

## UNITED STATES PROPOS-ALS TO CHECK H. C. OF L.

Last Friday President Wil-son laid several specific pro-posals before Congress for checking the high cost of liv-ing. The following is a short summary of his pronounce-ment.

ment: High prices not justified by abortage of supplies. Ratilers were responsible largely for extortionate prices. Strikes will only make mat-ters worse, and recoil on in-effectore

one's country counts for more than in most places the One Big Unionists are telling the workers that they need a "truly Canadian" organization and that they will find it in the One Big Union. Yet at the Calgary Convention where this illegitimate child was born greet ings were sent to the Soviets in Russia and the Spartacan in Germany. Do these men care one iota for Canada? We think not. They would not hesitate to overthrow constituted authority and responsible Government. They aim, as their constitution states, to control industry and set up a Soviet form of government. Their emblem is the "Red" flag-an international flag of all nations. However, we believe that British government is the only sound one in the world and while we all agree that many of the laws have long since outlived their usefulness we are firm in our belief that the laws can and will be amended to suit existing conditions. This can only be brought about by united effort of all workers and if these "Time Wasters" and "Seccessionists" would use the same effort in ebtaining this end instead of concentrating all their efforts to destroy Canada we could achieve this end.

We have our organization with "truly Canadian" autonomy-the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress to which is affiliated all International Trade Unions. But because this body does not and will not approve of general and sympathetic strikes, Soviet Government or the "Red" flag these "Radicals" and "Time Wasters," who did not care one hoot about Canada during the war and certainly care less now that a victorious peace has been signed, tell us that the One Big Union is the only "truly Canadian" organization.

Workers of Canada take no heed to these frantic ravings of imbecility which would sway you from your moorings and cut the cables that hold you safe in the harbor of International Trade Unionism.

## A RACE FOR THE WORKERS' WEAL.

VENTS are moving rapidly in the Dominion to make for labor legislation which has been withheld and considerably overdue. However, the blazing of the trail by the International Trade Union Movement has been efficacious, having kept to the forefront the problems of the workers for which general legislation was required to overcome.



After investigation the Eoard of Trade is authorized to declare what is a reasonable price and require that the article be sold at that price. In case of failure to sell ar-ticles at the price specified the board is empowered to take pro-ceedings against offenders before a court of summary jurisdiction. The Board of Trade may anther-ine the local authorities under pre-iseribed conditions to purchase and sell any article to which the act applies. 
