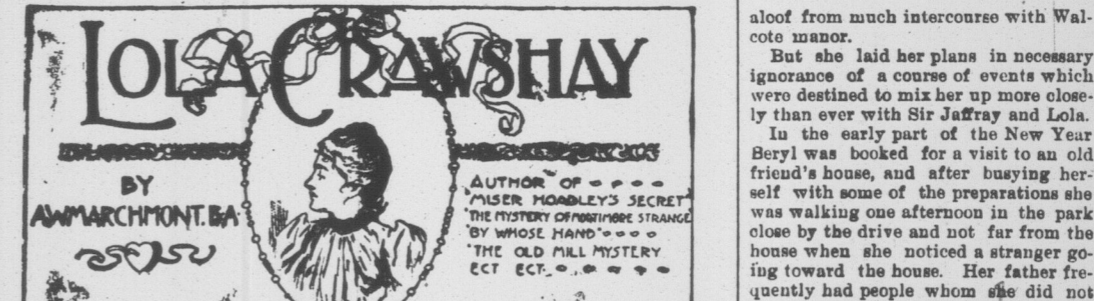

A large decline in the prices of breadstuffs is noted. Manitoba flours are quoted at \$3.50 and Ontario flours at \$5 to 5.40 per barrel.

The people are not voting on the obligation or ritual of any temperance society. They are voting to show whether or not a majority of them are in favor of the sale or manufacture of intoxicating liquor.

The feature of the month's trade is the enormous increase in imports, a considerable part of which is to be credited to the Yukon requirements.

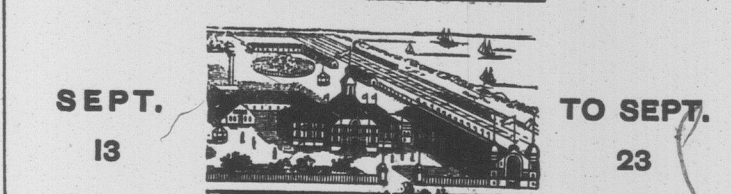
