THE DEAD EDITOR.

Interesting Information About W. F.

Storey, of the Chicago Times. One of the strange ambitions of Mr. Storey's declining years was to erect for himself a magnificent residence of proportions and elegance so great as to entitle it to be called a palace.

As is well known he entered upon this undertaking some years ago, and the mammoth white marble edifice, still unfinished, though having eaten up hundreds and thousands of dollars in its construction, remains down on Vincennes arenue to testify of his strange desire. In personal appearance Mr. Storey was tall and always neatly dressed. His hair was abundant and snowy white. His fore-

head was high and his hazel eyes clear and bright. As a journalist Mr. Storey had a clear, concise, and very forcible style. He was more of a paragraphist than essayist. In his editorials he often repeated the prominent idea again and again, each time with verbiage so forcible yet different that the effect was like that of the repeated blows of a battering ram, as many of them who have left the force of them can testify. Even his enemies, and they were many, attest to his remarkable ability as a journalist. place for holding the first meeting of the For many years be was an indefatigable

worker. He almost lived in his office. The first man at work in the morning, he was frequently the last man to leave at night. He was a master of the business, and he gave to every detail his personal attention. He organized his staff for work and not for ornament. He was the sole head. There were chiefs of departments, but no one em The ployee could lord it over another. Every one could appeal to the "old man," and a boy was quite as apt to be listened to patiently as an old member of the staff. Considering his disposition Mr. Storey often exhibited a singularly confiding nature. He would believe implicitly whatever was told him, and sometimes he was misled by dosigning men before taking decisive action. He would not confer the title of managing editor upon any employe until his own fail. ing health made it absolutely necessary that there should be an active and responsible chief. When he started an evening paper in 1876 he attempted to manage that also as he had his morning paper, but finding the task too onerous, he at length in brief notes, informed the various heads of departments that he had appointed a manager for the evening paper. He took good care, however, to explain that he was not the manager of the morning paper.

THE DEAD EDITOR.

Interesting Information About W. F. Storey, of the Chicago Times.

One of the strange ambitions of Mr. Storey's declining years was to erect for himself a magnificent residence of proportions and elegance so great as to entitle it to be called a palace.

As is well known he entered upon this undertaking some years ago, and the mammoth white marble edifice, still unfinished, though having eaten up hundreds and thousands of dollars in its construction, remains down on Vincennes avenue to testify of his strange desire.

In personal appearance Mr. Storey was tall and always neatly dressed. His hair was abundant and snowy white. His forehead was high and his hazel eyes clear and bright. As a journalist Mr. Storey had a clear, concise, and very forcible style. He was more of a paragraphist than essayist. In his editorials he often repeated the prominent idea again and again, each time with verbiage so forcible yet different that the effect was like that of the repeated blows of a battering ram, as many of them who have felt the force of them can testify. Even his enemies, and they were many, attest to

For many years he was an indefatigable worker. He almost lived in his office. The first man at work in the morning, he was frequently the last man to leave at night. He was a master of the business, and he gave to every detail his personal attention. He organized his staff for work and not for ornament. He was the sole head. There were chiefs of departments, but no one em ployee could lord it over another. Every one could appeal to the "old man," and a boy was quite as apt to be listened to patiently as an old member of the staff . Considering his disposition Mr. Storey often exhibited a singularly confiding nature. He would believe implicitly whatever was told him, and sometimes he was misled by dosigning men before taking decisive action He would not confer the title of managing editor upon any employe until his own fail. ing health made it absolutely necessary that there should be an active and responsible chief. When he started an evening paper in 1876 he attempted to manage that also as he had his morning paper, but finding the task too onerous, he at length in brief notes, informed the various heads of departments that he had appointed a manager for the evening paper. He took good care, however, to explain that he was not the manager of the morning paper.

So implacable were his hatreds that he neither forgot nor forgave an injury. The patient search, the vigil long

A walk through the back lanes of our town suggests that our people here are running more risks than the "average eitizen" is aware of. The villainous stovepipe is in many places sticking out from legislature. If this is not local selfstables and outhouses in a way that is most encouraging to the mischievous sparks, and if the inducements were specially intended we think the preparations for an exten sive conflagration could not be more complete. The lively winds which occasionally get up in this vicinity afford the best means for communicating the incendiary sparks. Under incorporation this state of things would not be tolerated, but if we are to wait until that becomes an accomplished fact, before anything can be done to lessen the danger of a conflagration it is running a severe risk. We think there is a Northwest ordinance applicable to the present carelessness and the Northwest mounted police have the power to enforce it.

Some of our citizens appear to be apprehensive lest incorporation will not entitle the town to a sufficient revenue to pay running expenses. The North-West Land Company it is claimed, are exempt from taxation. It is a matter which can easily be decided whether they are or not. Though we do not pretend to possess legal knowledge sufficient to set this question at rest yet we feel satisfied that the Syndicate bargain contemplated the exemption of the Railway Company's property only. In any case, this is a matter on which a legal opinion may readily be obtained. A town like this can secure a large miscellaneoua revenue other than from the taxation of lots, if it is properly

The Monetary Times and Trade Review of Toronto, Ontario, thus announces its opinions as to the Hudson Bay route:

"The experience of one voyage, made in August, counts for more than a voyage any other month; because by that time, the theory is, the ice I as generally moved away. The observation of the state of the Strait in winter will be interesting, but for the purposes of navigation it will have no value. It both Straits and Bay of Hudson were open in winter, navigation would be impossible, s nce no vessel could penetrate the fringe of ice which clings to the shores of the Bay for a distance of some miles. What we want to know is the condition of the Strait during the months in which there is a possibility of navigation. To complete that season the observations would have to be carried on till August next; and then we should only have the narrow experience of the months which comprise a single season. This would not be enough to found any general conclusion upon; though there would be an advantage in having the observation to complete a season made up of parts of two different years, for in that way something of the climatic changes, which go to form a cycle of seasons, might be observed. The present duty is to await the accumulation of fact which are to determine the navigability for commercial purposes of the Bay and Strait all that can at present be said is that the outlook is not encouraging." 
