

Macaulay as Macaulay and other great men in a similar fashion," said Mr. Fox, "when talking of his mightiness " on Coaker, one must always say Mister. Why not Excellency?

Joking at his own expense, Mr. Vinicombe characterized the Speech from the Throne as being as bald as " his bald head. Nothing, he said, could be compared with the baldness of the address, not even the "wooden heads" of the Opposition members so gentlemanly referred to by the Premier.
