"While the experiment in shad culture at Hampton this spring did not prove as successful as we expected, the results were fairly encouraging," said S. J. Walker, of the department of marine and fisheries, Ottawa, who was at the Royal yesterday.

"This is the first experiment in shad culture made in Canada, and the circumstances attending it were decidedly unfavorable. The high water and cold weather made the fishing out, and we were able to get only a small portion of the fish we wanted.

REV. GEORGE ROSS WILL NOT GO TO CENTENARY CHURCH

Conference Stationed Him There but Church Declines to Receive Him and Rev. Mr. Ross now Refuses the Appointment—President of Conference in City to Arrange Settlement of Matter

According to present indications Rev. George Ross will not occupy the pulpit of Centenary church during the coming year. The recording secretary of that church yesterday received a letter from Mr. Ross to the effect that as the church had declined to receive him as its pastor he would ask that other arrangements be made as promptly as possible to fill the pulpit.

This is the outcome of a discussion which has been going on for some weeks. Centenary, which by changing pastors next year, will be in line with the majority of the churches in the conference, asked the stationing committee of conference either that Dr. Flanders be permitted to remain a fifth year, or that the pulpit be left vacant and Dr. Flanders without a permanent charge.

The stationing committee appointed Dr. Flanders to Marysville and Rev. G. M. Young to Centenary. A protest was entered from Centenary and another from Tryon, P. E. L. to which circuit Mr. Young had been invited.
