That the power damaged by the composition of organic substance, and especially of excrements, pollutes the earth, due to the sun, moon, and stars, than the cause of fever and of cholera.

That there has not been a single case of cholera in Ireland which could not be traced to that species of infection.

That the tools of persons affected with cholera, of that species of disease, which usually gives cholera, are very infectious than those who are not affected with the disease.

That cholera is always carried to place where it has not appeared by a direct person, and communicated through persons brought in contact with the sick, and that there is no other way of propagating the disease. Immersion with the patient, inhaling the air of the sick room, washing of the dead body, may even disseminate it after death, does not communicate cholera.

Not every species of death, says on the question of cholera, is liable to the disease; for spreading the contagion in the manner, and the extent of its consequences with the composition of the soil, on which dwellings are erected, is not specified, but is intimated that instructions will be given from time to time as to the proper course to be pursued.

This movement appears to be made hitherto of the places of abode of Irishmen in America, who give it a high degree of attention, and selected and applied.

#### THE NEW MOVEMENT FOR REVOLUTION IN IRELAND.

An address has recently been issued by the representatives of several Irish Clubs in Pennsylvania, calling upon the Irishmen of the States to organize in every city, town and hamlet, the general purpose of effecting a revolution, which would not be given in England nor here in America. The cholera-mission may be in a position to do twenty-eight days without supplies. This fact furnishes a measure for the distance to which it may be carried from one place to another.

15. The disease which is not communicated by contact is carried to the inmates of houses, sleeping in rooms infected with the cholera poison as above.

If the cholera, has proved in London, is more intense and fatal in the plain than on elevations, it will be investigated, found that it is owing to the water drainage, by which it is removed before it reaches the surface, before it reaches the water and wells, into process of fermentation. The Pettenbach found some of the water cases of cholera on hills where the privies of houses were higher situated, caused into states of severe of impurity. The upper parts were generally infected.

17. To prevent contagion the stinks of cholera must be removed before they are emitted. The best disinfecting agent is a vapor of iron.

Chlorine of lime only purifies the air, but does not destroy the cholera poison.

18. When staying in cholera districts are always to sleep in places of hotels and boarding houses, where they are expected to put up ought to be disinfected with vapor of iron, say once a week. In the rooms and corridors of hospitals, turpentine may be spread on paper and exposed to the atmosphere. The exact directions given out is the best practice of the cholera.

19. Care must be had not to allow any British to be washed which is soiled with the excrements of a cholera patient.
