LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, Nov. 19th, 1917.
NO CHRISTMAS GIFTS.
 Christmas present buying is going to be even more arduous than usual this season, and one great standby will be no longer available. One knows that worried search for something which members of the family do not possess, and recalls the inevitable solution if they are smokers—give them a pipe, cigarettes, or cigars. I have not heard of any serious pipe shortage, but the pipe will be the only recourse this year. The Tobacco Control Board is aware of the Christmas tendency, and has issued an early injunction against the selling to customers of tobacco in excess of their usual purchases. The wife who likes to give her husband cigars will find it hard to make her purchases, and firms which had been accustomed to distribute consignments of cigars among their employees will have to try something else. That something will not be whiskey, for there will be no big supply of spirit available.

PIANO SHUFFLE.
 Owing to the redistribution of wealth strange things are happening in the piano world. In the homes of munition and other war workers are to be found pianos where formerly were none. Long-time possessors of pianos, on the other hand, have many of them, made over their pianos to hospitals and canteens. At the same time, the great demand for pianos is accompanied by a corresponding shortness of supply. A well-known firm of piano makers state that whereas they used to turn out sixty pianos a week, they now produce ten, and even this number was due to the fact that the oldest workers were in this connection usually the most valuable. Wood for cases, they declared, had gone up 600 per cent, and makers were thankful to secure the old cases, fretworked and green-silk fronted, that we knew in our grand-mothers' drawing rooms. The cheaper pianos could be sold over and over again. Since pianos are not likely to be among the first imports when the war is over, the British maker may count safely upon a long period of prosperity, during which he will no doubt further develop the qualities of his instrument. In the general reshuffle of money those who have less money do not necessarily sell their pianos, while those who have more may be safely counted upon to buy at the first opportunity this emblem of prosperity and—with the various piano players—of entertainment and pleasure.

GIRL CLERKS URGED TO EMIGRATE.
 Now the Government offices are full of young girls under 16 doing the work of messenger boys, the State is one of the principal employers of "half-timers" in the country. These girls spend about one-third of their working hours in school instruction. The Government is anxious not to fill

their heads with any desire to join the shorthand-typists who will overcrowd the labor market after the war. Instead, they are being educated with a view to their possible emigration overseas, as women generally useful and clever with their hands. They say, indeed, that the War Office and other Government "Welfare Superintendents," in their little chats with women clerks, are all urging their charges to consider emigration after the war and to prepare for it.

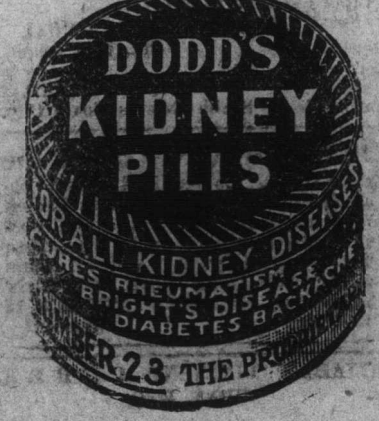

EX-PREMIER AND TAXI-LADY.

I noticed that when Mr. and Mrs. Asquith arrived at St. Martin-in-the-Field, Trafalgar Square, London, to attend the service in memory of Lord Basil Blackwood (the Marquis of Dufferin's heir, who went into the Army when he had passed military age), they had not come in their own car, but in a taxi driven by a woman. They were apparently satisfied with their chauffeuse, for the ex-Premier asked her to wait and take them away after the service. The taxi lady is still an unfamiliar figure in London streets, very few having received their licenses, but no doubt Sir Auckland Geddes will see to it that before long a larger number get to work and so release the men.

WIRELESS MONOPOLY AT SEA.

For a long time shipowners have been dissatisfied about the monopoly exercised by the Marconi Company. At present all British sea-going vessels of 3,000 tons and upwards have to be equipped with a wireless installation and from this week this must also be fitted on ships between that tonnage and 1,600 tons gross, and in addition each of the vessels has to carry two operators. As it happens there is no other concern in the United Kingdom but the Marconi Company that can make the necessary provision, and the chief complaint is that a contract for ten years is insisted upon. Shipowners have to supply part of the apparatus and pay £120 a year for its use, whilst the cost of such operator is £120 per annum in addition to food. If the ship is destroyed before the agreement expires it is stipulated that the owners must pay £30 a year for the remainder of the period. It is generally recognized

Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring.

Reports of the progress of the herring fisheries in Newfoundland waters failed to give more than an outline of the prospects of the pack of Scotch cured herring for this season, but it is known that higher prices are being paid at packing centers by merchants both in New York and elsewhere. During the present week offerings at \$16 were made from the West coast and it is understood that several New York operators have accepted them, subject to pack at this figure. The first shipments of Fall caught Newfoundland Scotch-cured herring will probably arrive in the New York market a week from next Friday on the steamer Florizel. Several New York houses are expecting goods on this steamer, and it is estimated that the shipment will be something in the neighborhood of 2,000 barrels. There is no indication to the opening prices of this new packed herring in New York, but in view of the prices now ruling in Newfoundland it would seem that the market must be above \$22 per barrel, perhaps as high as \$25 and \$26. There has been little trading on the spot since last reports, most operators being entirely cleaned up on their stocks.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Dec. 1.

TRANSFER OF INTERESTS IN BIG LINE.

NEW YORK, To-day. The International Mercantile Marine Co. announces to-day that it has sold one-half of its interests in the Holland American Line to a syndicate of Dutch bankers for \$3,500,000. It had been understood that the International Mercantile Marine controlled 35 per cent interests in the Dutch Company.

RUSSIANS IN FRANCE ASK TO JOIN AMERICANS.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN FRANCE, Dec. 20. (By the Associated Press).—The officers of the Russian Army in France have volunteered as a body to give their services to the United States. The officers are desirous of continuing the battle against the Germans notwithstanding the Russo-German peace negotiations. The ranking Russian officer who made the request that he and his subordinates be taken in the American service has given a guarantee to vouch for every one accepted. All grades are included in the request from second Lieut. up. There have also been suggestions that it might be possible to form for the Russians an organization similar to the French Legion of Lafayette Flying Squadron. There is a general feeling that the action of the Russian officers will have a moral effect in the country.

AIR RAID DOES LITTLE DAMAGE.

LONDON, To-day. Last night's air raid made less of an impression upon London's morale than any of its predecessors, and the casualties were small in view of the fact that the Gothas came just at the time the people were on their way home from shops and offices. The material damage was slighter, too, than some less pretentious attempts of the Germans. As a rule the raiders' bombs fell in places where little damage could be done, while only one fire was observed and that died down as quickly as it flared up. Outside of London most of the bombs fell in open spaces. The visit of the Germans was unexpected, as the new moon gave very little light and there were intervals when the sky was cloudy.

ENEMY ATTACKS FAIL.

ROME, To-day. The text of an official statement issued to-day by the War Office reads: In a sanguinary action which lasted the entire day the enemy, alternating violent bombardments with powerful infantry attacks, attempted from Col Capelle to Monte Vertica to push his line towards the south. Only on his left, where, however, about 100 prisoners remained in our hands, did the enemy succeed in maintaining his advantages, in the Monte Asolone. (Not finished.)

BRITISH CASUALTIES.

LONDON, Dec. 18. The British casualties reported in the week ending to-day totalled 17,976 officers and men as follows: Officers killed or died of wounds, 331; men, 3,181; officers wounded or missing, 1,039; men, 13,425.

Crisis Approaching on Western Front.

British Awakening—Lloyd George's Speech Stimulus to Full Realization of Gravity of Situation, London Press Declares—Call to Arms Clearly Sounded.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—There is no use trying to camouflage the gravity of the situation on the West front—the only war theatre which, in the last analysis, really counts.

To-day Premier Lloyd George's speech at Gray's Inn was regarded as a call to arms in a present-day crisis. The set-back to British arms at Cambrai has not only practically nullified Field-Marshal Sir Douglas Haig's splendidly conceived and Gen. Byng's splendidly executed advance, but it is generally admitted that the reverse marks the end of the British offensive for some time to come.

The initiative has now passed to Hindenburg. The most competent experts predict that only the greatest efforts will prevent the Germans from fulfilling their boast to break through the Allied line before American participation can equalize the reinforcement of the German line from the Russian front.

Huns Have 500,000 Reinforcements. This reinforcement of the enemy, made possible by the cessation of fighting on the East front, means a half million picked men to throw into the assault against the Allied line before America can get in.

Besides restoring to Hindenburg his long lost initiative, Gen. Byng's reverse graphically demonstrates the untruth of various widely prevalent

stories regarding the enemy. It demonstrates the utter absurdity of the story that the morale of the Germans is wanting. It gives the lie to the confidently circulated stories of Germany's impending collapse.

Regardless of who is personally responsible for the Cambrai reverse, the fundamental reason doubtless lies in the fact that the whole army has been permeated with such a spirit of cocksureness—if not over-confidence—that it had grown careless.

Perhaps it was only the natural result of an uninterrupted series of recent British successes, combined with the fact that the present army has never been compelled by hard necessity to learn defensive tactics like the Mons herbes, who are now a mere handful in the great war machine.

Coincidentally there has been the general development of a tendency to underestimate the enemy's capacity for an offensive.

British Press Comment.

The fact remains that the crisis is at hand and that the public is being awakened to realization of it. Practically every London newspaper to-day classed Premier Lloyd George's speech as a well-timed stimulant.

"Premier Lloyd George reached a true authentic note of British statesmanship," said the Post. "We are confident of his appeal to the spirit of the nation."

"The speech—for which we are all most grateful—is an appeal to reason, to honor, to our honor and to self-interest," declared the Telegraph.

"The speech was more than brilliant," summarized the Chronicle. "It had a dispassionate firmness appropriate with the present crisis. He has demonstrated the impossibility of a satisfactory peace now."

"The speech had courage and faith," said the Mail.

"It flung a challenge in the face of all doubters and waverers. He showed direct insight into the supreme issues of the war."

"The chief merit of the address," the Times asserted, "lies in the clearness and directness with which the Premier keeps the things that really matter before the people."

The News was the only London newspaper which did not entirely approve of the speech.

"Unfortunately he did not hint when victory would be considered as won," the editorial declared. "Among all his emphatic utterances there was not a word enlightening us on the one point that really matters. The world to-day will regret his failure to state the policy of the Allies with the gravity and the definiteness which

The Lost German Colonies.

New York Globe: The surrender and dispersal of the last German force operating in German East Africa marks the suppression of the German colonial empire. The suppression is likely to prove a permanent extinction. Self-governing South Africa is not likely to consent to a rehoisting of the German flag in its neighborhood. Self-governing Australia would fight against having German submarine bases re-established over against the Australian coast. Canada is concerned about the freedom of the Pacific, and will not consent to the re-establishment of menaces to her trade routes. The question of the German colonies is not an English question, but a British colony question. Germany in her colonial enterprises has proved herself an ill neighbor. Her activities have alarmed those who wish for peace and quiet. She has also proved an ill administrator. Her heavy hand has fallen with crushing force on the uncivilized natives who came under her control. Of all the cruel exploitations that have disgraced the relations of the white race to the black, the brown, and the yellow, that of Germany has been the most ruthless. For the sake of the natives as well as of colonial neighbors, it is to be hoped Germany will have no dependents until she learns better how to treat them.

Household Notes.

A good salad is made of slices of pineapple, with a spoonful of cheese on each slice, and served with cream dressing.

Dried fruits or vegetables should be placed in water and soaked until plumped before cooking. Cook in the water they were soaked in.

Common salt solution is made with

one teaspoonful of salt to a glass of water. This solution will be helpful in cases of bites or stings.

Good coffee should be made with cold water and fifteen minutes is the proper time to allow for it to come to a boil. It should boil five minutes.

There are so many places where brown sugar is better than granulated, in cooking. Brown betty is much better made with brown sugar.

A delicious ice cream is made of baked apples put through a sieve and flavored with lemon and sugar, then added to an equal quantity of thin cream and frozen.

No part of the ham should be wasted. The rough ends can be ground, creamed and served on toast for breakfast and the bone can be boiled with cabbage.

Mocha sauce is made with 1/2 cup butter, beaten to a cream, and 1 1/2 cups of confectioner's sugar beaten into it. Last, beat in black coffee drop by drop until it is dark enough.

Out of the gloom which enshrouded Halifax there shine forth some deeds of such splendid bravery, some examples of such divine self-forgetfulness in the service of others that the whole dark picture is illumined. There is the story of Captain Harrison, who, alone and unaided, boarded

the burning Pictou, loaded as she was with explosives, cut her moorings, allowing her to drift away from the menaced city, and on this floating volcano, single-handed, fought and subdued a fire which might have completed the catastrophe which the Mont Blanc began. There is the story of the 72nd Battalion of Ottawa, which, when the magazine was almost ringed around with flame, volunteered to a man to save it, and faced annihilation without flinching till the task was done. Great glory awaits the 72nd overseas—a battalion with that stuff in it will go far—but it will never do a more, supremely courageous action under the enemy's fire than it did last Thursday at Halifax. There are doubtless innumerable other similarly inspiring stories which have not and never will come to light.

There is a bravery which inspires great deeds upon the fields of battle. Happy is the people whose sons display it, as Canada's sons have done.

There is courage, no less admirable, which, in a moment of wreck and ruin, springs to the rescue of those in danger without thought of consequence or of self. Canada from coast to coast may thank God for the heroes of Halifax—Montreal Sear.

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir,—It does not appear to be known in Newfoundland that prisoners of war belonging to the 2nd Regiment can receive small parcels, as long as they answer the conditions laid down by the authorities.

A Government stamp and coupon may be obtained in England—by the next of kin which entitles them to send one Xmas parcel—this we ourselves, were able to obtain and have despatched a parcel to my son which has probably reached Germany by now.

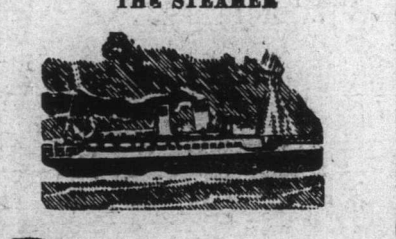

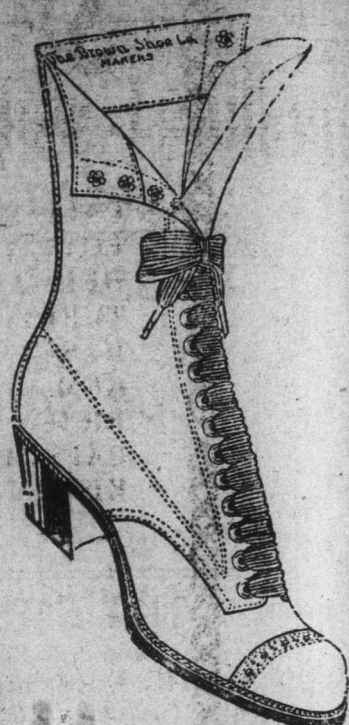

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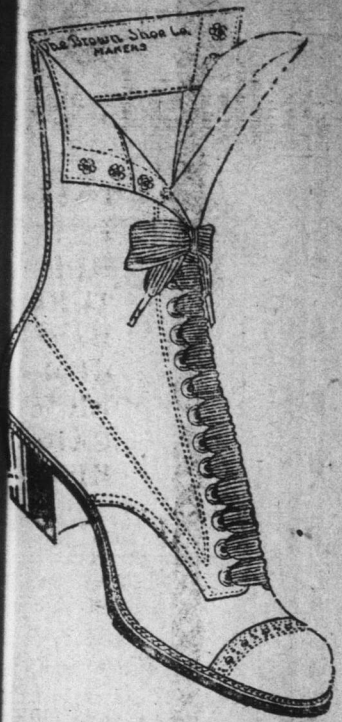

COMPLEXION EXERCISES.

It is often asked why, of all parts
of the body, the face is most subject to
spots, pimples and other blemishes.
It is because the pores are kept open
and by frequent baths and the circula-
tion stimulated by the rubbing and
drying, the effete humors in the blood
find there a ready exit, and conse-
quently crowd thither from all parts
of the body, giving the skin there too
much to do. If the whole body is sub-
ject to a daily bath and a thorough
rub down, the secretions will be
equally distributed and no one part of
the body overtaxed. Then, some ex-

ercises should be taken daily to com-
plete the cure.
Lightly flexing the arms is a mild
but invigorating exercise. It can be
made more intense by clenching the
fists and tensing the muscles as the
arms are bent. Begin the exercise
by raising the arms horizontally at
the sides, bent upward at the elbow
and continue the movement until the
hands rest on the shoulders. The
arms are now returned to horizontal
positions and then lowered to the

sides. Now raise the arms again to a
horizontal position, bend at elbow and,
with energy, thrust them high over-
head. The arms are lowered to the
sides by reversing the movements.
Two or three minutes are sufficient to
practice these exercises. Finish exer-
cising by flexing the legs as fol-
lows:—

Stand with one foot in advance of
the other, arms at back, feet firm and
flat on the floor at all times. Standing
so, the trunk is held erect, but low-
ered by bending at the hips, knees and
ankles. This should be repeated a
number of times. The other foot is
now advanced and the exercise re-
sumed. This calls into play a wide
range of muscles, but its efficiency
depends upon the vigor with which
they are executed.

Everyday Etiquette.

How Desert was Subdued.

Report From Sinai Armies Given by
General Murray.

How the Sinai peninsula, for two
years partially occupied by the Turks,
was freed of all formed bodies of
Turkish troops is told in General Sir
Archibald Murray's despatch on the
operations of the Egyptian force from
October, 1916, to the end of February,
last, culminating in the victory of
Rafa.

The main factor, he says, was in-
tense and unremitting work. To re-
gain the true eastern frontier of
Egypt hundreds of miles of road and
railway had been built, hundreds of
miles of water piping had been laid,
filters capable of supplying 1,500,000
gallons of water a day and reservoirs
had been installed, and tons of stone
transported from distant quarries.

Kantara had been transformed from
a small canal village into an import-
ant railway and water terminus, with
wharves and cranes and a railway
ferry; and the desert, till then almost
destitute of human habitation, showed
the successive marks of our advance
in the shape of strong positions firmly
entrenched and protected by hundreds
of miles of barbed wire, of standing
camps where troops could shelter in
comfortable huts, of tanks and reser-
voirs, of railway stations and sidings,
of aerodromes and of signal stations
and wireless installations, by all of
which the desert was subdued and
made habitable, and adequate lines of
communication established between
the advancing troops and their ever
receding base.

In the Rafa battle, which Sir Arch-
ibald Murray describes as a "fine ac-
tion," and for which he expresses his
indebtedness to Lieut-General Sir
Charles Dobell, in command of the
eastern force, more than 16,000 un-
wounded prisoners were taken. Our
casualties amounted to 487 in all, of
which 71 were killed, 415 wounded,
and 1 missing.

Herring Fishery at Bay of Islands.

The stormy weather of the past two
weeks has interfered considerably in
the prosecution of the herring fishery
in Bay of Islands. For six days
those operating at Middle Arm were
unable to attend to their gear and
similar conditions existed in Middle
Arm; and when at last they were en-
abled to get to their nets many of
them found them either sunk or
tangled with others. As a conse-
quence many nets have been lost.
And those who succeeded in getting
their gear, found them filled with her-
ring unfit for use.

At Penguin Arm on Saturday there
was very good fishing, boats getting
as high as thirty tubs per fleet.

There was good herring fishing in
Humber Arm on Friday and Saturday.

On Monday there was good herring
fishing all over the Humber Arm. At
Cook's Cove and Benoit's Cove there
were from three to five tubs per fleet.
Similar catches were made at the
Farm, and at McCarthy's the catches
range from five to six tubs per fleet.

The price of herring on Saturday
was \$3 per barrel.

Two schooners at Middle Arm went
to Bonne Bay last week.

The "Scotch" packers at Curling
had all the herring they could handle
on Saturday and Monday, and similar
conditions prevailed at Middle Arm.

AT BONNE BAY.

The price of herring at Bonne Bay
last week dropped to \$3 per barrel,
and the price on Saturday was report-
ed at \$2.50. Some big catches were
made, when the weather conditions
permitted fishermen to haul their gear.

AT HALL'S BAY.

There was fair herring fishing at
Hall's Bay all last week, but they
slackened off somewhat towards the
week-end, and one or two of the ves-
sels there left for the West Coast to
finish loading, owing to considerable
ice making.

The fishermen operating at Hall's
Bay suffered very heavily through
storms, many of them losing two sets
of gear.

Large numbers of people are engaged
in the herring fishery in Hall's Bay
this season. In Springdale nets are
set so close that motor boats find it
difficult to move between them.—
Western Star, Dec. 19.

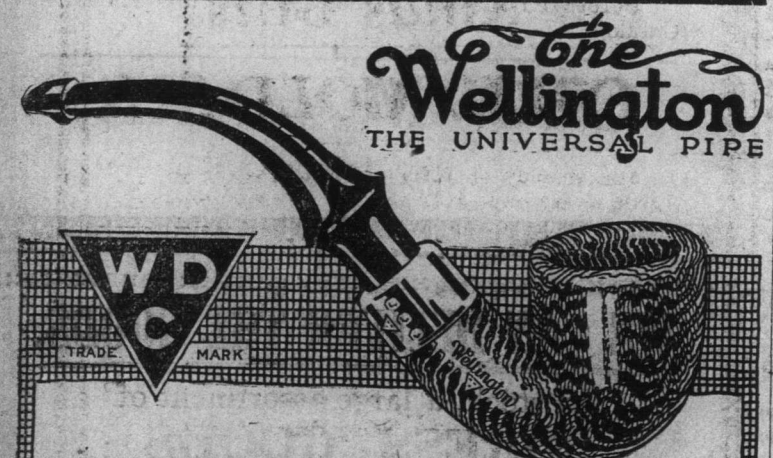

MONOPOLY.

Monopoly is an effort on the part of
 high finance to improve upon the
 methods so successfully followed by
 the late Captain Kidd. It consists of
 an arrangement with the common peo-
 ple by which the latter exchange all
 of their vested rights and most of
 their cuttle for the privilege of vot-
 ing in a loud and independent tone of
 voice.

Monopoly is caused by a concert of
 action on the part of a few rich men.
 This is one of the most expensive con-
 certs ever put on any stage, and a
 season ticket costs more than a grand
 opera box. Every once in a while,
 four or five well-to-do citizens, who
 own all of the natural resources from
 the Aurora Borealis to the Gulf
 Stream, get together and jack up
 prices so high off the ground that no-
 body can reach them with a three-
 section ladder, after which they cock
 an attentive ear and wait for the hard
 metallic plunk of the 400 per cent.
 dividend. This is called the law of
 supply and demand.

One of the most disagreeable forms
 of monopoly is that which corners all
 of the conversation that can be found
 at a six o'clock dinner. Almost every
 day, some ingratiating guests will
 start for a dinner party with a well-
 chosen line of repartee, and on arriv-
 ing run into a monopolist who draws
 up to the table with a double-acting
 jaw and a clear, penetrating voice,
 which has been wound up for twenty-
 four hours. This has a tendency to
 affect the appetites of other guests
 who have gone to the trouble of
 memorizing several side-splitting an-
 ecdotes from the comic supplement.

The monopolist, who, secure in a
 strange hold on a double seat in the
 smoking-car and builds extensive for-
 tifications with four suit-cases and
 both feet cannot be touched by the
 law, but can be killed with perfect
 safety, as no jury would convict the
 assassin. The law is a weak weapon,
 but the petit jury is one of man's
 noblest inventions.

Monopoly in any form is odious, un-
 less the spigot is turned in our
 direction.

THE RUSSIAN SITUATION.

LONDON, Dec. 20.

Despatches from Petrograd indicate that the struggle between the Cossacks and Maximalists in Southern Russia is increasing in severity. The correspondent at Petrograd of Reuter's Ltd., telegraphing under date of Tuesday, says that the flame of civil war is spreading northward along the Volga River from Astrakhan to Samara. The Maximalists hold Astrakhan, from which place the Cossacks were reported on Monday to be 20 versts distant. Fighting probably has now begun. The Maximalists are said to have many machine guns, but are almost without cannon. The Cossacks are reported to be equipped with light field guns. An extraordinary state of affairs is depicted at Tsaritsyn, in the province of Samara, where neither the Maximalists nor Cossacks have gained the mastery, both being beaten by the forces of Hallodorus, Abbot of Tsaritsyn, and known as Lhadore, the main monk, who advanced against them, singing "save, Lord, thy people." Orenburg Cossacks, commanded by General Durtroff, are advancing against Samara, the Maximalist garrisons on route being dispersed by the Cossacks, who have occupied all the eastern part of the province of Voronezh, a province in South Central Russia. Fighting continues at Odessa, where Ukrainian troops hold the arsenal and telegraph and telephone stations. The Municipal theatre repeatedly changed hands before finally remaining in possession of the Ukrainians. The Maximalists held the port, which the Ukrainians shelled with heavy field artillery, in response to the bombardment of the town by naval guns. Ukrainians are clearing and removing the Maximalist troops from the province of Kiev and at Konotop, about 100 miles east of Tchernigov, Ukraine, in Central Rada, has issued a message to the Ukrainians, proclaiming Ukraine a democratic republic, pending the meeting of the Ukrainian Constituent Assembly in January. Rada, in its message, recognizes the principle of expropriation without compensation of private lands, monastery land and some church land for the benefit of the labor classes. In expectation of an early peace, Russian soldiers in increasing numbers are leaving the northern front, urgent telegrams being received from Petrograd for reinforcements of soldiers, who are being promised the best of conditions and food. Dr. Petrofsky, a lecturer at Meezek University, has been deported by the Bolshevik Government to discuss peace questions with the Germans at Brest-Litovsk. According to the Russian official news agency, the delegates of the Ukrainian Council of Workmen and Soldiers Delegates, recently met at Elzackow, and resolved to regard Bada as Bourgeois, and an anti-revolutionary institution, and to oppose it.

The so-called peace terms which must be appraised only at their face value, are said to include the following: To leave the disposition of Alsace-Lorraine to a plebiscite of the inhabitants; England to pay Germany for her East African colonies, the money to be used for the rehabilitation of Belgium, Serbia, Roumania and Northern France. Russian provinces bordering on the Baltic and Black Sea and Prussia, to become independent under German plan. Poland to be called an independent state under Austrian suzerainty. Disarmament and freedom of the seas, and commerce to be left to the peace conference. Roumania, Serbia and Montenegro to retain their original boundaries, with the right of access to the sea being granted to Serbia. Turkey to remain intact. Whether such a proposal of terms is merely another step in the German propaganda to impress the public mind that the Allies are responsible for the continuance of the war, or whether it is really a feeling for peace, is a subject for the estimate of the Governments concerned. At first glance some are inclined to regard them as the Kaiser's much-advertised Christmas peace terms, probably designed in a large part to keep the German people under the illusion that they are fighting a really defensive war against a foe which insists on the dismemberment of their country. There is a very decided inclination in competent quarters, however, that Germany, having gained

great advances in Russia, might think it to her advantage to yield to demands in many other directions, which is the estimate her own statesmen would strike in the balance. This is one of the reasons which some close observers believe, as the offer of peace coming at this time, has probably more real intentions of peace behind it than the previous ones. No one here believes Germany's best terms would be put on the table at the first offering, and those inclined to start a discussion of terms. From what may be gained of the war aims explained by their statesmen and by President Wilson, such offering of terms as outlined in the foregoing couldn't be considered as a basis of a satisfactory peace, although it might contain some of the elements.

CONSCRIPTION VOTE IN AUSTRALIA.
VANCOUVER, B.C., Dec. 20.
A special Vancouver "World" cable from Sydney, Australia, states that the first return of the conscription plebiscite, gives a majority of 120,000 against conscription, with more than a million votes counted. Another million votes remain to be counted, including the soldiers' vote.

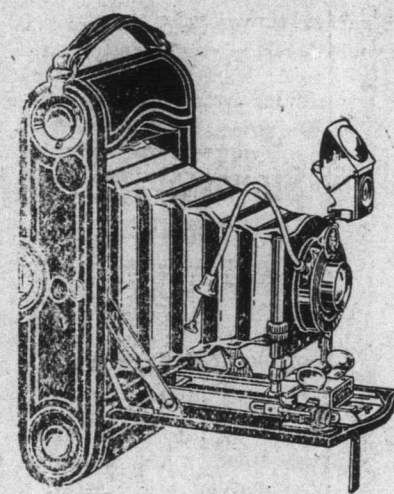
GERMAN INTRIGUE.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.
Evidences of a German plot to align the nations of South America against the United States, is revealed in telegrams sent to Berlin by the notorious Count Luxburg, former German

Charge in Argentina, were made public to-day by the State Department. In one of the messages, of which there are some forty, Luxburg reports that he induced President Irigoyen of Argentina to enter into a secret agreement with Chile and Bolivia, for mutual approach and protection, versus North America, and that he did his utmost to have Peru included into such an agreement. Translations of the despatches were given out by the State Department in agreement with the Argentine Minister of Foreign Affairs who in an accompanying statement gave a general denial of Luxburg's account of the negotiations with his government. The telegram shows a number of inaccuracies. It is surprising that no epithet will fill them said the Foreign Minister's statement, as they are at complete variance both in substance and form with the terms in which negotiations were entered into and carried on and brought to a conclusion. The message referring to the South American alliance freely said that the President had made up his mind to conclude such an agreement with Chile and Bolivia. There was nothing in the correspondence to clear up just what negotiations were carried on with these countries. A telegram dated July 20th last announced the completion of the "receiving plant" and asked for the wave length of the great wireless station at Nausau. The concluding message said that as long as Chile is neutral Germany will be able after the war to carry out her South American policy just as well, if not more easily, in opposition to an infatuated and misguided Argentina as well as with Argentina on her side.

BALFOUR REPLIES TO PACIFIST.
LONDON, Dec. 20.
Foreign Secretary Balfour made a spirited reply in the Commons this afternoon to attacks by Arthur Ponsonby, Liberal member from Sterlingburgs, pacifist, regarding the aims of Britain and her Allies, the published versions of which Ponsonby said, didn't tally with a proposal of secret treaties. GERMANY TO OFFER PEACE.

LONDON, Dec. 20.
A report that Russia has been informed by the Central Powers that they intend to make peace proposals to the Allies, is published in the Evening Post, which says the representatives of the Central Powers at the first preliminary peace conference with the Russians, held yesterday, announced that their Government intended on principle to put the question of peace before all the Powers and that they had asked their Allies to do likewise. Russia was requested to take similar steps. It is stated

LONDON, Dec. 20.
