The Burdick Murder Trial

Wife of the Buffalo Manufacturer Before Coroner's Jury.

Pennell's Letters to the Guilty Woman Produced in Evidence.

Buffalo, March 23.—Mrs. Alice Hull Burdick, widow of James L. Burdick, underwent an examination by Assistant Attorney Cotesworth this afternoon at the resumption of the inquest into the death of her husband, who was murdered on February 20. She will be recalled tomorrow to complete her testimony. With a package of letters in his hands, some of which were written to Mrs. Burdick by Arthur H. Pennell, correspondent in the divorce proceedings, and other communications between Mr. Burdick and his wife, Mr. Cotesworth forced Mrs. Burdick to tell the story of her relations with Pennell from the time she met him in January, 1901, when she first met him in 1901, when those relations were renewed after Burdick had forgiven his wife and had taken her back to his home for the sake of their children. Mrs. Burdick's destiny pale, and answered the questions in a low faltering tone, evading a direct answer whenever possible. It was since the inquest began has there been such intense interest in the proceedings. The court room was crowded, three-quarters of the spectators being women.

Mrs. Burdick testified that she would be 42 years of age on April 30. She was married to Burdick in 1886. The divorce proceedings were commenced in three children. Mrs. Burdick admitted that she remembered the incident referred to.

Two other letters and the cross-examination of Mrs. Burdick drew out the fact that Mr. Burdick first learned of her relations with Pennell when she had returned from her home, but took her back after three weeks upon her promise to leave the city. Mrs. Burdick admitted on the stand today that after her return from exile she again met Pennell at various places in this city by appointment. On one occasion they were detected by Mr. Burdick and she and Pennell jumped out a window. Mrs. Burdick was being questioned about other places where she met Pennell when the court adjourned until tomorrow.

It was after the incidents related today that Mr. Burdick sent his wife away at the campus rooms. Home began last Thanksgiving, and last night after Burdick was murdered, Mrs. Burdick will tell what she knows about Pennell's movements up to the murder.
