

### REGULATIONS

OF THE

### MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be denominated THE MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY and its object shall be to co-operate with the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

II. Comformably to the principles of the Parent Society, the Bibles and Testaments circulated by this Auxiliary shall be without note or comment.

III. All persons subscribing two dollars or upwards, per annum, shall be members of this Society; or, forty dollars at one time, shall be members for life,

IV. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than twenty members, with power to add to their number. Five members of this Committee shall form a quorum.

V. No lay member of the Society shall be eligible as a member of the Committee, unless he is a Life-member, or pays an annual subscription of at least four dollars.

VI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating persons who have rendered essential services to the Society as Honorary Governors for life.

VII. The Committee shall meet once every month, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

VIII. The whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society, and not required for its own operations, shall from time to time be remitted to the Parent Society.

IX. For the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in their grants for the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to inquire what families or individuals are in want of Bibles and Testaments; and it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them forthwith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

X. A general meeting of the Subscribers shall be held annually at Montreal, when the accounts shall be presented—the proceedings of the past year stated—a new Committee appointed—and a Report agreed upon to be printed under the direction of the Committee, and circulated among the members.

XI. No alterations shall be made in these Laws, except at a general meeting of the Society, called by special notice, to be advertised in two of the Montreal newspapers one month previously.

"That this meeting, humbly thanking God for the increasing circulation of His Word, both in our own country and in foreign lands, and for the continued support which the Society receives, would pray that His Holy Spirit may so bless each copy sent forth that it may extend the Saviour's kingdom on the earth."

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"Encouragement" is the keynote of the Seventy-sixth Annual Report of this Auxiliary. The friends of the Bible Society here cannot indeed rest satisfied with what has hitherto been done, but past evidences that their labour is not in vain stimulate to renewed exertion henceforth.

We are very glad to be able to submit without alteration last year's list of Office-bearers and Agents. But from our General Committee four valued names have been removed by death, those of Canon Henderson, D.D., the beloved and honoured Principal of the Diocesan Theological College, for nearly twenty years at the helm of one of our most important religious institutions, who entered into rest on October 20, 1896; of the Rev. W. J. Smyth, Ph.D., for many years the zealous pastor of Calvin Presbyterian Church; of the Rev. John McGillivray; and of the Rev. A. M. Phillips, B.D., pastor of Douglas Methodist Church, called suddenly home at an early stage of his useful career. We trust than new friends, as earnest and able, may come forward to fill these gaps in our ranks.

The Anniversary Meeting on January 29th, 1896, will always be remembered as one of the most successful ever held in Montreal. The presence of a number of our Colporteurs added to the interest of the proceedings; and the speeches of the Rev. F. M. Dewey and of the Rev. Donald Grant were regarded at headquarters as of such special value in setting forth the purpose and character of the Society's work, that they were reproduced in full in the Bible Society Monthly Reporter.

A very interesting meeting was held on September 28th, 1896, in connexion with the Protestant Ministerial Association, to take counsel with the ministers of Montreal as to our work.

The circulation of the Society's excellent periodicals, especially of Gleanings for the Young, has increased, and we hope it may increase still further. The actual number of Bibles sold is smaller than in some former years, but this fact is far from proving that the Society's influence is decreasing. Its success has, on the contrary, stimulated other people to sell Bibles at low prices, so that the Scriptures have been more widely diffused than ever. Every effort in this direction is a good thing, and at the same time the Bible Society holds its own, and must continue to do so, as selling Bibles of really good quality at the lowest prices.

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We are much indebted to the Editor of the Witness for the regular insertion of our monthly column, which during the last two years has replaced the Monthly Bible Reporter.

The annexed report of our District Secretary, the Rev. Henry Gomery, indicates the unflagging zeal and encouraging success with which his important work has been carried on during 1896.

The operations of the Parent Society have been of peculiar interest lately. We may note particularly the completion of the Bible for Uganda, by Mr. G. L. Pilkington, within twenty years of the arrival of the first missionaries in that wonderful land of Central Africa.

Your Committee has pleasure in recommending that the sum of one hundred pounds be voted to the Parent Society in aid of its general work.

The work of this Auxiliary during 1896 may be thus summarized:—

### I.-FINANCE.

The abstract of the Treasurer's Report of the cash transactions shows the *Total Receipts* (including the balance from last year) to be \$15,715.88, which includes the following special sums:—

From the Parent Society we have again to express our thanks for a grant of \$244.44 for the salary of a French Bible Woman.

Also for a grant of \$236.38 for the value of French Scriptures supplied to Missionary Societies;

A donation of \$40 from the Perth Auxiliary Bible Society;

A donation of \$42 from the Paris Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society;

A donation of \$240 from a lady to pay the salary of a Bible Woman;

A donation of \$100 from Mrs. Redpath towards payment of Bible Women;

A donation of \$198.44 towards the salary of The Hospital Bible Woman from a lady.

The Disbursements amount to the sum of \$15,165.49, in which

\$4717.31 remitted for Scriptures;

\$742.35, value of grants of Bibles and Testaments supplied to Missionary and other Societies;

\$792.43, a donation to the Parent Society; and additional donations from Brockville Branch, \$60 for 1895, and \$60 for 1896, and from Mr. S. Wallace, \$20;

\$2872 paid for salaries of Colporteurs.

\$1640 paid for salaries of Bible Women.

### 2.—ISSUES.

Eighteen thousand, two hundred and twenty-eight copies of the Scriptures have been issued during the past year, namely:—7709 Bibles, 6215 New Testaments, and 4304 Portions, value \$6370.77, in English, French, German and other languages.

The gratuitous distribution has been three thousand, five hundred and ninety-four copies of Bibles and Testaments, value \$742.35.

The following Missionary Societies and others have received grants of Scriptures:—The Presbyterian Board of French Evangelization, the Methodist Missionary Society, the Church of England Sabrevois Mission, the Baptist Grande Ligne Mission, Christian Mission to the Jews, Old Brewery Mission, Ladies' Benevolent Institution, Chinese Mission, Boys' Home (Mountain Street), Iroquois Indians, Miss Barber's School for Hebrew

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Children, Arab and Syrian Immigrants; several grants by Colporteurs in remote country districts, and through Branch Bible Societies.

### 3.—THE REV. H. GOMERY'S REPORT OF THE BRANCH SOCIETIES.

The year 1896 is one to be remembered by all the officers of Missionary Societies on our continent, owing to the great difficulty in meeting their financial pledges through the falling off in contributions; while the demand for still greater endeavours to supply the needs of the nations who know not God are more and more apparent to those who are privileged to live in close communion with Him who commands us to "Disciple all the nations, baptising them into the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

Compared with these, the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society has great cause for thankfulness in the fact that its members and friends have so well maintained their liberal support, notwithstanding the increasing local demands of the various organizations. There is an increased attendance at our meetings. Our Collectors merit our warmest thanks for their earnest and laborious work, while our local officers evidence their interest by their careful appointment of fit collectors, and I am sure our work finds place in their prayers.

Our ministerial friends have responded to our appeals for their co-operation nobly, not only with their presence and noble words, but many a dollar has come from God's servants who had but few left; yet the heart full of sympathy yields more real joy than hoarded money.

I have visited all our working branches and also twelve new places of more or less promise, and I have still invitations to others during the coming year.

With all the many risks of travel, my health has been good, so that I have been enabled to keep all my appointments.

The friends of the Bible Society are as hospitable as ever. To the owners of my many homes I offer my grateful thanks for their kindness. One of the remarkable incidents in the days of the early church was the tribute borne by the pagan lookers-on, "See how these Christians love one another;" and while in the world "the old order changeth," yet the Word declares, "Beloved, thou doest a faithful work . . . toward them that are brethren and strangers withal: who bare witness to thy love before the church: whom thou wilt do well to set forward on their journey worthily of God: because that for the sake of the Name they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles. We therefore ought to welcome such, that we may be fellow-workers with the truth."—III. John, 5-8 (revised version).

Very many of our friends note with pleasure the monthly Bible Society column in the Witness.

We feel that the blessing of the Holy Spirit has indeed rested upon our feeble efforts to glorify His Name and spread the Word of His Grace. To Him with the Father and the Son be all the glory.

### 4.—COLPORTAGE.

The work of the distribution of the Scriptures through Colporteurs has been steadily carried on. Six Colporteurs have been employed by the Society, two English and four French who speak English. Four Colporteurs have been enabled to continue work the whole year, and the other two about seven months each. They have travelled in the following districts, or parts thereof, assigned them:—Missisquoi, Nicolet, Prescott, Huntingdon, Drummond, Bagot, Arthabaska, Beauharnois, Richmond, South Leeds, Brockville and Argenteuil.

They have made the large number of 26,591 visits to families. Further particulars of their work will appear in a tabulated statement on Colportage in the printed Annual Report.

### 5.—MONTREAL LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION.

The seven Bible Women through whom the work of the Ladies' Association is carried on have paid 10,069 visits during the past year. These visits have been made day by day from house to house in the poorer districts of the city, among those who are often in sore need of Christian sympathy and kindly counsel.

Many of the poor, if deprived of the Bible Woman's help, would never hear the message of God's love revealed in His Word.

The work done is quiet and unobtrusive, but who can tell what great results God in His Providence may bring forth from that faithful sowing of the Word. The constant shifting of population, inevitable in great cities, though discouraging to the workers, who must often feel that they are writing their words upon the sand, spreads the truth over larger areas than they themselves can possibly reach, and the harvest, though unseen by them, is sure. The Bible Women need our prayers and sympathy. They are doing the work of Christ Himself when on earth, preaching "the gospel to the poor," going about "doing good," and often their labours meet with as little appreciation as did His.

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Through the liberality of the Parent Society, we are enabled this year to have another Bible Woman labouring among the French population.

To all who realize the importance of this branch of the work this is a cause for deepest gratitude. We have been fortunate in securing the services of a former French Bible Woman, who will thus bring to the work knowledge derived from past experience. The only change we have to report is the resignation of our Bible Woman in South Point St. Charles, who laboured faithfully for so many years in that district, and still shows her continued interest by giving her successor every assistance in her power.

The Association is indebted to the exertions of its Honorary Treasurer, Miss Isabella MacIntosh, for securing the aid of several zealous and efficient Lady Collectors, who have succeeded in reviving the interest of many in the work, and in considerably increasing the amount of the collections. The cordial thanks of the Association are due to these voluntary labourers in the good cause.

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### ISSUES OF SCRIPTURES, 1896.

### SPRING TOUR.

### MAY.

1st.—St. Lambert.—In commencing, after winter is past, on a lovely spring day, hopes and fears for the success of this year's work alternate in one's heart. This first meeting is of happy promise. Christian friends come together to talk over the triumphs of the warfare against ignorance and indifference won by the "Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God." The Rev. Messrs. Dart, Kelly and Watson, representing different schools of thought, harmonized upon the common ground our Bible Society occupies. D. Scott-Bruce, Esq., reported continued prosperity in the work of this good branch society. I hope Conference will place the Rev. E. R. Kelly still within my range of work, amongst the coming changes.

3rd.—Sunday.—English River, Howick and Georgetown.—I preached in each of these churches to large congregations. Our annual report shews the good work of this strong society, formed by the three churches, our dear friend, the Rev. C. McKeracher, the secretary, and the Rev. G. Whillans, with the other officers, render good aid to the society.

4th.—St. Louis de Gonzague.—Our friends met in great force. With us we had a French farmer, who told us the story of a copy of the Scriptures which had caused so great a change in his views that he had severed his relations with the Roman Catholic Church, in which he had been brought up. It was a very manly act on his part to thus acknowledge his gratitude for the Society's work. The Rev. Mr. McCuskar made a spirited appeal, urging his people forward, in their aid to the Society.

5th.— Laguerre.—Meeting assembled in larger numbers than I remember before. The officers were elected, (the secretary for the twenty-fourth time). The collectors reported favorably.

6th.—Dundee.—The Rev. Dr. McDonald presided over a pleasant meeting. Good results of the work of the collectors; an able speech from the pastor.

7th.—Kelso and Kensington.—Met the Society in the Presbyterian Church (whose turn it was this year). The Methodist minister

8th.—Athelstan.—The meeting, under the presidency of the Rev. A. Rowat, was successful, in numbers, interest, and financially; cheering in every way.

9th.—Anderson's Corners.—The old school-house was well filled and great interest shown in the report of your secretary for the past year. Here the younger people are well to the front, an encouraging feature. Good collections.

10th, Sunday.—Huntingdon.—The largest Bible Society meeting for years past in the Methodist church, all the pastors of the village being present. W. S. Maclaren, the president, announced another method of raising funds during the coming year, the result of which I wait with some anxiety.

May 11th.—Ormstown.—The meeting was not large, but considerable interest was shown. Local circumstances had prevented the usual subscriptions being taken up. We trust the coming year may be one of renewed prosperity in this branch.

12th.—Franklin Centre.—It was the turn of the English Church to have the meeting, the Rev. J. W. M. Beattie presiding. Each of the churches here appointed collectors, two of them showed good results, the third, the Rev. Mr. Thomas, will forward later. The Rev. J. Brown, who, according to precedent, would have been the president for the coming year, proposed Mr. Gentle in his place, thus placing a layman in that position.

13th.—Russeltown.—Another local event somewhat depleted our meeting. The Rev. P. Drummond, who was with us, gives us hope of increased prosperity in the coming year. The secretary's report exceeded last year.

14th.—St. Chrysostom.—The usual numbers assembled in the school-house. The report of last year showed a falling off financially, but some changes were made in the local officers, which should obviate this in the future.

15th.—Covey Hill.—A pleasant meeting and prosperous report.

16th.—Roxham.—A good meeting in numbers. The Rev. F. Pratt, newly appointed Anglican minister at Hemmingford, had driven over to help. The report here was considerably better than last year. I think we may consider this branch as possessing the elements of usefulness and prosperity.

17th, Sunday morning at Hemmingford.—The Presbyterian church was well filled, the Rev. Messrs. McKay and Young taking part. The treasurer, Julius Scriver, Esq., M.P., stated that the collection at this service was the largest ever taken for the Bible Society.

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rian ster 17th, Sunday evening. I had been directed by a shorter road to Beech Ridge, but, as often happens, it was the longest way around. For some miles it crossed a bog, and my horse plunged through the crust at every step. His remonstances were not loud but deep. However, all things have an end, and so had my journey. The Beech Ridge church was fairly filled with attentive listeners. I was gratified at the report I received of the work of the year.

18th.—Beauharnois.—The Rev. Mr. Boyd had secured collectors for the first time since my visits, who had canvassed with gratifying results, and the meeting was successful.

19th.—Chateauguay Basin.—A pleasant and hearty gathering, with an excellent report, cheered me in my work.

20th.—Laprairie.—The usual meeting was held. The Rev. T. C. Perry, our secretary, had a good report of subscriptions. The little Protestant colony shews a laudable desire to take its full share in our work.

21st.—Radnor Forges.—It was sharp work to make connections with boat and trains to reach this place, but the effort was successful, and in our meeting the branch officers were properly organized, so that we look for continued and useful work. The effort already made was very praiseworthy.

22nd.—Three Rivers.—A good meeting of the young people, the Rev. J. R. McLeod presiding, the Rev. H. Stuart also being with us. A good report of subscriptions. I took the night train, reaching Montreal to get my horse for the tour of the district north of Montreal, reaching Mascouche on the evening of the twenty-third, where we held a good meeting, our friends gathering in great force, both Anglican and Methodist ministers being present.

24th, Sunday.—Preached in the English church at Mascouche in the morning; in Terrebonne in the afternoon, in the beautiful church just erected, and in Charlemagne in the evening (at the mills). These three appointments are among our youngest branches (the last mentioned not being yet organized), appear to be good openings for the Society's work. Good results are already apparent.

25th.—Joliette.—The meeting here was smaller in numbers than usual, but the report was excellent. The Rev. L. R. Bouchard presided, and also addressed the meeting.

26th.—Kildare.—The meeting here was a failure. Of course, some one had blundered, but some of the officers will do their duty, so that the work of the year will not lapse.

27th.—Rawdon was in marked contrast. The Rev. W. Davies and J. Moorhouse, together with G. Irwin, Esq., had worked heartily and well. Of course, the result had been a good one. Over forty dollars had rewarded the labors of the collectors, naturally this was

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followed by a capital meeting, the Methodist church being well filled.

28th.—New Glasgow.—The Rev. P. S. Vernier presided in the absence of our old friend, Mr. Murray, who is seriously ill. The day had been stormy and wet, which reduced our numbers considerably. An average financial year was reported.

29th.—Shawbridge.—Good numbers in attendance. The treasurer presented a goodreport of subscriptions, the first-fruits of this new branch.

### JUNE.

Given, Mackie and Waddell, who all gave us help. Evidently the change of time here meets the approval of all our friends. Our secretary, Mr. Mc-Ouat, will send in a good report.

2nd.—Brownsburg.—This is one of our new ventures and this time our friends organized a branch with officers who are highly spoken of, and from whom we anticipate much good work.

3rd.—Dalesville.—This is the third visit to this place, and now some financial work has been begun. The lady collectors have found their way round, and made a fair start. May success attend their future efforts.

4th and 5th.—Old Harrington and Avoca do not shew enough interest to warrant further visits in the near future.

7th, Sunday.—Grenville.—Preached in the English church in the morning, and in the afternoon in the Presbyterian church. A truly union service, for our friends from all the churches gathered in, testing the capacity of the house. A capital report from T. Williamson, Esq., of the year's work, was presented at our business meeting on Saturday. Went to Cushing in the evening, good congregation in St. Mungo's church. The Rev. James Fraser, as always, our good friend and helper, had been with us in the afternoon, and

here also conducted the service. Mr. Weir, the treasurer, had a good list of contributions from our collectors.

A. Morrison, I determined to drive home by the light of the stars, reaching Montreal in "the wee sma' hours ayont the twal."

15th,—Crossed to Laprarie by boat and drove to Napierville, where the same faithful friends we looked for came together. Good work showed consequent good results. Many larger constituencies might well take pattern from our generous, kindly members here.

16th.—Lacolle.—An important gathering of Sunday-school teachers of Iberville Deanery was in session this day, by kindly concessions, our meeting was held in an interval of their work, so I was enabled to address a far larger number than I had ever before in Lacolle. The report was not ready, for the work of this branch was not complete.

21st, Sunday morning.—Philipsburg.—Preached among our Anglican friends. I find subscriptions rather behind last year. Drove between storms to Mapledale, rain entirely prevented our meeting, but successful work in collecting had been accomplished. At Bedford in the evening, a good congregation in St. James church. On Monday morning I learned that financially this branch is considerably in advance of last year.

### SUMMER TOUR.

### AUGUST.

11th.—Sorel.—Found several of our friends were from home, seriously reducing our subscription amount, but our meeting was bright and cheerful. The Rev. 2nd.—Moulinette.—Another long drive of over forty miles. I was rewarded by a pleasant gathering of warm-hearted friends, and finances in good shape. The Rev. Mr. Brown gave efficient help and Mr. E. O. Winter reported some practical work here by the W. C. T. U. in distributing many copies of the Scriptures among

the Italian and French laborers on the Cornwall Canal. We pray good results may follow this Christian effort.

3rd.—Morrisburg.—A good number met in the Methodist church., the Revs. Timberlake (pastor) and Cameron, were present with words of earnest goodwill. J. H. Meikle, Esq., reported improvement in subscriptions.

4th.—Iroquois.—T. S. Mallory, although the amount realized was not quite equal to last year, because, when one of his collectors had failed him and he could not at once secure another, he, a business man, had faced the difficulty and himself collected.

12th.—Caintown.—A goodly number present in the Presbyterian church, the Rev. J. J. Wright had driven over from Lyn to preside and show his sympathy by his personal help. A good report read by J. G. McDonald, Esq., our secretary.

#### **JANUARY**, 1897.

4th.—Cote St. Henry (Co. Vaudreuil).—By train to Coteau Junction, then back to Coteau Landing for my horse (which I had left there on my St. Lawrence tour). To my dismay, owing to the thaw carrying away what little snow had fallen, I had to take my buggy through muddy cross country roads, but arriving here had a hearty welcome at Mr. Grisdale's. Found a numerous and hearty company in the little church here, and a report in advance of last year, which, being the first, was encouraging for the New Year.

5th.—Hudson and Como.—Meeting this year in the Gibb School Hall, W. F. Halcro, Esq., presiding. The Rev. J. Watson (treasurer) and the Rev. J. Carmichael (secretary) presented their reports shewing good financial returns. Sales of Bibles had been small. Last

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School surer) shew-Last year, when we met in Hudson, we missed many of our Como friends, now we miss the Hudson friends, excepting those who are always faithful.

6th.—Point Fortune.—Intense frost had left the roads in a terrible condition for a horse to travel on, only a walk could be maintained, so the journey was very tedious, however, just as I reached this place, the snow fell so heavily that I wired at once for my cutter to be forwarded to Hawkesbury (but alas, the hope was only fleeting and the storm local). Our meeting here was good in all points, J. Middleton, Esq., presiding, the Rev. F. T. Phillips giving an address upon the importance of Bible study. This new branch has hardly got into working order, but is shewing already good results.

4th.-Wolford,-J. McCarthy, Esq., presiding over a hearty meet-

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ing here, a good report from our secretary, Mr. Wm. Chalmers, was read and adopted.

5th.—Lombardy.—Amidst many discouragements, Mr. Jno. Rabb, the worthy secretary,, continues his labors and keeps our work going. His report of work was a good one for this year.

6th, Sunday.—Toledo.—The weather had changed, the rain had poured all Saturday, and I had driven through it and caught cold, which flew to my throat, so my voice was only a croak, yet with the kind help of my friend, the Rev. J. J. Cameron, I was able to address the large congregation in the Presbyterian church. Good returns were made from our collectors.

Chantry in the afternoon. Our friends here are slow in organizing, but some work has been done in collecting.

Philipsville at night, the roads were flooded in many spots, so only a few good faithful people came out to meet me, but from the kind invitations I received I anticipate better results from here in the future. I drove on to Forfar, to the hospitable home of Mr. T. C. Hales, where I knew by experience I should receive every assistance to doctor my throat.

8th.—Forfar.—After continuous efforts to keep down my hoarseness, I managed to face the meeting at night. It was a very good one; the collectors had worked well, so the report was good.

9th.—Westport.—Special meetings were being held in the Baptist church, and our friends united our meeting with theirs, so our audience was a very large one. We trust this will enable our lady collectors to secure larger results next year, as there was a slight falling off in the present report.

10th.—Newboro.—An average meeting, the Rev. Mr. Shortt presiding and urging the claims of the Society upon all Christians. Subscriptions fair, sales low.

11th.—Elgin.—By an unfortunate oversight, the proposed meeting had not been announced, so was a failure.

12th.—Morton.—The night was a stormy and very cold one, and half an hour after the time advertised for the meeting, the secretary and I found the fires had not been lighted, but they were going to be. As this would have involved at least another hour of delay, we decided to adjourn at once. So the meeting was not held. Very little had been done, except by the secretary, in the way of subscriptions, but better than last year.

13th.—Lyndhurst.—Gathering of young people, principally, in the Orange Hall, the Rev. W. Moore presiding. The report was an increase over last year, our secretary, Mr. Jas. Thompson, being about to leave, we appointed a lady to that position, and heartily wish her success.

14th.—Delta.—There was a very large gathering in the Methodist church, the Rev. G. Poyser conducting the service, with an excellent choir assisting. I am always glad to speak to our friends here. Our own work had collided with a special effort to assist the Indian Famine Fund, with which we are in such hearty sympathy, as to accept cheerfully our somewhat reduced share of the subscriptions.

15th.—Athens.—The earnest addresses of the Revs. J. J. Cameron and J. Scanlon, were worthy to be listened to by all who live in this pleasant town, appealing to the highest aims and principles of the Christian church. The numbers present were the largest seen here for years. Miss Etta Wiltse reported a good subscription. J. Thompson, Esq., presided.

16th.—Glen Buell.—The desirability of establishing a branch here had been urged, but some slackness in arranging for the preliminary prevented its success, another attempt must be made before we decide.

17th.—Addison and Greenbush.—Met this year at Greenbush. I was glad to mark the improvement in the church building, and the increased reverence of the young people, now,if this be followed up by earnest endeavors in the Lord's work, this would be a prosperous branch. The pastor is a good friend to our work.

18th.—North Augusta.—Our friends were prepared with report of faithful work and assembled to hear of the Society's work, J. Bellamy, Esq., presiding. The Rev. M. Danby gave us a very nice address. Mr. T. E. Ralph read the report, not quite up to last year's

19th.—Spencerville.—Fine meeting in Presbyterian church, the Rev. J. Sinclair presiding, S. C. McLean, Esq., M.D., giving a good report of continued prosperity. The work of this branch speaks well for the interest shewn by its officers and collectors.

21st, Sunday morning.—Ventnor.—Special service planned for us in the Methodist church, the ordinary one being held in the evening. A large congregation gathered, great interest apparent. This branch has done well this year.

Brinston's Corners (North Matilda branch) in the evening, good attendance. Better work shown for the past year than in any recent year. I trust that there may come to this branch yet greater success in the future.

21st.—North Williamsburg,—A heavy snowstorm with driving east wind, not only made the journey difficult, but continuing, spoiled our meeting, only about a dozen braving the storm to be present. One of these, I am glad to say, was the Rev. J. Shunk, the Lutheran minister. We had no report, nor did we consider any business.

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22nd.—Winchester Springs.—A very good attendance here, the best for years, the Rev. W. T. Smith presiding. Good report.

24th.—Dunbar and Elma.—Meeting due this year at Elma, where the pastor presided and gave good reasons why all Christians should aid the Society, whose only object was to help in missionary work at home and abroad. The work shewed an advance on last year.

25th.—Colquhoun.—Another snowstorm filled up the roads, so that the meeting was small and only partial returns were possible.

26th.—Grantley.—Our first meeting in this place was a decided success in point of numbers, yet, on the advice of the pastor, organization was deferred until next year, when he hoped to have more of the older people present. However, he suggested some friends whom he knew would be in sympathy with our work as interim officers. Our acknowledgments are due for the kind interest shewn by the Rev. R. C. McConnell and Mr. Eli Robinson.

27th.—South Finch.—Business meeting on Saturday night. Sunday, Feb. 28th. A large congregation in St. Luke's church. I was very pleased to learn that while this parish had generously given a hundred dollars to the Indian Famine Fund on the previous Sunday, yet they had resolved not to take any of their support from the Bible Society, indeed, the report shews the largest amount received yet by me.

Avonmore, in the evening we had a large audience in the Presbyterian church to hear of the onward march of the Word of God. A good average report was furnished next day by the treasurer, W. Brownhills, Esq.

#### MARCH.

1st.—Gravel Hill.—Our collectors here are two of the older members of the community, Mr. J. Robinson being ninety years old, hale and strong, his friend, Mr. Margerrison, though his junior, is probably among the seventies. These hearty old gentlemen are the cause of our increased success in this branch.

2nd.—Apple Hill.—This active branch, with the last named, is under the pastoral care of the Rev. D. D. McLennan, to whose kindly words and judicious arrangements our success is largely due. The report this year is again of good earnest work and happy results.

3rd.—Alexandria.—A good, profitable time was spent in our meeting, the Rev. D. McLaren in a brief speech, which was illustrated by two large charts, shewed the circulation of the Scriptures from the time of Luther to the year of the formation of the Bible Society,

and the immense advance since then. There are reasons which would explain the report being below that of last year.

5th.—Cote St. George.—Notwithstanding a sudden change in temperature and heavy rains, our meeting was successful, both in numbers and interest shown. Report so far promises good returns when complete. This finishes the tour for the winter.

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#### REPORT.

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If, as has been well said, "no work is more important than women's work among women," we may truly claim the place of pre-eminence for the work carried on by the eight Bible-women employed by this Association. It is a record of faithful house to house visiting, and there in the home preaching Christ Crucified, Risen and Glorified to many who would never hear it proclaimed from the pulpit or trouble to open God's Word and read it for themselves.

The work is, as the name denotes, the woman with the Bible, and her life and conversation are watched and expected to be a faithful mirror of what she preaches

The number of visits paid during the year by seven Bible-women is 12,671, and the average length of time for each visit from twenty to twenty-five minutes. The number of Bibles sold by three Bible-women is 125, New Testaments, 67, and 14 Gospels. We regret not being able to get the return of sales from all the Bible-women.

The work of the French Bible-woman differs in some respects from that of the English ones. While she has visited some 2,453 homes, she has been received and able to read and pray in only 501. Her work requires special gifts of tact, patience and love.

Through the liberality of the Parent Society, we are enabled this year to have another Bible-woman labouring among the French population. To all who realize the importance of this branch of our work, this is a cause of deep gratitude. We have been fortunate in securing the services of a former Bible-woman, who thus brings to the work knowledge derived from past experience.

We have to report the resignation of one superintendent and one Bible-woman. The Bible-woman's place has been, we trust, ably filled by one who had already shown her interest in the work by voluntarily assisting our former Bible-woman. The position of Superintendent is still vacant.

The grateful thanks of the Association are due to Lady Galt for her interest in collecting funds to pay the rent of the mission rooms, etc., thus filling the place of her late sister, Mrs. Vanneck; and to the Hon. Treasurer, who has brought the financial year so creditably to a close.

The following reports from the various districts will be read, we are sure, with great interest.

#### ST. MARY'S WARD.

"It was in June, 1869, that the way was opened for me to work in the vineyard of the Lord. I was conscious of inability without God, but asked Him, as I went forth in His Name, to go with me, and that I might be received into the homes whither He would lead me. It happened on two occasions only that the door was shut in my face, and that was the result of drink." God has been with her whose words we quote, all through these 27 years, shedding more and more light upon her path, and making her rich in the treasures of His Word, that she also, through the ministry of the Spirit, may make "rich in faith" the poor whom God has chosen. This year has been one of much trial and hardship to many, but precious lessons have been learned in the school of adversity concerning God's tender care and loving supply. Just in such circumstances is the opportunity of the Bible-woman, and to her is given the privilege of leading back to the Saviour those who have wandered from Him, or of making Him yet better known and more lovingly trusted by those who have long been His followers. In the moment of need, God has directed her to one and another of such cases. One, a nursing mother, with a heavy heart, just going out to work, as her husband could find no employment and there was no bread in the house. A loaf was quickly brought, and warm were the thanks the Bible-woman received. The week before that woman had only earned 25c. To another mother, sad and desponding, with three small children, and without food, the husband out of work and still seeking it, the Bible-woman came in, and read of "God feeding the fowls of the air." Her eldest child of four years she had sent to her widowed mother, who works hard for her living. She also was helped.

How many such cases may be given, for the great need of the unemployed is a feature of this year's record. Every monthly report tells the same sad story. When a man has to face want for his family, and neither the skill of his right hand nor the strength of his right arm can procure bread for his crying children, he has to learn the lesson of his absolute dependence upon God for everything, and when the lesson of trust in God instead of himself is learned, God gives back to him the power to provide for his own. His temporary loss has brought him eternal gain. God's own Word becomes the daily bread of himself and family.

It is this simple lesson of trust in the living God, so simple that many of us pass it by, that the Bible-woman is sent to teach. It is the same lesson at the bedside of the sick and dying, trust in that Saviour who takes His own, without letting them see death, for He is with them, and on Him their eye is fixed. The same lesson

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As regards our Mission Room, we have never before been in such good quarters. The person in whose home we meet was at one time a Bible-woman herself, and her heart seems still to be in the work, which she understands so well, and in that and other ways she is so helpful and cheering to us all. Certainly God opened that door and let us in, for we never looked for anything so good, and the people themselves were greatly surprised. The Clothing Club goes on as usual, but not on so large a scale as formerly. Still, in times like the present, \$523.40 is no small sum for the year 1896. The payments in 1892 amounted to \$1,070.80. The large Sewing School is still held every Saturday morning, entirely in the hands of the young ladies from the West End, who are eager to adopt better and more progressive ways in their system of teaching, so that the largest benefit may be gained by the children. The mothers, when asked at the mission room, tell with pride and satisfaction what their little ones are able to do. The attendance this winter is larger than ever. We rejoice at the success which has followed the self-denying efforts of these ladies, a better form of praise than any words

### ST. LAWRENCE WARD.

For two years the Bible-woman has been labouring in this district with the Holy Scriptures as her passport, and faith and prayer for the Spirit's guidance in the God-given and God-chosen work.

Naturally, at the close of the year, in reviewing the past, the question arises, "Has any progress been made along Scriptural The answer comes in the Word, "God's Word shall not return unto Him void, but it shall accomplish that which He pleases and it shall prosper in the thing whereto He sent it."

The Bible-woman has visited some homes where her experience has been a new one. The Bible certainly was there, but evidently only because they thought as Protestants they ought to possess it. To them it was a sealed book, they knew nothing of its power, it was merely a good book, and told them about Jesus, who died for sinners. Indifference and ignorance had darkened their spiritual vision and hardened their hearts. In other homes of the poor, however, the Word of God has been unfolded as a great blessing coming into their lives, and a love for its teaching has influenced their characters, witnessing the change of heart both in their homes and in the world. The greatest hindrance has not been that people closed their

To r, it was sinners, sion and ver, the to their racters, in the ed their doors against the Bible-woman, but that their hearts and ears have been closed to the truth. Another barrier to the work is the great poverty in this district. The bread-winners struggle to support their families amid many discouragements, too often brought on by intemperance, but the good seed, even in such cases, has fallen into good soil and is now bearing fruit.

The Bible-woman is greatly encouraged in some of her interviews with French Canadians. She finds a great thirst for the Scriptures amongst them. Whenever opportunty offers to read or talk to them about spiritual things they display a hunger unusual in Protestants. They begin to feel the lack of something that they are deprived of, some blessing that Protestants enjoy.

The Mothers' Meeting, held weekly, continues to increase in earnestness and numbers. The service of song which follows the reading and explanation of Scripture has been greatly blessed. The hymns chosen and asked for by the members of the class, often silently express the great sorrow or need of the heart going up in song to the loving Saviour. The young ladies who for some years have guided this portion of the work have lately been joined by six of the "King's Daughters," who have brought fresh life into the whole undertaking.

Another branch of the work is the "Clothing Club and Helping Hand," which provides ready-made garments, new and old, at a small cost, thus enabling many a tired mother to secure more time for other home duties. The proceeds of these sales are used to supply necessaries for the sick or otherwise to help those in need.

Discouragements, disappointments and hindrances beset the Christian worker on all sides, but with the eye of faith fixed on the Master, the promise can be claimed, "I will direct their work in truth," and, "stablish them in every good word and work."

#### FRENCH POPULATION.

Madame Piché, the French Bible-woman, has continued her work faithfully during this year in Maisonneuve, Hochelaga and the East End in general. The committee hear with thankfulness that several hundred families have come in contact with the Word of God for the first time; for they believe that, sooner or later, the seed sown broadcast over the field must bear fruit.

If the Bible-woman cannot sell as much as she would desire, owing to scarcity of money and want of work among people she visits, it is encouraging to find that she is well received and that the people are willing, even desirous, to discuss several religious points; their eyes are being opened, and they want to know more and more,

though they are afraid of being influenced to "change their religion." One person said to Madame Piché: "What is the use of knowing so We are forbidden to ponder over these things. were priests given us? It it not to lead us? We must believe in them, as they are holy men. If they don't teach us right, so much the worse for them, they are responsible. I am afraid of your books. I have one, the "Evangile pour tous les jours." I have two brothers who began to study that book and to-day they have changed their religion and they can only talk about that new religion. When they come to see us they repeat some of the passages that you have just shown me now, and if my husband goes to see them they discuss all the time. They have even succeeded in getting our father, an old man, to study that book and he is now a Methodist. Oh! she continued, "I have already spoken too much with you; you had better go out. We are forbidden to talk with 'Orangiste' and 'Methodiste.'"

In the November report we read that a woman said: "I have great confidence in the Holy Virgin, who is without sin. She can obtain favours from her Son for us, who are sinners; it is true, as you say, that we should confess to God alone, as He alone knows our hearts; but you know, in order to be good Roman Catholics, we must not reason, for as soon as we think, we see absurdities"

"One day," says Madame Piché, "when I was offering a New Testament to a woman, she said, 'I had one a few years ago, and I used to enjoy so much the reading of it, but my busband took it from me. I know that it is in that book that we can find the pure doctrine that our Saviour taught. Oh! I cannot resist. I must have one. I will hide it carefully and read it when my husband is away."

"In one house," says the August report, "I met in a family two women on a visit from Maskinonge, who were deploring the spirit of insubordination of some parishioners to their bishop. A man, who happened to be present, remarked: 'The bishop was wrong, and those people have only shown pluck and courage and surely they have good strong heads.' 'Yes,' replied the women, 'but the bishop has a bigger head, and they ought to obey him. When they were immersed, they should have been left under the water.'

"When they had left, the man remarked to me, 'There are still many like those bigoted women, but there is progress, undoubted progress and less fanaticism,' and he wished me success in the sale of my books, so that people could be enlightened."

The field is very large and it was impossible for one Biblewoman to cover it. The Parent Society, which assumed the responsibility of Madame Piché's salary, has generously offered to pay for a second Bible-woman, and the committee were fortunate in securing Madame and was wil the country. did not hesi January, 189 the field wil Jean Baptis Piché in the

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ing Madame Desjardin, who was in their employ some years ago, and was willing to resume her work after several years' rest in the country. This was felt to be providential and so the committee did not hesitate to re-engage her. She began her work on the 4th of January, 1897, with her old-time energy and zeal, and has entered the field with a heart full of enthusiasm. She will work in St. Jean Baptiste and Point St. Charles, and also help Madame Piché in the large and crowded districts of the East End.

During the year 1896, Madame Piché has visited 2,453 houses offering the Word of God, and has been received and able to read and talk in 501 families.

#### MONTREAL GENERAL HOSPITAL.

During the past year the work has been continued with more or less encouragement. Some patients have been visited many times, also convalescents in institutions or in their own homes. One man, visited after he returned home, entered into the rest of faith while listening to the words, "Just as I am, without one plea." A lad of 17 years told his mother while he was in the hospital, that he had been led to Christ by the Bible-woman. A young man accepted Christ in the early summer, went out expecting to get strong, returned in the winter and died, saved through the atonement of Christ brought to his knowledge by the Bible-woman.

Many strangers, some of them Christians coming from a distance, having no friends to visit them, have greatly appreciated the visits they have received.

The number of Roman Catholics who have shown an interest in the Bible has increased during this past year. One girl from Ontario said so earnestly, "The more I hear, the more I want to hear." She thankfully accepted a copy of the New Testament, having "long wished to own one." The Bible-woman prefers to look on the bright side, and in giving a review of her work has not emphasized the disappointments caused by indifference and unbelief, and in some cases, resistance to the Gospel. She has faith that there will be sheaves at the great in-gathering of which she has now no counting.

#### SOUTH POINT ST. CHARLES.

The work this past year was carried on in all its branches with the energy and efficiency characteristic of former years up to the middle of November, when we were regretfully obliged to accept the resignation of our Bible-woman in that district. Owing to failure in health and nervous debility, the result, in part, of her earnest and

faithful service, she was forced to retire, for a while at least, to a quiet spot, where rest of body and mind "by God's good hand upon her" may be found.

Reluctantly she laid down the work, for six years' experience in it had greatly deepened her sense of the distressing spiritual poverty of those amongst whomshe laboured, and her heart was full of pity for them, but committing the district and its people to the Lord, she left us, strong in the assurance that He who was calling her apart to rest awhile, would not allow the work so prayerfully begun to languish and fall away.

Before Mrs. Carter left the city, her successor was found, so that without a day's interruption the service has gone on.

Family duties prevent our present Bible-woman carrying on the Sunday-school and evening classes that have been such a valuable and distinctive feature of this section of our mission. We regret very much that these classes must be discontinued, for the children gathered into them received great benefit from the instruction given, and were fondly attached to our kind and good Bible-woman, who shewed such loving interest in them and tried so faithfully to lead them aright and to bring some cheer and brightness into their otherwise dull lives.

There were, as usual, some cheering incidents through the year, chief amongst them being the conversion of a young woman who, when our Bible-woman met with her last summer, was in a low condition, both physically and spiritually, for she was suffering from dropsy, her case incurable and her soul in doubt and darkness. As the result of the daily visits, and careful instruction in the truth with prayer and sympathy from our Bible-woman, she came to a knowledge of the Saviour, and died three months later rejoicing in Jesus, whose precious blood had made full atonement for her.

Then, again, the Word of God was introduced into a Roman Catholic family, and readings from it readily and gratefully received by both the father and mother, who gathered their children in to listen to it. Several visits were made to them, and the Bible-woman was always well received. The seed has been sown, and who can tell what the result will be? Certainly, our Bible-women are pre-eminently seed-sowers. Day by day they scatter it carefully, prayerfully, and God nourishes their efforts, for many a soul has been brought into loving contact with a crucified and living Redeemer through their presentation of the gospel.

The Mothers' Meetings continue to be well attended. They are held every Thursday afternoon, 28 or 30 women on an average being present, with quite a number of children.

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#### NORTH POINT ST. CHARLES.

The Bible-woman has been going from house to house, visiting the sick, the infirm and the aged, reading the Bible to poor, tired mothers, whose family cares seldom allow them to attend church services, directing them to the burden-bearing and life-giving Saviour, and faithfully striving in God's strength to do God's work.

"Sometimes," she says, "when I have washed dishes, swept the room, or cooked a meal for a poor woman who is hardly able to stand up, it has seemed as true mission work as when I was reading the Bible to her."

While listening to the many sad stories poured into her ear daily, she has prayed for wisdom rightly to advise or comfort these troubled ones, and her report says "God always hears and answers my prayer."

She is constantly finding families with neither food nor fuel in their homes and although not able to supply their wants herself, she has often, through God answering her prayer, been able to direct them to where they could get their temporal needs supplied. The Lord does provide for those who put their trust in Him.

Sometimes her heart is rejoiced by the unfaltering faith of some poor suffering saint, like one she speaks of as dying of cancer, who is praising God for supporting her in weakness and pain by His Almighty strength, and abiding with her in the valley of the shadow of death. Another time she says, "Although my work often casts a gloomy shade over my life when I can do so little to relieve so much misery, yet the constant reading of God's Word and prayer, comforts me, while I am comforting others, and I feel indeed the results of a firm faith in God's promises." This Bible-woman has sold 107 Bibles and 29 Testaments during the past year.

#### HOCHELAGA AND MAISONNEUVE.

This past year was a most encouraging one to the Bible-woman working in this district, although there has been much suffering and distress caused by the husbands and fathers being unable to procure employment. Many cases of extreme need have been found; indeed, since the cold weather has set in, it is nothing unusual for the Bible-woman to find mothers and children cold and hungry while the father is out seeking work or food. The words of the Saviour come vividly to mind, "The poor ye have always with you." Yet it is in these homes of poverty and suffering that the work of the Bible-reader is best seen, and upon such dark backgrounds the Word and promises of God stand out with greater light. Won-

derful indeed is the change in many of those homes. Instead of the grumbling and complaining between husband and wife, making themselves and the children unhappy, they realize that poverty can be better borne with a spirit of love, and a calm, patient trust in God.

As the blessed promises are repeated to them and their cases taken directly to God in prayer, it is touching to hear their expressions of faith and trust in God, and did we not know that He is faithful that promised, we might often wonder at the direct answers to prayer.

The Mothers' Meeting has had an increase of twenty-five over last year, and a marked interest in the Word of God is noted. It comes to them with a freshness and reality that gives them a hunger to hear it again, and a desire to live its truth out in their lives.

The Tuesday evening evangelistic service is still increasing both in numbers and interest. New faces are seen almost every week, and many are testifying to the great spiritual good received from the Word so faithfully proclaimed.

Our future hope is in the children. The work in this department is being most successfully carried on. A meeting for the children is held in connection with both the Friday afternoon meeting and the Tuesday evening service, and their young minds are being well stored with Bible truths. Many of them, indeed, know more about the Bible than those that are much more advanced in years. A most enjoyable treat was given them at Christmas time, at which over a hundred children and about forty mothers were present.

Great benefit has been derived from the exchange formed by the Circle of King's Daughters from the West End. Here the mothers are able to procure clothing for their children and families for nominal sums. Those that have no money, can sew for two hours while the sale is going on, and are allowed so much for their work. Assistance is thus given to all.

Altogether we start out with brighter hopes and firmer trust in God for the year upon which we have entered.

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## REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR AGENTS AND COLPORTEURS.

### (A)-THE DISTRICT SECRETARY.

1. The District Secretary is charged with the oversight of the various Branches, Depositories and Agencies of this Auxiliary.

2. He has to make periodical visits, once a year, if practicable, to the Branches, for the purpose, in conjunction with the Office-Bearers of the same, of holding public services, at which services special information touching the operations of the Parent Society and of this Auxiliary is given by him; and any necessary public business between the Branches and this Auxiliary is despatched. On such occasions he is also expected, in such ways as he may deem proper, to encourage and stimulate the people to greater zeal and effort in the work of Bible circulation.

3. He has to make annual visits to the several Depositories and Agencies connected with this Auxiliary, for the purpose of inspecting the books or stock therein contained, and of taking account of the same with the Depositories.

4. He is authorized to receive, and to give receipt for the same, any moneys due to this Auxiliary on purchase account, or offered as free contributions.

5. He may take orders for supplies of Scriptures, should such be tendered him.

6. All receipts of money and orders for Scriptures are to be duly recorded by him, and reported to the General Agent.

7. Timely notice must be given by him to the General Agent of his intended visits to Branches or Agencies, in order to the preparation by the latter of the necessary statement of accounts for stock-taking and settlement with the Depositories.

8. Any omissions or discrepancies that may be found in the statement so furnished and the books of the Depositories must be reported in writing to the General Agent, with a view to the immediate rectification of the same.

9. A monthly Report is to be prepared and sent by him to the General Committee of the Branches and Depositories visited by him, of the public services held, and of moneys received, and also of colportage operations, should these in his judgment call for special notice.

10. He is charged with the preparation of an Annual Report to the Committee, giving an account of the work and condition during the year, of the various Branches, Depositories or Agencies that are comprised within the Society's field of operation; and also with preparation for publication in the Society's Annual Report, of the list of Branches, etc., with their Office-Bearers, together with the Subscription Lists of the same.

11. New Branches or Depositories may be organized or opened by him in or for such districts as may be found desirable to occupy as new centres of operation.

### (B)-THE GENERAL AGENT.

1. The General Agent is charged with the management of the business of the Society, as conducted in and from the Bible House of Montreal.

2. He has under his care the stock of Scriptures and other property belonging to the Society in the Bible House, and is held responsible for the safe keeping and good condition of the same.

3. It is his province to attend to the retail sales of Bibles at the Bible House, and to keep account of same.

4. A Monthly Report must be prepared by him and submitted to the General Committee at its regular Monthly Meeting of :—(a) the condition and amount of stock on hand, or required; of the number of copies sold during the month at the Bible House, with an account of cash received for the same, together with a statement of the same items in the corresponding month in the previous year; of the state of account between this Auxiliary and the Parent Society, or other parties; of applications for grants of Scripture; and, generally, of any other matters he may deem of importance to bring under the notice of the Committee. (b) Of receipts and disbursements made at the Bible House during the month.

5. Special Reports may be called for from him by the General Committee or any of the Sub-Committees.

6. Notices of all Meetings, whether of the General Committee or of the Sub-Committees, are issued by him; and he has charge of the place of meeting of the same.

7. On the receipt from the District Secretary of the programme of his intended visits to the Branches or Depositories, the General Agent is required to furnish him with the accounts of the several Branches set down on the programme, at least one week previous to his, the District Secretary's, departure on his tour of visitation, in order that time may be afforded for examination of these accounts by both Agents together if found necessary.

8. Copies of the Monthly Report and of the Abstract of the Annual Report of the Parent Society, as also copies of all other publications sent to the General Agent, which may contain information useful to the District Secretary in his visits among the Branches, are to be

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1. T Bible promptly and regularly sent forth from the Bible House to such places as he, the District Secretary, may designate.

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9. All mistakes, omissions, or irregularities that may be reported by the District Secretary, as existing in the books or statements or accounts appertaining to any Branch or Depository, are required to be placed on file and promptly attended to; and such file may be called for at any meeting of the General Committee or Agency Committee.

10. Orders for supplies of Scriptures from the Branches, the District Secretary or Colporteurs are to be carefully entered and promptly executed; and in case of any unavoidable delay occuring of the kind of books ordered not being in stock, notification of the same must at once be made to the persons sending the order, and further instruction sought from them.

11. An account current with each Colporteur employed by the Society is required to be kept of all books sent to his order, of cash received from him, of time spent in the service of this Society reported by him, and of payments on account of stipend made to him.

12. The General Agent has to prepare for the Corresponding Secretary all statistics or other details appertaining to the department of the General Agent that may be called for in the preparation of the Annual Report of the Society or of any Special Report.

13. On the publication of the Annual Report, the General Agent is required to distribute, without unnecessary delay, copies of the same to subscribers entitled to receive them, both in the city and country districts.

14. The General Agent has the oversight of such Assistant or Assistants as may, with the sanction of the Committee, be employed in the Bible House.

## RULES RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES AND BIBLE ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Constitution of a Branch Society and Bible Association is inserted for the purpose of facilitating the formation of those useful institutions. Persons in the country are particularly invited to form themselves into Auxiliary Societies. Besides discharging the duty of assisting in disseminating the Word of God (which is incumbent on every Christian) they would consult their private advantage, and thereby be enabled to obtain Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, whereas at present they purchase from country merchants at a higher rate.

1. That the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society have the cordial approbation of this meeting. 2. That a society be formed to be called "The Branch Bible Society, for the purpose of co-operating with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scripture, both at home and abroad.

3. That, conformably to the principles of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without note or comment, and those in the language

of the United Kingdom of the authorized version only.

4. That all persons subscribing one dollar per annum or upwards, or ten dollars or upwards at one time, shall be members of this Society.

5. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries and a Committee consisting of not less than three other members; and that three members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

6. That every clergyman or other minister who is a member of the Society shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting of the Committee.

7. That the Committee shall meet once a quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

8. That the Committee divide this neighborhood into districts, and appoint collectors for each district, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations and collecting the annual fees of the members.

9. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be remitted yearly, after deducting incidental expenses, to the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal, on condition of the Society granting to this the same privileges which the Parent Institution grants, in such cases, to the Auxiliary Societies.

10. That the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within the several districts, are in want of Bibles or Testaments, and unable to procure them; and that it will be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced prices, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

11. That a general meeting of the subscribers be held at in the month of each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee elected.

12. That these resolutions be published in such a manner as the Committee may direct; and a copy of them, signed by the chairman, transmitted to the President of the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal.

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require to recei NOTE.—Branches or Depositories selling Scriptures on credit, do so at their own risk and responsibility, as it is contrary to the rules of the Society. There is no need for it, as other provision is made for the poor.

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### COLPORTEURS.

1. The Classification of Colporteurs shall be as follows:—To be known respectively and indicated on the Monthly Report as:—Class I.—Class II.—and Class III. That promotion be made from one class to another only on account of fidelity, success or length of service, and by vote of the General Committee; that the Monthly Allowances be for Class I., \$40.—Class II., \$35.—Class III., \$30, with addition of fifteen dollars per month where the Colporteur, by direction of the General Committee, uses in his work a horse and a conveyance.

2. Colporteurs are required to keep carefully within the limits of the District assigned to them as their field of operations, and not to labor beyond them without the sanction of the Committee.

3. They are expected to visit, as far as practicable, every family within the limits of their field, in order to ascertain whether or not they are supplied with copies of the Scriptures, and, when these are found to be needed, to supply them at such prices or on such terms as may from time to time be ordered by the Committee.

4. In the case of poor families or persons, Colporteurs may, in the exercise of due care, supply copies, either at reduced price, or by loan, or by gift; but all transactions must be recorded and reported to the Committee.

5. Sales on credit are made without the sanction of the Committee and at the sole risk of the Colporteur making them.

6. The Committee require that a daily record be kept of the places visited, of the number of copies sold, and of the moneys received for the same; and, further, that a monthly report of these and other matters properly belonging to their work be made by each Colporteur. For this purpose blank forms are supplied, which the Committee expect each Colporteur carefully to study and fill up.

7. All monthly reports shall be made up to the 25th of each month, and on that date mailed to the Corresponding Secretary for presentation to the ensuing Monthly Meeting of the General Committee.

8. All days that are not reported as spent in the service of the Society, due allowance being made for sickness or bad weather, will be deducted in the payment of the monthly stipend, unless leave of absence has been before obtained from the Committee.

9. When in the neighborhood of Branch Societies, Colporteurs are required to report themselves to the officers of the same, in order to receive from them such co-operation and advice as they may be

able to give; and, also, to report themselves to the District Secretary whenever he may visit any part of their district, that they may have the benefit of his suggestions, and may assist him in his public meetings, etc., should he need assistance.

10. Colporteurs when on duty for the Society, are required to abstain from taking part in public political meetings or discussions, and also to avoid, as far as possible, points of controversy between different Christian denominations or Churches.

11. The general work and duties of Colporteurs are, to circulate the Word of God among ali classes and creeds of the community, and, as opportunity offers, to read the Scriptures, hold religious converse and prayer with families or individuals. When the great object of the Society can be promoted by religious services and addresses to public assemblies these may be held. But in proceedings of this character the Committee desire that Colporteurs seek the countenance and co-operation of Ministers of the Gospel, without distinction of denomination.
