We estimated the receipts from the Dominion govern-ment on account of the cost of wharves at \$7,500, but we did not receive so large a sum. We have an arrangement with them that they are to pay half the cost of the wharves on the tidal water of the St. John and its tribu-taries During the present year we ex-pect to receive the amount due us in full. Another item which we did not get was'\$13,189 for refund of fishing leases. This claim arises from the Do-minion government having taken pos-session of a river which we had leased to private parties. We claim that they should indemnify us for the rental. The claim is a fair one, and we will continue to press it. In this connec-tion I am glad to inform the house that the Dominion government are fully im-pressed with the desirability of getting all fishery questions adjusted as soon as possible. ANOTHER CABLE ACROSS STRAITS Will Be Adapted to Either **Telephone or Telegraph**

Prominent Business Men Interested-Major James C. Pollard Dead— **Raumond Gillis Rhodes Scholar** 64

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., March 19.—A company is being organized comprising prominent business men in 19.—A company is being organized comprising prominent business men in this province and Halifax to establish interprovincial telephone communica-tion by laying a cable under the Straits of Northumberland. The company will apply to the federal government for a charter and subsidy. Two of the pro-moters recently returned from Ottawa after interviewing the government. It is proposed to have the cable adapted to either telephone or telegraph. The laying of the telephone cable will be an important engineering feat in the narrowest part of the straits, nine miles, but it is not stated between what points the connection will be made. The new line is expected to be in oper-ation early this summer. At the pre-sent the only cable under the straits is the Anglo-American telegraph.
