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

It is necessary to avoid at all costs deceiving the German Government as to our real temper and our firm determination to see the present affair through, whatever the cost-even to that war which no American desires. We shall not bargain, haggle, trade: we shall not accept our inalienable rights subject to conditions imposed by another nation We shall not permit Germany to influence our relations with France or Great Britain in return for a solemn agreement to cease from further assassinations. The sooner Berlin grasps this fact the more promptly we shall be able to close the present acute international crisis. A week ago the President of the United States said of his country that it might be "too proud to fight." He meant for selfish interest or national aggrandizement. He made his whole mind clear in his solemn declaration that the force of moral principle was the one thing his country loved, the only thing for which she would contend. A moral principle is at issue between the United States and Germany. We shall do well to remember this always. German statesmen and rulers will serve their nation best by taking full measure of the meaning of the words of the President as they express and embody the spirit of his fellow citi-



Gerard the following answer to his ommunication of May 15, regarding German submarine warfare: The Imperial Government has subjected the communication of the American Government to a thorough investigation. It entertains also a keen wish to co-operate in a frank and friendly way in clearing up any possible mis understanding which may have arisen in the relations between the two Governments through events mentioned by the American Government. Regarding the first cases of the Ameri can steamers Cushing and Gulflight. the American Embassy has already been informed that the German Covrnment has no intention of submit ting neutral ships in the war zone which are guilty of no hostile acts, to attacks by submarine, or submarines or aviators, on the contrary the German forces are repeatedly instructed most specifically to avoid attacks on such ships. If neutral ships in recent months have suffered through German submarine warfare, owing to mistakes of identification it is a question only of quite isolated exceptional cases, which can be attributed to the British Government's abuse of flags together with the suspicious and culpable behavior of masters of ships The German Government in all cases which has been shown by its investiin fault for damage by German submarines and aviators, expressed regret over the unfortunate accident. and if justified by conditions, has offered indemnification. The cases of the Cushing and Gulflight will be treated on the same principle. An investigation in both cases is in progress, the result of which will presently be communicated to the Embassy. The investigation can if necessary be supplemented by an international call on an international commission to inquire, provided by Article Three of the Hague agreement Oct. 18, 1907. 



Passing of Hon. James Baird, M.L.C.



THE LATE HON. JAMES BAIRD.

Last evening there passed from the Legislative Council and from the business mart of Water Street one who has played a prominent part in the life of the Colony. The deceased, the Hon, James Baird, was born at Saltcoats in Scotland some 87 years ago, and as a youth of fifteen he came to Newfoundland in 1844, two years before the great fire of 1846, the story of which Mr. Baird often told to the younger generation. In the early twenties of his age he formed a partnership with his brother, the late David Baird, in the general importing and drapery trade. Twenty years later the present business of James Baird, Ltd., was established. In 1872 he entered into partnership with his nephew, the late James Gordon, and branched out in the fishery and supplying trade. Among the branches established was the lobster industry on the West Coast which led up to a crisis in the French Shore dispute, and paved the way for the settlement which took place years later in 1904. These were the days of the French Shore dispute, and the British Government through the Admiralty were endeavouring to keep the peace by administrative orders, familiar enough to continental methods. One of the orders affected Mr. Baird's lobster business and he refused to obey it, and the Commodore, Sir Baldwin Walker, proceeded to carry it out, and by so doing closed Mr. Baird's factory. This led to a law suit in which Mr. Baird won, settling clearly the constitutional point that no mere orders from the British Government unless it was authorized by statute or common law afforded a legal answer to injury to a private person's business. This led to the legalizing of such interference of Modus Vivendi Acts until the settlement in 1904, which was the commencement of that Entente which has brought British and French soldiers into line on the battlefields of Europe. This sturdy action of Mr. Baird earned for him the title of the "Newfoundland Hampden," and showed the grit that was in the man. The fire of 1892 destroyed the premises of Baird, Gordon & Co. but afterwards they were rebuilt on a more commodious form. The Bank Crash which brought down many firms left this firm unshaken and since that time it has grown larger and larger, but adverse circumstances have ises were again swept away by fire. The problem was again tackled and a finer suite of buildings has replaced those swept away. Mr Baird was a leading member of St Andrew's Church and in him the Church and its congregation found a strong supporter. His wife was a Miss Boyd of this city and died some years ago. He leaves surviving him one daughter, Mrs. Henry D. Carter and three sons, Mr. James C. Baird, Mr. Hugh Baird and Mr. David Baird. In the fullness of years and after a life-work in assisting in building up the trade of the country, the Hon. James Baird has passed to his rest.

Kuepferle arrived in Liverpool on February 14. He showed a passport signed by Secretary of State William sailing from New York. In writing J. Bryan, issued ten days prior to his letter, which resulted in his arest, he gave his home address as 665 De Kalb Avenue, Brooklyn. He epresented himself to be a woolle erchant. From Liverpool he wer to Dublin and then to London, where he was arrested on February 16.

Court Advised. When court opened this morning

Attorney General announced the death of the prisoner to the judges.

"Since the rise of this court last night," the Attorney General said, "this man Kuepferle has committed suicide in Brixton Prison. He was in a special observation cell under practically continuous observation, but during one of the short intervals, he seized the opportunity of taking his own life."

Chief Warden Cook, who is in charge of the prison, testified that last night the night warden named Perry, came to him and said:
"I cannot see the prisoner."

Warden Cook immediately arose and opening the cell door, he found the prisoner hanging by the neck, from a corner behind the door. He had used a silk scarf to commit suicide and he was hanging clear of the floor. Warden Cook cut the scarf and summoned the prison doctor. The man's body was still warm but he could not be revived.

The Statement.

Warden Cook produced the slate on which the prisoner had written his message. The communication fol-

"To whom it may concern:

"My name is Kuepferle and I was born in Rastatt in Baden. I am a soldier with a rank I do not desire to mention. I can say I have had a fair trial in the United Kingdom, but I am unable longer to stand the strain and I am taking the law in my own hands. I have fought many battles and death is the only saviour for me. I would prefer death by shooting, but I do not wish to ascend the scaffold as (here the prisoner drew a Masonic sign) and I hope the Almighty Architect of this universe will lead me in the unknown land. Money in Snapshots.

Romance of Lucky Press Photo graphs of the War.

The most interesting photographs published in the newspapers are often lucky snapshots taken by amateurs, and in proof of this several journals are now offering thousandpound prizes for war pictures. Naval and military men are at present supplying a number of the best photographs of famous incidents in the world's war, and the officer who secured a picture of the sinking Blucher heeling over before its death dive, with the crew clinging like flies to its battered hull, must have netted a substantial sum. The latter no doubt rivalled the amount paid to the passenger on board the vessel which sank the French submarine the Pluviose a short time back, who secured a valuable snapshot of the submersible disappearing beneath the waves. It was published in a London news-

A few weeks before the war broke out an Englishman travelling in Germany secured several excellent photographs of the latest types of German aeroplanes. Although his safest plan would have been to destroy them, he determined to bring them back with him to England. He secreted the plates in the cushion of his motor-car and started off on a quick dash to the frontier. He was stopped at frequent intervals by armed guards and his luggage searched, but the suspicious Uhlans did not think to examine the cushions of the car. Had they done so the Britisher would undoubtedly have been shot for a spy. The photographs were. smuggled through safely to this country, and they caused a sensation when published in an aviation paper. Apart from their news value, the snapshots provided much valuable information for the military authori-

At the time of the Durbar a London newspaper spent money like water in order to be the first to publish pictures of the ceremony. Immediately the photographs were taken they were rushed across Europe by special train and motor-car. At Calais a steamer fitted with an engraving plant awaited the arrival of the photographs, and as the vessel made its way to Dover newspaper blocks of the pictures were produced. Eighteen days after the photographs were taken in India they appeared in a London newspaper.

THUMB CUT OFF TO ESCAPE SER-

Private Bavin, 4th Royal Dragoons ppeared before a district court-martial at Devizes on Saturday minus the top of a thumb, which he was alleged to have chopped off in order to escape service. Lieutenant-Colonel H. Hicks ommanding the depot, Somerset Light Infantry, at Taunton, was president of the court.

Corporal Burrows, Royal Fusilers, and Quartermaster-Sergeant James, both of whom were formerly at Devizes Detention Barracks, gave evidence that the accused was undergoing a sentence there. He was supplied with a razor for shaving purposes, and a few minutes later was found with the top of his thumb cut off. The wound had practically

The accused denied that the injury was done wilfully. He said he had no proper razor strop, and used his braces fastened to a bell-pull. As he was stropping a door banged and startled him. The razor slipped and cut off his thumb. He had volunteered for the front twice, but when the regiment went he was not allowed to join them.

The court found the accused guilty. The president said it was a very serious offence; it was practically malingering when his country was at war, and Bavin was liable to a death sentence. 
