his searchlights as we passed unimpeded. I carried out a promise previously made by gunners and fired a shot at the fortress from a range of 2,500 metres.

## The Situation Perplexing.

**TURKS ISSUE REASSURING REPORTS BUT FIVE THOUSAND WOUNDED MEN HAVE ARRIVED AT CONSTANTINOPLE.**

Perplexity arising from the policy of the Governments engaged in warfare in south central Europe, in total excluding newspaper correspondents from the scene of hostilities is more pronounced than ever. An extraordinary series of despatches from Mazen Pasha, Turkish Commander in Chief, claiming the Turkish army had captured Bunarhisar and was still holding its own against the Bulgarians, were published at Constantinople. In the absence of independent testimony, however, various assumptions as to the accuracy of these telegrams are possible. They may be belated despatches, referring to earlier stages in the struggle or mere representations for the benefit of the Turkish populace. On the other hand they may mean the Bulgarian victory was not so complete as represented by the Sofia. Nine divisions of Turkish reserves are said to have been ordered to Turkish centre and may be holding back Bulgarian advances. Except that the Turks were retreating on Chatalja, fighting a rear guard action, no details of battle were forthcoming from Sofia, but the arrival of five thousand wounded men at Constantinople tells its own story of the sanguinary character of the encounter.

Despite optimistic reports from the Turkish side, it is not believed here the Turkish army can retrieve itself. All indications from Sofia are that the allies are determined to dictate the terms of peace from Constantinople. That construction is placed on an editorial from the official newspaper, Miri, published at Sofia and other official intimations, that Bulgarians expect to be at Constantinople within a fortnight. Possibly it depends upon the strength of the Chatalja fortified lines, which for nearly a century have been regarded as an impregnable stronghold, from which the Turks would face the world to expel them. Diplomatic activity continues in European capital, but the Balkan allies in their present mood are ill-disposed towards European interference.

**Has Stomach of Ostrich.**

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 24.—A case of much interest to the medical fraternity and others in Hamilton is being much discussed around the City Hospital just now.

Among the patients in the institution is a girl of 16 or so, who has in the very marked degree some of the peculiarities which are commonly reported to be possessed by the ostrich. An x-ray picture of the young woman's stomach shows a large assortment of small ware contained therein. The doctors in attendance have already taken from her a varied assortment which includes 145 pins, 45 cents in small silver, a handful of buttons and a number of other small articles.

"We have not got rid of nearly all of it yet," said Superintendent Langrill this morning. Many of the city physicians have examined the x-ray photographs and are deeply interested in the case. "It is a form of insanity," said one of the attendants, "and in this girl's case is quite severe."

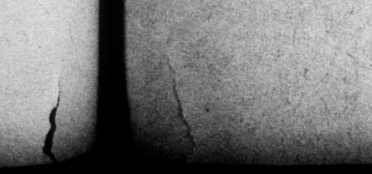

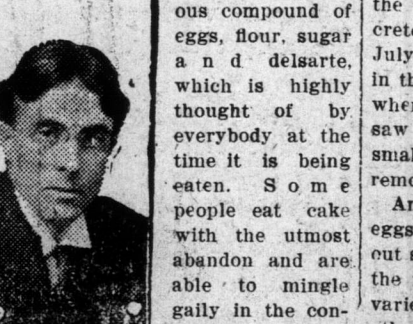

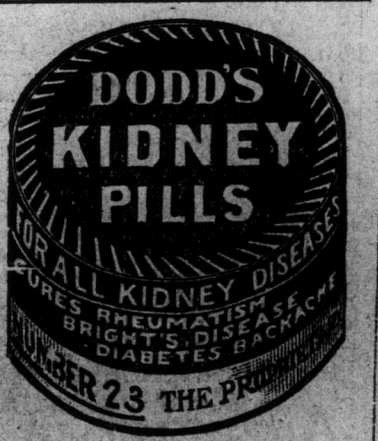
