

Opening of the Southern Extension.
We are glad to be able to state that the Southern Extension of the W. G. and Bruce Railway, will be opened for traffic to Kincardine on Monday first, and that on and after date, trains will be run regularly both ways on that line. Thus ends the long suspense and delay in the opening of this line, which completes the scheme of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway Company, when the hopes and expectations of the promoters of the scheme are at last realized. It is needless now to recount all the difficulties which from its inception beset this enterprise. These are now forgotten in the success which attended their efforts. It only remains to congratulate all who laboured so strenuously in its behalf on the completion of their labours, and also the people along the line to be opened, on the near prospect of securing railway accommodation which they ought to have had long ago.

The Last of Niagara.
Poor Niagara has been wiped out of the electoral list, and will no longer form a safe refuge for decayed politicians or distressed Ministers. The ancient pocket borough has been abolished, and will in future form part of the electoral County of Lincoln. When Mr. Mowat first explained the redistribution scheme he proposed to add Chippewa, Stamford and Clifton, to Niagara, so as to bring up the population to something like a decent figure. But that plan did not meet the approval of either side of the House, and so it was given up, and the Bill amended as already stated. This gave a member at the disposal of the Government, and Mr. Mowat proposed that Essex be divided into two Ridings—each returning a member—which makes the number of representatives the same as at first proposed. This also was done, and the Bill as amended was passed. We heartily approve of the change, and bid a long farewell to the old rotten borough of Niagara, which has figured so long in the political history of Canada, which was in its glory in the days when Toryism was rampant, and the Family Compact ruled the Province.

The Charges against Mr. Rykert.
The Committee which investigated the charges against Mr. Rykert, reported to the House on Thursday. They find that he was paid \$1,000 by the G. W. R., in February, 1874, for parliamentary services rendered during the Session of 1873; that he was paid by E. D. Tilson \$100 for similar services rendered in connection with the bill to incorporate the town of Tilsonburg, in the Session of 1871; that he was paid \$150 by the Toronto Street Railway Company for professional services rendered in connection with legislation respecting this Company in the Legislature. All these payments were made while he was a member of the House. None of the other charges, as alleged, have been proved. The minority report admits that the same payments were made, but excuse Mr. Rykert of corrupt practices, on the ground that the amounts paid by the G. W. R. and by Mr. Tilson, were voluntary payments in recognition of his services, and that the amount paid by the Toronto Street Railway Company was for professional services as a lawyer. We should think that the House and the country could have no difficulty in arriving at a decision on this subject. In two of the cases we find that money was paid him for Parliamentary services, which he would not have received had he not been a member of the Legislature. What is this but prostituting his position as representative of the people, and doing special work for which he was paid. In fact the minority in their report condemn Mr. Rykert, for they say:—"Your Committee desire to express their unqualified disapprobation of the practice of members of your honourable House, under any circumstances, accepting or receiving any valuable consideration or sum of money in acknowledgement of assistance previously rendered in connection with private or other legislation before your honourable House, or any of the Committees thereof."

MR. CHADWICK'S RESPONSIBILITY.
The Herald would make the ratepayers believe that Mr. Chadwick was not the proprietor of the paper at the time it defended the Chairman of the Road and Bridge Committee, and seeks to relieve him of the responsibility of so doing. We reassert that Mr. Chadwick was proprietor at the time stated, and if his views are not in accordance with those of the Herald at that time, he, as an honourable man, is bound now to repudiate them. Until he does so we must hold him responsible for what it then expressed, and we must conclude that he endorses its sentiments, and demands the Chairman in his gross mismanagement of the road and bridge work.
