SAN FRANCISCO HAS A STRIKE ON

All the Street Car Lines Tied up by Striking Car-men, and Telephone Service Also Badly Crippled--8,000 Iron Workers Out.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—San Francisco is again in the throes of a bitter strike. For the third time since the disastrous fire of a year ago, San Francisco is walking because of the declaration of a strike on all the street car lines in the city by the Car-men's Union.

Large crowds surrounded the car barns at Turk and Fillmore streets where the strikers met with no success. The carmen have organized an extensive picket detail at each car barn. The pickets are changed every four hours and according to President Cornelius have been instructed to permit no violence.

PROF. GRAHAM BELL HAS A LAUDABLE AMBITION

His One Idea Now is To Invent Something His Wife Can Use.

LONDON, May 6.—Becoming reminiscent of his inventions, Professor Alexander Graham Bell, just given the degree of doctor of science at Oxford, says that he was surprised to learn that his invention of 1880, the phonograph, by means of which speech is transmitted by a beam of light, is unknown in England, except to scientists, although it was used in Germany to establish communication between lighthouses and the shore.

Russian Fires on Cuirassiers in a Paris Square



PARIS, May 4.—The first of May in Paris, of which there had been dire forebodings, passed with but few breaches of the peace, until evening. An omnibus of the Madeline-Bastille line was traversing the Place de la Republique when a man on the top leaned over the side and began to hurl invectives at the cuirassiers drawn up in the square. He had apparently worked himself up into a paroxysm of fury and suddenly drew a revolver from his pocket and fired three shots in the direction of the soldiers.

HE HELD UP THE WHOLE SERVICE

Angry Husband Demoralizes Atlanta Car Traffic Looking for Conductor Who Winked at His Wife.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 4.—Armed with a heavy club, Oscar Huggard, a husband of two months, held up a dozen trolley cars in Atlanta yesterday and demanded the entire system in an effort to find a conductor who winked at his wife. Huggard stationed himself on Whitehall street, a main thoroughfare, and, as a car appeared he leaped aboard, rushed to the conductor, and, brandishing his club, cried: "Are you the man that winked at my wife?"

"Winked at your wife?" the conductor said aghast. "Why, I never saw you or her either before in my life."

After an argument of ten minutes or more that brought all the men in the car to the platform the motorman was allowed to go on. But the husband resumed his watch, waiting for the next car. Five cars were held up in this manner without finding the winked-at conductor.

By this time traffic on Whitehall street line was demoralized. The police arrested Huggard. He is a business man and promptly gave bond. According to Mrs. Huggard, as she left a car she had been winked at by one of the conductors.

SPIRITED TALK ON LIQUOR QUESTION

Evangelical Alliance Had a Lively Meeting This Morning—Prof. Nichols, of Boston, the Principal Speaker—Discussion Was Warm at Times.

The Evangelical Alliance met at 10:30 this morning in the parlors of St. Andrew's church, the chairman, Rev. David Lang, presiding. Rev. S. Howard moved the appointment of a committee to arrange for the selection of a chaplain for the Boys' Industrial Home, to succeed Rev. W. S. Pritchard, who is about to leave the city, and the following committee was appointed—Rev. D. Hutchinson, Rev. S. Howard (convenor), Rev. W. S. Pritchard, Rev. D. Lang and Rev. Dr. W. O. Raymond.

Dr. Fotheringham was asked to serve on this committee but declined, stating that he was not very enthusiastic over the matter and felt that the church had not to pay the chaplain and the matter was really for the government.

Resolutions of regret at the departure from the city of Revs. P. J. Stackhouse and W. S. Pritchard were also read and adopted.

Dr. Fotheringham said he had no definite information relative to the alliance meeting in London, Eng., this summer, and the appointment of a delegate from the local alliance was regarded as impracticable.

Professor Nichols of Boston, then delivered an address on the church in its attitude towards the liquor traffic. He said the liquor evil was generally regarded as detrimental to the Christian church. It existed only on the sufferance of the church. The saloons will not go till the churches vote go. The saloons are avowed enemies of the church, and if resolutions would kill them they would have been killed long ago. This is a practical plan could be devised to wrestle with the liquor license system, and for the promotion of prohibition.

The speaker then went on to a vigorous attack on the license system which he strongly denounced as a mere compromise with evil.

Compromise with sin, he declared, was the strength of the saloon and no protection to the people. The church should be uncompromising in its aggressive action towards the dram shops.

Prof. Nichols then read over the aims and objects of the National Temperance Conference which met in January in Pittsburg, Pa. This was aimed mainly against the liquor license system, and for the promotion of prohibition.

Mr. Hutchinson in moving a vote of thanks to the speaker asked if Prof. Nichols could tell of any more the church could do than was being done.

The meeting closed with benediction by Rev. S. Howard.

A LESSON FOR ST. JOHN

It will be of interest to these St. John aldermen who hesitated about giving a very small grant in aid of supervised playgrounds to learn that in Winnipeg there is a public playgrounds committee of the city council, and that it will ask the council to vote on the question of submitting to the ratepayers a by-law providing \$200,000 to purchase and equip playgrounds.

The nearest approach to a large free playground St. John has ever enjoyed will be the Victoria grounds this year, under the auspices of the Every Day Club; and it is to be regretted that financial conditions will make it necessary to impose any restrictions at all as to participation in the benefits.

A motion also went through to set aside the exhibition grounds as public playgrounds when not in use for exhibition purposes.

A decision was also reached to recommend that all the property owned by the city in blocks 2 and 3 D. G. S. 43-44 St. John's plan 329, be held for use as recreation grounds.

The council will also be asked to vote on a recommendation to prepare and submit to the ratepayers a by-law to raise \$200,000 for purchasing and equipping playgrounds.

Mr. Pufford said that public playgrounds should be provided now. Property was able to get close in property before it was built upon.

Mr. A. McIntyre came as a representative of the Principals' association of the city. He also felt that he represented all the children of the city.

Mr. Haddock, physical director of the union of athletic organizations, urged the movement in other public playgrounds.

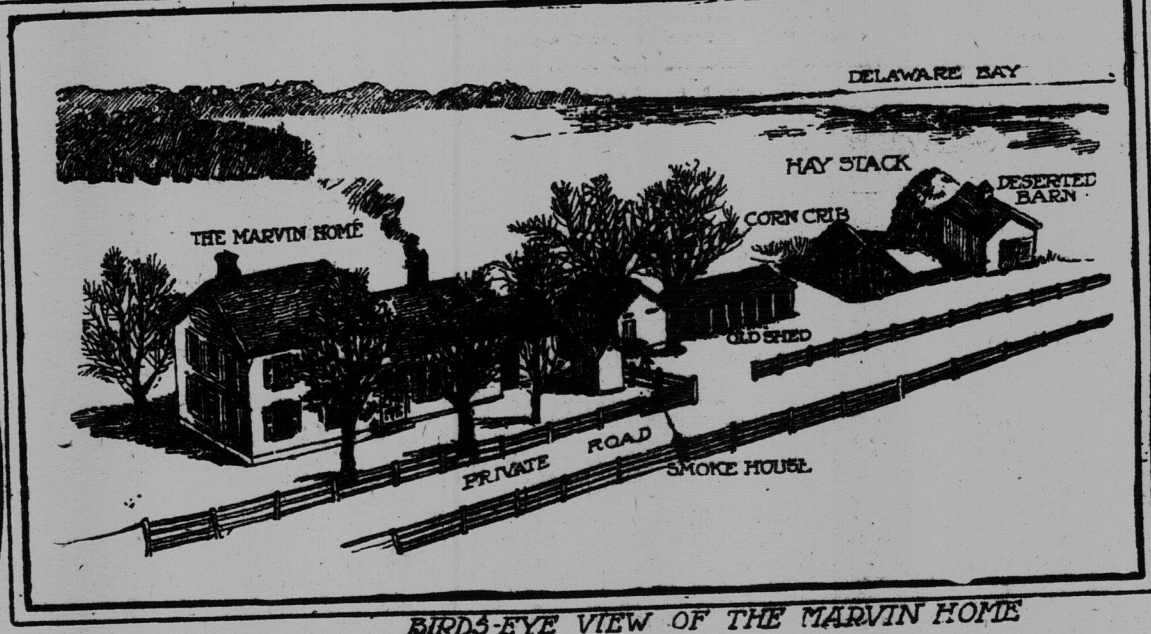

WHEN ST. JOHN BALL PLAYERS WENT TO DEFEAT IN BANGOR

Story of An Old Time Ball Game Played in Bangor on July 4, 1876, Between Bangor Orients and Mutuals of St. John.

(Bangor Commercial) The Commercial has received a letter from Charles F. Olive of the St. John Times asking that it publish the account of the baseball game which was played in this city, July 4, 1876, between the Bangor Orients and St. John Mutuals. As there is considerable local interest in happenings of these early days, the Commercial takes pleasure in publishing the complete story which was printed in the Commercial of July 5, 1876.

As far as the Commercial can ascertain, a number of members of the Bangor Orients are still alive. Fleming is in San Francisco, Hall at Bucksport, Eugene M. Hersey died recently, and David J. McGraw has a grocery store at the corner of Grove and Garland streets, and Fred Woodbury is a railway mail clerk, while the other members of that famous nine cannot be located.

The account was as follows: Perhaps the most exciting feature of yesterday's entire programme was the match game of baseball between the Orients of Bangor and the Mutuals of St. John, for a silver ball, offered by the city of Bangor. Somehow or other the people got an inkling that the game would be a very hotly contested one, and, as a result, 200 people, in carriages and on foot, gathered to witness the sport. The carriages occupied the streets and "outfield," while the pedestrians crowded close to the lines of the diamonds on the third and first base sides. The St. John visitors occupied a position at the side of the catcher's stand and opposite the scores. The grounds were not in excellent condition, but were, nevertheless, much better than formerly. During the forenoon a wind had been distributed in places, needful it, especially in wet spots.

The Orients won the toss and sent the Mutuals to the bat. Each club scored one on the first innings. The Mutuals went in on their second innings, and, through unfortunate playing on the side of the Orients, succeeded in making five scores. The Orients took their half of the innings in a blank. Again the Mutuals took up the bat and succeeded in entering five more scores before the third man was out. The Orients went in for another one, two, three--out. On the fourth innings the Orients held the Mutuals down to one score, and by hard work made three for themselves. The game now stood level, five to five. The St. John boys and Bangoreans began to grow down-hearted. How our boys were going to pick up, they couldn't see--but they picked up, nevertheless. The Mutuals, confident and happy, went in on their fifth. But alas for them, the Orients had commenced business in earnest and without adding a score to the list, our provincial cousins gave up the bat to the Orients. By good playing on the part of the Orients and errors on the Mutuals, our boys succeeded in making five scores. The shouts, yells and hurrahs which greeted this unmistakable improvement on the part of the Orients--was deafening.

This, too, was greeted with shouts. And now the Mutuals step to the striker's plate for the ninth and last time. The Orients are two ahead of them and have yet another chance at the bat. The Mutuals got one man as far as the second base when the third baseman took a fly and one man was out. Another Mutual struck the air three times and he retired. Then another Mutual put a fly down to second base and was taken--three out, side out and our boys victorious. Hurrah for Bangor! The crowd was almost frantic with joy and crowded around so it was hard work to clear the field. The Orients then went in one, two, three, but the game was theirs and don't you forget it!
