THE MINNESOTA AND LAKE SUP-THE MINNESOTA AND LAKE SUP-ERIOR RAILWAY.—Arrangements have been made which promise an early construction of the projected railroad from St. Paul to the western extremity of Lake Superior, distance 150 miles, in a nearly direct line. Ac-cording to present calculations, seven-ty-five miles will be completed next year, and the whole by the end of 1869. The people of Minnesota reasonably attach much importance to this en-terprise, as tending to complete the railway system of the State by connec-ting the great channels of trade which follow the direction of the St. Law-rence.

Parliament of Canada.

HOUSE OF COMMONS Bir J. A. Macdonald stated that Government, before the adjournment of the House, would allow all the items on the paper, except the first and ninth, to stand over till March. The first was the third reading of the Hill, respecting flashs, and the ninth was certain resolutions respecting the rates of postage in Canada and Government Savings Banks. It was expected the House would get through with these resolutions and the Bill founded upon them in time to enable His Excellency to come down at 11 to morrow and give the Royal assent to the measures which had passed Parliament. All the Bills relating to the organization of the departments would stand over till Parliament again met.

THE POSTAL BILL .- The Montrea Ministry will be reconstructed before Daily News says: We have reason to the re-assembling of Parliament. It seems extraordinary that while the framers of the new Postal Bill provided for the cheap transit of seeds, cuttings and bulbus roots," in the mail bags, the interests of Insurance Companies and of the legal profession have been altogether overlooked. We are glad to learn, however there is a chance of a clause being added to the Bill providing that partly written and partly printed papers shall be sent at the reduced book rates-a provision s obviously reasonable and necessary that the wonder is how it could have escaped the notice of the framers of the Bill.
