ECLIPSES FOR 1869.

There will be four Eclipses this year, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon, as follows :

I. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 27th, in the evening ; visible. Size, $5\frac{1}{2}$ digits on the northern limb. In California and Oregon the Moon will rise eclipsed.

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, February 11th ; invisible in North America, but visible in the southern part of South America and South Africa.

III. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon July 23d ; invisible in North America.

IV. A Total Eclipse of the Sun August 7th (Saturday), in the afternoon ; visible as such in part of Iowa, Illinois, Kentucky, West Virginia, and North Carolina. The Eclipse will be total at noon in Alaska, lat. $61^{\circ} 46.9$ north, long. $68^{\circ} 4.6'$ west of Washington. The line of central and total eclipse from thence runs southeasterly, touching the coast near Sitka, thence passes into British America, and enters the United States near the origin of Milk River, long. 30° west. From thence it passes through the southwest corner of Minnesota, crosses the Mississippi river near Burlington, Iowa, and proceeds through Illinois just north of Springfield, and crosses the Ohio river near Louisville. It then runs through Kentucky and North Carolina, passing just south of Raleigh, and entering the Atlantic near Newbern, and Beaufort, N. C. North of this line the Eclipse will be partial, the southern limb being eclipsed ; and south of the line it will also be partial, the northern limb being eclipsed.

The Eclipse first touches the Earth at sunrise, in lat. $36^{\circ} 53.3$ N., long. $138^{\circ} 37.4'$ W., at 2h. 29.7m. P.M. Washington time.

It becomes central and total first in lat. $52^{\circ} 41.9'$ N., long. $165^{\circ} 26.4$ W., at sunrise there, or 3h. 37.8m. Washington time.

The Total Eclipse leaves the Earth in lat. $31^{\circ} 15.2'$ N., long. $350^{\circ} 26.4$ W., at sunset.

The Partial Eclipse ends upon the Earth, at the last contact, in lat. $14^{\circ} 48.9'$ N., long. $13^{\circ} 10'$ W., at sunset there, or 7h. 15.6m. Washington time.

MORNING STARS.

Venus ($\circ$) until May 9.

Mars ($\circ$) not this year.

Jupiter (J) from Ap. 17 to Aug. 12.

Saturn (S) until March 7.

EVENING STARS.

Venus from May 9 to end of year.

Mars all the year.

Jupiter until Ap. 17 and after Aug. 12.

Saturn from March 7 to Dec. 11.

THE PLANETS.

MERCURY (γ) will be in a favorable position to be seen February 1, May 26, and September 22, being then brightest, and setting soon after the Sun. Also March 21, July 19, and November 7, being then brightest again, and in the east before sunrise.

MARS ($\circ$) will be brightest about February 13, rising about sunset.

JUPITER (J) will be brightest November 8, rising about sunset.

SATURN (S) will be brightest June 4, rising about sunset.

VENUS ($\circ$) will not be very conspicuous until towards the close of the year. Until October its form will not vary much from a circle, but its phase becomes very gibbous then; and at the time of its greatest eastern elongation from the Sun, December 13, it becomes a half-circle of large size; and after that it becomes a crescent.

REVOLVING STARS.

In the course of his diversified researches, Sir W. Herschel formally proposed to himself to solve the problem of the parallax of the fixed stars, by means of the double stars, which he then supposed to be only optically connected. But an unexpected observation stopped his investigation of parallax, in order to develop a new discovery. He found the stars of many pairs to be actually in motion, one revolving around the other, or, more properly, both revolving around a common centre of gravity in elliptical orbits. This wonderful spectacle of revolving suns, moving in obedience to the same influences which hold the planets in their career, each perhaps attended by a train of dependant bodies, vies in interest, as a discovery, with any ever made in the annals of astronomical science. It extended in the most absolute manner the great law of gravitation to the fixed stars, and justified the confidence which led Newton to affirm the influence wherever matter existed or motion was exhibited. The evidence of this revolution in the components of a binary or multiple system is as certain as that which we possess of the march of Jupiter and the planets round the sun. Since observation commenced, more than a complete revolution has in some cases been accomplished, while in others the changes of relative position have supplied data for approximate calculations of the periodic time.

Table for Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

Observations—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction. It is also said that less dependence is to be placed on the Table in winter than in summer.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout. Large vessels ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof, a plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. A white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—*white*—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distances by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.

The Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the S. W. Head of G. Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 13 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping 3 remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

From Brier Island Light to Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Island, S. and by W. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:—

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

“ N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

“ Little River Head, N. by W.

“ Libby Island Light House, (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new Ships,) before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or $1\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the old Proprietor, and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

A Fog Horn or Steam Whistle (the first of the kind ever used for this purpose) was placed on Partridge Island, near the Light House, in Sept. 1860, and is sounded at intervals of 10 seconds in every minute, during the prevalence of Fogs and Snow Storms. The whistle can be distinctly heard at the distance of four to six miles.

There is also a *Bell Buoy* anchored at extremity of the Ledge at the eastern end of the Island, which is very useful to vessels in thick or rough weather. The sound of the Bell can be heard three miles distant.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmerland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia,) in lat. 43, 39, N. long. 66, S. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also

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the Keeper's house, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows :

Cape Enrage Light by compass, S. $61\frac{1}{2}$ W. 10 1-7 miles.

Highest point of St. Mary's Ledge by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 miles.

The point of low water off the Light, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 miles.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs and has about $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it at half tide.

The Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 3-10 mile, it has $1\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's House at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted white.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 43' 30''$ W. of Greenwich.

Signals displayed at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbor of St. John.

One Ball close for one square-rigged vessel.

One Ball half-hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.

Two balls close, for three square-rigged vessels.

Two Balls separated, for four square-rigged vessels.

A Pendant of any color, for five square-rigged vessels.

A Pendant, under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels.

A Pendant, over a Ball half hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.

A Pendant, under two Balls close, for eight square-rigged vessels.

A Pendant, between two Balls separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.

A Flag of any color, for ten or more square-rigged vessels.

The foregoing are displayed at the East or West yard-arm, according to the direction in which the vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rig can be distinguished descriptive colors will be hoisted at the mast-head, in the following order:—

A Union Jack, for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.

“ “ with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.

“ “ with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.

“ “ with a White Pendant over, for a small armed vessel.

A Blue Pendant, for a Merchant Ship.

A Red Pendant, for a Merchant Brig.

A White and Blue Pendant, for a Foreign vessel.

A White Pendant, without a Ball, for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A Red Flag, pierced White, for a Steamboat from Digby.

A Red Flag, with a White Square, for a Steamboat from Boston.

A Ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore or in distress.

RATES OF PILOTAGE.

Established by a Law of Ordinance of the Common Council, of the City of Saint John.

One Dollar per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbor of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and \$1 per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In case where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of \$2 per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, \$1 50c.; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, \$2; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, \$3; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, and not exceeding Four Hundred Tons, \$4; and 25c. for every Fifty Tons such Vessel may measure over Four Hundred Tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing Northwest, \$1 per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing Northwest, \$1 25 per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing S. E., \$1 50c. per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South or Brier Island bearing South-Southeast, \$1.75 per foot.

Fifth District.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, \$2 per foot.

First Month.

JANUARY.

31 Days.

JANUARY, the first month in our present calendar, was also the first month in the Roman calendar. It was not the first month of the year in Britain till 1752, when the legislature, by an act passed in the preceding year, altered the mode of reckoning time from the Julian to the Gregorian style. At this time it was directed that the legal year, which then commenced in some parts of the country in March, and in others in January, should universally be deemed to begin on the first of January.—January derives its name from Janus. Macrobius expressly says it was dedicated to him because, from its situation, it might be considered to be retrospective of the past, and prospective to the opening year. It consists of thirty-one days, though originally only of thirty days. The Anglo-Saxons called January *Wolf-monath*.

FEBRUARY, the second month of the year. Its name is derived from *februario*, to purify or cleanse. The Saxons called it *Sol-monath*, because the sun's meridian altitude visibly increases in it.

February was not in the calendar of Remulus. It was added to the year by Numa, who gave it the twelfth place in the calendar. The Decemviri transferred it to the place where it now stands. Numa assigned twenty-eight days to it, in order that the sum of the year might be an uneven number, according to a Pythagorean fancy. In an ordinary year, February has twenty-eight days; in Bissextile, or Leap Year, it has a twenty-ninth day.

MARCH.

31 Days.

MARCH, the third month of the year, according to modern computation, contains thirty-one days. The Roman year originally began with March, and was in fact so considered in England before the alteration of the style, the legal year commencing on the 25th of March. Our Anglo-Saxon ancestors called it most commonly *Hlyd-monath*, loud or stormy month; and sometimes *Hræd* or *Rhæd-monath*, which some interpret *Rhedas*, others *Rhede* or *Rethe*, the rugged or rough month. The name of the month is said to be derived from that of Mars, the God of war.

Ray, in his Collection, has this proverb, relating to this month:—"A bushel of March dust is worth a king's ransom," thereby expressing the importance of dry or dusty weather at this particular season of the year, in an agricultural point of view.

4th Month.

APRIL.

30 Days.

APRIL, the fourth month of the year, consists of thirty days, which was the number said to be assigned to it by Romulus. Numa Pompilius deprived it of one day, which Julius Cæsar restored, and which it has ever since retained. In the original Alban or Latin calendar, April held the first station, and then consisted of thirty-six days. Its name is usually considered to have been derived from *aperire*, to open: either from the opening of the buds, or of the bosom of the earth in producing vegetation. The Anglo-Saxons called it *Ooster* or *Easter-monath*. In this month the sun travels through parts of the signs of Aries and Taurus, that is to say, of those parts of the *ecliptic* which astronomers designate by those names. The real motion of the sun among the constellations is through Pisces and Aries.

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5th Month.

MAY.

31 days.

MAY. the fifth month of our present year, was the second in the old Alban calendar, the third in that of Romulus, and the fifth in the calendar of Numa Pompilius. In the Alban calendar it consisted of twenty-two days; of thirty-one in the calendar of Romulus; and of thirty in that of Numa. Julius Cæsar restored it to the old day of which Numa had deprived it, and of which it still keeps possession. Its etymology is doubtful. Ovid proposes three derivations: one from *majestas*; another from *maiores*, a term which signified the *patres* or governing body of the city of Romulus, and the third from *Maia*. The Roman month was under the protection of Apollo.

Our Saxon ancestors, after the Romans, called it *Maius-monath*; and in their native language, *Tri-milchi*, three-milk month, when cows were milked three times a day.

6th Month.

JUNE.

30 Days.

JUNE, the sixth month of the year, named from the Latin Junius. Ovid makes Juno assert that the name was expressly given in honor of herself. Those who derive the name from Junius Brutus, who began his consulship in this month, forget that, according to tradition, it had received the appellation long before. In the old Latin or Alban calendar, Juno was the fourth month and consisted of twenty-six days. Romulus is said to have assigned to it a complement of thirty days. Numa, who named it the sixth month, deprived it of one day, which was restored by Julius Cæsar, since which time it has remained undisturbed.

The Anglo-Saxons had several names for the month of June. They called it *sear-monath*, dry month; *midsummer-monath*, midsummer month; and *cærlitha-monath*, the earlier mild month, in contradistinction to July.

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7th Month.

JULY.

31 Days.

JULY, now the seventh, was originally the fifth month of the year, and was called by the Romans, in regard to its numerical station, *Quintilis*.—Mark Anthony altered the name to Julius, the gentile name of Caius Cæsar, the Dictator, who was born in it. In the old Latin calendar, Quintilis had a complement of thirty-six days. Romulus reduced them to thirty-one; Numa to thirty; but Julius Cæsar restored the day of which Numa had deprived it, which it has ever since retained. Our Anglo-Saxon ancestors called July *Mæd-monath*, mead month, from the meads being then in their bloom; and *æftera-lutha-monath*, the latter mild month, in contradistinction to June, which they considered and named as the "former mild month." On the 3rd day of this month the Dog-days are supposed to begin.

AUGUST.

31 Days.

The month of AUGUST was originally called Sextilis, being the sixth month in the Alban or Latin calendar; and this name, as is stated, it retained in the calendars of Romulus, Numa, Pompilius, and Julius Cæsar. Since Numa's reform, however, it has held only the 8th place in the series of months. In the Alban calendar, Sextilis consisted of only 28 days; in that of Romulus, of 30; Numa reduced the number to 29; Julius Cæsar restored it to 30; and Augustus Cæsar from whom it derived its new name of August, extended the number of days to 31, which has continued ever since.

Our Saxon ancestors named August the "weed month," as abounding in noxious and useless herbs. Lammas day, the first of the month, is also called the Gule of August, probably from the Gothic *Hiol* or *Iul*, a wheel indicating that revolution of season which brought the return of harvest.

SEPTEMBER.

30 Days.

SEPTEMBER, the ninth month, as the year is now divided by European nations. It consists of thirty days. Etymologically the name is improper, being a Latin term formed of *septem*, seven, and the termination *ber*; and the same impropriety belongs to October, November and December. The Roman year originally commenced in March. The legal year in England was not made to commence on the 1st of January till the alteration of the style in 1752. The Saxons called it *Gerste-monath*, or barley-month, *gerste* being the original Saxon name for barley, which was the chief grain cultivated by the Saxons, and commonly harvested in this month. *Gerste* is still the German name for barley, which name seemed to be a corruption of *beer-leagh*, a term which the Saxons applied to the grain for its use in making beer.

OCTOBER, in the year of Romulus, was strictly what its name implies, the eighth month. With us it is the tenth. Domitian, who was born in this month, gave it his own name; but it lasted during his life only.—Antonius Pius, in honor of his wife Faustini, called it Faustinus; and the flatterers of Commodus assigned to it one of their patron's epithets, "Invictus."

Our Anglo-Saxon ancestors called it *se teotha monath*, the tenth month: they also gave it the name of *Winter-fyllith*, winter-beginning.

30 Days.

NOVEMBER, the 11th month of the Julian year, was the ninth in the year of Romulus, whence it received its name. This name was assigned to it in the Alban calendar. It originally consisted of thirty days, which were continued by Romulus and Numa. Julius Cæsar gave it another day, but Augustus reduced it again to thirty, and this number it has ever since retained.

Our Saxon ancestors called November *Blot-monath*, blood month, the month of sacrifice, because at this season the heathen Saxons made a provision for winter, and offered in sacrifice many of the animals which were then killed.

Martlemas or Martinmass beef, cured about the festival of Saint Martin, the 11th of this month, was a provision formerly well known, and in some places still known.

DECEMBER.—This month still retains the original name assigned to it in the Alban, and first Roman calendar adopted, according to tradition, by Romulus, in both of which it was the tenth as the name signifies, or last of the year. Our Saxon ancestors called it *mid-winter* month and *yule-month*, from 'a wheel', emblematical of the sun's revolution or return in his annual course.

December was anciently consecrated to Saturn. In the Alban calendar the month consisted of thirty-five days. Romulus reduced it to thirty; and Numa to twenty-nine days. Julius Cæsar restored the day of which Numa had deprived it: and Augustus added another day, which it still retains.

COUNTY COURTS.

The Courts are established by 30th Victoria, cap. x. passed 17th June, 1867. The Act authorises the appointment of one Judge for the Counties of Charlotte, Carleton and Victoria; one Judge for the Counties of Albert, Westmorland and Kent; one Judge for the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester, and Restigouche; and one Judge for the Counties of King's and Saint John—provided that said Court for the County of Saint John shall not have or exercise any jurisdiction in any cause in which the City Court in and for the City of Saint John, or the Police Court in the Parish of Portland, in the County of Saint John, have or claim Jurisdiction.

The Act also authorises the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who shall be an Attorney. The Sittings of the respective Courts shall be held at or near the County Court House in the Shire town.

The County Courts have not cognizance of any action

- 1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or
- 2d. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed, except as hereinafter mentioned; or
- 3rd. For Criminal Conversation, or Seduction, or
- 4th. For breach of promise of marriage, or
- 5th. Of any action against a Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office.

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt or damages do not exceed the sum of one hundred dollars; and in actions on bail bonds given to a Sheriff in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

SITTINGS OF THE COUNTY COURTS.

The Courts hold Terms every year in each County, which Terms annually commence as follows:

Charlotte County—On the second Tuesday in the months of January and June; on the fourth Tuesday in March, and on the first Tuesday in October.

Carleton County—On the second Tuesday in March and December, and the first Tuesday in July.

Victoria County—On the first Tuesday in March and December, and the second Tuesday in July.

York County—On the first Tuesday in January, March, June, and October.

Sunbury County—On the Wednesday next after the second Tuesday in the months of January, June and October.

Queen's County—On the Wednesday next after the fourth Tuesday in January and June, and on the third Tuesday in October.

King's County—On the first Tuesday in the months of January, April, July and October.

Saint John County—On the fourth Tuesday in the months of January, April, July, and October.

Albert County—On the fourth Tuesday in June, and on the second Tuesday in March and November.

Westmorland County—On the third Tuesday in June, the second Tuesday in December, and the first Tuesday in March.

Kent County—On the third Tuesday in January; on the last Tuesday in April, and on the first Tuesday in July and November.

Northumberland County—On the fourth Tuesday in January, the second Tuesday in April, the fourth Tuesday in July, and the third Tuesday in October.

Gloucester County—On the third Tuesday in January and July, and the first Tuesday in April.

Restigouche County—On the second Tuesday in January and March, and the second Tuesday in July.

The Inferior Court of Common Pleas are abolished by this Act.

LETTER RATES.

The postage on letters mailed in New Brunswick, addressed to any place within the Dominion of Canada, is 3 c. per half oz. if pre-paid: if not pre-paid, it is 5 c. On letters to all parts of the United States the postage is 6 c per half oz., if pre-paid, and 10 cents if unpaid.

Letters to and from England, via Halifax, are charged 6d. sterling, or 12½ cents per half ounce; and via New York, 8d. sterling, or 15 cents per half ounce, if prepaid: If mailed unpaid they are charged 6d. sterling additional on delivery. Per Canadian packets, via Quebec, 6d. sterling, or 12½ cents per half ounce; and via Portland, 6d. sterling, or 12½ cents per half ounce, if prepaid: If mailed unpaid they are charged 6d. sterling additional on delivery.

REGISTRATION.

The following are the fees which, as well as the ordinary postage, must be prepaid at the office at which posted, on letters, packets and parcels intended to be Registered:—On Letters addressed to any place in Canada, Newfoundland, or Prince Edward Island, 2 cents. On letters addressed to any place in the United States, 5 cents. On Letters addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, 8 cents. On Parcels, Packets of Patterns or Samples to any part of Canada, 5 cents. On Book Packets and Newspapers to the United Kingdom, 8 cents.

PARCELS.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, and not exceeding 4 lbs. in weight, may be posted at any Post Office in Canada, for conveyance to any other Post Office in Canada, at the following rates:—For each parcel weighing not more than 8 oz., 12½ cents; exceeding 8 oz. and not exceeding 1 lb., 25 cents; exceeding 1 lb. and not exceeding 1½ lbs., 37½ cents; exceeding 1½ lbs. and not exceeding 2 lbs., 50 cents; exceeding 2 lbs. and not exceeding 2½ lbs., 62½ cents; exceeding 2½ lbs. and not exceeding 3 lbs., 75 cents; exceeding 3 lbs. and not exceeding 3½ lbs., 87½ cents; exceeding 3½ lbs. and not exceeding 4 lbs., \$1. The postage must be prepaid by stamps. The Parcel should have the words "By Parcel Post," plainly written on the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, the name of the County in which the said Office is situated being added. Parcels sent under these regulations may contain books, daguerreotypes, photographs, written or printed matter, returns, deeds, legal papers, and all transmissions of a like character not being strictly letters. Parcels cannot be transmitted by post under these regulations to any place beyond the limits of Canada.

NEWSPAPERS.

Newspapers printed and published in Canada may be sent to any part of the Dominion by post from the office of publication if paid quarterly in advance, either by the Publisher at the office where the papers are posted, or by the Subscriber at the post office where the papers are delivered, at the following rates:—For a paper published once a week, 5 cents per quarter; twice a week, 10 cents per quarter; three times a week, 15 cents per quarter; six times a week, 30 cents per quarter. When these rates are not paid in advance the papers will be charged 1 cent each on delivery. Canadian newspapers may be forwarded from the office of publication, if prepaid, to subscribers in the United States, the United Kingdom, Prince Edward Island, or Newfoundland at the commuted rates. Transient newspapers addressed to any place within the Dominion, to the United Kingdom, to Prince Edward Island, to Newfoundland, or to the United States, must be paid by postage stamps at a rate of Two cents each.

PERIODICALS, AND PRINTED MATTER.

Printed or lithographed circulars, prices current, handbills, and other printed matter of a like character, posted in Canada, and addressed to any place in Canada, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, or the United States, are chargeable with a rate of one cent per oz., which must be prepaid by Postage stamp.

The half-yearly School Returns made by School Trustees to the Local Superintendents of Schools, filled up in writing with the names of the pupils and days of attendance, Military returns, states and rolls, containing written figures and signatures, and other documents of a like character, partly printed and partly written, such as Policies of Insurance, may be transmitted by Post, as printed matter, at the rate of one cent per ounce which must be prepaid by Postage stamp.

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less frequently than once per week. An Almanac, or any work of a like character published at stated periods, and containing matter of general interest, is deemed to be a Periodical.

Periodicals posted in Canada, when addressed to any place in Canada, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, or the United States, will be subject to a rate of one cent for every four ounces weight of package, whether the package contains one or more numbers, to be in all cases prepaid by Postage stamp,—any fraction of four ounces to be counted as a full rate. Under this regulation, periodicals for delivery in any post office in Canada, may be made up and posted in a separate package,—the numbers contained therein to be addressed to the persons for whom they are intended, and the outside wrapper to bear the name of the Post Office,—provided such package does not exceed four pounds in weight, and that it be prepaid, by Postage stamp, at the rate of one cent per four ounces, bulk weight.

A like rate of one cent per four ounces will be payable on delivery in Canada, on all Periodical publications received in the Mails from the United States, from Prince Edward Island, or Newfoundland, and should be charged on such Periodical matter at the Frontier or other Office, where such Mails are received.

But when Periodicals weighing less than one ounce per number are posted in Canada for any place within the Dominion, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, or the United States, and are put up singly, that is, only one number to a single address, they may pass at a rate of one half cent per number, to be prepaid by Postage stamp.

Exchange periodicals passing between publishers in Canada, and between publishers in Canada and publishers in the United States, Prince Edward Island, or Newfoundland, may be sent and delivered free of Canada Postage, but only one copy of such publication can be forwarded to the same publisher under this privilege.

Periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, in the Mails by the Mail Steam Packets sailing from Quebec or Portland, and Halifax, on prepayment, by Postage stamp, of two cents each.

No packet of Periodicals to exceed four pounds in weight.

BOOKS.

The following conditions apply to all Book packets, and must be carefully observed:—1. Every book packet must be either without a cover, or in a cover open at both ends. 2. It must not contain any letter, open or sealed, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, or any sealed enclosure whatever. 3. No Book packet must exceed four pounds in weight; nor must the size exceed two feet in length, or one foot in width or depth. 4. The postage must be prepaid by stamps.

Books bound or unbound, Pamphlets and occasional publications, posted in Canada, and addressed to any place in Canada, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, and the United States, are chargeable with a rate of one cent per ounce, which must be prepaid by Postage stamp.

Book packets can be forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom, and *vice versa*, at the following rates:—By Mail Steam Packets sail-

ing from Quebec or Portland, and Halifax, for each packet weighing not more than 4 ounces, 1 rate, 3d. sterling, 7 cents; above 4 ounces and not exceeding 8 ounces, 2 rates, 6d. sterling, 12½ cents; above 8 ounces and not exceeding 12 ounces, 3 rates, 9d. sterling, 19 cents; above 12 ounces and not exceeding 1 pound, 4 rates, 1s. sterling, 25 cents; and so on, adding one rate of postage for every 4 ounces or fraction of 4 ounces. By Cunard and other Steamers sailing from New York:—For every packet weighing not more than 4 ounces, 1 rate, 4d. sterling, 9 cents; above 4 ounces and not exceeding 8 ounces, 2 rates, 8d. sterling, 17 cents; above 8 ounces and not exceeding 12 ounces, 3 rates, 1s. sterling, 25 cents; above 12 ozs. and not exceeding 1 pound, 4 rates, 1s. 4d. sterling, 33 cents; and so on, adding one rate of postage for every 4 ounces or fraction of 4 ounces.

Book packets, printed matter, or newspapers, can be forwarded from Canada to France, or *vice versa*, by the Mail Steam Packets sailing from Quebec or Portland, and Halifax, at the following rates:—If not exceeding 2 ounces in weight, 5 cents; if exceeding 2 ounces and not exceeding 4 ounces, 10 cents; if exceeding 4 ounces and not exceeding 8 ounces, 20 cents; if exceeding 8 ounces and not exceeding 1 pound, 40 cents; and so on, adding 20 c. for each additional half pound or fraction of a half pound.

The following Post Offices are authorized to issue and pay Provincial Money Orders (under directions of the Postmaster General) for any sum not exceeding in any one order \$100, viz.:—Andover, Baie Verte, Bathurst, Buctouche, Campbelltown, Canterbury, Caraquet, Chatham, Dalhousie, Dorchester, Fredericton, Gagetown, Grand Falls, Harvey, Hillsborough, Hopewell Cape, Kingston, Moncton, Manners Sutton, Newcastle, Ossekeag, Richibucto, Sackville, Salisbury, Shediac, Sheffield, St. Andrews, St. George, St. John, St. Martins, St. Stephen, Sussex Vale, Woodstock.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more offices upon another office, the Postmaster of the office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the payment of such Order for six days.—All Money Orders shall be drawn upon printed forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular printed forms.

Persons applying for Money Orders will be required to state the particulars upon a Form of Application provided for that purpose. Parties procuring Money Orders should examine them carefully, to see that they are properly filled up and stamped. This caution will appear sufficiently important when it is understood that an Order defective in any important respect will throw difficulties in the way of its payment.

Postmasters will not pay an order to a second person without the written endorsement of the Payee thus:—"Pay to the order of ———, (the name of the second person to fill the blank) for value received."

The commission charged for Money Orders, drawn and payable in New Brunswick, is as follows:—Not exceeding \$10, five cents: exceeding \$10 and not exceeding \$20, ten cents; exceeding \$20 and not exceeding \$30,

The Post Offices at Grand Falls and Hillsborough will issue Money Orders payable in Canada, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

The commission charged for Sterling Money Orders on the United Kingdom is as follows:—Not exceeding £2, twenty-five cents; exceeding £2 and not exceeding £5, fifty cents; exceeding £5 and not exceeding £7, seventy-five cents; exceeding £7 and not exceeding £10, one dollar.

The commission charged for Sterling Money Orders on Canada, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island:—Not exceeding £5, twenty-five cents; exceeding £5 and not exceeding £10, fifty cents.

As the advices of Sterling Orders have to pass through the Head Office in Saint John, Orders for the United Kingdom should be obtained two or three days before the closing of the English mail.

No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Sugar, &c.:—Candy, brown or white; refined sugar or sugar rendered by any process equal in quality thereto and manufactures of refined sugar, including succades and confectionery, per 100 lbs., \$3 00; white clayed sugar, or sugar rendered by any process equal in quality to white clayed, not being refined nor equal in quality to refined, 2 60; yellow Muscovado and brown clayed sugar, or sugar rendered by any process equal in quality to yellow muscovado or brown clayed, and not equal to white clayed, 2 25; brown Muscovado sugar, or sugar rendered by any process equal in quality to brown muscovado and not equal to yellow muscovado or brown clayed, 1 90; any other sugar not equal in quality to brown muscovado, 1 68; cane juice, syrup of sugar or of sugar cane, syrup of molasses or of sorghum, melado, concentrated melado or concentrated molasses, 1 37; molasses, if used for refining purposes, or for the manufacture of sugar, 73; molasses, if not so used, 55; Coffee, green, per lb., 3; coffee, roasted or ground, 4; Chicory or other root or vegetable used as coffee, raw or green, 3; chicory, kiln-dried, roasted or ground, 4; common Soap, per 100 lbs., 1 00; Starch, per 100 lbs., 2 50.

All goods not enumerated in any of the Schedules to this Act, as charged with any other duty, nor declared exempt from duty, shall be charged with a duty of fifteen per cent. ad valorem.

SCHEDULE C.—FREE GOODS.

Arts and Science.—Anatomical preparations, Botany, specimens of; Cabinets of Antiquities, Coins, Gems and Medals; Drawings, not in oil; Gems, Medals, Mineralogy, specimens of; Models, Natural History, specimens of; Sculpture, specimens of.

Works of Art, viz.:—Busts, natural size, not being casts nor produced by any mere mechanical process; Casts, as models for use of schools of design; Paintings, in oil, by artists of well known merit, or copies of the old masters by such artists; statutes of bronze, marble or alabaster, natural size.

Drugs, chemicals, dye stuffs, oils and colors, not including chemical preparations or chemical compounds, for dyeing or otherwise, not elsewhere specified:—Acids of every description except acetic and vinegar; Alum, Antimony, Argol, Bark when chiefly used in dyeing, Barilla, Berries when chiefly used in dyeing, Borax, Bleaching Powders, Brimstone in roll or flour.

Colors and other articles, when imported by room-paper makers and stainers, to be used in their trade only, viz.:—Bichromate of potash, Blue Black, British Gum, Chinese Blue, Lakes, scarlet and morone, in pulp; Paris and

Cream of tartar in crystals, Drugs when chiefly used in dyeing, Essential Oils, Indigo, Kelp, Kryolite, Medicines for hospitals, Metallic Oxides, dry, ground or unground, washed or unwashed, not calcined; Nitre, Nuts when chiefly used in dyeing, Ochres, dry, ground or unground, washed or unwashed, not calcined; Oils, cocoa nut, pine and palm in their natural state; Phosphorus, Red Lead, dry; Roots, medicinal, in their natural state, Salammoniac, Sal Soda, Saltpetre, Soda ash, Soda caustic, Soda nitrate of, Soda, silicate of, Sulphur in roll or flour, Vitriol, blue, Vegetables when chiefly used in dyeing, White Lead, dry, Whiting or whitening, Woods when chiefly used in dyeing, Zinc, white, dry.

Manufactures and Products of Manufactures:—Anchors, Ashes, pot, pearl and soda, Bread and biscuit from Great Britain and the B. N. Am. Provinces, Bolting Cloth; Books, periodicals and pamphlets, printed, not being foreign reprints of British copyright works, nor blank account books, nor copy books, nor books to be written or drawn upon, nor reprints of books printed in Canada, nor printed sheet music; Bookbinders' tools and implements, Brim moulds for gold beaters, Burrstones, Candle wick, cotton, Cement, marine unground, Cement, hydraulic unground, Church Bells, Clothing, donations of for charitable institutions, Communion Plate, Cocoa Paste from Great Britain and the Br. N. A. Provinces, Coin and Bullion except United States silver coin, Cotton Netting for India rubber shoes, Cotton waste, Cotton wool, Drain tiles, Duck for belting and hose, Emery paper and emery cloth, Electrotype blocks for printing purposes, Farming Implements and Utensils when imported by agricultural societies for the encouragement of agriculture, Felt for hats and boots, Felt hat bodies, Fire brick, Fire Engines, steam, when imported by the municipal corporations of cities, towns and villages, for the use of such municipalities, Fish hooks, nets and seines, lines and twines, Flax waste, Glass paper and glass cloth, Gold-beaters Skin, Gold Leaf; Hoop Skirt manufacture, the following articles for, crinoline thread for covering crinoline wire, clasps of tin and brass, slides, spangles and slotted tapes, and flat or round wire uncovered; Junk, Linen machine thread, Lithographic Stones; Lumber, plank and sawed, of mahogany, rosewood, walnut, cherry and chestnut; Machine silk twist, Machinery when used in the original construction of mills or factories, not to include steam engines, boilers, water wheels, or turbines; Nails, composition, Nails, sheathing, Oakum, Oil Cake; Philosophical Instruments and apparatus, including globes when imported by and for the use of colleges and schools, scientific or literary societies; Platers' Leaf, Printing Ink, Printing presses except portable hand printing presses, Prunella, Rags, Sand paper and sand cloth; Ships' binnacle lamps, blocks and patent bushes for blocks, Bunting, Cables, iron chain over three quarters of an inch, shackled or swiveled, or not, Compasses, Dead Eyes, Dead Lights, Deck Plugs, Knees, iron, Masts, or parts of, iron, Pumps and pump gear, Riders, iron, Shackles, Sheaves, Signal lamps, Steering apparatus, Travelling trucks, Wedges, Wire-rigging; and the following articles when used for ships or vessels only, viz.: Cables, hemp and grass, Cordage, Sail cloth

or canvas from No. 1 to No. 6, Varnish, black and bright; Silver Leaf, Spikes, composition, Straw Plaits, tuscan and grass, fancy, Stereotype Blocks for printing purposes, Treenails, Twists, silk for hats, boots and shoes, Veneering of wood or ivory, Weaving or tram silk for making elastic webbing. Weaving or tram cotton for making elastic webbing, Wire cloth of brass and copper, Woollen netting for India rubber shoes.

Metals.—Brass, bar, rod, sheet and scrap, Cranks for steamboats and Mills forged in the rough, Copper in pigs, bars, rods, bolts and sheets, and sheathing; Iron of the following descriptions—bar, rod, hoop, sheet, scrap, galvanized or pig, bars puddled, bolts and spikes galvanized, boiler plate, Canada plates and tinned plates, nail and spike rod (round, square and flat), rolled plate, wire; Locomotive Engine Frames, axles, cranks, hoop iron or steel for tires of wheels, bent and welded, Locomotive crank axles, piston rods, guide and slide bars, crank pins, connecting rods; Lead in sheet or pig, Litharge, Railroad bars, wrought iron chairs, wrought iron fish plates and car axles; Shafts for mills and steamboats in the rough, Spelter in blocks, sheets or pigs, Steel, wrought or cast in bars and rods, Steel plates cut to any form but not moulded, Tin in bar, blocks, pig or granulated, Tubes and piping, of brass, copper or iron, drawn, Type metal in blocks or pigs, Wire of brass, copper or iron, round or flat, Yellow metal in bolts, bars, and for sheathing, Zinc in sheets and blocks and pigs.

Natural Products.—Bristles, broom corn, bulbs, caoutchouc unmanufactured, clays, coal and coke, cork wood, cork wood bark, diamonds unset, earthen, eggs, emery, fibre Mexican; fibre, vegetable, for manufacturing purposes; fibrilla, flax undressed, fire clay, fire wood; fish, fish, not to include oysters or lobsters in tins or kegs, furs undressed, gravels, grease and grease scrap, gutta percha unmanufactured, gypsum not ground or calcined, hair, human, goat, angola, thibet, horse, hog and mohair, unmanufactured, hay, hemp undressed, hides, hops, horns; India rubber unmanufactured; lemons, oranges and citrons or the rind of such when imported in brine for the purpose of being candied, manilla grass, manures, marble in blocks unwrought or sawn on two sides only, and slabs from such blocks having at least two edges unwrought, moss for upholstery purposes, ores of metals of all kinds, osiers, pelts, pipe clay, pitch, plants, plaster of paris not ground nor calcined, precious stones unset, ratan for chair makers, rice, roots, rosin, salt, sand, sea grass, seeds for agricultural, horticultural or manufacturing purposes only, and not to include cereals, shrubs, skins undressed, slate, stone unwrought, tails undressed, tanner's bark, tampico white and black, tar, teasels, tobacco unmanufactured, tow undressed, trees, turpentine other than spirits of, vegetables culinary, vegetable fibres, whale oil in the casks from on ship-board and in the condition in which it was first landed, wheat, willow for basket makers, woods of all kinds wholly unmanufactured, wool.

Special Exemptions from Duty.—Apparel, wearing of British subjects dying abroad but domiciled in Canada; Articles by and for the use of the Governor General, Articles for the public uses of the Dominion, Articles for the use of Foreign Consuls, Arms and clothing for Indian nations; Army and Navy, for use of—arms, bagatelle tables, billiard tables, clothing, cloth-

ing, plain for officers, musical instruments for bands, stores. Canteens (under regulations by Order in Council) coffee, sugar, tea. Officers' Mess, (under regulations by Order in Council) china ware, cigars, glass ware, malt liquors, plated ware, silver ware, spirits, table linen, wine. Settlers Effects of every description in actual use, not being merchandize, brought by persons making oath that they intend becoming permanent settlers within the Dominion.

Under Regulations and Restrictions to be prescribed by the Minister of Customs:—Carriages of travellers and carriages laden with merchandise, and not to include circus troops, nor hawkers. Locomotives and railway passenger, baggage and freight cars, running upon any line of road crossing the frontier, so long as Canadian Locomotives and cars are admitted free under similar circumstances in the United States. Menageries, horses, cattle, carriages and harnesses of.

SCHEDULE D.

The following goods when the growth and produce of any of the British North American Provinces, may be imported free of duty, viz:—Grain, flour and breadstuffs of all kinds, animals of all kinds, fresh, smoked and salted meats, seeds, green and dried fruits, fish of all kinds, products of fish and of all other creatures living in water, poultry, butter, cheese, lard, tallow, timber and lumber of all kinds, round, hewed, sawed, but not otherwise manufactured in whole or in part, fish oil, gypsum, ground or unground.

SCHEDULE E.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz: Books, Drawings, Paintings and Prints of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

EXCISE DUTIES.

Spirits, of the proof of Sykes' Hydrometer, per gallon, 63c.; Malt, per lb., 1; Snuff, ground dry, per lb., 10; Tobacco—Canadian Twist, *Tubac blanc entorquette*, per lb., 5; Fine Cut do., per lb., 10; Cavendish, Plug, Twist, and all other manufactured Tobacco, not before described, per lb., 10; Cigars,—value not over \$10 per thousand, per 1000, \$1; do., over 10, and not over 15, 2; over 15, and not over 20, 3; over 20, and not over 40, 4; over 40, 5; Petroleum and Coal Oil, per gal., 5c. Any fermented beverage made in imitation of beer or malt liquor, and brewed in whole or in part from any other substance than malt, per gal., 3½c.

LICENSE FEES.

For a license for distilling and rectifying, or either, by any process, \$250; *for a first class license for malting, 200; *for a second class do., 150, *for a third class do., 100; for a license for brewing, 50; for a license for manufacturing tobacco, 50. [*Provided the Governor in Council may so direct.]

TABLE OF STAMP DUTIES.

Stamps required on Notes, Drafts, or Bills of Exchange, executed singly:—Under \$25, free; for 25, 1c.; for 50 and over 25, 2; for 100 and over 50, 3; each additional 100, 3; each additional fraction of 100, 3.

On Drafts or Bills of Exchange in duplicate:—For \$100, 2c.; for each 100, 2; each additional fraction of 100, 2. On Drafts or Bills of Exchange in more parts than two:—For every \$100, 1c.; for each additional 100, 1; for each additional fraction of 100, 1. Interest made payable at the maturity of any Bill, &c., shall be counted as part of the principal sum. Stamps must be cancelled at the time of affixing the same, by writing or stamping thereon the date. The stamps for Notes, &c., to be affixed by the maker or drawer; and in case of any Draft or Bill of Exchange drawn out of the Dominion, by the acceptor or first drawer.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

THE SAILOR'S GUIDE-BOARDS.—The common method of determining the longitude at sea is by observation of the moon. The apparent distance of the moon from the sun, the planets, and certain conspicuous stars lying in or near her path, is computed for every three hours, and for two or three years in advance; and these distances, with the corresponding time at Greenwich observatory, are printed in the Nautical Almanac.

An observer at sea, wishing to know his longitude, measures with the sextant the distance of the moon from some of these stars, a planet, or the sun; he learns from the Nautical Almanac the hour answering to the same distance at Greenwich; and knowing the hour where he is, the difference of time gives him his longitude, fifteen degrees of longitude being equal to one hour in time. Simple as the process appears, it has exercised the ingenuity and taxed the exertions of the greatest minds, for obviously it could never have been practicable unless the whole theory of the moon's motions had been completely mastered. Thus, to borrow the fine illustration of Sir John Herschel, the visible surface of the celestial vault may be compared to a vast dial-plate; the stars are as fixed marks distributed upon it; the moon is a hand in motion among them, leaving one and approaching another with the most exact regularity, on her monthly circuit; the whole, with the almanac, answering the purpose of a clock in the heavens, marking Greenwich time to our sailors in every part of the globe, and enabling the skilful seaman to estimate the position of his vessel, though no object may have been seen for weeks but the trackless deep, the stormy petrel, and the changeable sky.

Captain Basil Hall relates the following interesting incident, illustrating the dependence which may be placed on this method of determining a ship's course, when the distances are taken with accuracy and the computations are made with care. He once sailed from San Blas, on the west coast of Mexico, and after a voyage of eight thousand miles, occupying

eighty-nine days, he arrived off Rio de Janeiro, having in this interval passed through the Pacific ocean, rounded Cape Horn, and crossed the South Atlantic, without making land or seeing a single sail, except an American whaler. When within a week's sail of Rio, he set seriously about determining by lunar observations the position of his ship, and then steered his course accordingly. Having arrived within what he considered from his computations fifteen or twenty miles of the coast, he hove to, at four o'clock in the morning, to await the break of day, and then bore up, proceeding cautiously, on account of a thick fog. When the fog cleared away, the crew had the satisfaction of seeing the great Sugar-Loaf Rock which stands on one side of the harbor's mouth, so nearly right ahead, that they had not to alter their course above a point in order to hit the entrance of the port. This was the first land they had seen for nearly three months, after crossing so many seas, and being set backward and forward by innumerable currents and foul winds. The effect upon all on board was electric, and giving way to their admiration, the sailors greeted the commander with a hearty cheer.

SUBMARINE CABLES.—The Atlantic cable is the fifty-fifth submarine telegraph now in working order. The first line was laid in 1851, between Dover and Calais, and has worked without any trouble or renewal for fifteen years. The line from Dover to Ostend has been working for thirteen years. The Atlantic cable is the longest submarine telegraph in existence, being 1,866 miles long. The telegraph from Malta to Alexandria, forming part of the connecting link between Great Britain and her Indian empire, is the next, being 1,535 miles long. It is laid in three sections, and has been at work for five years without any expense being incurred for repairs. The following is a list of the lines now in operation :

FACTS vs. SPECULATION.—When astronomers leave the solid ground of ascertained facts and necessary inferences, and base their theories on guesses, however ingenious, little confidence can be placed on their conclusions. Vast schemes of nature are constructed only to be shattered by later discoveries, and one famous man is found on one side and another on the opposite of the great questions. Uncertainty rests upon no small part of our astronomical lore. Thus "stars of the first magnitude" are so named because of their superior brilliancy, and they are supposed to be nearest to us; but now it is found that some stars of the ninth magnitude are nearer to us than Sirius itself, and we are utterly unable to tell whether a high degree of brilliancy denotes greater size, or nearness, or illuminating power. Stars have been known to appear exceedingly bright, and then fade away and disappear, and join the vast host of non-luminous stars.

Observations of the fixed stars require exact measurements of the most minute angles; but these are rendered very doubtful by the imperfections of our instruments, and the vibration of our observatories, and the heavings of the earth itself.

Even the distance of the earth from the sun, which is the unit of measurement for astronomers, is still undetermined. The best observations now reduce it from 95 millions of miles to 92 or 93. Humboldt made it less than 83 millions, and some have made it more than 100 millions.

THE GREATEST OF WATER-POWERS.—It is now proposed to throw a dam 2800 feet long across the north channel of the St. Lawrence, just above Montreal, at the foot of the La Chine rapids. This channel is shut in by a series of islands, which with the north bank of the river, and the dam, would form a vast lake, with a great fall at the outlet, and furnish a water-power equal to 2,000,000 horses.

WATER FOR DRINKING.—Rain-water, properly collected and preserved, is the best and safest water for drinking and cooking, though *pure* spring-water is equally good. Water from wells, streams, etc., where liable to drainage from any corrupt vegetable or animal matter, is rendered more or less impure, and in many cases is dangerous to health. Water standing in an occupied room absorbs much of the bad air formed by breathing and perspiration, and soon becomes unfit for drinking, impure water being worse than impure air.

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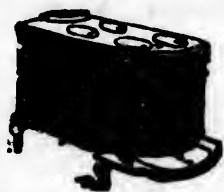
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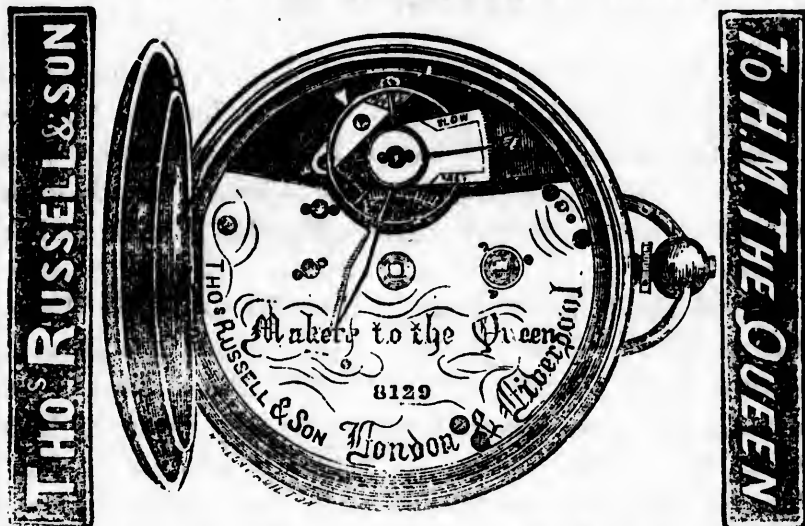
