THE CANADIAN LABOR LEAGUE

Political Movement for the Working Classes Started on a Sound Basis.

After several weeks of consideration, the committee appointed by the District Council have arrived at a satisfactory understanding. It is proposed to make this the groundwork of a party that will spread its influence and numbers, and before very long will be a power in politics that will give returns to the workers for the labor expended. The following are the platform and rules, and it is to be hoped that every worker will take the matter up and get in line:

PREAMBLE.

We assert that the working out of our present system of government does not give to the people of this country an equitable share of the material things of life, and to the end that a better system may be inaugurated, guaranteeing to all equal privileges and opportunities, we call upon all men to join hands under the banner of the Canadian Labor League, formed to bring into force the following progressive reforms in our present system of government:

PLATFORM.

1. Public ownership of all natural opportunities and public utilities.
2. The initiative, referendum and power of recall.
3. Abolition of all houses to railways and industries.
4. To the people belong the values created by the growth and organization of society, and to the end that they may get their rights in this respect we pledge ourselves to so legislate.
5. Equal protection to the worker and manufacturer.
6. Abolition of all child labor.
7. Women franchise.
8. Abolition of the appointive Senate.

NAME.

This body shall be known as the Canadian Labor League. Its aim and object shall be the advancement of labor interest, as laid down in its platform and preamble.

MEMBERSHIP.

All persons of the age of 21 years and over shall be eligible to membership, but previous to their admittance they shall subscribe to the pledge.

PLEDGE.

I hereby pledge myself to do all in my power to carry out the platform and principles of the Canadian Labor League, and I further pledge myself to abide by the will of the majority in all matters pertaining to the furtherance of the said platform and principles in whatever may be necessary, as adopted by the majority of its members in convention assembled.

DUES.

The dues shall be 50 cents per year, payable half yearly or yearly in advance. For this sum he shall receive the official organ of the League (The Toiler).

The present committee appointed by the District Labor Council shall conduct the business of the League until 150 members shall be enrolled, when a convention shall be called to elect officers and perform any other business necessary for the future conduct of the League.

Any member found guilty of conniving to use this League in the interest of any party other than this League, or who does anything which will tend to bring the League into disrepute shall be expelled.

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

Current Comment

The result of the vote of the proposed to inaugurate the eight-hour day by the principle of majority voting in favor of it. The vote stood: For the eight-hour proposition, 19,443; against, 5,485. This means that where agreements are not against it, the eight hour day will be inaugurated all over the jurisdiction in January, 1906.

A PADDED MEMBERSHIP

The National Congress has only about 2,500 Members, while Claiming Ten Thousand.

We would recommend trade unionists to read carefully the report of the so-called National Trades and Labor Congress, which recently held its second annual convention in Ottawa.

T. J. Griffiths, the secretary-treasurer, claims a total membership of 19,453 in 47 local unions. This membership, at a capitation tax of 12 cents a member per year, should net a total revenue from that source of \$1,257.20, but no reference is made to the original report of the auditors.

It is found that the capitation tax received only amounted (all told) to \$260.00, which would show a paying membership of less than 2,500.

The report states that two out of the forty-seven local unions are in London, Ontario; and they are credited with 200 members.

Now, we know what we are talking about when we state that this is a deliberate fabrication. Secretary Griffiths says only too well that the two national unions formed in London to act as strike-breakers were stillborn, and that at the time of their birth, in fact, outside of a month they were reduced to non-existence, and that occurred over twelve months ago, and we doubt if they ever paid a cent of capitation tax.

The other figures in the report of the secretary-treasurer are equally reliable with those that refer to London, Ontario. We don't wonder that the capitation tax only totals \$260.00.

We don't presume to speak for other places. We prefer to let the auditor's report speak for itself; but we do know that the national movement does not exist in London, and that Secretary Griffiths knew of that fact when he prepared his official report.

Just got the October Labor Gazette and figure the problem out for yourself: don't take our word for it, but go by the official report of the National Congress itself. You will find it the richest thing you ever read, and we only wonder that Griffiths was so short-sighted as to let the official auditor's report get into print. Just read up the proceedings of the convention as given in the Government publication and you will not be long in arriving at the conclusion that the whole aggregation is a row of mighty small potatoes that has been struck by a freight.

Industrial Banquet.

The Trades Council, at the last regular meeting, decided to adjourn for two weeks. The principal item of business transacted was the consideration of a letter from Secretary Mitchell, of the British Trades Congress, dealing with published statements of principles to have been made by Mr. Vansittart, president of the Trades Congress. Upon a thorough investigation, it was found that the so-called manufactured one and a half deliberately falsehood, published by the enemies of organized labor in an effort to separate the brothers on the other side of the pond from those over here. It will fail, however, as the expedition sent to Secretary Mitchell for publication over there will show the British trades unionists just where their Canadian brothers stand.

AIL TO EDUCATION

Labor Movement a Great Force in Americanization — Must Admit All on Equal Terms.

In an article on "The Effect of Trade Unionism" in the Labor Clarion, Prof. John R. Commons of the University of Wisconsin declares that the trade union is the greatest of existing forces in what is called Americanization.

SHAM BATTLE OF CAPITALISM.

The quadrennial sham battle between the forces of capitalism in the United States known as the Republican and Democratic parties occurred on Tuesday of last week amid all the cloud of vapors about principle and glorious records, and resulted in the strenuous President being re-elected by the enormous plurality of over a million. This means there will be no change and consequently no improvement for the great masses who, by voting for one or other of the parties, have fastened the shackles of capitalism on themselves still more firmly.

If the Democrats had been elected, the capitalists would still have been at the top, just as they are here as a result of our election. It pays the corporations to assist a scrap in having the appearance of being genuine, for these contests are

practically ruled by the Almighty Dollar.

gress we must get back to the great Creator and give of all our Heavenly Father.

CLASS DISTINCTIONS.

This money god has graded humanity into so many classes that one might easily conceive, when they perceive the lines drawn so closely, that each class was made of a different kind of flesh and blood instead of us recognizing that we are all children of our Heavenly Father.

WE MIGHT MEDITATE.

On Thanksgiving Day we might give a little time to meditating on "The Fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man, and that this earth was intended for our use. Christ was so busy teaching us that God was our Father and that all men were our brothers that He did not have time to own a place even large enough for Him to lay His head.

THE DOLLAR STANDARD RULES.

We have got this "dollar god" to work down to fine that the man who digs the sewer of a house has one price, the man who does the woodwork a higher price, the man who builds it a higher one still, and the man who draws the plan the highest price. In every realm of

human life we have the "dollar god's"

price placed on humanity, but we never think that all humanity has the same red blood in their veins and are created by their Heavenly Father, and that not one of our dollar kings has any more aspirations, feelings or needs than is common to all humanity.

STAND THE TEST.

There are two ideas to-day that govern humanity that will have to pass through the fiery test of public opinion—one in profit, the other wage or salary. If they are based on truth they will stand, but if they are false principles they will have to pass away and make room for the manhood standard of Christ to be applied to our industrial affairs, the same as we have applied it as the principle by which the church, state and school are governed. We give a man a voice in the control of these three because he is a man.

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

CHRISTIAN UNITY

As Viewed by a Workman - How
Best Can It Be Carried Out?
The Short Hour Question.

Editor Toiler: Although it is a fact
that the retail clerks belong to the
labor cause, a good many of them are
not yet on the side. They are
guilty of this simple fact. How
is that? There are many reasons. One
is that, being very busy during
their working day, they think themselves
a great deal better than a carpenter, or
trucklayer, who is not so fortunate in much
better circumstances as is a shop worker.

Bad wages, an unlimited work day,
overtime without extra pay, and sometimes
things working on Sunday, are common
things amongst them. The employment
of number of boys and girls are bringing
cheap labor conditions and spoiling
the wages for the adult male and female
workers, and the "middle class" are
making the profits of the day in the high
shops, and so on upward. They can

make that Saturday half-holiday

established in the large cities of the

United States and Canada. I can re-

member in the early history of the Broth-

erhood of Carpenters when there was

more talk but little progress in the es-

tablishing of the shorter hours in the

United States. Of course, San Fran-

cisco carpenters, in the latter half of

the sixties, and the Eight-Hour League

in existence of this day in progress was

made, or at least The Carpenter did not

intimate such. In the first decade of

The Carpenter will be found a letter of

mine dealing with the short hour ques-

tion, particularly stating that the

Saturday half-holiday was established

here in Toronto by the Brotherhood of

Carpenters and Amalgamated Society

of Carpenters, and that the nine-hour day

was in a fair way of being carried out

by us. I can follow examples

of our English brothers and form an

organization of all shop workers, and let

us work together to get better conditions.

Alone we cannot do much, united we are

able to get what we want. Don't let us

be separated on account of a better sit-

uation. What we have to day we might

lose to-morrow.

If there are comrades who feel the

need of an organization for the shop workers, and I am sure there are many,

let us come together, and we will try

to get a union for shop workers and

warehouses in Toronto. So let us

be of real benefit for all shop workers.

As a consistent observer of the short

hour movement, it is my desire here to

ask attention to a part of the subject

that touches upon Christian duty that
