COVERED BY TWO MANITOBIANS

Harvesters en Route to Manitoba Became a Roystering Mob, Defying Peace.

Port Arthur, Aug. 29.—The Chronicle says to remark: The crowd of harvesters from the maritime provinces made plenty of doing on their way to Manitoba, but they behaved themselves nicely when within easy reach of the law's arm.

An old gentleman conducting a trading post at Heron Bay appointed two husky Chippewas to protect his emporium. The aborigines, armed with Winchester repeating rifles, stood on each side of the doorway leading to the post, presenting a formidable front to the surging mob of harvester-hunters.

At one point a bridge gang, making repairs, sat on the ground, and the "blue noses" as the tramps passed by.

The "blue noses" spied the men as the train approached the bridge, and prepared for sport by securing some long poles which they had in the cars. The train police saw the sportive harvesters poking them with the sticks, forcing them to jump into the water of the lake.

The windows of outlying stations were smashed and other damage done. The cars in which the outfit traveled were almost wrecked. Lamps were pulled from their fastenings, broken and windows smashed.

WHY OUR PARCEL POST IS NOT EUROPEANIZED.

The people of Canada have often wondered why the Postmaster-General of this country has not extended our parcel post system on the lines that now obtain in Great Britain and in most European countries.

Let us always praise our great American nation and rejoice in our superiority to the whole world. But let us not lose sight of certain important details.

For instance, one difference between the government of Great Britain and the government of the United States is this: The government of Great Britain is really run in the interest of the public, financially and otherwise.

If you doubt this statement, study an arrangement which Great Britain has just completed for sending parcels to the United States through the postoffice.

All over England parcels are sent thru the postoffice at a nominal rate, much to the advantage of commerce and of private economy.

Such an arrangement would exist in this country except for the fact that it would wipe out the enormous profits that come from the extortionate charges of express companies.

The government of Great Britain has just completed an arrangement for extending its parcel post system to the United States. Do you know how it has done that?

It has done it by an arrangement with the people of the United States, the American government or the American postoffice, but by an arrangement with the American Express Company.

The British sends his parcel thru the British postoffice. It reaches the United States, is taken in hand by a private express company and forwarded to its destination.

An Englishman can send a three-pound package from London to Chicago for twenty-four cents. An American waiting for our mail to take shelter under the Maple Leaf of the British West Indies acknowledges the same sovereignty.

But we must look even farther seaward. We must cast our vision to the south, where rest tropical lands of America waiting for our mail to take shelter under the Maple Leaf of the British West Indies.

CONSOLIDATE BRITISH AMERICA. With pleasure The World prints in another column a letter from a well-known Torontonian on "Canadian Expansion." He believes in an ultimate consolidation of all sections of British America, and urges that Canada should without delay take steps towards bringing into the Canadian federation Newfoundland, the British West Indies and British Guiana.

well-finished cattle of the same weight bring three dollars a hundredweight more in Chicago than in Toronto, and a comparison of quotations on the two markets will show an average difference of between \$2 and \$3 in favor of the city at the foot of Lake Michigan.

We also observe that the Toronto hog market holds its own with the Chicago hog market. Live hogs bring here as good prices here as in the Armour yards.

In Chicago both cattle and hogs are absorbed by the dead meat trade. In Toronto all hog receipts are looked after by pork packing enterprises, but the cattle bought here for export purposes are shipped alive.

The question that naturally arises is: If the dead meat trade were established in Toronto on a sufficiently large scale, would prices of cattle in Toronto, like the prices of hogs here, approximate Chicago figures?

We recall that some months ago Hon. G. W. Ross talked of bonusing an Ontario dead meat trade, but no steps have yet been taken by anyone to earn the bonus.

Now what is the reason for the disparity in Toronto and Chicago prices for cattle? And would the establishment of a dead meat trade here help the situation?

We invite communications and general discussion on the subject.

WATCHING THE THERMOMETER. Friday's news from Winnipeg that the thermometer was rapidly falling caused not a little anxiety in Toronto and at other eastern points.

Editor World: I write to ask you if the time is not ripe for Canada to take active steps towards the complete unification of British America.

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The World has advocated this all-British-American idea before, and as late as Aug. 10 we urged commercial as well as sentimental arguments in support of the proposal.

It is not difficult to deduce reasons why each section of British America would be materially benefited by close political and trade relations. In the first place, Newfoundland, besides being the key to the St. Lawrence, possesses natural resources, the value of which would be enhanced by union with Canada.

Then, as for British Guiana and the British West Indies, these areas are populous and wealthy; they export what we import, and import what we export. The mutual benefits that would follow a freer interchange of products are apparent. The West Indies are suffering just now from commercial depression, due to European bounty-free sugar, and this would be an opportune time for Canada to show them sympathy and draw their attention to the advantages of union with the Dominion.

The Dominion of Canada, expanded to include all British America, would embrace the torrid as well as the frigid and temperate zones. She would produce nearly everything produced on earth, and would be thus more than self-supporting and self-sufficient.

As remarked in these columns before, the all-British-American exposition to be held in Toronto in 1903 should render the different portions of the empire on this continent better acquainted commercially, and that exhibition should be made part of a campaign looking to ultimate political confederation of all concerned.

TORONTO'S TRIUMPH OF ART

Annual Exhibition Will Open Monday With Many Superior Attractions in the Various Lines.

QUAINT FEATURES FOR THE CROWDS Much to Please and Interest in the Splendid Buildings on the Spacious Grounds.

With a dash and a roar the finishing touches are being put on what promises to be the most splendid Exhibition Toronto has ever supplied the multitude.

Those in control predict that all will be in readiness to receive the crowd of sight-seers Monday, but the avenues are still littered with the evidence of the painters and the mechanic.

The grounds will be strictly closed to the public for the next two days to give the artisans a better opportunity to make their final preparations.

Already the green carpet along the lake front is being prepared for the closing touch of the landscape gardener, and the great canvas settings for the Kiralfy spectacular with its chorus of 800 trained voices.

The clatter of the carpenters' tools, the clang of the machinery, the neighing of the horses, the roar from the wild animals and the voices of the chorus girls being recruited at the present almost grotesque.

Exhibits are numerous. But the substantial evidence of what the big show will resemble when the gates are thrown open Monday are sufficiently numerous to indicate to even the novice that a splendid Exhibition has been planned.

But the exhibits are more numerous, more elaborate and more diversified than at any previous exhibition. The history of machinery has never had so many exhibits, and so many countries represented as to-day.

The live stock entries have reached the highest mark ever, and even the Midway "daze" is a piece of lined and color—better provided with attractions than usual.

The practical, the indifferent and the casual observer—all will find much of interest in the present exhibit. Art Hall is a dream of colors and beautiful things, and the final touches will present a scene of grandeur seldom exposed in this part of the country.

In contradistinction to this entrancing spectacle is the Museum of Mechanical Arts, presenting a picture to the eye of the inventor and the student of industrial mind equally absorbing.

From Jamaica is a quantity of fruits, minerals, and the surprises and delights the average individual. From Trinidad the things in bottles, jars, packages and bulk are enormous. An imitation Panama hat, made by the show time display, is really a fine article and sells for 75 cents.

Floral Hall. Floral hall is sufficiently attractive to engage the attention of a large crowd. The plants are in fine condition, and the display is gorgeous in the extreme.

From the variegated colors of the palm garden to the cool of the green area, surrounding the arch is but a step, and the combination is exceedingly pleasing.

Improvements in the grandstand, numerous, and will prove very popular. Fifteen 2000 candle power lights have been arranged on top of the grandstand instead of beneath it, as of former years. This arrangement is enough to produce the Kiralfy spectacular performance in the best possible way.

But joy of joys—the Midway! This bit of color exceeds in dazzling proportions anything previously attempted in this line in Toronto. The original "rube," will drift over the grounds and direct the throng toward the various exhibits.

The "Haunted Chamber," the "Palace of Pleasure," the "Giant of the North," "Wild Animal Shows," the "Fire-Eating Devil," the "Mystic Maid," and an innumerable number of other attractions, are all in evidence.

The real attraction of the Midway, however, will be the woman swimming champion of the world—Cora Beckwith. For this entertainment, the swimming pool, with a capacity of 40,000 gallons, has been dug. Miss Beckwith has been a champion swimmer for many years, exhibiting all over Europe and other sections of the world.

She will hold her record during the exhibition, where any ladies desiring to profit by her knowledge of the art, which she has developed to a high degree, will be given the benefit free of expense.
