Their greatest need is to be eduacted say others. This is a means to their civilization. And educated they are. Wherever it is possible to have schools among them they are found. The different denominations working among them, aided by the Government, are endeavoring to instruct the children. All may attend the ordinary schools, and many have the privilege of remaining for some years in the Industrial Training schools

But few will allow that these are sufficient that nothing more is needed or that these are the most important needs to be supplied. They must be Christianized. They must be won from their heathen religion to Christian religion, and instructed in Christim doctrines. And when this is done, when an Indian gives up his old religion and confesses himself to be a ristian, many think that the great need has been supplied, and that nothing and speak to more is required.
