Arrangements have been completed for securing pancreas from slaughtered animals, and 50 units in insulin will be manufactured weekly, sufficient for 12 patients. This will be increased later.

We would advise those husbands who advertise their wives as having "left my bed and board," and "that no one shall credit her on my ac-count," to read the following notice in an American paper by an advertised wife: "I take this method of informing the public that he never had a bed; the board has always been furnished by myself; and as to anybody trusting me on his account, I know of no one that would trust himself. Dominion Parliament opens Wednesday, January 31. By the desertion of Joseph Binette, M. P., for Precott, from the ranks of the Progressives and uniting with the Liberals, the King Gorevnment now has a majority to two over all. Indications at present are that the session will be a heavy one. The Government will likely bring down a redis-tribution bill early in the session, the revision of the Bank Act is due this year, and the establishment of a National Bank is expected to be pressed for, as well as the necessity for a more generous system of credits to farmrs and stockmen and the encouragement of small banks.

#### IMPORTATION OF PRODUCE

Upholding the millions of dollars expended on purchasing foreign farm produce as a reflection on the efforts of the Canadian farmer, Dr. G.G. Creelman, Dominion Government agricultural expert of Ottawa, told farmers of Essex County at the opening of the Essex County Corn Show at Essex, that farmers of Western Ontario are not working intensively enough their own calling. As a result, he said, the production of farm produce is insufficient to cope with the demands of the home market, thus necessitating heavy expenditures abroad.

\$19,000,000 of fresh fruit, \$11,500, 000 for meat and over \$2,000,000 for butter and cheese. All these expenditures, the speaker asserted, could be overcome within a few years if only farmers of Canada would realize the potentialities of their work and undertake it more enthusiastically.

'IRELAND IN RECENT YEARS' Scholarly Address Delivered

by Rev. J.H. Hosford Before

the Watford Reading Club Rev. J.H. Hosford, M.A., B.D. the talented rector of Trinity

church, Watford, was the speaker at the regular meeting of the Watford Reading Club held in the public library basement on Friday evening last. His address was entitled "Ireland in Recent Years." and was one of the most comprehensive as well as scholarly and interesting that the club has ever listened to. Mr. Hosford is a native of Cork, and has been in this country only nine "When I was in Ireland," he said

"it was my lot to be brought into touch with all sorts and conditions of men—to visit the homes of the rich and of the extremely poor. In the rainy season I have often seen ducks swimming on the floors of swimming on the floors of Irish homes—more rightly called hovels, the hens devouring fresh bread from the clothless tables (in the land of the world's best linen they do not worry about its price quantity or quality, in many cases at least); the pigs with their price-less flocks (for pigs are, or used to be the Irish banks), as well as the donkeys occupying the best room, where their grunts and brayings take the place of the more up-todate victrola. Coupled with that we have seen the landlords lording it over the poor tenants and doing acts would not be tolerated in Canada for a minute.

Home rule has been a burning

uestion as Irish questions are often burning questions. Sir Horace Plunk-ett, one of the men who has meditated much and is making modern Ireland, tells of watching a football game between two Irish villages, one of which favors one political ism, the other the ante-ism. "When I arrived on the scene," he says, "the game had begun in deadly earnest but I noticed the ball lying unmolested in another quarter of the field.'

The hope for Ireland in spite of what we daily read and are told is that a certain group of men and women may enjoy the happy fate of that football and be free to do their work unmolested by partisans, whether political or ecclesiastical and unaffected by the fact that on July 1, 1690, on the banks of the Boyne, a Scotchman and a Dutchman fought for an English crown, according to Father Fraiey's descripition. The doctrine of self-help has been preached in the most effective way by Sir Horace Plunkett. The tenants could be kept on the land, he said, only by co operation—by mutual aid. The operation—by mutual aid. They were such a happy-go-lucky lot and their saying: "Comeday, go day, God send Sunday" showed plainly that Ireland was the ideal place to spend a holiday. They say: "Why spend a holiday. They say: "Why not enjoy life for we'll be dead long enough."

There are now about 1,000 co operative societies in Ireland. Co-operation appeals to the Irish. The operation appeals to the Irish. The Co-Operative Dairy Society has had a president who was a Protestant and a vice-president who was a Jesuit father. As in all things we are not left without signs of hope. Think of Tim Healy. Some years ago the question was asked of Father Healy—a noted wit and namesake of the new Governor-General of Ireland, "And where will Tim Healy be when Ireland has a government of its own." He replied: "I'm thinking he'll be a very ould man." Tim Healy isn't such a very old man and Ireland has a government of its own.
With what bitter mirth would Tim Healy have received 30 years ago the suggestion that he might one day be the King's representative in Ireland and be addressed as "your excellency." excellency.

Before the Free State Government lies a heavy task, yet a hopeful one. Rebellion smolders still, but faith is returning to the Irish people. Mr. Cosgrave has lately said that Irish finance and trade are steadying and the statement is amply borne out by the reports and returns furnished to English financial and trade journals by their procial and trade journals by their representatives in Ireland. That is one of the surest signs of the beginning of a return to normal conditions.
