SCHOOLS FOR SOLDIERS

Board of Education is Asked to Place Rooms at Disposal of Militia.

Acting Chief William Smith was nominated for the position of fire chief, head of the fire department, by the board of control at its meeting of the 1916 board of control, which was held yesterday. This was the first action of the mayor in his new capacity, and indeed was the first important order of business for the day.

Mayor Church opened the subject by saying, "Yesterday's fire at the Union Station was fought well, in my opinion." He said there were 18 firemen on duty at the time of the fire, and that the fire had been extinguished exceedingly well during the time Mr. Smith has been acting chief.

REPORT.

REPORT OF THE AUDITORS TO THE SHAREHOLDERS OF THE CANADIAN BANK OF COMMERCE.

In accordance with the provisions of Sub-Sections 19 and 20 of Section 66 of the Bank Act, 1913, we report as follows: We have audited the above Balance Sheet and compared it with the books and vouchers at Head Office and with the certified returns from the branches.

General Manager's Address

The statement presented to you today is a striking illustration of our policy during the year. The net profits amounted to \$2,852,085 95, or 2.5 per cent. upon the moneys which belong to the shareholders of the Bank, that is, upon the total of the paid-up Capital and Reserves.

An Additional Precaution

It is the time-honored custom and expectation of every general manager of a Canadian bank upon first assuming the responsibilities of his position to assume the policy which the value assigned to it in its books and published statements.

No Unnecessary Expenditures

Our Bank Premises Account was as the accounts of Real Estate owned and Mortgages held, remain practically stationary, the general policy of the bank, and not having warranted our undertaking any expenditure on new premises which did not appear to be absolutely necessary.

Strong Cash Reserves

In view of the general situation we have thought it prudent to keep gold in cash reserves, particularly in gold, the medium for the settlement of international transactions, and that of the day might be the more readily available for such purposes.

Current Loans Increase

Total Current Loans show an increase of \$2,087,251, more than anticipated for by an increase of \$3,046,464 in Call and Short Loans due to the policy of keeping our assets in the most liquid shape possible during the present conditions.
