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MINUTES.

HANTSPORT CHURCH,
Saturday Morning, June 24th, 1876.

The NOVA SCOTIA CENTRAL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION convened this day with the Hantsport Baptist Church, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

The Moderator of last year, Rev. S. W. DeBlois, called the Association to order. After singing, prayer was offered by Rev. James Stevens.

SATURDAY—Afternoon Session.

Meeting opened at 2.30 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. W. Spencer. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Upon request of the Moderator it was

Resolved, That the Standing Committees be appointed by the Committee on arrangements.

Additional letters from the Churches were read and in view of the large increase of membership and general prosperity of the Churches as shewn by the letters, the Association joined with Rev. Dr. Cramp in prayer and thanksgiving to God for His abundant mercies during the year.

The Treasurer's account of the Board of Infirm Ministers was submitted and adopted and ordered to be published with the Minutes. (See Appendix A.)

Resolved, That the present Board of Infirm Ministers be re-appointed with the substitution of C. F. Eaton for Rev. E. O. Read, the members thereof being therefore for the ensuing year, Rev. S. W. DeBlois, Rev. D. F. Higgins, Rev. S. B. Kempton, Bro. C. F. Eaton, Dea. J. W. Morse, and Bro. James S. Morse.

The Committee on the Circular Letter reported recommending that it be read. Report adopted.

Mention being made by the Moderator of the severe illness of Rev. James Parker, the Association joined with Rev. E. M. Saunders in earnest prayer on behalf our Brother, and also on behalf of Rev. R. R. Philp, who has been deprived of his sight and on behalf of Rev. Dr. Tupper, and other aged fathers in the ministry. Prayer was also offered by Rev. W. B. Boggs, and Rev. W. E. Hall, on behalf of Rev. A. R. R. Crawley whose health has failed, and Rev. G. W. Churchill who has been compelled by illness to leave his field of labor temporarily.

Resolved, That Revds. E. M. Saunders, Prof. Welton, W. E. Hall, Prof. Higgins, J. W. Manning, and I. J. Skinner, be a Committee to prepare a plan for facilitating the transaction of the business of the Association.

The Committee on arrangements further reported recommending that all the Churches supplied to-morrow by the Association be requested to take collections for Home Missions.

Resolved, That the Home Mission Union be permitted to publish their report with the Minutes of the Association.

Resolved, That Monday afternoon be set apart for hearing the Education report and for discussion on Education.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. Meadows to Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

MONDAY MORNING, June 26th.

The Association re-assembling engaged in prayer and praise.

The ASSOCIATION SERMON was preached by Rev. J. W. Manning from Ezra viii. 22, "For I was ashamed to require of the king a band of soldiers and horsemen, to help us against the enemy in the way: because we had spoken unto the king saying, The hand of our God is upon all them for good that seek Him."

Business was resumed; prayer by Rev. A. S. Hunt.

The CIRCULAR LETTER was read by the writer Rev. J. M. Cramp, D. D. Subject:—"The Realities of Religion."

Resolved, That it be adopted and printed in the Minutes, and that Rev. J. W. Manning, and Dr. Cramp be requested to furnish copies of the Sermon and the Letter for publication in the *Messenger*.

Additional letters from the Churches were read—

Resolved, That the letter from the African Baptist Church of Halifax be referred to the Committee on Questions in letters.

Resolved, That Joshua T. Eaton be appointed in the place of J. W. Bars on Committee to revise blank form of Letters.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. George Weathers.

MONDAY—Afternoon Session.

Opened with prayer by Rev. J. Chase.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Committee on Obituaries presented their report which was adopted. (See Appendix B.)

The Committee on Sabbath Observance presented their report, which was adopted. (See Appendix C.)

The Committee on benevolent funds presented their report which was adopted. (See Appendix D.)

The Committee on Education presented their report. (See Appendix E.)

Resolved, That it be considered clause by clause.

The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th clauses passed without discussion.

The motion to adopt the fifth clause which alludes to the proposed University of Halifax was discussed at considerable length, the following brethren taking part in the discussion;—Rev. J. M. Cramp, B. H. Eaton, Rev. S. J. Neiley, Hon. Judge McCully, Revs. I. Wallace, E. M. Saunders, Prof. D. F. Higgins, Revs. M. Welton, and Dr. Sawyer. The clause passed and the report was adopted as a whole.

The Committee on Arrangements further reported recommending follows:—

1. That this evening be devoted to Missions and that Revs. W. H. Warren, W. B. Boggs, Dr. Cramp, E. M. Saunders and others address the meeting, and that each speaker be limited to fifteen minutes.

2. That Reports of Committees and general business be attended to to-morrow forenoon.

3. That Revs. J. C. Bleakney, S. W. DeBlois, and A. J. Stevens be a Committee to arrange for the place for the next meeting of the Association.

4. That Rev. J. C. Bleakney preach the Association Sermon next year, and that Rev. A. J. Stevens be his alternate.

5. That Rev. Dr. Crawley be requested to write the Circular Letter.

Report adopted.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. Dr. Crawley.

MONDAY—Evening Session.

Meeting opened with singing, and prayer by Bro. H. N. Parry. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Rev. Dr. Cramp, Chairman of Committee on Questions in Letters reported recommending that the Brookline Church recently organized be received into the Association. Report adopted.

The Moderator on behalf of the Association presented the right hand of fellowship to Rev. J. C. Blakeney pastor of the Brookline Church.

The Committee on Missions reported. (See Appendix F.)

The Moderator announced the death to-day of Rev. Jas. Parker the Association joined in prayer with Rev. E. M. Saunders on behalf of the bereaved family.

It was resolved that the Committee on Obituaries be requested to add a postscript to their report.

After singing the 1104 hymn,

“Hear what the voice from Heaven proclaims

For all the pious dead,

Sweet is the savor of their names

And soft their sleeping bed.”

Rev. W. H. Warren addressed the meeting on Home Missions giving a general account of the operations and present position of the Home Missionary Union.

Rev. W. B. Boggs spoke in behalf of Foreign Missions, urging two great reasons for sending the gospel to the heathen, (1.) For the sake of the heathen themselves, so numerous, so degraded, so wretched; (2.) For Christ's sake. Nothing will bring the nations to God but the Gospel, and that will do it. He referred to discouraging circumstances already attending our mission and claimed that they are not greater than other missions have met and overcome.

Rev. Dr. Cramp moved the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted :

Resolved, That this Association has heard, with deep sorrow, of the death of their beloved brother, the Rev. James Parker, who, after long-continued sickness, has at length passed away, "and now rests from his labours," and joyfully dwells with the Saviour and the glorified. The brethren indulge in grateful reminiscences of their fellowship with the departed, whose co-operation with them in evangelical labours was always cheerfully afforded; they record the expression of their warm sympathy with the widow and children who are now mourning on account of the loss they have sustained, and hope that divine grace will support and comfort them, and that the denomination will extend to them such practical manifestations of kindness, as will tend to bind up broken hearts and sustain and console the desolate.

Rev. E. M. Saunders, in a short address remarked among other things that our Mission work is not to be just for a few years, but to continue through all time.

Hon. Judge McCully also spoke briefly.

A collection was then taken for Home Missions. Report on Missions adopted.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. A. E. Ingram.

TUESDAY MORNING, June 27th.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. I. Wallace.

Minutes of last meeting read, amended, and approved.

The Committee on Questions in Letters presented a majority report, and also a minority report, the latter differing from the former only in the clause relating to the admission of the 3rd Halifax Church; after full discussion the minority report was adopted. (See Appendix G.)

The Committee on revision of blank form of letters to the Association presented their report. Adopted. (See Appendix H.)

Adjourned with prayer by Bro. J. A. McLean.

TUESDAY—Afternoon Session.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. W. H. Warren.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Committee on Denominational Literature presented their report, which after discussion was adopted. (See Appendix I.)

The Moderator on behalf of the Association presented the right of fellowship to Rev. J. F. Avery, pastor of the 3rd Baptist Church, Halifax.

Committee on Facilitating business presented a report which was adopted. (See Appendix J.)

Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Association be tendered the Hantsport Church and congregation, for their hospitality and readiness to the delegates during this session.

Rev. J. W. Manning gave the following notice "I give notice

that Art. 3rd. be amended, to read,—Each church shall have the privilege of sending one delegate besides the Pastor and one for every one hundred members.”

The report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools was read and adopted. (See Appendix K.)

On motion of Rev. Isa. Wallace—

Resolved, In view of the great work accomplished by the Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union during the past year, and the vast work now lying before that Board in spreading the Gospel among the destitute portions of our Province, as well as the nurturing of our feeble churches, and the circulation of denominational literature among our people; and the consequent need of enlarged liberality on the part of our Churches,

Therefore resolved, That this Association hereby pledge their sympathy and co-operation with said Board in its great and responsible work.

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CIRCULAR LETTER.

THE REALITIES OF RELIGION.

THE CIRCULAR LETTER OF THE NOVA SCOTIA CENTRAL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES OF WHICH IS COMPOSED.

Dear Brethren,—

The subject of this Letter is "THE REALITIES OF RELIGION," and our object in presenting it to your consideration is to produce, by the Lord's blessing, a livelier apprehension of those realities, and a deeper experience of their preciousness and their power.

Although we have not recited any creed in this meeting, as done in the congregations of another denomination,—and although we do not admit the authority of any human standard of faith or morals, there is happily a substantial agreement among us with regard to the doctrines of the gospel and the duties of believers. We are not bound, indeed, to use the same words in stating or discussing them—for Christian freedom chooses divers modes of expression—but we all receive the same truths, and all our hearts yield to the influences which flow from the belief of those truths. We believe, for instance, that God "hath saved us, and called us with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace, which was given us in Christ Jesus before the world began" (2 Tim. i. 9). We believe that "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John i. 7). We believe that "the washing of regeneration," even "the renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus iii. 5) is essential to membership in God's family, here and hereafter. We believe that perseverance in faith and holiness is both a duty and a privilege. We hold that "he that hath the Son hath life, and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life" (1 John v. 12). This is the substance of our Christianity. Other items of belief need not be enumerated.

Now, correctness or orthodoxy of opinion is not all that is required of a professor of religion. If we really believe the truths that are comprised in the gospel of the Son of God, we are conscious of certain effects. "True holiness" (Ephes. iv. 24) is the holiness of the truth, the necessary effect of the reception of that truth. To be a Christian is to be the subject of specific habits, denoting character, and that character is the result, not of occasional impulses, but of a continuous influence. It is to be "joined to the Lord," and to be "one spirit" (1 Cor. vi. 9); it is to "live by the faith of the Son of God" (Gal. ii. 20); to "put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Ephes. iv. 24); to "forget the things that are behind, and to reach forth to those things that are before" (Phil. iii. 13); to conduct ourselves as "strangers

"pilgrims" (1 Peter ii. 11); to "lay hold on eternal life" (1 Tim. ii. 12).

We want soundness in the faith. It is the foundation. But we want something more. Cold, dry theology will not serve the purpose. We must have warm life—affectionate earnestness—a firm grasp of spiritual and heavenly realities. We must be what we profess, and we and act as those who have "put on Christ" (Gal. iii. 27).

Have we "fled for refuge to lay hold on the hope set before us" (Heb. vi. 18)? What is now the position in which we stand before God? We are deeply in debt and have nothing to pay; but the debt is paid. We are rebels against the Divine majesty; but the sentence of condemnation is cancelled. Christ's righteousness covers

us. Let us enjoy the blessedness, and delight ourselves in the presence of God. Let us exclaim, with Toplady—

"A debtor to mercy alone,
Of covenant mercy I sing,
Nor fear, with his righteousness on,
My person and offerings to bring:
The terrors of law and of God
With me can have nothing to do;
My Saviour's obedience and blood
Hide all my transgressions from view."

Let us sing, with Oliver—

"He by Himself hath sworn,
I on his oath depend,
I shall, on eagle wings upborne,
To heaven ascend:
I shall behold his face,
I shall his power adore,
And sing the wonders of his grace
For evermore."

As believers in Jesus we are sons and daughters of the Most High, and entitled to all the privileges of the adoption. How precious—how precious they are!—We share in love which, as Lightfoot says, "exceeds that of mothers in tenderness, and that of fathers in wisdom." We are watched over, cared for, by God Himself; and to his fatherly grace we may take all our wants, all our griefs, all our dangers, with the assurance that He, the "Father of mercies and the God of all comfort," "thinketh upon us" (2 Cor. i. 3; Psalm xl. 17). Believing this, we are "not afraid of evil tidings" (Psalm cxii. 7), and we have learned to say, when floods are high and tempests roar, "It is the Lord" (1 Sam. iii. 18). We are in the covenant of heavenly love, the "everlasting covenant, confirmed in all things and sure" (2 Sam. xxiii. 5), secured to us by the blood of Christ, dignities, and glories unspeakable. We are "heirs of God, joint-heirs with Christ" (Rom. viii. 17). All things are ours—Divine perfections—all Providences—all spiritual influences, and graces. We are fully provided for while in the wilderness, and a rich inheritance awaits us at the end of the journey.

"This world is ours, and worlds to come,
Earth is our lodge, and heaven our home."

All this is true and real. It is actual matter of fact. The question then is, not merely what we believe, but what we are, or to what extent we realize the blessedness of God's chosen, and live in the habitual enjoyment of the privileges which are common to all Christians. Some persons, as it appears to us, have fallen into great mistake. They imagine that there is both a common and higher Christian life, and they separate Christians into two classes unmindful that personal godliness, as described in the New Testament, is attainable by all believers, and that there cannot be anything higher—and, forgetful of the fact that the Apostle Paul, who unquestionably rose to the highest style of devotedness to the Saviour, disclaimed all superiority, and said, "Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect" (Phil. iii. 12). Be ours to follow so noble an example, and to resolve, by the grace of God, that we will be whatever a Christian may or ought to be—that we will carry into practice all our professions—and that we will "hold on our way," and "be stronger and stronger" (John xvii. 9).

This realising experience is necessary as a sustaining element of Christian activity. The Lord Jesus calls upon us all to labour for him. Every member of a Christian church is bound to be a worker, for the salvation of others, and for the edification of his fellow-members. But we shall neither be fit for work nor able to sustain a steady course of action unless our souls are constantly nourished by gospel truth—intelligently apprehended, enjoyed, and felt—penetrating and inspiriting every power. And we all know that such a state is attainable, because we remember the words of our Lord—"If ye, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him," (Luke xi. 13). These words are as true to-day as they were when they were first uttered. Be in pleading the promise let us bear in mind that we must "ask in faith, nothing wavering: for he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed; let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord" (James i. 6, 7).

Brethren, "the time is short" (1 Cor. vii. 29). Some of us are young and strong, and may hope for long lives of consecration to Christ. But a considerable number have passed the meridian. The day is far spent. The time of our departure may be at hand. Our remaining stay upon earth is not to be reckoned by years; it is not to be reckoned at all. The Saviour says, "Take ye heed, watch and pray, for ye know not when the time is" (Mark xi. 33). Do it not especially behove us to spend the few days that are left us in full harmony with our professions and our prospects, and to "gather up the loins of our minds, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto us at the revelation of Jesus Christ" (1 Pet. i. 13). Let us climb to Pisgah's top, and "view the landscape o'er." Let us familiarise ourselves with the general outlook, and be as "men that wait for their Lord" (Luke xii. 35).

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Glorious visions are to be beheld by the ransomed Church of God. If we belong to that Church, we shall take part in events of the most solemn and inspiring character. The Lord Jesus will be revealed from heaven, with his mighty angels, in flaming fire" (2 Thess. i. 7, 8);—we shall see him come.—The archangel's trumpet will summon the nations to God's bar (1 Cor. xv. 52: 2 Thess. iv. 16);—we shall hear it.—The world's population from the beginning to the close of the history will be gathered together before the judgment seat:—we shall be there, and each one in his own proper place, nor will there be any mistake in the allotments. We shall hear the Judge when he welcomes the saved to the heavenly mansions. We shall hear him when he dismisses the lost. And oh! what ecstatic delight will thrill through every saved soul, when "a great multitude, which no man can number, of all nations, and kindreds, and peoples, and tongues, "shall stand on God's hill, and the voice of the universal Church shall be heard, "as the voice of many waters, and as the voice of mighty thunderings, saying, Alleluia, for the Lord God Omnipotent reigneth,"—"Worthy the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing" (Rev. vii. 9: xix. 6). Brethren, shall we be there? Shall we be in that song? Shall we take part in the triumph of the glorified, and dwell with them in the presence of the Lord for ever?

"For ever with the Lord"—

Amen: so let it be!

Life from the dead is in that word,

'Tis immortality.

Here in the body pent

Absent from him I roam,

Yet nightly pitch my moving tent

A day's march nearer home."

Yes—"nearer home": for "our citizenship [conversation] is in heaven, from whence also we look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto his glorious body, according to the working whereby he is able even to subdue all things unto himself" (Phil. iii. 20, 21). Then— "we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is" (1 John iii. 3.) Having this hope, what manner of persons ought we to be, in all holy conversation and godliness" (2 Pet. iii. 11)!

"Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and for ever. Amen" (Jude 24, 25).

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg to report the heartfelt conviction of the imperative duty of all believers in the Lord Jesus to observe tenaciously the Christian Sabbath. They have

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noticed with pain and regret a mournful laxity on the part of many even who profess piety with regard to the claims of the Lord's day. In view of the plain and positive teaching of the Bible, indicating *Blessings* in connexion with Sabbath observance and *curses* in connection with Sabbath desecration, your Committee urge that all travelling and visiting merely for worldly pleasure or business, indolent and sluggish neglect of public worship, worldly conversation, the performance of unnecessary manual or mental labour, as well as all other forms of Sabbath desecration be conscientiously avoided. And more, that parents and guardians do their utmost to inculcate in the minds of the young under their care, regard and veneration for God's holy day, by encouraging Sabbath School work, by furnishing suitable instruction and reading for them at home, and by leading them to the house of prayer.

Your Committee close by a simple quotation from the Divine Word, hoping that the course it suggests may be pursued, and the blessings it promises enjoyed, by every member of the churches constituting this body:—"If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day: and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable, and shalt honor him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord: and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it." (Isa. lviii. 13, 14.)

REPORT ON BENEVOLENT FUNDS.

The Committee on Benevolent Funds are glad to observe indications of a growing liberality on the part of several of the churches. Taken as a whole, however, the churches are far from giving as they ought. A cent a week for each member would be a small contribution, yet spread over all the churches, it would amount to more than three times the sum that is now raised.

Your Committee believe the comparative smallness of the sums contributed to the benevolent objects of the denomination to be the result, not so much of want of financial ability, as of a true sense of the Redeemer's claims, and of a proper system in meeting them. How strange that Christians should not remember how completely and expensively they have been purchased. Now all they have and are, belong to Christ, and yet withhold the means of advancing his precious cause!

The system your Committee would recommend is a quarterly collection through the medium of envelopes prepared for the purpose and distributed among the members of the church and

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congregation, so that all may have the opportunity of giving as God hath prospered them : the total sum thus received to be appropriated according to a scale of per centage previously agreed upon.

Your Committee would urge upon the different Pastors of the churches the duty and importance of bringing this matter before their respective flocks, and of urging every member thereof to do something. Any professing Christian who cannot listen to sermons on the christian duty of giving—who cannot stand this kind of fire—is not fit to fight the battles of the Lord. It is found that the pastors who lead their churches in the work of Christian benevolence, receive a better support from them than those who do not. And these ministers who are ever hinting that their own poor support is a reason why their people should not give their money freely to the Lord, hereby show that a poor support is about all they deserve.

In conclusion your Committee trust that the recommendations of this report be not suffered to remain a dead letter, but be immediately and efficiently carried out by all the churches.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

1. The Baptists of the Province have affirmed in their annual meetings, for many years, their belief that education is an important ally in christian work,—that provision should be made by which the churches may have the services of an educated ministry,—that it is the duty of all parents to provide for the intellectual, as well as moral, development of their children,—and that the property of christians should be conscientiously used to promote the education in its various grades and departments.

2. That the repeated affirmations of these truths have become something more than idle words is plainly proved by the long continued and growing attachment cherished by our people toward their institutions of learning.

3. The advantages of an educational system, which is developed into distinct grades, are now within the reach of our people. Our children can find in the common schools preparation for study in the Academy; in that institution all students who desire it can be fitted for College; and in that department young men are conducted through a higher course of education and are then sent forward to the various professional schools. Some of these departmental education may well be left in connection with a public educational system; but it will be better that the Academy and the College should be so far under denominational control that there may be to them a free and full recognition of the truth and claims of the Christian Religion, that thus mental power may be developed and used in subjection to moral principles and purposes.

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4. All measures that are adapted to make the common schools better and more useful, should receive cordial support from us ; but the educational agencies which are in more immediate connection with the denomination, demand especial consideration at the present time. In order that the Theological department may accomplish its purpose, it must have the generous and constant sympathy of the leaders of our churches. It is an occasion for great thankfulness that the Academy is so prosperous, both in its finances and in the number of students in attendance ; but it must be remembered that a large debt still lies on the new Boarding Hall, and contingencies may arise in which this may prove a serious inconvenience. It is very important that the Governors of the College should have sufficient funds to meet promptly all demands that may be made on them, in order that the College may maintain an honorable position in the educational work of the Provinces. The increase in the Provincial Grant will give assistance for a short time ; but the Governors must have larger resources at their command, or the promise of the College cannot be fulfilled.

5. Collegiate education in the Province is evidently passing through an important crisis. What will result from the changes that have recently occurred and from others that are contemplated, it will be difficult to foresee. But certainly the questions concerning collegiate education, which have recently been presented for consideration and decision, are so serious that they demand the calmest wisdom in deliberation and the greatest prudence in action.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

The Committee would rejoice if it were in their power to present such statements respecting the Foreign Mission as would fill the souls of the brethren with hope and triumph, and arouse latent energies, and develop true evangelical benevolence. Possibly these results may be produced even now, notwithstanding the absence of such exciting consideration as are wont to work on the public mind and stir up the feelings ; but it must be confessed that there is but slender hope of such an issue, seeing we have to tell of disappointments and loss. Last year we had nine missionaries in the field : now we have but six : for Miss Armstrong having married the Rev. G. F. Currie has become connected with the Canadian Foreign Mission Society, in whose service that brother is now laboring ; and the Rev. W. B. Boggs and wife have returned home, the Indian climate having proved so injurious to Brother Boggs's health, that his return home was found necessary in order to preserve life : while Bro. Churchill has been so prostrated by disease that he has been compelled to remove to Madras for medical advice, with the probability of being sent on a sea-voyage to complete his cure.

This reduces our actual working staff to four—the Brethren Sanford and Armstrong and their wives—the continuance of whose good health furnishes matter for thankfulness, and whose efforts have already begun to be crowned with success.

Let us therefore praise God and take courage. It is not for him to help by many or by few. He can bless to us the most painful dispensations, and sanctify the sharpest strokes of his rod. His grace will be sufficient.

Our missionary brethren have studied the language with success and gained much important information respecting the native character and the deleterious influences of Hindoo idolatry. They have also been privileged to witness the effects of converting grace and the transforming power of the Gospel. Encouraged by what they have observed and seen they are about to establish permanent settlements, which will require considerable expenditure, and enable them to work from these centres among large bodies of the people.

The land of the Telugus belongs to the Lord Jesus Christ. Let us arise and take possession. And let us be “fervent in spirit, abounding in earnest supplication for our brethren and sisters, and for those to whom they make known the “glad tidings of great joy which shall be to all people.”

The work of the Home Mission has proceeded vigorously in various parts of the Province, and many souls have been converted to God. Much good has been also effected by the circulation of useful books chiefly of a denominational character.

Destitute populations have been supplied with the bread of life—the ignorant have been enlightened—and weak Churches strengthened and encouraged. There is a wide field of usefulness before us; let us arise and take possession, for “the kingdom is the Lord’s; and He is the gold and the silver, and all the sources of strength, and we are but stewards and servants, responsible to Him for the use of whatever he has entrusted to us.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON QUESTIONS AND LETTERS.

1. The Committee have to report that a communication from the church meeting in Gerrish Hall, Halifax, has been placed in their hands, representing their progress and present state—announcing certain contributions to the benevolent funds of the Association amounting to 78 dollars—and expressing the assurance of their sympathy and co-operation with this Body, if admitted into it. The Committee would have been better satisfied if the evidence of compliance of the church in Gerrish Hall with the recommendation of the Association last year had been clearer and more complete; nevertheless, believing that in all essential matters the ab-

mentioned church has established its claim to be considered a Baptist Church, in harmony with our Associated body, notwithstanding any irregularities that may have occurred in the transaction of the business, the Committee recommend that the request of the said church be granted by its admission into the Association.

2. The Committee have also received an application from the church in Brooklyn, near Hantsport, recently formed, asking admission into this Association, and they recommend that the request be granted.

3. The brethren of the Western Association having resolved that the Legislature of this Province be petitioned to pass an Act of incorporation of the Baptist Body, of which any churches may avail themselves in an inexpensive manner, and having requested that this Association will co-operate with them by the appointment of a Committee of three brethren, to meet with a like number of brethren appointed by each of the other Associations of the Province;—the Committee recommend compliance with this request, and that the Brethren J. W. Barss, B. H. Eaton, and W. A. Porter be such Committee, as representative of this Association.

4. The Committee further report the reception of the following communication from the African Baptist Church, Halifax :

DENOMINATIONAL LITERATURE.

The Committee learn with satisfaction that by the system of Colportage established by the Home Missionary Union, large numbers of useful books have been circulated during the past year. They trust that efforts will continue to be employed for this purpose and especially that measures will be adopted for the supply of our Sunday Schools with books uncontaminated by sentiments hostile to the truths held and professed by the Baptist Denomination. They rejoice in the abundant dissemination of general knowledge by which this age is characterized, and hope that constant care will be exercised by those who provide for the public enlightenment, that infidel thoughts and theories should find countenance among the youthful members of our body.

The *Christian Messenger* which has exerted a beneficial influence among us for nearly forty years—the *Christian Visitor*, and other organs of Baptist views, are worthy of extensive patronage and should find places in our households. Baptists are under special obligations to support the religious press. It is at the same time desirable and proper to observe that in the manner of conducting religious papers there is much room for improvement. The Committee particularly refer to articles of merely local importance; such as Addresses to ministers or others, and replies to them, and obituaries, which are often filled with needless details. Such papers should be either omitted, or considerably shortened. The public will thank the Editors if they exercise great care in this respect.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee believe that Sabbath School instruction of the present day ultimately relate to the prosperity of our churches and that by the churches should be more cared for and not left mainly to the good will of the brothers and sisters who feel it their duty to labor in that department. There is an unpardonable lack of interest in the churches, and by parents of the children in Sabbath school work as is manifested by their absence, in their giving, and by their prayers. Your Committee feel that the churches comprising this Association have great cause for encouragement in their work and for gratitude to God in view of the abundant blessings vouchsafed to their Sabbath Schools. During the past year the divine blessing has rested upon this department of christian labor and many precious youth have been brought into the fold of Christ. Your Committee would urge the whole church to enter upon Sabbath School work either as Teachers or for the study of God's word; the public and private prayers of pastor and members; the frequent visits of those parents who are not especially engaged in the work; liberal financial assistance.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

1. Your Committee beg to report that the Temperance Cause has been advanced during the past year. Temperance Societies of various names have been prosperous: public opinion has risen rapidly; church and State have felt the influence and given much attention to this question: we, as a people, occupy a position in advance of any previous era in our history, and, in respect of sobriety we stand the foremost Province of the Dominion of Canada.

2. There are upwards of *thirty-two thousand* people pledged in the 400 active Temperance Societies of Nova Scotia; and also from 7,000 to 10,000 of our children in the Bands of Hope and other Juvenile Societies. The four counties embracing the Churches of this Association compare favorably with the rest of the Province in the progress of this portion of the Master's work. The cause of this prosperity is easily traced to the activity in the Churches. The pastors of the various denominations have entered into the battle against the demon of Alcohol with commendable zeal, realizing that many of them do that it is the prolific source of many evils: and we are pleased to announce that among no people have the pastors been more outspoken or more consistent than our own ministers of the Baptist Churches. Where Revivals have blessed the people, drinking has decreased and become disreputable; truly that spirit of "Antichrist" cannot flourish amid the outpouring of the Spirit of God.

3. Our Laws during the past winter have been so amended as to make it much more difficult and dangerous for Liquors to be sold, and it only remains for the christian and right thinking people to enforce our laws, to free our towns and villages of this evil. It is our bounden duty not only to obey but to aid in enforcing all good laws, and if we neglect or shirk this duty, retribution will surely come upon us and some of our dear ones will fall victims to strong drink through our apathy. The past has taught us this lesson: may we profit thereby for the future. Churches as such cannot undertake the enforcement of laws; that is left to individuals sustaining the officials; but the church can set the example, having nothing to do with that which has proved a bane to mankind and all the fruits of which are in direct antagonism to the fruits of the Spirit of God.

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF

NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY UNION

The Executive Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union beg to present their fourth annual report. Immediately after the Anniversary of the Union, your Board met to review the past, examine the present and prepare for the future. The past was radiant, the present was somewhat clouded, the future was intermingling of light and shade. The financial pressure seemed to be growing more severe. Your Board believed that their general policy in the past was sound, and they were ready to pursue the same course. But circumstances seemed to indicate that it might be advisable to make certain changes in the manner of their work.

General Agency.—Your Board had the Rev. D. Freeman employed as their General Agent. He had laboured faithfully with a good measure of success. Probably he could have prosecuted this work with favourable results, but objections had been raised by prominent brethren against the General Agency work. All the Associations had recommended that instead of an appeal to the churches for financial aid by the voice of an Agent, applications should be made to them by letter. Your Board, therefore, although doubtful of the propriety of this course, felt morally bound to relinquish their hold on a General Agent. The Rev. Mr. Freeman who had acted in this capacity was subsequently stationed at Glasgow, where he laboured for some time with encouraging success.

In compliance with the recommendation of the Associations your Board prepared an appeal to the churches for financial assistance. A circular containing this Appeal was sent to each church in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. Your Board regret to say that, except a few instances, the churches did not respond, and the appeal was almost a complete failure. What was to be done? The French Missionary needed his salary. The money was not in hand. Your Board were compelled to act against their former expressed opinions. They were forced to take the missionary from his legitimate work and send him on a collecting tour. The churches visited kindly responded to the appeal made to them, and we hoped that the addresses delivered by the missionary may excite a greater interest in the French Mission.

Other brethren who had labored for the Board requested payment of the amounts due to them, to meet, if possible, these the services of the Rev. P. A. Shields, as a financial agent were secured for a few weeks. He hurriedly visited several

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...arches, and, considering the season of the year, and the general depression in money matters, he met with a good degree of success.

In view of their own experience, and the experience of many societies in the United States, your board strongly recommend that suitable General Agent be almost constantly in the field.

Theological Professorship.—Your Board are pleased to state that Prof. D. M. Welton has been laboring for them for five months—from January to June—in the Theological Department of Acadia College. His time during the summer vacation and for the following four months was occupied mainly in reference to the New Academy Building. His salary for that time was paid by the Building Committee.

As Prof. Welton had devoted a part of his time during the winter to regular College work, your Board thought that the Governors of the College should pay a part of his salary. A request to that effect was sent to them. They report that they cannot accede to this request. Your Board are pleased to recommend that Prof. Welton be continued in the Theological Department, and that the Governors of the College pay his salary.

The following extract of the Professor's report will show the nature of the work done:—

"My time during the past term has been pretty equally divided between the Theological Department and the College proper.

In the Theological Department I have had Homiletics and *Church History*. Twenty-five young men having the Christian ministry in view, have attended the lectures in Homiletics, and the work of the term in this branch has been arranged in the following order:—

1st. On one week, the reading of a sermon by one member of the class, said sermon open to criticism by all present.

2nd. On next week the placing of the plan of a sermon on the black-board by one member of the class appointed for the same purpose, said plan open to criticism by all the members of the class.

3rd. On the following week, a lecture by myself on some topic connected with the preparation and delivery of sermons. The topics on which I have principally dwelt are:—1st. Arrangement of sermons. 2nd. The different species of sermons, noticing three, the topical, the textual, and the expository. 3rd. Preparation and delivery of sermons, noticing three methods of delivery, reading, extemporaneous speaking, and extemporaneous speaking. 4th. On the proper method of conducting public worship. 5th. The guarantees of a successful ministry.

French Mission.—Nothing of special interest has occurred during the year. The Missionary has been toiling on as usual. There has been some encouragement. One soul has professed faith in Christ and has been added to the company of believers. Others have been inquiring after the truth as it is in Jesus. The leave is working, albeit its progress is slow. The ground is hard. The harvest is scanty. Your Board nevertheless would not give up the work. There must be a future for this Mission. Too much money has been expended thereon and too many prayers have been offered in its behalf for it to become a failure. During the spring there was quite a religious interest in the French Mission church but the fruits do not yet appear.

Your Board are of the opinion that the French Mission premises at Tusket should be sold as soon as they can be disposed of to advantage. They also recommend that a Mission be commenced among the French in the Eastern part of the Province as soon as the man and the means can be obtained for such a work.

Book Department.—Your Board have long felt the importance of having a Baptist Book Depository in this Province. They have been working for the last few years with this object in view. At one time three colporteurs were in the field, and a good deal of work was done. Had a fair share of encouragement been given to the Board an immense deal of good would have been accomplished in this department, but objections were raised against the whole plan, and the efforts of your Board were in a great measure thwarted. The Board believe that the world has need of a Baptist literature. Baptists need it too. When Temperance Reformers wish to create a temperance sentiment, they spread abroad temperance literature. If Baptists wish to spread their principles and indoctrinate their youth they should use a Baptist literature. The Board wish to create a correct sentiment on this subject, but they find it a difficult task. While prominent Baptist ministers and influential laymen are officers of a so-called *Union Book and Tract Society*, and while Baptist churches supply their Sabbath Schools from that source it is not an easy matter to make progress in this department. Our Methodist brethren have a *Book Concern*. Our Presbyterian friends have a similar society. Why should Baptists be behind them? Your Board do hope that the pastors of our churches will look at this matter in the proper light.

Your Board have had one Colporteur employed during the latter part of the year. He occupied a good portion of his time in taking orders for books. He has sold quite a large number of volumes, chiefly small ones—and given many away to the destitute. About many books have also been sold at the Depository. Altogether about 3000 volumes of pure Baptist literature have been put into circulation. Thousands of pages of tracts in English, French,

German, Swedish, and Norwegian have been distributed. As these books and tracts teach the truth with as small a percentage of error as can likely be found in merely human productions, your Board cherish the belief that much good has been done in this department during the past year. But they are not satisfied. They wished to do more. Many circumstances, however, seemed to be against them. They take pleasure in recommending that more vigorous measures be put forth in this department in future.

HOME MISSIONS PROPER.

1. *Nova Scotia*.—As the returns began to come in after the summer vacation, your Board found it would not be wise to undertake to accomplish all the work which they desired to do. The important points, however, have been held, and much missionary work of a general nature has been done. The Redeemer's cause prospered in Annapolis. The largest congregation in the town rests upon the ministry of your missionary there. A flourishing Sabbath School has also been gathered. The change for good in Annapolis since your mission was started in that place has been remarkable, and claims the gratitude of the Baptists in this province. Shelburne, too, has been held. The cause in this Shelburne field is for the most part very prosperous. A mission has been commenced at New Glasgow. As an immediate result a church has been organized there. A piece of land has been secured for a building lot. Efforts will be made immediately to erect upon a suitable house of worship. The Rev. D. Freeman labored there with gratifying success. They hope he will be succeeded by a Christian worker of similar energy and faith. Your Board are pleased to state that the Kentville church, which was assisted by the Union last year, has become self-supporting. The cause there is making remarkable progress under the faithful ministry of the Rev. Mr. Stevens. The churches on the Barrington field, which formerly received assistance from your Board, are this year supporting the gospel of Glasgow without any external aid. Annapolis, Shelburne and these points are important, and in the mean time they will be encouraged by the Board.

Prince Edward Island.—There has been a large amount of missionary work done in P. E. Island during the year. The general Missionary of the Board, Rev. D. McDonald, has labored with marked success. The blessing of the Lord followed his labors in every place. On the first of May last he resigned, to take the place of the Charlottetown church. Your Board reluctantly declined to aim up, but they were pleased to learn that he would assist to the best of his ability in giving information and offering aid. Brethren Kidson, Gordon and DeWolf, C. C. Burgess, and others have been under the direction of the Board. All have labored faithfully, and the Master has been with

them. Your Board are glad to learn that Baptist principles are making quite rapid progress in this important Island. They therefore recommend energetic measures in Home Mission work. The prospects are encouraging, and success is sure to follow faithful efforts in this field.

3. *Newfoundland.*—Your Board have long felt a deep interest in the Province of Newfoundland. They wished to explore the country with a view to establish one or two Baptist missions, but but a suitable person could not readily be found to perform the work. In July last your Board were happy to learn that the Rev. George Armstrong and Dr. McDonald were willing to visit and explore the Island. These brethren undertook the work and returned with entire satisfaction to the Board. They prepared and sent forward a voluminous and excellent report. Your Board believe with this committee of exploration that *two missions* should be planted in Newfoundland as early as circumstances will permit and that *two others* should soon follow them. Your Board sincerely hope that some of our brethren who were once filled with Foreign Missionary spirit, but were deterred from going abroad, will be divinely directed to labor in Newfoundland. The following extract from the committee's report will shew how necessary it is for your Board to undertake missionary work there :

"The work which you were pleased to assign to us, viz: to preach the gospel in Newfoundland, to explore the country with a view to ascertain the spiritual condition and wants of the people, and to recruit any of our brethren who may be there, and to see what opportunities exist for missionary work by our denomination, we have performed to the best of our ability in the limited time at our disposal."

"*St. John's, Newfoundland.*—It is no easy matter to trace the footsteps of the Baptists who from time to time settled here. Mr. Turner, of England, preached in the Temperance Hall, a few years ago, for twelve months. He was supported by a Mr. Muir, a wealthy merchant of the place. Mr. Muir died after Mr. Turner had been about a year, and his widow went home to England. Mr. Turner, by this providence, deprived of his support, and left the country. The few members gathered in by him being open communion, became absorbed by the other denominations. The most of them united with the Congregational church."

"*Harbour Grace.*—There is one solitary Baptist in this town and its inhabitants. He is a respectable man, a druggist. He now works with the Presbyterians. The District Judge is a son of Mr. Bennett, of Windsor. He has become an Episcopalian. We think he would be friendly to the Baptists were we to start a church there."

"*Notre Dame Bay.*—Quite a number of Nova Scotians, and among them several Baptists, were employed at the copper mines opened at Betts' Cove, in Notre Dame Bay, by Mr. Ellerslie, and favorably known in Nova Scotia. It was deemed highly probable and desirable that one of us should proceed northward on this exploration, examine the above named Cove in particular, visit the friends, and preach the Gospel, ascertain all the facts possible on the objects of our mission, and do all in our power to fa-

...tist principles and the promotion of truth and holiness in the world. Brother Armstrong accordingly, with the full consent of his brother missionary, undertake the toil and responsibility of this interesting and important part of our mission."

"We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for the openings observed in the prospects of success in mission work in the name of the Lord on the important Island of Newfoundland.

We recommend that missions be commenced in the following places as soon as it is in the power of the Board to do so, which we faintly hope is the case now, viz.:

1st.—At St. John's as soon as possible.

2d.—At Notre Dame Bay, with centre of operations at Betts' Cove.

3d.—At Harbor Grace, in Conception Bay.

4th.—At Fortune Bay, with centre of operations either at Grand Falls or Fortune."

Liabilities.—Your Board regret to state that their liabilities are comparatively large. This fact, however does not discourage them.

Many Societies of a kindred nature are in the same position. The extent of our liabilities are apparent. Among the number we may mention the following:—the immense deal of work done the previous year, the absence of a General Agent; incorrect ideas of missionaries and churches in regard to the resources of the Board; a want of love to the Master and a failure to understand their obligations

on the part of his professed followers. Care has been taken of late not to increase the indebtedness of the Board but to reduce it to its removal. But few appointments have been made lately. Many brethren have been recommended to churches that are unable to support them. Several have in this way settled for the present.

Others have made their arrangements in an independent manner. Your Board sympathize with the students who depend on the proceeds of their labor during the summer vacation to support them through the College year, and sincerely hope that they may not suffer loss by the decision of the Board not to make many appointments. They trust that these brethren will see the necessity of being more zealous in the matter of collecting funds

and that the churches will feel the full weight of their responsibility. We do not, neither Acadia nor Newton will furnish for them an adequate supply of ministerial help.

Summary.—It will appear from the foregoing list that 45 missionaries and agents have been in commission during the year several of whom have been re-appointed. Together they have travelled 39,142 miles; preached 2465 sermons; attended 164 other meetings; made 10,116 family visits; distributed 29,000 pages of tracts; 20,000 pages of books; received 13 subscribers to the *Christian Messenger*; baptized 211; built or carried to completion 1 meeting-house; organized 3 churches and 9 Sabbath Schools; and performed 801 weeks' labour. Collected on the field \$5235.36.

In conclusion, your Board wish to record their sincere thanks to the Giver of all good for his mercies to them, their agents and missionaries during the past year. Their lives have been spared, great deal of money has been collected, and much work has been done for the Lord. A special cause for thankfulness is found in the fact that although the pressure in money matters was so severe about the same amount of funds came into the Treasurer's hands as were received last year from the regular sources of supply. Your Board, therefore, must speak hopefully of the future. The amount of work done, the large sums of money collected and expended during the past three years, and the glorious results, must convince the unprejudiced that *union* is better than *isolation* in Home Missionary work. The Board feel that they have labored faithfully in the cause of the Master, and that he has blessed them. Their success has been the glory of God in the spread of true religious principles in the whole field of their labor. They are now ready to give honours and responsibilities of their office to their successors, accompanied with their sympathies and prayers. They sincerely hope that the whole denomination may co-operate with them so that far greater work for God may be accomplished this year on the Home Mission field than ever was done before.
