

Head Crushed by Flying Deal in Bart Duffy and His Revolver Put an Murray & Gregory's Mill-Inquest Tonight.

A fatal accident occurred in Murray & Gregory's mill on Saturday afternoon about a quarter past three o'clock. Archie Craig, aged 17, who lives with his mother and four brothers on Merritt street, near the Strait Shore, while standing on the bed near the western end of the mill, was struck on the head by a deal end hurled with terrific violence from the edger and killed instantly.

THE RACE SUICIDE QUESTION.

(Philadelphia Enquirer).

Dr. W. H. Tolman, director of the American Institute of Social Science, told the following story the other day as an unconscious illustration of the prevailing sentiment in regard to the "race suicide" problem:

(Brooklyn Eagle.)


