The captain immediately went on his boat leaving the woman at the station. Shultis approached her, and being a med with a six-shooter fired three or four shots at her in rapid succession, wounding her in the arm, hand and side. She appears to have had her hand up to her side; the same ball that hit her 'a the side inst passed through her hand. She was taken into the station and put on a chair, and afterwardsconveyed to Schumacher's tavern. Shultis then went for the captain, and fired at him twice, when a clench took place. In the melee Shultis placed the revolver close to his opponent's side and pu'led the trigger and the weapon's missing fire only saved him from taking life.

The 10w was then stopped, though Shultis was not immediately taken into custody, as it appears he jumped into the water with suicidal intent. He was fished out, however, and gave himself up to constable Glichriese, who had charge of the barge, and who brough he in fluence of liquor. A telegram from Chippawa says the woman is getting better, and we believe there is little or no danger of hardying, though undoubtedly she is seriously wounded. Sheltus—or rather Shelters, as sometimes spelt—is a labourer, and he and his wife are middle aged. She is considerably older than him, and is consequently not possessed of that personal attractiveness which might be expected to be the case. Diffin is also a married man. Sheltus did not go with the excursion from Welland, but drove down afterwards. He says he bought the revolver at Mater's, in Chippawa. Public sympathy is with him, as it is believed his wife's misconduct goaded him to


