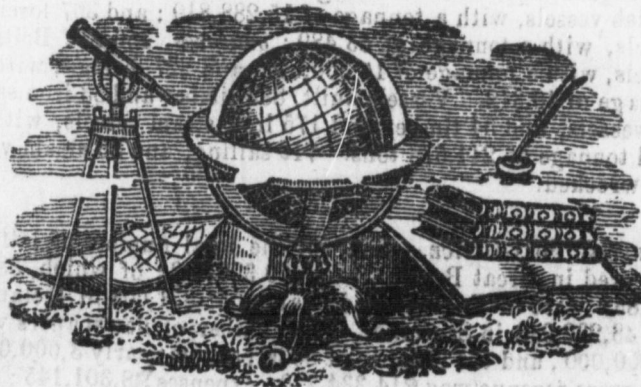

SHIPPING AND TONNAGE OF GREAT BRITAIN.—On January 1, 1857, there were in Great Britain 24,480 registered sailing vessels, with a tonnage of 3,981,475 ; and of registered steam vessels, 1,697, with a tonnage of 386,462. In the colonies, etc., 8,615 sailing vessels, and 239 steamers, with a tonnage of 780,116 tons. The coasting trade was, *inwards*, 152,383 British vessels, with a tonnage of 15,288,819 ; and 307 foreign vessels, with a tonnage of 53,489 ; *outwards*, 156,212 British vessels, with a tonnage of 15,356,647 ; and 227 foreign, with a tonnage of 40,312. Vessels built, 888 timber and 33 iron sailing vessels, and 54 timber and 175 iron steam vessels, with a total tonnage of 244,578 tons. 719 sailing, and 35 steam vessels wrecked.

BRITISH POST-OFFICE.—In 1856, the total number of letters delivered in Great Britain, was 479,393,803 ; of which, 388,309,853 were in England and Wales ; 41,851,008 in Ireland ; and 48,232,942 in Scotland. The number of newspapers was 71,000,000, and the number of book packets nearly 3,000,000. The gross revenue was \$14,334,770 ; expenses \$8,301,145 ; net revenue, \$6,038,625. The total number of money-orders was 6,178,982, to the amount of \$49,027,810, being an increase of 7½ per cent. over the previous year. So much for *cheap postage!*

RAILROADS IN GREAT BRITAIN.—On June 30, 1857, there were 8,942 miles of railroads opened and in use in Great Britain, employing in all 109,660 persons; and 3,193 miles of unopened railroads, employing in all 44,037 persons. In 1856, the number of passengers conveyed, was 129,347,592; number of persons killed, 281; and injured by accidents, 394. In the half-year ending June 30, 1856, the total number of passengers in England and Wales, was 49,179,847; and the total number of miles travelled, 665,315,079, or upwards of 30 miles on an average for each inhabitant. In Scotland, 5,608,232 passengers, and 68,890,094 miles travelled, or 20 miles for each inhabitant. In Ireland, 3,436,041 passengers, and 46,059,536 miles travelled, or about 7 miles for each inhabitant.

BRITISH REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES for the year ending Dec. 31, 1856.—Receipts, \$361,094,940; expenditures, \$411,617,000; excess of expenditures over income, \$50,522,060: more than \$205,000 were expended for the war services of the year. Total debt of Great Britain, funded and unfunded, March 31, 1856, was \$3,876,563,470.

TO ASCERTAIN THE LENGTH OF THE DAY AND NIGHT, at any time of the year, add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising, for the *length of the day*. Subtract the time of setting from 12 hours, and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning, for the *length of the night*. These rules are equally true for *apparent time*.

LEAP-YEAR.

Every year the number of which is divisible by 4 without a remainder, is a leap-year, except the last year of the century, which is a leap-year only when divisible by 400 without a remainder. Thus the year 1900 will not be leap-year.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus will be Morning Star until September 27th, then Evening Star the rest of the year. Mars will be Evening Star until July 21st, then Morning Star the rest of the year. Jupiter will be Evening Star until June 25th, then Morning Star the rest of the year. Saturn will be Morning Star until January 29th, then Evening Star until August 8th, then Morning Star the rest of the year.

MERCURY.

This planet will be in a position most favorable for observation on the 30th of March, the 28th of July, and 22d of November, when it will be in the west, not very far from the place of sunset; also on the 24th of January, the 22d of May, and 16th of September, at which times it will be in the east just before sunrise.

ECLIPSES.

There will be six Eclipses this year, two of the Moon, and four of the Sun, as follows:

I. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Feb. 2d, invisible in P. E. Island.

II. A total Eclipse of the Moon, Feb. 17th, early in the morning, visible in P. E. Island, as follows:
Eclipse begins 4h 47m. Total Eclipse from 5h 46m. to 7h 22m.

The moon will set from four to seven minutes after the Sun rises, and with about one third of it eclipsed at that time.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 4th, invisible in P. E. Island.

IV. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, July 29th, in the afternoon. This Eclipse will be very small, lasting only a few minutes, and occurs about an hour before sunset.

V. A total Eclipse of the Moon, August 13th, invisible in P. E. Island.

VI. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, August 28th, invisible in P. E. Island.

From the above it will be seen that 816,000,000, including Pagans and Mahommedans, have no correct knowledge whatever of the true God; that 244,000,000, embracing Jews, Catholics, Greek, and Eastern Churches, are but corruptions of true Christianity; while only 90,000,000 are Protestants—*ninety* of the eleven hundred and fifty of earth's teeming millions, a mere fraction over *one in twelve*.

HALO.—If there be a halo around the moon in fine weather, expect rain; and the larger the circle, the nearer the rain. If two or three rings be seen round the moon, which are spotted and spread out, expect a storm of long continuance. When halos are observed around the sun or moon it indicates the presence of the wane-cloud, and shows that hail, snow, or rain, according to the season, will soon follow. Colored or double halos are still more certain indications of rain, and of wind also.

When mock suns or mock moons, bands of light, and other unusual phenomena, attend halos, a peculiar condition of the atmosphere is indicated. The proper *halo*, or luminous ring, is distinguished from the *corona*, or luminous disk, which is sometimes a forerunner of rain also, but is a thing of more frequent occurrence. When halos are very red, wind almost always follows

GEESE are not such "geese" as we think them; their movements are impelled and controlled by strong and almost unerring instincts. When washing, or taking wing with a clamorous noise and flying to water, they portend rain. Geese are excellent guards against fire or thieves, always watchful, and giving notice by their noise of any unusual movements about them. When wild geese are observed to migrate southward or westward in greater numbers than usual in autumn and winter, they are said to indicate hard weather; when to the northward, warmer weather. In general, the early appearance of flocks of geese or other wild fowls in the south, foreshows a severe winter. A curious illustration of their instinct is seen in their flight, which is wedge-shaped, the leader cleaving the air for those who follow, and at stated intervals falling in the rear, and his place being supplied by another, who pursues the same course; which proceeding will at once be seen to facilitate flight and preserve the strength of the flock.

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IF you want to thrive by farming, and have good stock, you must begin in season. Mr. Flint, in his Treatise upon Dairy Farming, directs as follows: "Give calves a good start

or it won't pay to raise them. But we can't afford to let the cow support them when milk sells so high. As soon as they are able to stand let them take one or two good meals right from the cow; then remove them to a dry, warm, clean and well-littered pen, out of her sight. Give them the help of your finger and as much warm milk fresh from the cow as they will drink, for the first ten days. Now cut up a little of that best hay, steep it well in a kettle of hot water, and put into it skim-milk, half and half. It won't cost so much as new milk, and is about as nourishing. Now, when they are three weeks old, and thriving, put a little of that sweet rowen in their way, and slice up a potato or two for them. A little more solid food day by day; a little buttermilk now, and less of that sweet skim-milk, as they get to be six or seven weeks old; and where's that linseed cake, or corn meal? Mix in a little of it, or something as good. When the calves are eight or ten weeks old, they may begin to have a bite of grass and clover; but never make sudden changes."

A little Yankee "gumption" will make the frame part, adapted to the size of the sashes you are going to use. The back should be some inches higher than the front. For the other part we condense from Schenck's Gardener's Text-book directions somewhat as follows:—Of the substances to supply artificial heat, horse-manure is the best. First get rid of the violent heat and rank vapor of fermentation, by piling it in a conical shape, that air and moisture may come to it. Turn over and shake occasionally, and supply water, if wanted, until the straw assumes a dark brown color. The hot-bed should be sheltered from the N. W. winds, and in a S. or S. E. exposure. Let the bed be ten inches larger all around than the frame, which should lie on the surface, a little inclined. Shake the manure well, and build up the heap twenty inches, highest at the edges, and cover it six or eight inches with fresh mould; then put on frame and sashes, and protect from the weather. In two or three days stir the mould, and plant the seed. Renew the air, and water it constantly.</p> |

THE birds are now, or
will soon be, making the gar-
dens, orchards and woods,

vocal with their music; but
they are sent by Providence
for another and more impor-
tant purpose—to keep down
the alarming increase of
insects; and, as they are the
best friends of the farmer
and gardener, they should
not be disturbed when pre-
paring their nests, and
bustling about, with their
happy voices and picking up
the bugs, worms, beetles or
flies, that make all the care
and expense bestowed upon
your grounds of little avail.

If you will watch a blue-
bird, when it has a brood of
young to feed, you will see
the little busy-body fly from
the nest empty-mouthed, and
then fly back with an insect
in its bill, more times in the
day than you will have pati-
to count. The robin, too,
has been proved, by examina-
tion of the crops of those
killed, by a committee of
the Mass. Hort. Society in
1858, to settle this question
to be the devourer of hurt-
ful insects.

Your orchard would do
better if you would trim out
the interfering branches, and
plough up the sward, being
careful not to injure the
roots, and cart a few loads
of enriching mixtures up-
on the land, and work them
well in.

I have not done with the insects yet, and if you have not looked out for them, they have not done with you. Study

their habits, and you may hit upon some mode of destroying them. My farming friends, I want to give you one word of advice about the cows. There is time

enough before winter sets in to provide for them. I've made up my mind it don't pay to winter cows on poor hay, or let them fall off in flesh. It takes a good while in spring to get them up again, and they can't make milk without good food. Give them a warm and well-ventilated barn; never let them out even to drink on cold, stormy days. It is cheaper to take the water to them. Never let them get chilly if you can help it. They fall off in milk, require more food, and are worse off every way. If you wish them to give milk in winter, as they ought to, just cut up a little good English hay, straw and corn-stalks, mixed together, a couple of quarts of shorts, or meal, wet the whole, and mix well; then give them a good, generous feed of it every morning and night, at the time of milking, with long hay and roots in the middle of the day. Mark my word, it will make them give down the milk and pay up as they go. Do feed higher, and take more pains about the cows, for I tell you it will pay. When you like to go half starved and frozen it will be time enough to neglect your creatures.

MAYOR'S COURT.—This Court, established for the purpose of adjudicating in cases of Small Debts, is composed of His Worship the Mayor, with two Councillors; or, in the Mayor's absence, three Councillors. Its sittings are held at the City Hall, on the first Friday in each month, with power to adjourn to the following day. The last day of issuing Summonses for these monthly sittings, is the Wednesday week previous to the said first Friday. At the sittings in the months of March, June, September and December only, can debts over £8, and not exceeding £20, be adjudicated upon; the remaining eight months are restricted to the adjustment of debts not exceeding £8.


