People who are the victims of sensitive eeth that crumble and acquire cavities read ily may do much toward checking this dental decay by the use of a simple remedy. A bottle of milk and magnesia should be kept on the washstand and each night, after brushing the teeth just before retiring, some of it should be held in the mouth for a minute, that it may reach each side of every tooth By this process a coating of the magnesia is formed over the sensitive enamel, which is thus protected from the action of the acids that form in the mouth during sleep. The magnesia will remain on the teeth for three or four hours. Washing the mouth with a solution of bicarbonate of soda after eating sour fruits or salads is also recommended by dentists, as the soda, like the magnesia
