TO DISCONTINUE OPERATIONS IN QUEBEC. Montreal, June 28.—The provincial government have issued an order for the Ancient Order of Hibernians to discontinue operations in Quebec. This action was taken in accordance with the law requesting mutual benefit organizations which are compelled to submit a report annually in regard to their membership and financial standing and the A. O. H. not having complied with the law in this respect it is placed under the ban.

TROOPS CALLED TO QUELL RIOT. Serious Affray as Result of Strike Among Italian Navies on Grand Trunk at Kingston.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 28.—Two hundred Italians, employed by the Grand Trunk in repairing the road at the outer station, went on strike yesterday demanding that their wages be increased from \$1.50 to \$2 per day. As the Italians were making trouble and rioting, the police were called, but they were no match for the striking workmen. When Police Sergeant Nesbitt made a rush to arrest the ringleader of the strikers, the latter drew knives and pistols, firing in all directions. Sergeant Nesbitt grasped his man, but was immediately surrounded. When he emerged, his left arm was useless, having been ripped from the shoulder several inches down. He was also stabbed in the left breast, and in the leg. Chief Detective McRae was also in the scuffle, and was suddenly grasped around the waist and a knife run into his abdomen on the left side. The strikers then rushed the police and detectives off the platform, and the latter had to make their escape. The wounded officers were brought to the city and their wounds dressed. Mayor Mowat called out the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, and the men mounted and armed, soon covered the Italian. Ten were secured at one station, and nine at Cataract. The ringleader is thought to be one Dehalla, a vicious looking fellow. He bears a bad cut over his left eye. The contingent was brought in the hope of identifying some of the assailants. Sergeant Nesbitt's wounds are quite serious. Probably a dozen Italians were knocked down by the clubs of the police and detectives. The extent of McRae's injuries were not known. The knife went in deeply, however.



**ALLAN COMPROMISE CAUSES WARM TIME IN TREASURY BOARD**

The treasury board met in monthly session last evening. The decision to compromise for \$50 the action brought by W. C. R. Allan against the city was made the subject of considerable discussion. Several aldermen claimed they had not been notified. The mayor defended his action, and eventually the compromise was confirmed.

Tenders for the civic loan of \$721,000 were opened and referred to a committee. It was decided that until they had no information should be given out for publication. A resolution was passed recommending that the bid and details of the departments of public works and water and sewerage should be notified that their offers would be removed to the part of the city hall as soon as arrangements could be made.

It was decided to refuse the application of E. S. Dibble for appointment as constable.

The chairman brought up the matter of the mayor's settlement had been left in his hands. Mr. Allan had first asked for \$10,000, and by settling the case for \$50 he thought he had saved the city considerable money. He reminded the board that he had mentioned his action at previous board meetings, and the aldermen had consented.

The chairman—"I have no doubt your word acted in the best interests of the city, but I want to get back the matter out of the hands of the council."

Ald. Lantalam—"Was there a meeting of the council?"

The chairman—"No, sir. We've been up against this claim several times before."

Ald. Lantalam—"Last Tuesday I met an alderman who had a notice to attend a meeting."

The common clerk—"There was an informal meeting in the mayor's office."

The mayor—"It was intimated to me that the case had better be settled, and some of the aldermen told me they were going to meet in my office. We discussed the matter there, and the recorder and director were also present."

The chairman—"I want to know why certain aldermen were exempted from the meeting, and why they were not in the dark. I was not consulted, pro or con. The claim was before the water and sewerage board, and there was an understanding that it had better be settled out of court, the board should have been summoned, or the matter left to the treasury board. The mayor has no right to call in whom he will and whom he likes."

The mayor—"You are not putting the matter in a fair light. I had nothing to do with calling the meeting. I was as much in ignorance as you were. The recorder told me that a meeting was to be held. It was only then I learned the particulars. I had nothing to do with calling the meeting, first or last. In the first instance, we decided to offer Mr. Allan \$500—\$400 and \$100 cents. I don't know who were present. Then I went out to lunch, and I met Mr. Allan. I told him in a friendly way and without prejudice what had been decided."

The chairman—"He said he would not think of taking it unless his counsel advised it. Later on his counsel, Mr. Cussey, came and said they would accept \$70. I replied that we had nothing to do with it. We had a strong case, and I was willing to give my support to the offer of \$50, but no more. Mr. Cussey said in that case they would go on with the suit, and so things remained until the last day. Some of the aldermen came in and said the case ought to be settled. It had been hanging over for two years, the witnesses were gone over the ground directly after the accident occurred, and were prepared to swear to the facts. I want you, Mr. Chairman, to disillusion your mind that I had anything to do with the matter, except that it was left in my hands in that way. I object to the system myself, but I did the best I could."

Ald. Lantalam—"It's all very well for you, but I want to find out why notices for a meeting of the council were not sent out by the mayor's clerk and I and several others were not notified. This thing has been fixed up in a slipshod way, and it ought to have been referred to the board. There is too much of this kind of thing in the corner meeting, and it's a wrong principle."

The mayor—"I never authorized my clerk to send out notices. We never had a special meeting, and I have never shown any impatience."

Ald. Lantalam—"I can give the name of an alderman who was called."

The mayor—"I had no notice. I think I should have known something about it."

The chairman—"The matter was not conducted in a proper way at all with due respect to the common council, and as a member I protest. It is very unpleasant."

The mayor—"Unpleasant for whom?"

The chairman—"For me. I feel the matter keenly and it shows a want of whole confidence in the common council."

The mayor said he was astonished at the remarks that had been made after he had mentioned the matter at previous board meetings.

The chairman said the whole difficulty had arisen from there not having been a thorough investigation when the incident occurred. An act would probably have cost the city twice as much, but there had been a want of formality and some of the aldermen naturally felt they ought to have been consulted. The mayor had, no doubt, done what he thought was best. He moved that the mayor's action be confirmed. This closed the discussion and the motion was carried without dissent.

The question of collection of taxes was referred to Ald. Bullock, the mayor and Ald. Pickett, with power to incur any expense necessary to obtain a satisfactory system.

**GRAND TEMPLE OF HONOR G. T. Blewett Chosen as Grand Worthy Templar.**

The thirty-ninth annual meeting of the Grand Temple of Honor was held yesterday afternoon and evening in Alexandria, at the Grand Hotel, North End. The following officers were elected and installed at the evening session: G. T. Blewett, G. W. T.; F. S. P. McFarlane, G. W. V. T.; W. C. Simpson, G. W. R.; C. B. Black, G. W. T.; W. Lewis, G. Chap.; G. H. Johnson, G. Fisher and W. L. Jones, G. W. G.; S. E. Logan, D. M. W. T., was the installing officer.

The only business in the afternoon was the initiation of George Johnson, of Victoria Temple. The reports of Dr. Roberts, G. W. T.; W. C. Simpson, G. W. R., and C. B. Black, G. W. T., were read and considered in the evening. From these it appeared that the order here now numbers about 300 Templars, 120 section members and forty counsel members. There are three temples—Victoria, Alexandria and Montreal, three sections—Victoria, Alexandria and La Par, and two councils—East and West.

The total receipts were \$33.41; orders drawn on the grand treasurer, \$22.03; cash on hand about \$25. The finance and audit committee reported the accounts correct. The credentials committee reported about eighty representatives present. The state of the order committee also submitted a report which was very encouraging. R. D. Martin and F. S. P. McFarlane were appointed representatives to the supreme council. The next emergency meeting will be with Alexandria Temple, and the next annual meeting with Victoria Temple.

**ROGERS IS COMMITTED**

Preliminary hearing in the case of the Singer Manufacturing Co., against their agent, John Rogers, was concluded yesterday, when Rogers was committed. He was remanded all this morning in order to give him an opportunity to find bail, which was fixed at \$2,000, himself in \$1,000 and two sureties in \$500 each.

R. W. Mitchell, and John J. McDonald were the only witnesses examined. The honor agent Rogers if he had anything to say, as there was sufficient evidence to send him up for trial. He replied: "I had no wish to defend the company at all, but confidently hoped to be able to reimburse them in the spring every cent I was short." Rogers was then remanded till this morning.

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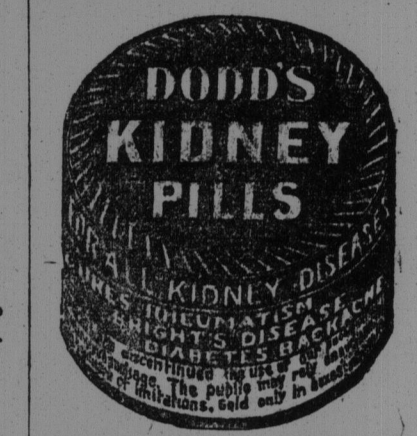

NEW YORK, June 28—Harry Kimball Thaw's career has been public property since 1897, when he introduced himself to the New York public by shooting the actress Evelyn Nesbitt.

His career began in the West, where he was a railroad man, and later a real estate and steamboat man.

He was married to a woman named Mrs. Thaw, who made five millions in real estate and steamboats.

He was a member of the New York Yacht Club, and was a frequent guest at the homes of the rich.

MONTREAL LABORERS TO GET HIGHER WAGES

Montreal City Laborers Request is Granted and the City Council Will Increase Their Pay.

(Montreal cont.)

At a meeting of a special civic committee yesterday afternoon it was decided to pass the following resolution asking council to increase the pay of civic laborers and carriers:

'That from and after January 1, 1907, no contract shall be awarded by the city at less than the following rates: For day laborers, \$1.50 a day, except in case of old age, or of partial incapacity, infirmity, or other cause, and that the finance committee be instructed to prepare the appropriate by-law, the working day to consist of nine hours, or 54 hours a week. That every working man in the employ of the city shall receive \$1.50 a day, except in case of old age, or of partial incapacity, infirmity, or other cause, and that the finance committee be instructed to prepare the appropriate by-law, the working day to consist of nine hours, or 54 hours a week. That all carriers in the employ of the city be paid at the rate of \$2.75 as a minimum, from January 1, 1907, and that the finance committee be instructed to prepare the appropriate by-law for next year, accordingly, the working day to consist of nine hours, or 54 hours a week.'

The proposal to increase the wages as above, was made by Ald. M. Martin. Ald. Martin contended that laborers and carriers could not eke out the old scale of wages. The old scale is \$1.50 for laborers and \$2.25 for carriers.
