BY THE YUKON TO FOURTEEN!

Senate Hoisted Government's Yukon Bill With Much Emphasis.

RED CHAMBER FILLED TO ITS CAPACITY.

Hon. David Mills Made a Splendid Effort on the Government's Behalf—The Debate in the Upper House was Mope Argumentative and of a Higher Standard Than That in the Commons—Analysis of the Vote—Scenes and Incidents Around the Buildings.

Ottawa, March 30.—(Special).—The scene in the Senate Chamber to-night will long be remembered as of historic interest.

It is a long time since the galleries of the Red Chamber have been as crowded as they were on this evening.

The last part of the debate was well worth listening to, for Hon. David Mills' speech was by far the best defense of the Government's Yukon Railway policy which has been heard in either House.

The vote was taken about 10 o'clock, and the result was rather a surprise, both on account of the fulness of the vote—66 voting out of a House of 79—and of the large majority against the bill; in fact, indeed, than was expected.

One of the incidents of the evening was the action of Mr. Wark, the Nestor of Parliament, rising from the seat which he occupied at the clerk's table, and going over to the Minister of Justice to congratulate him on his able speech.

Mr. Dever of St. John, who has been particularly obstreperous during the debate, received the vote and some of the "cheer" which was sounded through the chamber when Mr. Dobson, the only Conservative who voted against the amendment, rose in his seat.

Sixty-six members of the Upper House voted. Included in the majority were two Liberals—O'Donoghue and Boulton—while the minority included only one Conservative—Dobson—as already stated.

Sir Frank Smith, however, was paired as voting with the Government. The pairs were: Hon. D. Ferguson with Sir Frank Smith, Sir Wm. Hingston with Alfred Thibaudeau, Hon. D. McInnes with Mr. Reesor, Hon. Mr. Kirchoff with Mr. Lovett.

The absentees unpaired were: Macfarlane, Elie, Sanford, Sutherland—four—with two vacancies, and the Speaker not voting. The full membership of the Senate, 81, is thus accounted for.

In the Commons the day has been very much like a lady's letter, the most interesting part of the proceedings being the postscript, or last clause, moments before adjournment, when Sir Richard Cartwright, in reply to a question by Mr. Macleod, stated that the budget speech had in connection with the West Indian sugar trade.

Sir Richard's reply is regarded here as indicating that the country's tenders had made a change in the sugar trade, possibly by a slight increase in duty on raw sugar, by a rebate of 25 per cent. on sugar imported direct from the British West Indies.

It is expected that an announcement will be made in both Houses to-morrow night. The Liberals are breathing out "threatenings and slaughter" against the Upper House, but the Senators, who know well the country is at their backs.

The concluding speeches of the Yukon debate in the Senate were characterized by ability and much of the second reading of the bill. Senator Prinsloo led off with a rattling arraignment of the Government's policy.

Senator Sullivan, admitting the seriousness of the situation, maintained, still that its duty was to save the country from the consequences of a monstrous bargain.

Senator O'Donoghue said the contract, however every description of the biggest steels ever perpetrated upon the people of Canada. As a Liberal, he was utterly opposed to the measure and would vote against it.

Senator Macleod, P.E.I., said he intended voting against the bill, because he considered the bid grant out of all proportion to the cost of the railway construction.

Senator Cox's Rejoinder. Senator Cox replied to the reports that he was at all interested with Messrs. McKenzie and Mann in the contract. He defended the contract, and argued that every citizen of Canada would be benefited by the development which the contractors would bring about.

Coming to the question, Senator Cox said the Senate was assuming a serious responsibility in refusing to ratify this bill. There was nothing in the bill which the Senate taking out of the hands of the Government.

Continuing, Senator Cox said he had to regret today that he had become one of a syndicate which opposed the construction of the C. P. R. He now knew that had the syndicate of which he had been a member succeeded in what they had tried to do they would have done the country an

WANT A \$2 IMPORT DUTY.

Ontario Lumbermen Petition the Government for Reciprocity of Treatment in Lumber. Toronto, March 28, 1898. Hon. Sir R. J. Cartwright, Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

My Dear Sir,—I desire to address you in regard to the lumbering industry of Ontario at the present time, as affected by the passage of the Dingley Bill in the United States last season.

The lumbermen at Ottawa, asking that an import duty be charged upon lumber and it appears strange to those who are not familiar with conditions that exist through the Dingley Bill, that those who have hitherto been what are known as free traders should now ask that an import duty should be placed upon lumber coming into this country from the United States.

Ontario Government's Action. The Ontario Government after due consideration and notice to all interested, did pass legislation meeting the wishes of the lumbermen who desired that, so long as the Dingley Bill remained, logs cut under license should be manufactured in Canada.

Development Statutes Desirable. I believe it to be the advantage of nearly everyone interested in the lumbering industry of Canada that we should have reciprocal trade relations with the United States in that commodity, and with the United States that they should procure their supply of lumber from Canada.

C.P.R. Will Meet the Government. If the Government, of which you are a distinguished member, will grant the petition of the lumbermen for an import duty of \$2 on lumber, it will be a great benefit to the lumbering industry of Ontario.
