THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

A CLOSE VOTE ON THE DISABLING QUESTION.

Mr. Gladstone Delivers a Vigorous Speech in Support of Disestablishment—Should the Welsh Be Outside the Pale of the Church?—The Newfoundland Question Again Discussed.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Baron Henry de Worms, Political Secretary of the Colonial Office, in the House of Commons, in answer to a question upon Newfoundland matters, said that the Government of Newfoundland had protested against the fact that the convention had not been sanctioned by the Imperial Parliament. Baron de Worms added that the documents relating to the French mode of voting and the Washington convention negotiations would be laid before the House before the vote on the colonial estimates was taken, so as to enable the House to discuss fully the Home Government's action in the matter.

In the House of Commons this evening Morgan's resolution in favor of disestablishment of the church in Wales was rejected 255 to 258. The close vote was greeted with loud applause. Mr. Gladstone made a speech in favor of disestablishment. His argument, that an enormous majority of the Welsh were outside the pale of the church, and that the opinion of a constitutional manner demanded an equitable settlement, met with the heartiest response from his followers.

THE FEATS OF THE STRONG MAN.

C. A. Sampson Snaps Chains, Breaks Coles and Does Other Feats of Strength.

C. A. Sampson, "the strongest man on earth," whose marvelous performance attracted thousands to the Westminster Aquarium in London, Eng., gave a private exhibition of his wonderful strength before the members of the press and a large number of medical men in the Auditorium yesterday afternoon.

Among the feats performed were those: He produced two chain bracelets and invited four men upon the stage to test their strength. Dr. Gladstone, Dr. Williams, William Mills and another powerful man stepped up, and after they had tugged in vain for several minutes, he showed them the muscles of the upper part of his right arm and again the muscles of his left arm, which is perhaps his most wonderful feat. He held the arm out at full length and, using a long iron cap and a white canvas, he swung the huge muscles quiver-d, his body swayed to and fro, and the chains and bracelets flew from his arm, broken in pieces. He afterwards broke a 25-cent piece, using the first finger of his right hand, and broke a stout leather strap by the expansion of his fist.
