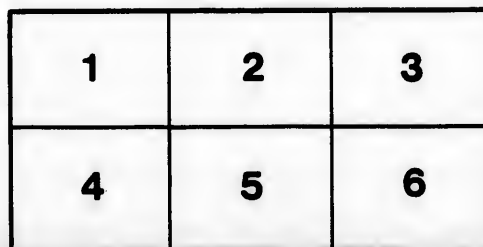

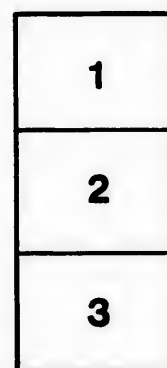

O God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all works of piety and charity do proceed, we beseech Thee to visit with Thy favour our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and so rule her heart, that she may in all things seek Thy honor and glory. Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants, the Clergy; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign, and the labours of those Missionaries who are proclaiming the same in this Province. And may thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—**AMEN.**

O **MERCIFUL** God, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that thou hast made, nor wouldst the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live: Have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels, and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of thy Word; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold, under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end.—**AMEN.**

CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of

twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

(Executive Committee.)

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

VIII.

(Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz. :—

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

IX.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

X.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XI.

(Local Committee.)

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in

any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an annual meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks' notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIII.

(The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; but in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman, the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the

Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the Certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:—

Firstly. Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

XIV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion for the General Purposes of the Society.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary, receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz. :—

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized, in his discretion to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (23d Report, page 33.)

That if any alterations shall be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary salaries granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it. (25th Report, page 30.)

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That the Treasurer be directed not to pay any monies after the first day of May in each year, until authorized to do so by the General Committee at their meeting in July.

That the following be the form of draft for a Missionary's salary, to come into effect on the first of October, 1861, and that no draft be paid by the Treasurer, unless presented in person, or endorsed by the person to whom it is made payable, the Treasurer to take a receipt from the party to whom the payment is made on the same.

REPORT.

It seems very necessary, at the present time, to lay before every member of the Church its real position with reference to the Missionary work in this Diocese. During the present year a most important crisis will arise, by which the Missions, in connection with this Society, will be seriously affected. Apart from the appropriations yearly made by the General Committee, there are (with limited exceptions) no means for the maintenance and extension of the Church, where there are no endowments or sufficient local resources.

Previously to the year 1865, the income of this Society annually increased, and by appropriations to the various objects, provision was in some degree made for the increasing wants of the Church.

When, however, four years ago, the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel determined, on making the grant in aid of this Diocese, in a block sum, to reduce the amount, this Society was called on to make up a large deficiency. Since then, for various reasons, the annual income has *not* increased; and the General Committee has found it no easy matter to provide for the yearly Missionary expenditure. The Committee has also found it a hard thing to refuse aid to many pressing wants,—to refuse assistance for additional clergymen in large and extensive Parishes, or for districts in which no provision has been made for the ministrations of the Church.

Through the Lord Bishop and the Executive Committee, the present state and prospects of the Missions in this Diocese have been laid before the Parent Society in England with a memorial to continue the present grant undiminished for another period of years. There is, however, too much reason to believe that the resolution for a gradual reduction will be adhered to.

This then is a very important matter for the inquiry and consideration of the members of the Church and of this Society.

By the accounts of the Treasurer it will be seen that it is impossible, with an income this year equal to the last, to increase the appropriations. How then is the large deficiency, anticipated in January next, to be made up!

By a valuable report of the Loan Committee, it will be observed that through late bequests the investments have lately been considerably increased, and that measures are proposed to secure the prompt payment of the interest. It is of great importance to maintain and add to this Endowment. Due regard to the interests of the Society will not allow any portion of this principal for annual expenditure, except under the most pressing circumstances.

Without a considerable increase to the annual income of the Society, there is plainly one only alternative—one which must be appalling to every true-hearted Churchman. Not only must all hope of aid to the over-worked Clergy in the larger parishes be withdrawn,—all hope of opening new Missions be given up, but even of those long established some must be abandoned,—churches closed, and means of grace no longer afforded.

The following abstract of the reports of the Missionaries in connection with this Society,—exhibiting so many instances of zeal and self-denial, and labor for Christ's sake—may lead to the hope that the great Head of the Church will, in mercy, avert a judgment in which so many will be involved.

ANDOVER.—Rev. W. H. Street writes that he cannot report so large a contribution as last year, as his people are making an effort to procure a parsonage for the Missionary.

"We are," Mr. Street writes, "quite aware of our duty to the Society, and unwilling that any thing should interfere with the subscriptions. The progress of the Church, in this Mission, if not rapid, has, I trust, been steady and real, and under the circumstances, satisfactory. The population increases on all sides, and each year the necessity for an additional laborer in this extensive district becomes more evident. It is a cheering fact that our sister church of the United States is likely to extend her influence through the large Arcotook territory bounding on us. This indeed must strengthen my hands very much, isolated as I am at present, with no brother clergyman within fifty miles."

"At Tobique, on Trinity Sunday, I admitted into the church by baptism an adult member from that part of the Diocese of the Bishop of Maine, of which I have spoken."

BATHURST AND NEW BANDON.—Rev. W. B. McKiel writes as follows: "In a mission on the Bay Chaleur there is little to vary the accustomed round of duty,—the exercises of public worship, the ministration of the sacrament to the sick and dying, the catechising of the young, and parochial visiting. We were cheered by the visit of the Bishop in September last. It was in the work of preparing candidates for confirmation that more than ever I found my mission too extensive, and myself unable to look up and prepare as many as might have been presented to the Bishop. The whole number was twenty-five,—scattered over eighty miles of the country. Some of those confirmed have since become communicants, and I trust that others will soon follow their good example. One, within a month after she was confirmed, fell sick, and though suffering extreme pain, she was happy and cheerful. She sang hymns night and day, while her strength lasted, and till her voice could be heard no more.

It is seldom the joyful portion of the Missionary to see the death bed of one so young lighted up with such faith and thankfulness.

"I earnestly hope that the funds of the Society will be found sufficient this year for a separate grant for a Missionary at Restigouche. The people there are very anxious to secure the services of a clergyman, and will, I believe, do their utmost for his support.

"In Bathurst a new roof was put on St. George's Church last summer. Through the exertions of the ladies the sum of \$161.51 was raised, which cleared the new parsonage of all debt; and at Christmas time the sum of \$11.50 was provided for a library for the Sunday School."

Contributions amount to \$67.50.

CAMBRIDGE.—Rev. B. Shaw writes as follows: "I have not yet concluded the subscriptions for the Society's fund, but I am afraid that we shall fall short this year; I could not guarantee more than \$70, although I cannot possibly say what the exact amount may be. We have added five new communicants since last year.

"In April last some of my parishioners exerted themselves in making a donation party. About thirty persons came to the Parsonage: we all took tea together, and spent a very pleasant evening. The amount of the donation was \$112, \$32 of which was in cash, the rest in hay, oats, &c. Last winter I made a long excursion up Salmon River, amongst the back settlers. I baptized ten children in Harcourt Parish, Kent County—a distance of fifty-six miles away from my own house. I was away ten days; and during the period I held nine services, baptized twenty-three children, and one adult.

"On the whole I think one may take courage in looking over the results of one's work for the past year. Our congregations are generally good; and I trust that not the shadows and forms of religion, but true holiness, is possessed by many who are walking in the straight and narrow way.

"I have nothing more to add which is peculiar from the work done in the rest of the missions in the Diocese; but I cannot close my report without hoping that the Society will, as soon as its funds will allow, send a clergyman on the western side of the Lake. That is not a new mission, but one from which the clergyman was withdrawn; and I think the clergymen should be restored to these vacant missions before they are appointed to new ones."

CAMPOBELLO.—Rev. J. S. Williams writes that this Local Committee, while expressing its continued interest in the welfare of the Society, would represent that the depressed condition of the fisheries precludes the hope of any increase in the amount returned from this Mission.

A renewal of the grant to the Missionary, and also the Church School, is respectfully requested.

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin reports contributions amounting to \$33.25.

In one of the churches twenty-seven persons were confirmed in October last by the Bishop.

CARLETON.—Rev. W. Walker reports \$28.69 as the contributions from this Parish.

CHATHAM.—Rev. S. Bacon has forwarded the following resolutions passed at a meeting of the Local Committee on Whit Monday:—

1. That it has ever been the decided opinion of this Committee that no better means could possibly have been devised to create a general endowment fund for the Anglican Church in these Colonies than the Diocesan Church Society; which, therefore, strongly claims the devout prayers, the strenuous efforts, and the liberal contributions of every one who has the cause of Christianity at heart.

2. That this Committee will not fail to use their utmost endeavors to obtain collections and subscriptions towards the augmentation of the funds of this Society, which, owing to the extreme pressure of the times, they fear will be less than usual. Contributions amount to \$127.38.

DERBY, BLACKVILLE, &c.—Rev. W. Cruden writes: "I regret to state that on account of repairs which have to be made on St. Peter's Church, Derby, the contributions towards the general purposes of the Society will not amount to more than \$12 or \$14. It was exactly eleven years on Sunday, 21st Inst., since I first commenced ministerial work among my parishioners. All my labors, during that period, have not, there is every reason to believe, been in vain. There is evidently an increasing desire for a knowledge of the truth—a warm affection for that form of sound words taught by the Church of England."

DOUGLAS.—Rev. T. E. Dowling has enclosed the following report: "During the last year the congregation of St. John's Church, Nashwaakia, has been indebted to the rector of Fredericton for six evening services. Owing mainly to the exertions of our new Church Warden (J. DeLancey Robinson, Esq.), the church yard and out-buildings are assuming a more respectable appearance. I record this with pleasure, because owing to the important position of this church in the mission, there is reason to hope that it will continue to exercise a healthy influence over less favored districts. It is a source of continued disappointment to me, that on two Sundays in every month this church should be unused."

"Twice in each month we are now worshipping and holding a Sunday School in the new church at Upper Keswick. Since the consecration in January, suitable seats have been provided, and we are ready to complete the outside of the building. Unexpected encouragement has been afforded to this undertaking, which some of our friends thought would never succeed; but for some time past there have not been wanting 'two or three' who prayed that the good work might grow and prosper, under the hand of the great Master Builder. So far we are out of debt, but we shall be thankful for assistance to paint the outside of the church."

"Towards the endowment of this Mission the N. S. and N. B. Land Company have lately granted 200 acres of land in this district."

"At a more distant portion of the Mission, as the name New Zealand implies, there has been an unusually large number of baptisms during the last year. Three heads of families have lately expressed their desire to be received into the church; and I shall most gladly welcome a travelling Missionary, whose labor would not be in vain in the Lord. Attempts are being made to remove a small debt on the parsonage, which, nothing preventing, will be accomplished within a few weeks."

Contributions amount to \$100.

DUNDAS AND WELLINGTON.—Rev. A. H. Weeks has forwarded a list of subscribers from this Mission, amounting to \$21, which amount is included in the sum reported by Rev. Dr. Jarvis, the Rector of Shediac.

FREDERICTON.—Rev. Charles Lee reports contributions as follows: Aged Clergy Fund, \$2.00; Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$4.00; General Purposes, \$694. Total, \$700.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. James Neale reports contributions, to the amount of \$78.77.

GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.—Rev. D. W. Pickett reports contributions to the amount of \$80, the same as last year.

HAMPTON.—Rev. W. W. Walker reports the amount of contributions at present to be \$55.65.

HARDWICKE, NEWCASTLE, &c.—Rev. J. Hudson informs the Society that in August and September last the Lord Bishop of the Diocese paid his eighth triennial visitation to the various churches, as well as to one station, on the Miramichi, when "the Apostolic rite of Confirmation" was duly administered, to more than the ordinary number of candidates. It is almost needless for

him to add, that the Bishop's addresses to those confirmed were marked by their usual earnestness.

The Rev. J. Hudson also states that he omits no opportunity of impressing on the minds of the church folk in his mission field, that if the English Church is to be efficiently maintained in this Colony, it must be, for many a year to come, by free will offerings transmitted to the Church Society.

Since July 1st, 1867, sums as follows have been forwarded to the Society's Treasurer: Hardwicke, £8 16s. 6d.; Newcastle, £7 18s. 11d.; Northesk, 18s. 9d.; Ludlow, £3 19s. 6d.; Boteston, 13s. Total, £23 1s. 8d.

KINGSCLARE.—Rev. J. Black reports contributions to the amount of \$74.27.

KINGSTON.—Rev. W. E. Scovill reports contributions to the amount of \$143.

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert reports contributions from this Mission amounting to \$30.

MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON.—Rev. Henry Pollard writes that through the zealous exertions of a lady of the congregation, a cabinet organ has been provided for St. Paul's Church, Lower Burton; and a larger choir has been formed, which has proved more conducive to the worship and praise of the Redeemer. Mr. Pollard considers that a re-arrangement of the several parishes in his and the adjoining Counties, would tend to the good of the Church and convenience of the clergy.

Contributions amount to \$100.

MONROE.—Rev. W. N. Boyer reports contributions amounting to \$27.40. He writes, that the depression in business and removal of several subscribers have caused the falling off in the amount.

Mr. Boyer adds that his stipend is being withdrawn by the Colonial and Continental Church Society, and what little he does draw is only by tacit acquiescence, after a service of twenty-five years. In all probability, if there is no increase of stipend, he will have to give up this Mission, which he has held twenty-two years.

NEW MARYLAND.—Rev. J. Pearson reports contributions to the amount of \$20.46.

NORFOLK.—Rev. E. A. Warneford reports contributions to the amount of \$76.80.

PETERSVILLE.—Rev. Charles R. Matthew reports contributions amounting to \$36. He writes as follows:—"Since last October, when I took charge of the Parish, I have been engaged in visiting and gathering together, as far as in me lay, the flocks grievously scattered by their long deprivation of a settled ministry. Dispersed along more than ninety miles of road, the visitation of the people, together with attendance on the sick, and the various weekly and Sunday services, have taxed my time and energies constantly. Withal there still remains some families upon whom I have as yet been unable to call.

"I have thankfully to record the kind reception and patient hearing I have met with from the people, as in accordance with apostolic precedent, I have endeavored, 'both publicly and from house to house, to testify repentance toward God, and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.'

"Although the attendance upon the means of grace is encouraging, it is not nearly as general and regular as it might be and as it ought to be. The frequent and evident neglect by many of the ordinances of religion, is a source of pain and anxiety to the pastor's heart. The manifest absence of the power of vital godliness over the hearts and lives of numbers, move the soul to cry out, 'Sle up Thy power, O Lord, and come among us, and with great might succour us.'

"Since the inclement weather and bad roads have passed away, we have been enabled to revive our Sunday School in the lower part of the parish, with an attendance of from thirty-five to fifty children. The superintendence I

undertake myself personally, and teach a Bible class of young men and women.

"At the Welsford Church we have recently erected a commodious shed, eighty feet in length, for the accommodation of the horses and wagons of the people attending that church; and we are about enclosing the church and lot in a neat board fence. We propose also to make a move this fall towards erecting a new church in the upper part of the parish. The parish church is sadly out of repair, and, standing in a most bleak and exposed situation, is almost uninhabitable in winter."

PORTLAND.—Rev. Canon Harrison has much pleasure in reporting the sum of \$165.77, which has been collected this year for the Society and for general purposes. "Several of our highest subscribers," Mr. Harrison writes, "are away; but the sum is in excess of last year."

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. E. A. W. Hanington has enclosed a most interesting report, of which the following are extracts:—

"Beside the usual ravages by disease, there have been no less than seven sudden deaths in this small mission during the past year. Among them were John Miller, his eldest son and a daughter, who were all destroyed by fire on the night of the fifteenth July last. Mr. Miller lived several days, and was able to receive the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. He died in great suffering, but with an humble trust in the mercy and love of Him in whom he had put his trust in life. The son and daughter perished together while the latter was vainly but nobly endeavoring to save his sister from the flames.

"Mr. Miller was a communicant and teacher in the Sunday School, and is a great loss to the church in the settlement. His widow, left homeless with several children, has partaken of the blessing promised to the widow and the fatherless. She has now a comfortable house, and her little ones are regular attendants at school."

Mr. Hanington mentions another sudden death of a son of Mr. Smyth, occasioned by a fall, from the effects of which he never recovered his consciousness.

"On the 22d of October," Mr. Hanington continues, "the Bishop visited this Mission, and confirmed twenty-one persons. At Magundy, nine miles from the parsonage, there were twelve candidates and nineteen communicants from a congregation of sixty-three. At the evening service in St. Clement's Church nine were confirmed. Among them were two newly baptized, who have since been regular communicants.

"During the year I have administered the holy communion on every Lord's day, beside fifteen celebrations in private to the sick.

"By the free will offerings of the congregation, aided by the 'Ladies' Needle Work Society, Fredericton,' a new carpet has been provided for the chancel, and other requirements for St. Clement's Church. The foundation of the church also has been repaired. At St. John's Church, Magundy, still more has been done towards the House of God. Though not a large congregation they have raised about \$75; and this, with their own labor, has enabled them to put the church in thorough repair, with the exception of the roof, which requires renewing, and the fence around the church. I think it not only right to acknowledge publicly the general liberality of all in their offerings towards God's House and service, but also the zeal and continued exertions of Messrs. James Henry and Wm. Brown.

"In Magaguadavic the people are engaged in building a church with their own hands. They have hauled out the frame, and eight families have offered \$149, besides much labor from others who are not able to supply money. They hope to finish the exterior of the church this autumn. There is still a large sum required for the completion of the work, in which it is hoped assistance may be rendered by those who would devote a portion of their worldly treasure in this good cause.

"Although so much more than usual has been given in this mission for local church purposes, the subscriptions to the Society exceed those of last year, and

are larger than ever before, while the spirit in which the offerings were made was decidedly better.

"Amid the common difficulties and fatigues of a country mission, so long as our services are received as those of 'Ambassadors for Christ,' our labor is not wholly lost, and we must not complain of the drawbacks common in the work of every minister of the Church of Christ.

"The whole amount, including aid to the Missionary's stipend, raised in this Mission, during the past year, for church purposes, is about \$684.61."

Contributions to the Society amount to \$85.

QUEZENSABAY.—Rev. H. W. Tippet writes as follows: "I have only had three baptisms during the year, and have buried four—all aged—three of them were communicants. Among them was my much respected parishioner, Ira Ingraham, whose name has never been absent from your lists of subscribers for twenty years. Few men have gone down to the grave more generally respected; and though his last illness was sharp and painful, I am happy to say that his mind was calm and peaceful, and that he died, relying for salvation only on the merits of our crucified Redeemer. Several of his sons are among our subscribers, and have partly made up the loss of their father's contributions by increasing their own.

"I constantly have to regret the impossibility of getting my people together in any numbers at any one centre for church purposes, and the distances that many have to travel to attend church, makes their attendance very dependant upon the state of the weather and the roads. I am happy to say that I have at present three small groups of children under instruction in various parts of the Mission; and I have been able, owing to the settling of an excellent female teacher belonging to the church, in one of the districts, and who has been long a laborer in the Vineyard, to begin a Sunday School where I never had one before.

"As since my last report I have completed my twentieth year of missionary work in connection with the Diocesan Church Society, I may add that during that time I am thankful to say I have been enabled to travel 30,000 miles in all weathers and on all kinds of roads, in the execution of my duty, without any serious accident; I have preached 2,000 sermons, and baptized 139 infants and adults. In addition to this I have promoted and collected the funds for building three churches and a parsonage house; and have added to the value of the church property upon which I live, by improvements, at least from \$80 to \$100 per annum.

"I am afraid, however, I have done but little spiritual good, and am conscious of being an 'unprofitable servant.' It was my misfortune to be an utter stranger to country life, and particularly in a colony, where I began to work as a missionary; and from my inexperience in this respect have made many mistakes, but I have worked with good intentions, and hope, through Divine mercy, to meet many of my people in a better world, when my work is done."

Contributions, which owing to the death and change of residence of many subscribers fall a little short of those of last year, are \$68.98.

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. N. A. Coster reports contributions to the amount of \$12.33. Mr. Coster writes that this falling off is due to the exertions of his people in raising funds required for very considerable repairs for the church and parsonage.

"I cannot," he adds, "refrain from mentioning the recent loss of one of my flock, to whom I was in the habit of applying for every charitable purpose. Few parishes contain many such exemplary members, and such a loss is sometimes not repaired for years."

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts is thankful to be able to send a satisfactory report of his parish during the past year.

"I cherish," Mr. Roberts writes, "an humble hope that many of those committed to my pastoral care are making progress in the Christian life. As an

evidence of this, I may mention that at the Wednesday evening service at the Church at Dorchester, the attendance has been most encouraging, the congregation during the winter averaging more than fifty.

"Our Bishop's visit in September last, had, I trust, a lasting influence for good. The number of the candidates was diminished by sickness and unfavorable weather; yet of the twenty-three confirmed, seventeen have since become steady and regular communicants. The whole number of communicants has considerably increased,—being about 110 in both parishes. The congregations also are large, and additional sittings are required in Trinity Church, Dorchester. In order to this, a large chancel is to be built, which will add to the beauty of the building. This work is to be proceeded with immediately. An effort is being made to procure a large and handsome organ for this church. Nor is Sackville behind hand in this work of love. St. Paul's church is to be newly roofed and painted. New books are to be provided for the Westcote Sunday School, and about \$120, partly raised in Dorchester, is to be expended in repairs on the parsonage. Notwithstanding these local expenses, I am glad to be able to report an increase in the contributions to this Society. The amount is at present \$165, and I hope to make it more."

SAINT ANDREW.—Mr. George D. Street, Secretary of this Committee, reports the amount of contributions as \$120. A considerable sum is still required towards the fund for the completion of the Parish Church. This, it is to be regretted, has again prevented larger offerings in aid of the Society.

On the 1st April last, Rev. Ranald E. Smith resigned his duties as Assistant Minister, having accepted the rectorship of St. George. Mr. Smith had endeared himself very much to the parishioners, who parted from him with great regret. His place is supplied at present by Mr. Francis Partridge, of Saint Augustine's, Canterbury, who has charge of the Grammar School; and being a champeok for holy orders, renders great assistance to the Rector, as lay reader at Chamcock. Mr. Partridge's acquirements in music are of the greatest value in connection with the choir of the Parish Church, of which he has kindly taken charge.

SAINT DAVID.—Rev. J. S. Thomson writes that the amount of contributions will be about \$80, which he intends to increase, if possible.

SAINT GEORGE, PENNFIELD, POPOLOCAN, &c.—Rev. Ranald E. Smith, who, since the 1st of April last, has been appointed to the charge of this important Mission, has inclosed the following report:—

"This Local Committee beg to express their continued interest in the affairs of the Diocesan Church Society. They look upon it as the main stay of the Church in this Diocese. Their contributions would, most likely, have been larger, had not the parishes suffered from the want of the ministrations of our Church for the greater part of the past year. A balance of \$120, due to the late Rector, had to be made up; and a parsonage also is in course of erection, the contributions to which have somewhat conflicted with the collections for the Society. The Committee respectfully ask aid for this purpose. They do so with more confidence, as it is their first application for any grant, and they have always manifested a willingness to contribute to the funds of the Society."

"This Committee cannot meet, for the first time, since their late respected Rector, Rev. John McGivern, has been summoned to join the church triumphant, without bearing testimony to the deep interest and unselfish labor which he always bestowed in forwarding the objects of the Diocesan Church Society, and the loving memory in which his name is still held."

Contributions are much larger than those of last year—being in all, \$161.53.

SAINT JAMES.—Rev. W. Armstrong reports contributions to the amount of \$150; and he adds, it is hoped from what may be yet collected, that the amount will not be less than it was last year.

SAINT MARK.—Mr. C. H. Fairweather, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$319.

SAINT PAUL.—Rev. W. H. DeVebor reports contributions to the amount of \$525, and a collection on the day of the Bishop's visitation, amounting to \$28.16, making in all \$553.16, of which \$20 is limited to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

SAINT MART'S, STANLEY.—Rev. W. Jaffrey has much pleasure in reporting \$40.48 as the contribution to the Society, which exceed those of last year.

SAINT STEPHEN.—Rev. J. H. Saurley, in the absence of the Rector, the Rev. E. S. Medley, has kindly exerted himself in aid of the Society, and has forwarded the sum of \$38.08, with a list of subscribers.

SHEDIAC.—Rev. G. J. Jarvis, D. D., has inclosed a list of contributions amounting in all from Shediac, Dundas, &c., to \$55*.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield has inclosed the following report: "The annual record of a clergyman's labors in a parish like this has little novelty. The main features are these—travelling about fifty miles a week, three services each Sunday, and one during the week, with visits to the sick and whole. During the last year I had thirty-three baptisms, seven marriages, and seven burials. Elements of change, indeed, are always at work, but for the most part the changes are so gradual as to be almost imperceptible. Our duty is that of diligent and prayerful labor. We sow good seed in faith and hope, sometimes weeping, sometimes rejoicing. My parishioners are plain, imperfectly educated folks, who have to work hard to earn a living, but many of them are shrewd and thoughtful. They are rustic in attire and manner, but sincere and true in their attachment to their church. With little to give, they give what they can without grudging. They have few words of commendation, but they are grateful for holy ministrations. I would that in each church and at each station there could be a service each Sunday instead of each alternate Sunday. This would prevent Sundays being spent uselessly, if not injuriously, and it would guard those who do not decidedly belong to us, against the temptation of going to hear any self-authorized teacher who may find his way into the neighborhood. It is a practical question affecting every rural parish in the Diocese, whether laymen, authorized by the proper authority, might not be usefully employed in reading at least the service. I am thankful that unbroken health is still mercifully continued to me, and I pray that the Divine blessing may abundantly prosper all my labors.

"O for more of the true apostolic spirit—that love to Christ and love for souls which will make us willing to impart, not the Gospel only, but also our own souls, for our people, because they are dear unto us."

Contributions amount to \$80.

SPRINGFIELD.—Rev. G. Rogers writes as follows: "I have paid to the Treasurer \$86, on account of the contributions from this Mission, which I hope will amount, when completed, to at least \$80.

"With regard to my report there is nothing special to communicate to the Society. There has been the usual amount of work as that of former years. It is with much pleasure that I have witnessed, in one part of my Mission, the steady increase of a congregation of devout worshippers. Nearly three years ago I commenced a service in a school house at Centreville. The number was small; not large enough to justify me in giving more than an occasional service. From a request made to me by a few persons, I consented to give an afternoon service on every third Sunday. The result has been during these three years a steadily growing number of earnest, and I trust, sincere worshippers. The school house, which is rather over the ordinary size of such buildings, is always so crowded at the time of my reaching it, that I often find it difficult to elbow my way through to the desk. The last Sunday that I officiated there, several persons were unable to gain admission. I have urged upon them the necessity of erecting a suitable building. I earnestly hope, therefore, that during the next winter a frame will be got out for a church, and that another

summer will afford us the opportunity of assembling in a building at least comfortable during hot days, such as the past few Sundays have been.

"I regret to say that one of my Sunday Schools has lost an able and valuable teacher. When I reported last year that one of my schools owed its efficiency to the zeal of two young churchmen, I little thought that one of them would be taken from us so soon. George Northrop was among the number confirmed by the Bishop two years ago. I am only too happy to say that his outward demeanor was exemplary. A frequent recipient of the Holy Communion, a constant and devout attendant at the means of grace, and a useful member of the church, makes our loss the more severe. An only child, his departure hence in peace, has afforded comfort and consolation to his surviving parents, and left an impression of consistency and uprightness in his Christian walk, which I trust will lead all who knew him, to pray that God would give us grace so to follow his good example, that we may be partakers of Christ's heavenly kingdom for Jesus Christ's sake."

STUDHOLM.—Rev. R. Simonds reports that contributions amount to \$75, and writes as follows:—

"Since the arrangement made last year, and the liberal appropriation by the Society, Divine service has been held regularly every Sunday, in the church at Studholm, with but two exceptions,—one caused by a violent snow storm, and the other by a misapprehension regarding the appointment. The people value the services, and are anxious to have them continued. An occasional service has also been held in a school room six miles from the church.

"On the 1st October the Bishop visited the parish, and though the weather was cold and wet, all the candidates, numbering sixteen, were present, and received that holy rite. Two adults were also baptized by the Bishop.

"Some improvement has been made in the Studholm Church. A neat font has been procured, and chairs for the chancel—all from the offerings of the congregation at the time of Divine service.

"As Missionary of the Diocesan Church Society, assisting the hard working and esteemed Rector of Sussex in the three parishes of Studholm, Sussex, and Havelock, the duties performed by me, have, of course, been many more than when I officiated in Studholm only; yet I have been, thank God, quite equal, physically, to the work, and have not been obliged to omit any duty on account of illness during the year."

SUSSEX AND HAVELock.—Rev. Charles Medley reports contributions to the amount of \$110.13, and that at a meeting of this Committee, held on the 22d instant, resolutions were passed urging the wants of the Mission of Sussex, Studholm, and Havelock, and requesting a continuance of the grant of \$300 to the said Mission, and also asking for a grant in aid of the parsonage now building in Sussex.

Mr. Medley has forwarded a very full and interesting report of his labor in this Mission, of which the following are abstracts:—

"A year has now passed since I commenced my duties as Rector of Sussex. Through the generosity of the Diocesan Church Society, the valuable services of the Rev. R. Simonds were secured in July last, which has enabled me to keep open for Divine service, every alternate Sunday, the churches of Sussex, Portage, and Havelock, distant from the parish church 16 and 25 miles. I believe that previous to this arrangement these two churches were served once a month. This benefit of more frequent service, has been derived by the aid of this Society, for which the people are, I trust, not ungrateful. At Havelock, in September last, the Bishop confirmed seven persons. This number seems small; but all the candidates manifested their desire to fulfil their solemn vows, by partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ at the Lord's Table the same day.

"During the past winter, we have not been free from the trials and difficulties which ever meet the Missionary in the discharge of his duty. Snow drifts and rain storms have not been wanting; and at times it has almost been impossible to complete the journeys; yet, with one exception, I have not failed to

keep my appointments; and Mr. Simonds, who has taken one half the duty at those distant churches, has only failed on two occasions. By these regularities, the people are led to see that we are not unwilling to deny ourselves for their good, and I hope that our labours have not been without success. On two occasions, I regret to say, that at Havelock we were obliged to omit the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, from 'lack of company.' This may be excused, by the great distance at which many of the communicants live from the church. They number twenty-six, out of a congregation of seventy church people. Out of four offertory, we have been enabled to purchase a carpet for the Chancel, a Fout, and Glastenbury Chair.

"At Sussex Portage, though the numbers are small, and the fruit less apparent, I trust the good seed sown in faith, and in the name of the Lord Jesus, will bear fruit upward in God's good time.

"Dutch Valley is an extensive settlement, mostly inhabited by persons from the North of Ireland. Here the congregation, which have been diminished from the want of services, is becoming steady, and the people are urgent that I should do more than I feel I can undertake. The number of baptisms is increasing fast, and nearly every month show some addition to the number of communicants. Here, too, we have a new Font, the gift of the Bishop; and twice the men have mustered to make the approach to the church more accessible, and remove the unsightly stumps from the now consecrated burying ground. The women also propose that a collection of wool should be made by them, in order to weave a new carpet for the Chancel.

"At the Parish Church the congregations are increasing. Could the present evil of the pew system be removed, I have no doubt whatever that there would be twice as many in church as there now are. A Sunday school has been opened at Sussex with some success. During six months, as the children live at a distance, we are obliged to give up this good work. I hope soon to begin public catechising. The people of Sussex have been very zealous in building a parsonage on the old site, which they hope to complete by the 1st October next. New fences have been put up round the burying grounds of Sussex and Dutch Valley. We hope to commence a new church next year.

"These expenses (which together with the support of the clergyman), are alleged as reasons for giving a smaller amount than I could have wished to the Society. But as all these objects are included among those to which the funds of the Society are devoted, I hope my mention of them will be taken as a proof that we are not forgetful of the claims of the Society upon us. The collections are larger than any hitherto made in the mission.

"On the Festival of Saint Barnabas, the twenty-third anniversary of the Bishop's installation, his Lordship held a confirmation at Sussex, when ten candidates received this holy rite. A large congregation attended, and listened with marked attention to the Bishop's impressive address. This makes twenty one confirmed in this mission during the year; of whom eighteen either have, or will forthwith, become communicants.

"Mr. Simonds, who, apart from his own work at Studholm, has most kindly and willingly given his assistance at Sussex Portage and Havelock, has determined to relinquish his labours in this mission. I trust we may receive the same grant of \$300 for another year.

TRINITY—SAINT JOHN.—Mr. H. W. Frith, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$320.19.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. J. Hanford regrets that, for several causes, he has not been able to complete the collections for the Society. They are reported at present as \$100.

WESTBORLAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss fears that he will not be able to forward as much for the Society as last year. He will send the list of names as soon as the subscriptions are paid. Contributions amount to the same as last year.

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman reports contributions to the amount of \$91.

WOODSTOCK.—Rev. S. D. Lee Street writes that "the new church, to replace the old Parish Church, has been completed. It is not only an ornament to the place, but a credit to those chiefly engaged in its erection. It was consecrated by the Lord Bishop in November last. The cost of the building was about \$2000. Carpeting for the chancel, with matting for the aisles, has been kindly presented by J. Nicholson, Esq. of St. John, and a font by Rev. J. Pearson, of Fredericton. The ladies of the congregation succeeded in procuring a cabinet

organ, and the choir conduct the singing in a very creditable manner. We have now also just received a bell suitable to the church, presented by Norris Best, Esq., who had previously contributed over \$100 towards the erection of the building. Thus the church is fully completed and provided with all that is essential, and is wholly free from debt.

"I regret to say, that from the effects of a serious illness, I have been unable to take any part in the work of my mission for the last five months; but I hope, after a lengthened rest, by the blessing of God, I may be enabled to undertake a portion of the work I have heretofore been accustomed to do.

"The duties of the Parish have wholly devolved upon the Curate—Rev. J. Dinzey—with the aid kindly afforded by the Rectors of Queensbury and Frederickton. As Mr. Dinzey will shortly take charge of the Parish of Richmond, to which he is soon to be appointed, I shall be left alone till after the ordination in September, when the Bishop has promised to send me an assistant. In the mean time I hope my brother clergy will be able to afford me occasional assistance.

"I was obliged to entrust to the ladies the arduous work of collecting the contributions, which has heretofore wholly devolved upon myself. Though the amount falls short of that of last year, this has not arisen from any want of zeal on the part of the Collectors.

"During the past year there has been in this Mission twenty baptisms, eight marriages, seventeen burials, and the usual number of services,—five on every Lord's day, up to the time of my illness; since then three on each Sunday, besides services on Friday evenings and other occasional duties. After Richmond is provided for, there will be still four services required on every Sunday, with extra duties in remote districts during the week."

Contributions amount to \$245.

From the foregoing report it will be observed, that the sum total, which will be exactly stated in the Appendix, will not exceed the entire returns of the past year.

This, then, is what Churchmen are disposed to offer to God for His service, for the maintenance and extension of the Church of Christ. Surely there must be many unaware of the present state of the case in this Diocese—many who are able to give more—many who have not been called upon to give, and who, therefore, have not "come up to the help of the Lord."

The Society has accepted with thankfulness, two bequests of a considerable amount during the past year. One to the amount of \$1,720, from the late Chief Justice Parker; and the other, of \$2,000, from the late Mrs. Rawleigh, of the City of Saint John.

As each anniversary comes round, sad events remind every one connected with the Society, that its work has to be done within a limited time.

Often, a few years ago, in this place, the claims of the Society were earnestly set forth by the late esteemed Rector of Trinity Church. Now his place knows him no more.

Another of our number—one of the most prominent in work for the Society—the late well known and valued Rector of Saint George has, since the last anniversary, been called to his account. And yet one more name is marked from the list of the clergy—that of the Rev. J.

On motion of Mr. Jarvis, this was referred to the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

On motion of the Rev. O. Lee, it was Resolved, That the recommendation of the Executive Committee with reference to publishing certain Minutes of the said Committee, be adopted.

Rev. W. Scovil, from the Committee appointed last year with reference to the employment of a travelling Missionary, submitted a Report, which he read; and on motion of Rev. H. Pollard, the same was referred to the consideration of the Executive Committee.

On motion of the Rev. G. M. Armstrong, the following Resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, by his last will and testament, the Hon. Robt. Parker, late Chief Justice of New Brunswick, deceased, set apart certain bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, bearing date the 3d September, 1856, of which three are conditioned to pay £100 each, and a fourth is conditioned to pay £130, with interest at 5 per cent., for the benefit of such Missions of the Church of England in New Brunswick as his Executors should deem best; and should they make no provision, then to go to the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, for the object of missions in the poorer parishes, on such terms as the Society should direct; and *Whereas* one of the Executors of the said Testator has deceased, without making such provision, and the Hon. Neville Parker, the sole surviving Executor, has communicated to the Lord Bishop of Fredericton that he declines to make such provision, and is desirous of handing over the said Bonds to the said Society, for the purposes contained in the said bequest; and further, that he is ready and proposes to pay over all sums received as interest on the said Bonds since the death of the late Hon. Robert Parker, by his Executors, together with interest thereon, subject to the charge of 5 per cent. commission of the late J. M. Robinson, Esq., thereon as Executor; therefore *Resolved*, That this Society accedes to the proposal of the Hon. Neville Parker, and accepts the said Bonds above mentioned on the terms of the bequest. That the principal sum of £430 secured thereby shall remain invested in the present or some other good and sufficient security, to the use or in the name of

Neville Parker; and that upon the transfer of the said Bonds to the Society, a full release and discharge be given him, as such surviving Executor, from all further claim under the said bequest, and that the Secretary affix the seal of the Society thereto.

On motion of Major Robinson, it was Resolved, That the Executive Committee be empowered, with all convenient dispatch, to call in the sums invested in mortgage securities, for the benefit of the Society, and take such necessary proceedings therefor, as in the opinion of that Committee, or any sub-Committee appointed by them, may be required.

The Lord Bishop read the Missionary Schedule, and the Secretary read a list of applications for grants to this Committee; whereupon, on motion of Rev. Canon Harrison, it was Resolved that a Committee, consisting of Rev. J. J. Hill, Major Robinson, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, with the Officers of the Society, be appointed to report to-morrow evening on the available funds of the Society, the Missionary Schedule, and the several applications.

Major Robinson, from the Committee appointed last evening, submitted a Report to the following effect, which he read.

It was moved by Rev. J. J. Hill, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Justice Allen, and—*Resolved unanimously*, That the Report be received and adopted, and printed under the direction of the Executive Committee.

Moved by Major W. B. Robinson, seconded by W. L. T. Seely, Esq., and resolved unanimously—

Whereas the diminution of the grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in aid of the church in this Diocese, may oblige this Society to withdraw aid to certain Missions, whereby extensive districts will be deprived of the means of grace; therefore

Resolved, That it behoves every member of the church to unite in earnest prayer and every possible exertion to avert such a calamity.

Moved by B. Robinson, Esq., Prov. Treasurer, seconded by H. W. Frith, Esq., and—*Resolved unanimously*, That this Society desires to record an expression of deep regret at the loss sustained by the Church and this Society during the past year by the death of Rev. Canon Gray, D. D., late Rector of Trinity Church, St. John, and also by that of the Rev. J. McGivern, late Rector of St. George.

Rev. B. Shaw gives notice that he will at the next meeting of the General Committee move the following alteration in the Constitution of the Society:

“Rule XII., to substitute after the word “alternately,”

the following: "on the first Thursday in October, and that the fiscal year shall close on the first day of September."

The Lord Bishop left the Chair; and, on motion, Rev. J. J. Hill took the same;

Whereupon it was moved by the Hon. Mr. Justice Weldon, and seconded by B. Robinson, Esq., Prov. Treasurer. That the most cordial thanks of the Meeting be tendered to the Lord Bishop for his kindness in the Chair, and the appropriate address with which he has favored the Meeting this evening.

A REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE
COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY
FOR THE PAST YEAR.

The minutes of the meeting of this Committee held in Fredericton on the 5th July, 1867, were published in the 32d Report (see page 35).

The next meeting of this Committee was held at Saint John on the 2d October, when a statement of the Treasurer's Account, made up to 1st October instant, was received.

A letter was read from this Committee to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, on the subject of the block sum granted by that Society, and asking for a continuance of the same, without diminution, for a further term of years; and it was—*Resolved*, That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to forward the said letter to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

The Lord Bishop read a letter from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, containing a proposal for contributions in aid of Foreign Missions. Suggestions were made by his Lordship, in which the meeting appeared to concur.

Read the following accounts :

Messrs. Chubb & Co., for printing the last Report, amounting to \$120.75.

The Secretary, for incidental expenses, amounting to \$7.86. Ordered that the same be paid.

On motion—*Resolved*, That a Committee, consisting of the Lord Bishop and Mr. Frith, be appointed to ascertain the position of the bequest of the late Hon Chief Justice Parker, contained in the 16th paragraph of his Will; and that the said Committee be requested to communicate with the Executors of the estate of the late Mr. Hanford Bostwick, of Norton, with reference to a bequest made by him in favor of the Society.

The Committee met at Fredericton, in the Madras School, on the 1st January, 1868.

A statement of the Treasurer's Accounts was received, made up to this date.

On motion—*Resolved*, That the Treasurer be requested to prepare the Account C, of Loans and Investments for the current year, agreeably to the form in which it is

printed at page 49 of the 29th Report, and that such form be continued for subsequent statements.

The next meeting of this Committee was at St. John, March 4th, 1868, when a letter was read by the Secretary from Mr. W. Jack, with reference to certain resolutions passed at the last meeting of this Committee, and tendering his resignation as a member of the Loan Committee.

The Secretary also read a letter from Rev. W. Scovil and Mr. B. L. Peters, to the like effect.

On motion—*Resolved*, That the Rev. W. Scovil, Mr. B. L. Peters, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, do form the Loan Committee till the next general meeting of the Society.

The Loan Committee were requested to make the necessary arrangements with the Treasurer for the payments due from the Society till the close of the fiscal year.

Read the following accounts:—

The Lord Bishop, from the Committee appointed with reference to certain bequests of the Society, submitted a report, which he read, and which, on motion, was received.

The Secretary submitted a statement of the Treasurer's Account, and of sums due on the investments of the Society.

It was—*Resolved*, That on the receipt of the bonds and interest, his Lordship the Bishop give a release, under the Seal of the Society, to the Honorable the Master of the Rolls, for the legacy of the late Honorable the Chief Justice, to this Society.

It having been reported to this Committee that the Executors of the late Mrs. Rawleigh were prepared at once to transfer to the Society a mortgage upon undoubted security for the amount of her legacy, and that unless this was accepted, payment would be delayed for at least the period of one year from Mrs. Rawleigh's death; therefore it was *Resolved*, That the Loan Committee be authorized, in this special case, to make arrangements for receiving an assignment of the said mortgage, should the security be considered by them sufficient and a proper investment for the Society; it being understood that the expenses connected with such transfer be borne by the Estate.

This Committee met at Fredericton on the 2d June, when a report of the Loan Committee was submitted and received. It was ordered to be laid before the General Committee.

It was—*Resolved*, That the Treasurer be requested to make out an account of the investments of the Society, as specially held for its various objects as in the 30th Report, page 40, to be submitted to the Auditors, and to be laid before the General Committee at its next meeting.

The Secretary read a statement from the Treasurer's Account, showing a balance in favor of the Society of \$188 at the close of the fiscal year.

Read by the Secretary a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year. It was—*Resolved*, That the same be received, and with an abstract of the minutes of this meeting, be laid before the General Committee.

It was also—*Resolved unanimously*, That it be a recommendation from this Committee to the General Committee, that the minutes of the meeting held at Fredericton on the 1st and 7th January, last, relating to the correspondence between the Lord Bishop and the Loan Committee, as to the investment of the legacy of the late Miss Simonds, and also the minutes of the subsequent meeting with reference to the same subject, be not published in the Annual Report.

It was—*Resolved*, That the Rev. J. J. Hill, Rev. W. H. DeVeber, and Mr. H. W. Frith, be a Committee to make arrangements for the meetings of the Society in St. John.

An account of the Secretary for incidental expenses, up to this date, amounting to \$12.90, were ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at Saint John, in the vestry of St. Mark's Church, on Wednesday the 3d July.

An account of the Secretary, for incidental expenses, from 1st June to this date, amounting to \$8.70, was ordered to be paid.

It was—*Resolved*, That 3,000 copies of the Annual Report be printed; and that 12 copies of the Reports from 1860 to 1868, inclusive, be bound; and that the Rev. W. H. DeVeber, Mr. H. W. Frith, and Mr. G. Sidney Smith, be a Committee to assist the Secretary in that duty.

Resolved, That Rev. W. Scovil, Mr. W. M. Jarvis, and

Mr. B. L. Peters, be the Loan Committee for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That all bonds, mortgages, debentures, and other securities belonging to the Society, be deposited in the Bank of New Brunswick, in a box for that purpose, and that the Treasurer and Chairman of the Loan Committee shall have sole access to the same, and that all securities be submitted annually to the inspection of the Auditors, who shall report thereon.

Resolved—That the Loan Committee be authorized to enforce payment of all mortgage securities now over due, and to take all proceedings, in their opinion, necessary therefor.

The matter of the special funds invested, having been referred by the General Committee to this Committee, it was—*Resolved*, That they be permitted to remain as reported by the Auditors, irrespective of accumulation of interest; but that, in future, the interest of such funds be used for annual expenditure, under the several heads, such amounts being, if necessary, supplemented from the general funds of the Society; but if such expenditure for any special fund be not voted, the simple interest of the said original fund taken from the annual income, shall be carried to the credit of the same.

The Secretary brought under the consideration of the Committee, the report to the General Committee with reference to the appointment of a Travelling Missionary; and it was—*Resolved*, That the matter be referred back to the Committee appointed last year on the subject, and that they be requested to take steps to raise the required funds by the means of the Sunday School children in the Diocese, and to report on the subject at the next meeting of the General Committee.

The Secretary was requested to procure the requisite blank forms for notices of the meetings of this Committee.
