CONVENTIONS AND REGATTA

Trysting City Follows up the Policy of Hospitality

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WANT A \$2 IMPORT DUTY.

Ontario Lumbermen Petition the Government for Reciprocity of Treatment in Lumber. Toronto, March 28, 1898. Hon. Sir R. J. Cartwright, Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

My Dear Sir,—I desire to address you in regard to the lumbering industry of Ontario at the present time, as affected by the passage of the Dingley Bill in the United States last season.

The lumbermen at Ottawa, asking that an import duty be charged upon lumber and it appears strange to those who are not familiar with conditions that exist through the Dingley Bill, that those who have hitherto been what are known as free traders should now ask that an import duty should be placed upon lumber coming into this country from the United States.

Ontario Government's Action. The Ontario Government after due consideration and notice to all interested, did pass legislation meeting the wishes of the lumbermen who desired that, so long as the Dingley Bill remained, logs cut under license should be manufactured in Canada.

Development Statutes Desirable. I believe it to be the advantage of nearly everyone interested in the lumbering industry of Canada that we should have reciprocal trade relations with the United States in that commodity, and with the United States that they should procure their supply of lumber from Canada.

C.P.R. Will Meet the Government. If the Government, of which you are a distinguished member, will grant the petition of the lumbermen for an import duty of \$2 on lumber, it will be a great benefit to the lumbering industry of Ontario.

EXPERIENCE IN GOLD LAND.

Letter Written at the Mouth of the Stikine River.

Town of Wrangell Having a Boom—The McKenzie-Hank Vangard—Several Cases of Freezing—One Man Whose Feet Dropped Off—Men, Horses, Dogs, Oxen and Goats on the Trail. Stikine Island, Mouth of Stikine River, March 6.—(Special Correspondence to the World.)—Since my last letter, sent you a few days after Christmas, the town of Wrangell has taken a wonderful boom. Real estate is changing hands at high figures, and land "jumping" is rampant. Every steamer arriving discharges crowds of passengers, supplies, horses and dogs. Sleeping room is at a premium, and room to pitch a tent hard to get. Buildings are being rushed up in all directions, and are rented before finished at surprising high figures. For instance, Mr. McKinnon, one of the leading merchants of Wrangell, rented a common store for the building of the company for \$500 per month. This will give your readers a slight idea of the boom that has struck this part of Alaska.

The Bush of Miners. As regards the eager miners, who are now trying to reach the gold fields via the Stikine River route, I am in a position to speak, having been on this island for the last seven weeks in the interests of the company which has the island. All passengers intending to go up the Stikine have to take a draft steamer at Wrangell, so as to reach this island, where the tide keeps the lower end free from ice, about half a mile up the island the ice can be taken. The first parties to arrive reached here about the middle of January, and since then they have been arriving thicker and faster, until at the present date I think there are at least one thousand men with outfits on the river between here and the Big Bend. While the ice is melting while camped on the island are at least five hundred more, and there are between five and six hundred more at Wrangell, which number is being augmented each day by the many that are coming from the coast. Two or three of which arrive daily.

Man-Mckenzie Vangard. To-day four steamers arrived here, one of which was the Vangard, the McKenzie and McKenna's party. There is also here Captain Armstrong's party of forty men, seventy men, and a number of supplies. Captain Armstrong is intending to haul his outfit up the river by steam power. He has a heavy engine and long steel cable. This cable he will run out ahead, take a snub on some convenient tree and steam up the river, haul engine and supplies up to the snubbing point. So that no time may be lost, he intends to travel day and night, and takes an electric light plant for the purpose of illuminating the river ahead at night. Captain Armstrong carries the necessary machinery for three steamboats on Lake Tetlin.

Ready for a Start. The Klondike Mining and Transport Corporation are now ready to start the first party up the river, and have many tons of supplies, tents, sleighs, etc., also forty men and forty horses on the island. Private parties are arriving and starting up the Indian canoe and steamboat. They have, of course, supplies, some only a ton, others with a ton and a half, each, some trust to their own muscles, others to horses, oxen, dogs or goats. For those who intend hauling their supplies by hand it will be a long and tedious journey. Take as an illustration the case of a man with, say, 1000 pounds of food, tools, clothes, etc. in his outfit, not pull more than 250 pounds on an average; sometimes, of course, he may haul more, and sometimes less, it depends on the condition of the trail; but 500 pounds will be fair allowance for one man. He will have to run four trips of five miles and return to get his outfit; that is to say, he will have to cover forty miles to make five miles of progress, which would take him two days, doing his twenty miles a day, or two months of thirty days each to Telegraph Creek. So you will see that it is no Sunday school picnic sliding up the Stikine with an outfit.

Every boat that reaches the island is crowded with horses, cattle, dogs and eager miners, and the costumes are as varied as the faces, to begin at the top, caps of all sorts, fur, principally of the heavy, fluffy description, reminding me of a line in one of Kipling's poems: "Ere's to you fuzzy-wuzzy with your fur hat and your fur coat." Then fur jackets, Mackinaw coats, buckskin coats, conyform coats and canvas coats—ditto as to the trousers—long rubber boots, moccasins, sheepskins, in fact, every description of foot gear. The female prospectors, of whom at least eight have gone up the trail, dress so nearly similar to the men that it is hard to tell them at a distance apart.

Several cases of freezing have occurred. Two weeks ago a man arrived down from the mouth of the Stikine with his toes with the toes of both feet frozen, and mortification having set in, the doctor who is accompanying Captain Armstrong's outfit amputated his feet. Last night another man arrived from what is called the "Barley Cache," a sleigh pulled by two Indians, and a white man can do when he is obliged, I will give you his story, to show you what I mean. He told me he stopped until he could get away in the boat for Wrangell this morning. "I left my cabin about 12 miles below the mouth of the canyon, at 2 o'clock on
