THEY WILL UNITE FOR PEACE

SEVENTY-FIVE NATIONS DECIDE ON A COMPACT.

"The League of Peace" as an object to the League of Peace, a dispatch to the League of Peace, published today, says that during the imperial and royal jubilee at Fredericton, the place of the Danish royal family, where the Emperor and Empress of Russia have made long visits, the League of Peace has been organized among the titled nobilities there assembled. According to the figures, countries included in the League are Russia, Rumania, Servia, Montenegro, Greece, Sweden, Denmark and France. He adds that it is to be a permanent organization, and that its constitution will be publicly announced in January.

The League of Peace, should it turn out to be a fact, will naturally be regarded as a counter move to the renewal of the Dreibund agreement, formed by the Emperor of Germany previous to his recent visit to England.

THE PAPER IN HONOR

A GERMAN JACK THE RIPPER

MORRIS BUTCHER OF AN ABANDONED WOMAN IN HER LODGINGS IN A SQUAD QUARTER OF THE TOWN—PART OF THE GARRIED AWAY—MANY ARRESTS MADE.

BELLEVILLE, Oct. 25.—This city has been treated to a "Jack the Ripper" sensation. A miserable, wretched abandoned woman was found horribly stabbed in her lodgings in a squad quarter of the town. The body was horribly mangled and mutilated. The assassin escaped.

The woman was seen to enter the house with a stranger at 10 o'clock this morning, and 10 minutes afterwards the man was seen to run away. The woman was found fully dressed, even to the hat, and her abdomen ripped open. A large reward for her murderer was promptly offered. The police suspect a well-dressed young man who was some time before on the street.

The name of the victim was Hedwig Nitsche, and she lived in Holmestreet. Portions of the man's body after being cut off were carried away by the murderer. The room where the body was found and the surroundings were entirely untouched. The person in charge of the building where the body was found drove a good trade for a while by exhibiting the remains to the public for a small sum of money until the police intervened.

The blood was scattered all over the ceiling and walls of the room, and it seems impossible to arrive at any other conclusion than that the deed was the work of a madman.

The police have already arrested several persons, but they have all been discharged for lack of evidence, and the authorities are still hopelessly without a clue to the sickening tragedy.

The body of the woman was nearly severed and was ripped from the neck downwards. It seems that another woman tried to intervene before the crime was committed. Her attempt disturbed the assailant who suddenly rushed out pushing aside several who were in his way.

The weapons used by the murderer were two knives belonging to the landlady of the house, but the police are of opinion that the original murder was committed by a different person, and that the woman was killed by the same person.

The excitement in town has greatly increased to-night. The rewards reach \$200 marks.
