THAT MURDER VERDICT AT CORK

Matter Comes Up in the British Commons - Sinn Fein Prisoners Taken Away.

London, April 22.—The question has been raised in the House of Commons whether the persons accused of murder in the Cork jury's verdict at the Mayor's Court should be brought to trial. The attorney-general for Ireland, the Right Hon. Denis Henney, said he was awaiting the report of the evidence before he would consider the matter. Replied to another query, Mr. Henney said that it was a matter affecting the public service he could give no further information as to whether the government had proof that Mayor McCurtain was murdered by a secret society and if so, why this evidence was not produced at the inquiry. Charges of wilful murder in the death of Lord Mayor McCurtain were made in the verdict against Premier Lloyd George, Lord French, lord lieutenant of Ireland, Ian MacPherson, late chief secretary for Ireland, Acting Inspector-General Smith of the Royal Irish Constabulary and other officials. Belfast, April 22.—The removal of fifteen Sinn Fein prisoners from Belfast and a large number from Queenstown on three destroyers leads to the belief that the authorities are planning to transport all Sinn Fein prisoners from Ireland. The house of a merchant named Stewart in County Down was destroyed by fire yesterday. In Limerick the Theatre Royal was attacked on Wednesday night by a dozen armed men who took the receipts of the day. Dublin, April 22.—Many raids were made last evening by the military in the villages around Dublin and also in the town yesterday. No arrests are reported. The last hunger striker was removed from Mountjoy prison yesterday. He was taken to a hospital.

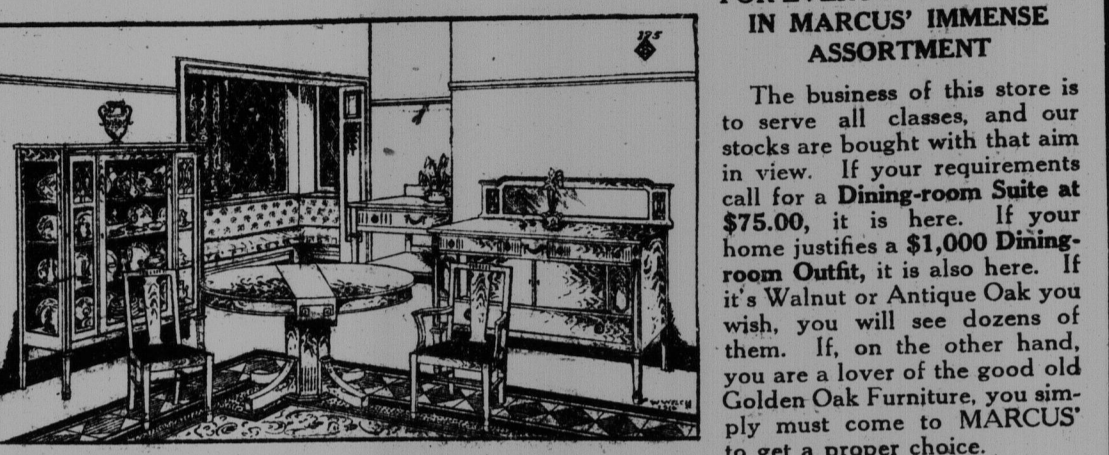

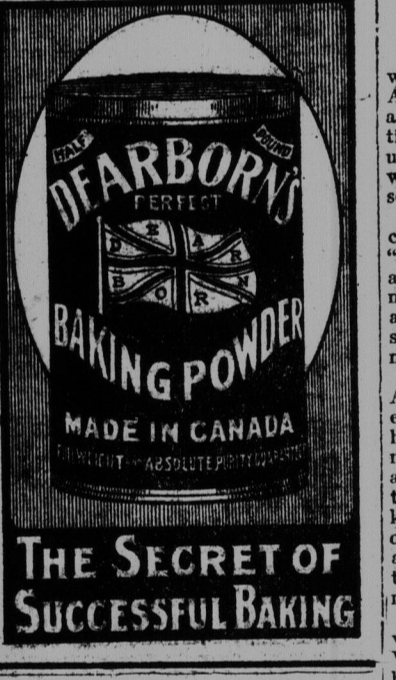

Sullis, newly elected grand secretary; J. Starr Tait, S. B. Budin, Francis Kerr, C. B. Ward, J. E. Arturs, K. B. Spears, J. King Kelley, Isaac Mercer, D. Hipwell, E. H. Hennigan, as well as others from various parts of the county and from points in other parts of the province.

Many matters of interest to the Orange order were dealt with at the sessions and the delegates were kept particularly busy. The statistical reports, it was said today, were still incomplete but an increase in membership was reported and a balance of some \$16,000 reported in the funds. An annual grant of \$2,000 was made to the St. John Protestant Orphanage in Carleton. The work done by a special committee in this connection was sustained. It was reported that \$12,000 had been raised within the order for this institution. A liberal grant was made to the 'Frederic's Aid.' Neil J. Morrison, who retired as grand secretary, has been twenty-two years in that office, during which time he has rendered capable and painstaking service. He is known to Orangemen all over the province and held esteem by all. L. A. Palmer, grand master, was empowered to represent the grand lodge at the supreme convention in Calgary and all officers of grand lodge are privileged to attend also if they desire. There were 110 delegates present at the sessions and much business was accomplished.

THREE CHARGES AGAINST HIM

BABY CLINIC AND NURSES' SCHOOL

Important Developments in Connection With Work of Victorian Order Expected Soon.

Through the efforts of the minister of health and the Victorian Order of Nurses, St. John, is to have in the future not only a baby clinic but a school at which the order's nurses are to be trained and thereby to do away with the necessity and delay of sending to Upper Canada to receive members of the staff doing duty in the city. This was the statement made by Commissioner Baulgo, one of the members of the board to a Times reporter this morning.

He said that during this session of the legislature, Hon. Dr. Roberts would ask for an appropriation of \$2,000 towards the establishment of the baby clinic, which would be established in the new home of the order in Carleton street. Here it is proposed to have periodical lectures for mothers and here also treatment will be given to children. It is felt that this method will be much superior to the present scheme of visiting the ailing children in their homes as more up to date and thorough equipment can be kept on hand.

Provision has been made by the order, some time ago for the establishment of a school for nurses and it is understood that \$5,000 has been set aside from a fund held by the headquarters of the order, for the work in this city. Following the permanent institution of the school, it is said, its maintenance will be taken care of partly by grant from the provincial government. It is felt that this is a most progressive and beneficial line and the results should be beneficial.

At the present time there are seven nurses on the order in the city, five residing at Haymarket square and two on the west side. They will occupy their new home about May 1.

Warns U. S. About Pulpwood. Washington, April 23.—Calling attention to the heavy increase in pulpwood imported from Canada last year over 1918, Colonel Wm. B. Greeley, recently appointed chief forester of the United States, warns the United States of the seriousness of its timber situation. partisan. The line of argument followed by the delegation from the New Brunswick branch of the Dominion Alliance which appeared before the legislature and urged that a resolution be passed in the matter of a referendum on inter-provincial traffic in liquor, was as follows:

The temperance alliance desires to express its appreciation of the courtesy of the premier in arranging for this meeting to the members of the legislature for their presence.

We are representing all the churches of this province and a good many other organizations as well.

We are here to ask the legislature to pass a resolution asking the dominion government to appoint a referendum enabling the voters of this province to say if they wish prohibitions to be made effective. Unless this resolution be passed by the legislature the referendum cannot be taken.

The legislature of this province in 1916 passed a prohibitory law to prevent the sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes within the province, and in spite of its limitations it has been successful beyond our most sanguine expectations.

One of the greatest hindrances to the effective enforcement of the law has been the importation of liquors into the province under the dominion law regarding inter-provincial trade.

The dominion order-in-council passed in 1918 prohibited this importation with marked beneficial results in this province.

This order-in-council was repealed by the dominion government with disastrous results to the enforcement of the prohibition laws of the several provinces making them largely ineffective.

The dominion house of commons passed the necessary legislation to provide by statute for the prohibition which had been given by order-in-council, but for some unaccountable cause the bill of the people's representatives was rejected by the senate.

The house then passed in amendment to the Canada Temperance act providing that any province might take a referendum vote of the people giving to them the power to decide on the question of the importation of liquor into the province for beverage purposes.

The process by which the vote is to be brought into effect in any province is as follows:

1. The legislative assembly of the province must pass a resolution signifying a desire that a vote be taken on the question.

2. The resolution must be sent to the secretary of state for Canada—that is the resolution we now ask you to pass.

3. The dominion governor-general-in-council will then issue a proclamation announcing the date and detailing the arrangement for taking the vote.

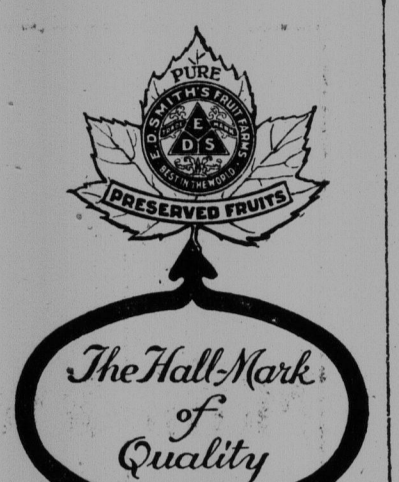
4. If more than one-half of the total number of votes cast are in favor of prohibition the governor-general-in-council will, by proclamation, declare the law in force in such province.

The effect will be to prevent the importation into the province of liquor for beverage purposes, allowing it for medicinal, manufacturing and sacramental purposes.

6. All the provinces, with the exception of Quebec, have already passed or are passing similar resolutions with similar aims.

7. It may be asked why this resolution is being asked for when the government has already provided for a vote on the provincial prohibition law.

If the vote under the provincial law be favorable, of which we have no doubt, the question of importation would still remain as it is today, one of the great barriers in the enforcement of our own provincial law.



The Hall Mark of Quality

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The dominion referendum is necessary to settle this question and to remove this difficulty. The reason why we ask it now at this session before the provincial question is settled, is this—that unless it is done at this session it will be fifteen or eighteen months before it could be brought into force, as it would need at least three months after the next session of the house before the vote could be taken, and paralyzing the enforcement of the provincial law during all that time.

All the provinces are ahead of us on this question except Quebec. You gentlemen are equally interested with us in the success of the prohibitory law and doubtless will be as anxious as we are to give the people a chance to say for themselves what they wish to have done and which can only be done by the passing of this resolution we are now asking you to pass.

The delegation also impressed the following four reasons:

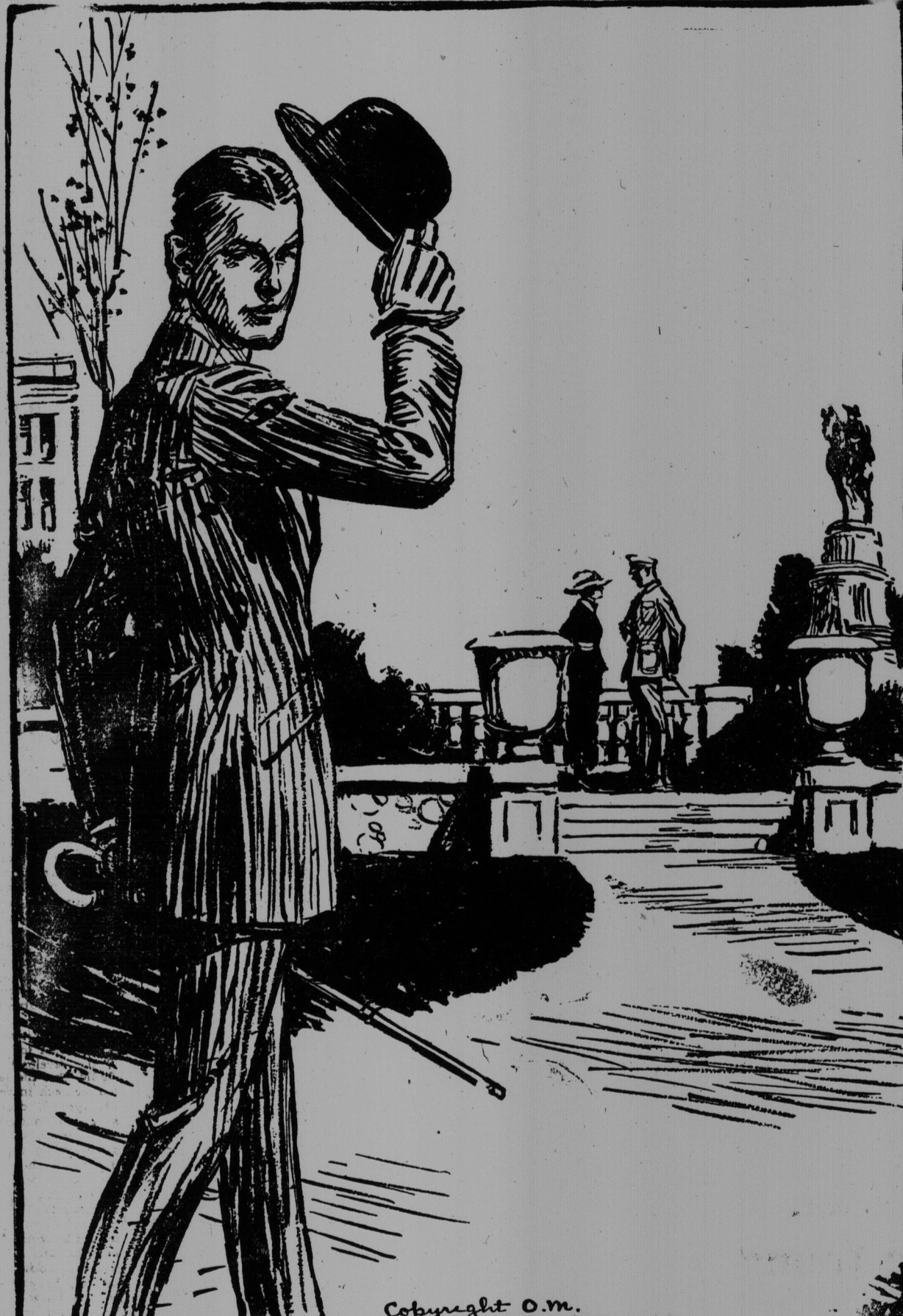
1. consistency and common sense in relation to the provincial law as well.

2. In the interests of law and order.

3. International obligations especially to the State of Maine.

4. As a principle of democracy.

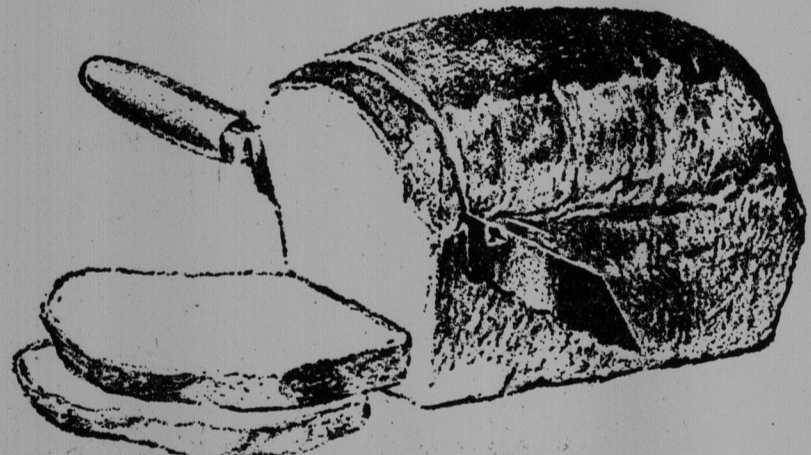

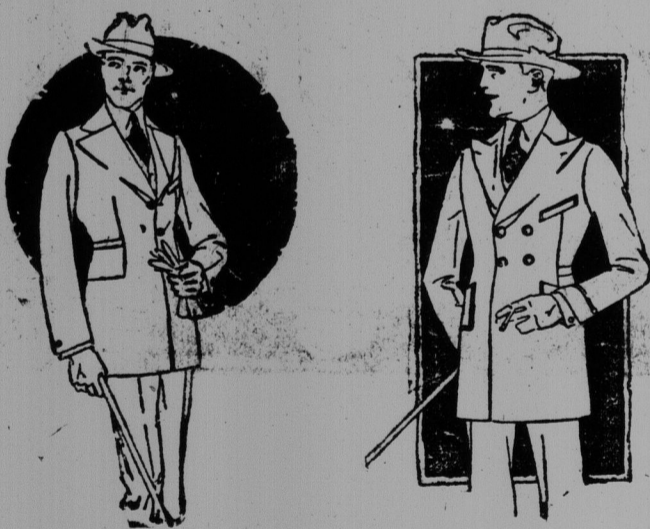
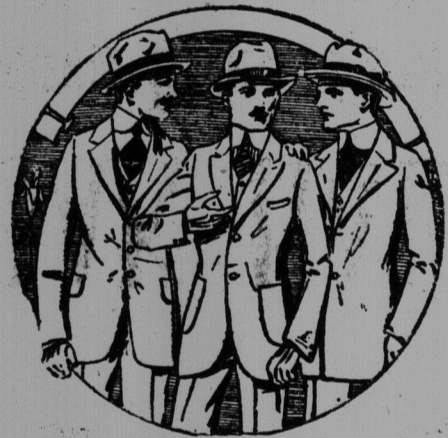

C. P. R. CAR ORDERS.

Orders for rolling stock placed by the C. P. R. in connection with the recent sale of \$12,000,000 of equipment notes will give much additional business to the Canadian car builders, in addition to the large amount already on their books. Box cars with a carrying capacity of sixty tons each will be constructed, forty-one feet in length and nine feet six inches high. These dimensions are considerably larger than any type used on the American railroads. The Canadian Car & Foundry Company has been given an order for 1400 cars for its Fort William plant, and the Eastern Car Company of Amherst, N. S., will make 600 more. The C. P. R. will build 500 refrigerator cars in its Angus shops.

Doorknobs Start Mill.

Nelson, B. C., April 23—After an active winter's logging in the two camps in the Kooch limits on the Little Sloon, the Christian Community of Universal Brotherhood, otherwise the Doorknobs, have started up the sawmill at Kooch. The mill has a capacity of 50,000 feet per day, and there are logs already accumulated to keep it operating throughout the summer.

No Insurance for Children.

Victoria, B. C., April 23—To remove any temptation which excessive insurance on a child's life might give, a bill prohibiting the writing of life insurance on any child under twelve months of age, and limiting the amount on children of two years to \$25, three years to \$40, four years, \$48, and up to \$260 for a child of ten, has been introduced in the provincial legislature.
