

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

The Temporal Committee of Knox Church, Ottawa, Year ending 31st Dec'r. 1871.

At the close of another year, your Committee beg leave to submit their usual annual Report and Account.

The following synopsis and comparative statemeet will exhibit more clearly the financial condition of the Congregation, viz.:

From the above statement it will be seen that the Finances of the Congregation are in a sound and healthy condition. Ordinary Revenue shows an increase over last year of \$104 61, and special collections \$116 47, while the current expenses have decreased \$71 37. All the accounts for the year have been paid. and the Temporal Committee for 1872 will begin their labors with the sum of \$85 36 in the hands of your Treasurer. Your Committee feel that this state of things is indeed a matter for congratulation and of sincere thankfulness, in view of the labors and trials of the past, and of encouragement for the large and important undertaking before us in the future.

Your Committee feel, however, that although much has undoubtedly been done, there still remains much to be done. It has ever been a matter of deep regret that so large an amount of arrears should be carried on from year to year. According to last year's report, there was outstanding the sum of \$536 77. Of this amount your Committee has received only th small sum of \$106 80, leaving still unpaid \$429 97 When to this is added the arrears of 1871, amounting to \$288 31, we have the large sum of \$599 97 still unpaid. The subject is a painful one, and your Committee regret the necessity of alluding to it. They cannot but feel, however, that Members who voluntarily promise to contribute of their means, and yet fail to do so, do serious wrong both to themselves and the temporal prosperity of our Church. Your Committee would fain hope that it may not be necessary again to allude to this unpleasant subject.

In the Report of last year, the retiring Committee alluded to the question of the disposal of the Church Manse, as one which would "in all probability come up for decision at no distant date." Allusion was

also made to the subject of Church extension, and the Members of the Congregation were urged to give it their "earnest and conscientions consideration." In consequence of the above, your Committee felt themselves specially charged to give their attention to the matter, and accordingly at their first meeting they appointed a sup-committee to prepare and report upon a scheme for Church extension. After receiving their report, a meeting of the Congregation was called in the month of April last. At that meeting it was resolved that immediate steps should be taken to secure increased. Church accommodation by the erection of a new Church, and at a meeting held in the month of August last, it was further resolved to secure an eligible site, which it was found could be obtained on the City Hall Square. Your Committee were also authorized to dispose of the Manse on Stewart Street, and apply the proceeds towards the said purchase. In accordance with above, the Manse has been sold, realizing the sum of \$2070, and an eligible site on the corner of Elgin and Albert Streets, has been acquired for the sum of \$4000. On this site there are at present two houses, which were sold at public auction for the sum of \$501.

Prior to the sale of the Manse and purchase of the site, a Finance Committee was appointed to take steps for raising the requisite funds, and the result of their labors shows a subscription list amounting to \$14553. When to this is added the proceeds of the Manse, \$2070, and the houses on the Church site, \$501, we have a total amount of \$17,124. With such a result before them, your Committee felt themselves warranted in proceeding at once with the work, and have secured the services of Mr. Langley, of Toronto, for the purpose of preparing plans. Mr. Langley has visited Ottawa, inspected the site, and received all the required information and instructions. He now reports, that in his opinion, a sufficiently handsome and commodious building (a drawing of

which is now in the hands of your Committee) capable of seating 1150 people, can be erected for the sum of about \$25,000. This would bring the total cost of building and site to about \$30,000, a sum which your Committee consider is fully within the resources and ability of the Congregation.

Thus far has the work of Church extension progressed, and your Committee feel gratified and thankful for the large measure of success which has so far attended their labors, and should the same degree of success continue in the future as in the past, they are confident that within the space of two years, Ottawa will possess another Church in connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church.

Upon one subject more your Committee desire to express their opinion, and it is one personal to our esteemed Pastor, Mr. MacLaren. When Mr. Mac-Laren first came amongst us, he was promised a salary of \$1800 per annum, besides the rental of the Church The Manse having been sold, his income Manse. is thereby reduced by the sum of \$160 per annum. Your Committee would therefore recommend that in order to reimburse him for the loss of that amount, his salary be placed for the future at the sum of \$2000 per annum. Your Committee feel that the prosperous state of the Congregational Finances warrants them in recommending this, and trust that the present meeting will see its way to giving effect to this recommendation.

In resigning office your Committee hope and pray that the Divine blessing may be vouchsafed abundantly to their successors in office, enabling them successfully to advance and perfect the important work entrusted to them; remembering ever that whatever amount of success may have been attained, he honor and glory belongs to Him above, who doeth all things well, and who has so abundantly blessed all bur labors as a Congregation in the past.

LIBRARY.

A good library commends itself to the consideration of every one interested in Sabbath Schools. Our present supply of books is very limited, being far short of the requirements of the School, though volumes have been added to the library during the year, 135. We would earnestly recommend parents to see that proper care is given to the books.

CLASSES.

A year ago, through the want of teachers, our classes only numbered 18. We are glad to say this want is now supplied, and we can report our full compliment, 22.

The teachers, with the assistance of a few kind friends, warmly interested in Sabbath Schools, made a thorough canvass of the City, east of the Canal, for the discovery of children not attending a Sabbath School, and to persuade them, if possible, to do so. The number who have thus joined our ranks, though not large, more than compensates for the trouble.

In conclusion we would earnestly commend the Sabbath School to the attention of the Congregation, and trust that a hearty support may be given to all the schemes connected with so interesting and essential a portion of the Church's work.
