**WINTER WILL BRING SUFFERING TO THIS CITY'S UNEMPLOYED**

Methods of Immigration Partly to Blame—What Relief Officials Say.

That Toronto will be called upon to assist the poor in a large number of ways, even tho' the city is enjoying a season of prosperity, is already a foregone conclusion, judging by the consensus of opinion of all the charitable organizations actively interested. The chief causes seem to be a great loss of money to the laborer, resulting from the prolonged strikes this summer and the flooding into the city of immigrants from all parts of the Dominion, who arrived from the Old Country during the summer. To emphasize the point, the city is already a foregone conclusion, judging by the consensus of opinion of all the charitable organizations actively interested.

Perhaps the most serious problem that will tax the ingenuity of those interested with the welfare of the unemployed is the ill-prepared in every way to combat a cold Canadian winter. Their clothes are made of light fabrics, and hardly any who are now without work wear flannels or underclothing.

The rather startling statement was made yesterday by a man who is in close touch with the situation in the streets looking for work. The number is likely to be increased, according to the judgment of the same gentleman. This morning there are many Italian laborers and railroaders who have recently been discharged at this point, but the largest number is made up of those who immigrated from the Old Country and, having gone west during the busy season, return here with the view of securing permanent employment. The majority of these, however, are not of the type to succeed very quickly, and it is to be expected that many interested in relief work that they should not have been encouraged to come to this country.

**Many Sad Cases.**

Already many sad cases are coming under the notice of the laborer and other different societies. Married men with two and three children have been tramping the streets, looking for suitable employment. The statement is freely made by them that there are some jobs available, but the salaries attached would not keep one person alive. Four dollars a week is a wage generally offered to men who are not of the type to succeed very quickly, and it is to be expected that many interested in relief work that they should not have been encouraged to come to this country.

**St. George's Society Head.**

The St. George's Society has probably the largest number of the English immigrants than any other charitable institution. It is stated there were 23,000 men who arrived in the city in the last month, and that the number of men who are now without work is being distributed daily, and information as to the best means of obtaining employment. The applicants are for the most part laborers, who are better known in the Old Country, and who do not take kindly to it here. When they are asked to do so, they are unable to answer at present. They have started the Friday night school, and already the numbers in attendance are growing rapidly. Some of the men have gone back home on board cattle ships, and many others are being shipped to other parts of the country. The \$150 necessary before being allowed to go aboard. They borrow money or had it given them by the City Relief Department. But now that navigation has about stopped, the purpose of the ship is to have either got to work or undergo severe hardships.

**YORK COURTS AND SUBURBS**

Interest in County Model Schools is Falling Off, Says Inspector Fotheringham.

**RE SUBURBAN POLICE PROTECTION**

Councillors object to spending \$147 in safe-guarding Residents of the Suburbs.

The York County councillors continued their November session at the old Court House yesterday, and will be in session until the end of the week. The Board of Audit presented its report, which shows that only \$147 was paid for special constabulary service in patrolling the suburbs of Toronto. Even this amount was objected to by some of the Council, who thought it was too much to spend, councillor Evans argued that there were very many persons roaming around the city, shooting at birds, and when they are no birds they shoot at cats. He thought life ought to be made safe in the suburbs, and considered the money well spent. The auditors are of the opinion that there is no necessity for attendance of constables on rounds in city cases, and deducted \$250 from the account of Constable James, who acted in the MacIntyre case, in which there were several adjournments. His bill amounted to \$72.50. The Council did not sustain this action of the auditors, and said that magistrates had the right to send a constable, and when he is sent he should be paid.
