John (the third,) and Edivy, (the fifth) were also earnest expounders of the Methodist christened Adolphus Egerton—christened Adolphus Egerton, after two old military friends and his father. The latter, with his family remeved from New Brunswick to Upper Canada in 1799, and took up his abode in Charlotteville, where he continued to reside until his death in 1854, in the 94th year of his life.




