Science Builds \$70,000 Dam

By DAVID DIETZ.

SCIENTISTS are planning to build an arch dam one hundred feethigh near Fresno, Callf, at a cost of 870,000. As soon as they have built it they will set about destroying it. But in destroying \$70,000 worth of concrete masonry, the scientists carpect to settle problems that are centuries old and to save the future builders af arch dams not thousands but milions of dollars. For, paradoxical as it sounds, scientists have found that one way to improve things is to destroy them.

The scientist calls this process "testing to destruction." It is practiced by the U. S. Bureau of Standards, the U. S. Bureau of Mines, the national fire underwriters' labratories, and many manufacturing companies, including especially the makers of telephones and electrical apparatus.

An engineer designs a telephone transmitter that he thinks is better than one in use. Accordingly the transmitter is put before a graphophone which shouts "hello" into it continuously, day and night, until the telephone transmitter breaks. The record is then compared with the record for other types of transmitters.

The U. S. Bureau of Standards tests steel beams by smashing them with a hydraulic press capable of exerting thousands of tons pressure.
